Within a detailed evocation of the city in the 1880s, a drowning, a kidnapping, class divisions, even the tensions created by the introduction of female students during this period, are vividly depicted.

Mallowan - Christie the residue of her earlier marriage). The letter begins by remarking that I have read and enjoyed all of your books to date', before venturing 'a few observations on your train mystery - "Murder on the Orient Express" - as I have more than an average regard for railways'; Allchin points out that the train on which the murder took place would 'strictly speaking' have been the "Orient-Simplon Express", and a second sheet provides further information regarding the distinction between this and other trains of similar name covering a similar route. Before praising her new play (The Hollow'), he takes 'the liberty of enclosing' the present work in illustration of his fanaticism.

There is no cause to think the Queen of Crime took any of his remarks on board.

Broom Lynne, who original trained at St. Martin's, is perhaps better known as a commercial artist and illustrator, providing dustjacket designs for Heinemann, Michael Joseph, MacDonald etc. for the novels of Gladys Mitchell, Dick Francis, among many others, and perhaps most notably Powell's 'A Dance to the Music of Time' series. He also wrote plays for the BBC and novels in a number of genres, this, the third of the Diamond books, a tense Mafia Manhattan thriller.

A particularly striking example of an author's work reflecting their own experiences, the action here features a best-selling writer of spy thrillers, who is, himself, deeply involved in espionage and threatened, as the narrative opens, with a serious breach of security by a rogue agent.

Seth, who adopted the name Robert Chartham for his sexology work, was educated at Cambridge, and after spells at the BBC and Monitoring Intelligence Bureau, was parachuted in 1942 into occupied Estonia in order to destroy shale oil refineries. He was


captured by German authorities, was employed as an informer in Oflag 79, a prisoner-of-war camp, and carried a message of peace from Himmler to London in 1945. The British Secret Service, who, according to Max Hastings (The Secret War: Spies, Codes and Guerrillas 1939–1945', 2015) referred to Seth as Blunderhead, deemed that there was insufficient evidence to establish that he had 'turned', leaving him free to follow his sexology pursuits. The title of this work rather neatly summarizes the author's double life.



The different sections of the Miscellany have different dedicatees, notable among which are E.C. Bentley for the Crosswords section, and Dorothy L. Sayers for 'Cain's Jawhone'. Mathers, who attended Trinity College, Oxford, was a poet and translator as well as a compiler of cryptic crosswords and other puzzles.


