



Elaborate and ingenious advertising material from the brewer, the third of these booklets to use the 'Alice' books as a source-text; an excellent copy.





The surrealist touchstone of Lewis Carroll's work dominates the first page of the opening issue, with Henri Parisot's translation of 'The Walrus and the Carpenter' ('Le Morse et le charpentier') -

his influence on this generation throughout enshrined by the periodical's subtitle: 'De l'autre côté du miroir' ('From the other side of the looking-glass'). A Belgian surrealist periodical in newspaper format, issued weekly over the course of two months late during the War. The seventh issue features the first appearance in print of poet and filmmaker Marcel Broodthaers (albeit as Marcel Broodhaerts); Andre Breton, Fernand Dumont, Marcel Mariën, Raymond Roussel, and Pablo Picasso are among the other literary contributors, whilst pictorial elements are provided by René Magritte, Robert Willems, Suzanne van Damme, et al.







A wonderful edition of Carroll's poem, with Jansson's illustrations -

full of her characteristically sombre and quizzical expressions - capturing its mood perfectly. A sparkling copy, and scarce thus - the illustrations were used for an English language version by the Tate Gallery in 2012, but this is their original publication.

The translator, Lars Forssell, was a major literary figure in his homeland with a diverse career, from poetry and journalism to song lyrics - including the Swedish Eurovision entry in 1973.









Inscribed on the flyleaf: 'N.W., With the compliments & regards of the Author. Jan 1936'; the Translator, Hubert Digby Watson, has only partially got above his station here, given that the volume includes an equal weight of his own original work (with a parallel version in Latin in each case) in two sections following his Latinisation of Carroll's verse: the second of these, 'Domestic' is rather negligible, but the first tackles weightier themes - principally involving the work of Save the Children, and the League of Nations. Gilbert Murray's Foreword reveals the author to be the Chairman of the former organisation, and

his introductory note returns us through skilful digression to Carroll's text-identifying political import, where 'the Franco-British proposals for the surrender of the League of Nations to Italy' (i.e., over the latter's invasion of Abyssinia) provides the reflection that '[a]t various crises of history Snarks which looked genuine and solid have proved to be Boojums'.

The first Latin translation of Carroll's poem was published two years earlier, a version in Virgilian hexameter by Percival Robert Brinton - this, then, as the Translator's Preface clarifies is the first in 'Ovidian - or rather Tibullan - elegiacs'; a nice technical distinction, rendering the 'two versions [...] really quite independent of each other'. Both are scarce. The respective translators had, by coincidence, both enjoyed brief first-class cricket careers: Watson

(whose brother Arthur and uncles Reginald and Kenelm Digby also played) had made ten appearances- for Oxford University whilst he was up at Balliol College; Brinton's sole appearance, for Worcestershire, was against the University - yielding one run in his single innings, to provide one of the most readily-calculable batting averages on record.










Though Carroll's late novel is not ranked highly within his oeuvre, its Index alone is a work of genius.


A scarce edition of a selection of Carroll's well-known verses from *Alice's Adventures*, *Through the Looking-Glass* and *Sylvie and Bruno*, including 'Jabberwocky', 'The Lobster Quadrille' and 'The Mad Gardener's Song', brought to colourful life by the bold, playful and slightly terrifying illustrations of Gerald Rose, the youngest winner of the Kate Greenaway medal.

With a gift inscription to the flyleaf, linking this copy to the Bloomsbury Group: 'Saxon, from Dad, Christmas Day 1913'. The recipient was Saxon Sydney-Turner, a civil servant who had been a Cambridge Apostle, and there a friend of Clive Bell, Lytton Strachey, and Leonard Woolf. Beneath the gift inscription is the later ownership inscription of Michael Bagenal, the son of



artist Barbara Bagenal (née Hiles)
- she was a friend of Carrington
from the Slade, with whom
Sydney-Turner had a long
relationship.

This volume, originally published in 1899, was edited by Dodgson's nephew, who was also his first biographer. 'An interesting volume, belying the limitations of its chief title. Besides twenty-four illustrations it contains reprints and new matter which make it an indispensable companion of the 'Life and Letters' (Williams).
