


James Lees-Milne is known as much for his work shaping the National Trust's collection of significant English country houses as for his diaries detailing upper and upper-middle class life in the mid-twentieth century. For a pupil who showed little promise he defied scholarly estimation to publish some 34 books. In this catalogue, we are offering 21 of these all inscribed to his second wife, Alvilde Chaplin. The collection includes architectural history, biography, fiction, his autobiography and the first four volumes of his classic diaries.



Following an Oxford encounter with a boorish

Hooray who took a shotgun to a statue of Apollo, Lees-Milne "made a vow ... that I would devote my energies and abilities, such as they were, to preserving the country houses of England". He was instrumental in shifting the National Trust's initial focus from the preservation of countryside, coastal and green spaces towards historic houses. During his forty-seven years with the Trust he secured many of the country's great estates for the nation. Without his involvement as a preserver of the English Country House at this crucial stage in the Trust's development the UK's built heritage would look very different.

Lees-Milne approached his work with the Trust as an aesthete and an architectural historian and this catalogue includes many of his most important works of architectural history.

The extraordinary cast of characters he met when touring the country – mostly penurious aristocrats keen to offload their burdensome houses – fed into his diaries, the first four of which, detailing his early work with the National Trust are included here as are three of his biographies including that of Harold Nicolson, his finest, and most personal. It is these waspish and amusing diaries and biographies for which Lees-Milne is best remembered as a writer.

In 1951, somewhat against the odds, Lees-Milne married Alvilde Chaplin. It was not a conventional marriage. Bisexual both, they kept arrangements open which was the source of much turbulence. Even so their mutual affinity, shared cultural interests and experiences enabled them to weather forty-three years of marriage and Lees-Milne was devoted to Alvilde until her death. Alvilde herself was charismatic, highly cultured and a notable gardener, creating renowned gardens at their homes in France and England as well as for high-profile clients. She also edited four books with distinguished English garden designer Rosemary Verey.

The books, all in very good condition and many fine or near-mint, bear personal inscriptions to Alvilde from Jim, many warmly affectionate, attesting to their strong – albeit unconventional – bond. A significant set of works, from the library of an eminent designer, by a custodian of British heritage whose impact will resonate for generations.



Dustjacket is illustrated with a wood engraving *Tobias and the Angel* by Reynolds Stone (which is repeated as a frontispiece). Illustrated endpapers. Top edge stained purple. Loosely inserted are three newspaper cuttings. Spine is sunned and there are one or two spots of foxing but otherwise in superb, near fine condition throughout. An excellent copy of Lees-Milne's characteristically witty and self-deprecating memoir of his early life before he began keeping what would amount to multiple volumes of diaries.

Half title is inscribed "To my first adviser, censor and critic Alvilde from her J. March 1970".

A very good copy of the first volume of Lees-Milne's celebrated diaries which provides an invaluable insight into the life of the country house during WWII and describes his early work in saving many of these houses for the National Trust.





Front free endpaper is inscribed "For darling Alvilde who salvaged me midway on the waves, from Jim, 1985". Loosely inserted are three newspaper cuttings with reviews of the book by Anthony Lambton, Anthony Powell and Hugh Montgomery-Massingberd. All are full of praise for the book, unsurprisingly so in the case of HM-M who thought so highly of JL-M that he wrote a one-man play based on his diaries.

The Age of Adam, looking at the architectural impact of the four Adam brothers among their contemporaries both in Britain and on the continent, was Lees-Milne's first published work.





Loosely inserted are two newspaper reviews and a postcard addressed to "Dear Diarist" from a reader. Inscribed on the dedication page *For Alvilde who is always in a hurry* "and so gets there first, sums it all up like lightning and what is more remembers what the plodding tortoise with all his vaunted thoroughness forgets". *Venetian Evenings* is both a companion piece to *Roman Mornings* (first published in 1960 and reissued in 1988) and a personal portrait of La Serenissima through his eleven favourite buildings.



Jim". *Baroque in Italy* is one of Lees-Milne's earlier books and was described by Sacheverell Sitwell (himself an expert on the subject) as "by far the best book he has written". It is unclear what Lees-Milne means by "the first" in his inscription. Is it the first book he had given to her? Unlikely as they married in 1951 or is Alvilde the "first" of his darlings?





As well as describing fourteen houses given to the Trust, Lees-Milne provides wonderfully clear and fresh pen portraits of the (frequently eccentric) donors.






A near-fine copy of Lees-Milne's biography of the eminent British diplomat, diarist, journalist, novelist, biographer and politician. Author and subject also shared a more personal connection: Nicolson and his wife, Vita Sackville-West, were like Lees-Milne and Alvilde both bisexual and polyamorous. Together Nicolson and Sackville-West created their legacy at Sissinghurst Castle, its garden internationally famed for its expressive planting.





Esher is perhaps little known now but he was, at the end of the nineteenth century and the beginning of the twentieth, one of the most influential figures in political life. 

A superb copy of Lees-Milne's third novel set in a country house during WWI and which tells the story of a schoolboy (Rupert Fiennes-Templeton) for love and affection. "Sparkling, sinister, occasionally comic and often moving".
