










The extremely scarce de luxe version of a wonderful edition in which Pogany updates our heroine to the Jazz Age, the edition identified by John Davis as 'the first really original interpretation since Tenniel and a milestone in the artistic characterisation of Alice' (*The Illustrators of Alice in Wonderland*).

Lawrence's re-telling of the Alice story proceeds from the coincidence of the opening of the first underground railway in London in 1863 and the early development of Dodgson's tale; it places the familiar characters in a modern setting.

The deluxe portfolio version provides a separate suite of Davidson's wonderful engravings, allowing their many witty details to emerge, alongside the original text (itself replete with many witty details).



An appropriately whimsical take on two of Carroll's nonsense verses, which parodied popular poems of the time. The first poem folds out into a large illustration of Father William doing a headstand with Alice sitting on his feet, and the second is printed on a card cut-out tea tray attached with string to the little bat.


An imaginative and accomplished piece of printing, strikingly illustrated. The printer makes clever use of different type to convey the nonsensical tone of the poem, which was sung by the White Knight in Carroll's *Through the Looking Glass*: only Kabel used for the narrator, whilst the aged man speaks in an eccentric combination of Caslon, Gill Sans, Goudy Old Style, Trajan, Futura, Caviar Dreams, Din and Porter.






A scarce edition of a selection of Carroll's well-known verses from *Alice's Adventures, Through the Looking-Glass* and *Sylvie and Bruno*, including 'Jabberwocky', 'The Lobster Quadrille' and 'The Mad Gardener's Song', brought to colourful life by the bold, playful and slightly terrifying illustrations of Gerald Rose, the youngest winner of the Kate Greenaway medal.








(Reading Room Press.) CARROLL (Lewis, pseud. for Charles L. Dodgson) The Hunting of the Snark. Quenington: Reading Room Press, 2022, ONE OF TWO COPIES (from an edition of 63 copies), set predominantly in 24D *Koch-Antiqua type (cast by Rainer Gerstenberg)* and printed on Zerkall paper, the title and sectiontitles to each of the 8 'Fits' printed in various colours, the latter each with wood-engraving by Ian Corfe-Stephens to verso (a few of these tipped in), further decorations by the same to the text printed in various colours, full-page map (in fact, blank) tipped in, tipped-in photograph facing Colophon, the latter with tipped-in slip at foot giving details of this 'deluxe' edition, pp. [70], 4to, publisher's deluxe binding of quarter darkgreen morocco, with boards of pale green Strathmore Artlaid paper, backstrip lettered in gilt, edges untrimmed, fine £300

One of only two copies in this special binding.

10. Carroll (Lewis, pseud. for Charles Lutwidge Dodgson) The Game of Logic. Macmillan, 1887, FIRST PUBLISHED EDITION, frontispiece diagram, tissue guard, diagrams in text, pp. [xii], 96, [3, list], crown 8vo, original red cloth, lettered in gilt to upper board and backstrip, the latter darkened with slight lean to spine, lightly handled with a couple of small waterspots to upper board, black endpapers with a couple of light creases to flyleaf, laid in: the original printed envelope (dated 1886) containing the game-card (similarly dated) and 9 counters (4 pink and 5 grey), the envelope with a few light marks and two corners with short closed tears repaired with tape, the game card slightly browned and with some light handling, very good (Madan 126; Taylor 472; Williams 196)

The Game of Logic was first printed in 1886 by Baxter of Oxford. Dodgson, however, not uncharacteristically, was unhappy with the quality of the work, and condemned this first printing to be sold in America. He stipulated that they should not be sold before the English edition, printed by Richard Clay, was published. Carroll retained fifty copies of the Baxter printing which he asked should be 'bound, as already ordered'.



These fifty copies are referred to by Williams and Madan as the 'first private edition'. The present edition, the 'first published edition', was of 500 copies.
