





12mo. xxii, [1], 24-174pp, [6]. Contemporary blind-tooled sheep. Lightly rubbed and bumped, chipping to head of spine. Near contemporary ownership inscriptions and pentrials of Ann and Lucy Bayliffe to endpapers and head of p.28.

A revised edition of lexicographer and grammarian John Ash's (1724-1779) chief work, first printed in 1762, and notably the first grammar produced in England to be published in America. This enlarged edition is appended by 'A Library for Young Gentlemen and Ladies' (which amusingly contains the present text as the first work listed), that, according to a lengthy 'intended to direct some tender and valuable Parents who may possibly be at a Loss what Books to buy for their Children; and likewise to gratify some young People of an inquisitive and ingenious Disposition, who have a keen Taste for Books, but for want of Experience often purchase Trash.'









Extremities worn and marked, substantial loss to spine. Hinges exposed, recent inked ownership inscription of W. B, Reynolds to FEP, frontispiece detached.

The sole edition of a brief survey, intended for a juvenile readership, of the methods employed in book production, commonly attributed to printer and bookseller John Baxter (1781-1858). Although rather worn, the original boards here bear a pictorial representation of Baxter's Printing Office, a binding seemingly discarded by other booksellers (such as Darton) in favour of a different dress, no doubt in order to avoid advertising the competition.





An apparently unrecorded catalogue of the books, in excess of 7,000, held by the Beveridge Library at Pathhead, Kirkcaldy, issued in the year of their inauguration. The origins of the institution were tied to the desire of Provost Michael Beveridge to erect a public hall and free library as a memorial to Kirkcaldy born social reformer and father of modern economics Adam Smith (1723-1790). The first proposals were submitted in 1889. Beveridge died shortly afterward but left in his will and bequest of £50,000 towards the completion of the project. The library at Pathhead, named in recognition of Beveridge's philanthropy rather than in commemoration of Smith, was opened on 12th March 1896 by his widow. It operated for 39 years until 1935 when it transferred its then 12,000 volumes to the Beveridge Hall, a venue adjoining the Adam Smith Hall, that was ultimately opened by Andrew Carnegie in 1899.



Shelf-label of the Bath Royal Literary and Scientific Institution to FEP. Presentation copy, inked inscription to head of title: 'Bath Literary Institution with the compliments of the committee of the Russell Institution', with associated presentation plate pasted to FEP.

The second known copy of the first recorded edition of a catalogue of the library holdings of the Russell Institution for the Promotion of Literary and Scientific Knowledge, compiled by then librarian and secretary, noted topographer and archaeologist, Edward Wedlake Brayley (1773-1854).

The Institution was founded by private subscription in 1808, somewhat opportunistically, to provide a revenue-paying purpose for an assembly hall which had been constructed in Coram Street, north of new housing around Bloomsbury Square. Previous ventures at the building having failed, the proprietors thought it expedient to imitate the model of the Royal and London Institutions; to that end they organised a meeting of local residents, seeking 12,500 guineas at 25 guineas each from 500 subscribers. The objects of the Institution were the formation of a circulating library, consisting of the most useful works in ancient and modern literature and the establishment of a reading room provided with the best foreign and English journals and periodical publications. It survived until the early 1880s. The Post Office listed it in an 1881 directory, but it is found missing in the 1891 counterpart.

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A noteworthy benefactor of the Institution, recorded in the list of proprietors (No. 354), was philanthropist and surgeon Thomas Phillips (1760-1851) who no doubt donated books to the library as he did with numerous reading rooms and scientific institutes all over England and Wales, notably St David's College in Lampeter to whom he bequeathed 22,500 books from 1834 to his death. At the time of his death there were more than 50,000 books in his house awaiting distribution.



The second known copy of the catalogue of some five hundred books and periodical housed in the members lending library of the British Institution of Radio Engineers; a professional organisation established in 1925, incorporated in 1932, and since 1988 defunct following a merger with the Institution of Electrical Engineers.

COPAC records a single copy at the The Institution of Engineering and Technology; OCLC adds no further.





Extra-illustrated with 68 engravings/chromolithographs (predominantly portraits of prominent authors, but also illustrations of fine bindings), two leaves extracted from later publications, and two tipped-in A.L.S. in the hand of Katharine Burton (the author's second wife). Contemporary red morocco, lettered in gilt to spine. Extremities rubbed. Marbled endpapers, later book-label of William Abercrombie to FEP, occasional offsetting.

A generously margined, grangerized copy of the first posthumously published edition, with the addition of a memoir by his second wife Katharine Burton (1824-1898), daughter of antiquary Cosmo Nelson Innes (1798-1874), of John Hill Burton's (1809-1881) collected articles on the various personal characteristics of the book collector and related organisations and collecting clubs, which had first appeared in *Blackwood's Magazine* prior to being first issued in book form in 1862.







A late nineteenth century catalogue of the holdings of the Chemical Society library. The Society was founded in 1841, primarily due to the efforts of chemist Robert Warington (1807-1967), initially to be a self-help institution, housing a laboratory, a library, and reagent resources that would have been beyond the means of most of its members. The library was inaugurated in 1842 to guard the extensive historical archive. Its stacks grew swiftly, thanks in part due to conations from past fellows, including an especially generous number from Michael Faraday (1791-1867).

Pattinson B. Melmore (d. 1935), analytical chemist operating in Maryport and fellow of the Chemical Society for fifty-eight years.





George Crabbe (1754-1832), poet and Church of England Clergyman. In 1781, having failed both in his career as an apothecary and in his attempts to secure patronage, Crabbe was living in destitution. In desperation he solicited Edmund Burke, who, taking pity on the impoverished poet, discharged his debts and gave him an apartment in his home at Beaconsfield. Burke himself took the manuscript of *The Library* to Dodsley, who agreed to underwrite the cost of publication and give Crabbe all of the profit. Crabbe sent his 250 subscriber's copies of *The Library* in lieu of a previously projected miscellany. The poem, organised by the subject classification of books in a library, is in the tradition of Juvenal's tenth satire and Johnson's *The Vanity of Human Wishes*. It was an immediate success, receiving remarkably favourable notices in the reviews. A second edition appeared in 1783.

The first edition of the second volume of antiquarian bookseller Guillaume-François Debure's (1731-1782) much-admired monumental bibliography of rare books. De Bure organised his reference work according to the five fundamental categories originally promoted by Prosper Marchand in the pioneering Bigot sale in 1706 (the first book auction conducted in Paris for which a catalogue was printed), theology, jurisprudence, sciences and arts, belles-lettres, and history. Among the many notable features of the *Bibliographie instructive*, it was the first to identify and describe the Gutenberg Bible (Vol. I, *Théologie*, 1763).

The primary seven volumes were published between 1763 and 1768. Two further volumes appeared in 1769, both devoted to the auction of library of bibliophile **Louis-Jean Gaignat (1697-1768)**. A tenth and final volume, concerning anonymous authors, was issued in 1782.

A century later **Jacques Charles Brunet (1780-1867)** wrote: 'une production tout à fait neuve et assez remarkable à l'époque où elle parut: aujourd'hui même elle peut encore être consultée utilement pour plusieurs articles qui n'ont pas été décrits autre part avec autant de détails que là. Ce catalogue donne d'ailleurs une idée exact du goût qui dominait alors parmi des amateurs de livres rare et précieux.'

['A completely new and quite remarkable production at the time it appeared: even today it can still be usefully consulted for several articles which have not been described elsewhere with as much detail as there. This catalogue also gives an exact idea of the taste that then prevailed among lovers of rare and precious books.']

The first edition of antiquarian bookseller Guillaume-François Debure's (1731-1782) first supplement to his monumental seven-volume bibliography of rare books *Bibliographie instructive* (1763-68), a catalogue devoted to the auction of library of bibliophile Louis-Jean Gaignat (1697-1768).

The *Bibliographie instructive* was the first work of its kind to identify and describe the Gutenberg Bible (Vol. I, *Théologie*, 1763); the *Supplement* provides the first auction description (volume I, pp. 6-7, lot 16). Gaignet's copy on vellum in two volumes sold (as the manuscript notation in the present copy attests) for 2100 francs and 1 sou to Paul Girardot de Préfond (in 1817 it would enter the library of **Thomas Grenville (1755-1846)** who bequeathed it to the British Museum in 1846).

Cette Edition de la Bible n'est pas absolument la même dont il a été fait mention dans la Bibliographie Instructive, fous le Numéro 25, & dont nous avons indiqué un Exemplaire existant à Paris , dans la Bibliothéque Mazarine, Il y a dans les deux Exemplaires des différences trop fenfibles pour ne pas être apperçues, & le caractere de la premiere étant un peu plus gros que celui de la seconde, donne à cette Edition moins de lignes dans les pages. A revised edition of a bibliography of 'anti-Methodistical' works, first published at Philadelphia in 1846. A total of three hundred and sixty-one titles are recorded, eighty of which by Methodist authors, and several political pamphlets occasioned by the publication of **John Wesley's (1703-1791)** sensational polemic *A Calm Address to our American Colonies* (1775). The catalogue is the only published work of Curtis H. Cavender, issued under the anagrammatic pseudonym H. C. Decanver, perhaps in an effort to guard against the ire of Methodist detractors.

The most sought-after volume produced by the prodigious Victorian Camden Society, an institution founded in 1838 to reprint early historical manuscripts and rare printed works, this was the first printing of both the private diary of and catalogue of manuscripts owned by John Dee (1527-1608/9) Anglo-Welsh scholar, astrology, occultist, alchemist and advisor to Queen Elizabeth I. As the preface notes, the diary was 'written in a very small illegible hand on the margins of old Almanacs, discovered a few years ago by Mr. W.H. Black, in the library of the Ashmolean Museum at Oxford' which the editor, Shakespearean scholar and antiquary James Orchard Halliwell (1820-1889) suggests will 'tend perhaps to set Dee's character in its true light, more than any thing that has yet been published'. Whilst the library catalogue, 'valuable for the notices which it preserves of several middle-age treatises not now extant' is preserved in Trinity College, Cambridge, the collection itself, said to have cost Dee 'the sum of three thousand pounds', is long since dispersed.



The first edition in English, of Gallican ecclesiastical historian Louis Ellies Dupin's (1657-1719) *Méthode pour étudier la théologie* (1716). As the preface succinctly attests: 'The Design of the Author is seen in the Title Page, which promises a Method for the Study of Divinity, and the Book fully Answers to it, for it contains an accurate description of the Way to that Sacred Science; together with a Catalogue of such Authors as have most judiciously treated of the several Branches of it.' Indeed, the final lengthy chapter provides a series of 'The most Material questions to be Examin'd and Discuss'd In a Course of Theological Studies' with each followed by a list authors and books that would ideally be consulted; for example, when searching for proof of the existence of God, one is encouraged to consult the *Meditations* of Decartes, Cicero's *De Natura Deorum*, and Archbishop Tillotson.

A rare survival, in original unsophisticated state, of the sole edition of a general catalogue (in four parts) of the municipal library of Falaise, Normandy, compiled by local historian Frédéric Galeron (1794-1838). Five supplements were issued separately in subsequent years up to 1837.

Accounts of the library are in short supply, with the notable exception of a passage in **James Augustus St. John's (1795-1875)** *Journal of a Residence in Normandy* (1831): 'From the environs we very quickly returned to the city, in order to pay a visit to the public library, an institution which owes its existence, I believe, to the exertions of M. Galeron. The books are arranged, at present, in a small apartment of the Hôtel de Ville; but it is in contemplation to erect or appropriate some entire building to the library, which appears to be exceedingly well managed. Instead of laying out their funds in the purchase of rare editions, and curious old books, works of undoubted utility, histories, voyages, and travels, and the masterpieces of modern literature are bought. The only piece of luxury which I observed was the great work which Napoleon caused to be written on Egypt; but this was presented to the library upon application by the government. Numerous translations from the English, - Shakespeare, Hume, Byron, &c. - adorned the shelves, and appeared to have been much read: a few inferior authors, not very deserving of being translated, were also there; but, in general, the books are well selected.'



The author's own grangerized copy of his voluminous catalogue, furnished with extensive bibliographical and biographical remarks, of early English poetry books, predominantly comprised of volumes once in the library of antiquary and bibliographer Thomas Park (1758/9-1834). At some unspecified point Park sold many of his precious books to prominent collector Thomas Hill (1760-1840) on condition that he could consult them whenever he wished. Ultimately, they passed to publisher and bookseller Longmans (who gave between £3000 and £4000 for them) and then dispersed by sale via the present catalogue. Longman's speculation was not a profitable one. A few of the more expensive books were bought by Sykes and Heber, the larger portion were subsequently brought together again in the Britwell Library.

The complete five-part catalogue, one of fifty copies on large paper, comprehensively priced in manuscript, for the sale at auction, over a total of 52 days (on non-consecutive months between 1833-34), of the extensive library of Philip Augustus Hanrott (1776-1856). Though little is known of this seemingly insatiable bibliophile, he was evidently a collector of no mean learning. The library contained a large quantity of books printed on vellum, fine incunabula, and a sizeable quantity of manuscripts and prints. The stacks included books printed by Fust and Schoffer (on vellum), Caxton and other early English printers, editiones principes, such as the Homer of 1482, Chroniques de France (1476), as well as a plethora of outstanding copies of great books. The, quite staggering, 10,829 lots realised a total of £22,425.9.0. A much smaller sale of his remaining books was held in 1857.

A touching verse celebration, albeit almost entirely devoid of bibliographical reference, of the opening of the Manchester Free Library dedicated to 'Sr John Potter, Knight, of Buile Hill, Pendleton, near Manchester, the originator and magnificent supporter of the Manchester Free Library'.. Described in the preface as the 'first really popular Free Library in England', the library was the first to be opened following the provisions of the 1850 Public Libraries Act, which allowed a tax on the population if two-thirds of the local rate-payers supported the endeavour. More than £4000 was raised to purchase the opening stock of 18028 books. So popular was the opening in Manchester ('great are thy attractions, sure') that the police were brought in for crowd control.

Rare; OCLC locates just three copies, all in the UK (Cambridge, Manchester and NLS). COPAC adds Oxford and Trinity College, Dublin.



The first edition of an authoritative account of the establishment and contemporary state of the various nineteenth-century charities devoted to providing financial aid to those in, or once part of, the printing trade; compiled by sometime secretary to the Printers' Corporation, James Shirley Hodson (1819-1899). The organisations detailed include the Printers' Pension Society, the Printer's Almshouse Society, Printer's Orphan Asylum, Biggs's Charity for Printers, and the Galpin Pension Fund. Hodson apportions an entire chapter to the Caxton Exhibition of 1877 (of which he was honorary secretary) that he believes was 'not without use in upholding the dignity of the Art of Printing, and in giving more extended publicity to the deserving objects of the Printers' Pension, Almshouse, and Orphan Asylum Corporation'.





A rare survival, in original state, of the eighth annual report of the Huddersfield Auxiliary Bible Society, that includes the first report of the newly formed Huddersfield Ladies' Bible Association. Formed 21st May, 1818, the objective of the Association was to supply impoverished families throughout the Kirklees district copies with copies of the Bible in exchange for a negligible subscription fee. The ladies, on first canvassing the area, enrolled 1541 subscribers. At the time of this initial report, 118 copies of the Bible had been distributed.

An assortment of catalogues issued by Bristolian bookseller (and sometime publisher) Charles Thornton Jefferies (1794-1882) between 1856 and 1871. Purveyors of both new and second-hand books, the firm boasted an excess of 50,000 volumes for sale at any one time.

The book store occupied a five-storey building at the junction of Redcliff Street and Ferry Street (appropriately opposite a leather warehouse). Records pertaining to the management of the business are scarce, a notable exception being articles relating to a fire which broke out at the premises on 9th November, 1881, the cause of which is unknown. According to the Western Daily Press, the glare of the flames could be seen from Montpelier, and scores of onlookers made the work of the fire brigade all the more challenging. Thousands of books were destroyed. Despite this horrific ordeal, the firm appears to have continued trading until at least 1905.

Those catalogues included here for the years 1870 to 1872 are extensively marked-up (predominantly providing shelf references and, through deletion, an indication of the availability of stock), providing a unique record of the operation of a metropolitan bookseller during the height of the Victorian publishing boom.

He continued the project, with publisher Thomas Bennet, under the title *The Works of the Learned*, which ran from August 1691 to April 1692.



The latter half provides the same information, only in this instance the books are ordered by subject ('History', 'Biography', 'Voyages & Travels', 'Poetry', 'Divinity', Novels, Tales 7 Romances', 'Philosophy', and 'Miscellaneous'), each entry preceded by respective shelf number. The books speak to a learned proprietor, one whose interests lay more in the historical and theological rather than the literary arts - only four novels appear and the poetry is predominantly translations of classical authors - and whose collecting habits seem more concerned with content rather than edition, with few publications issued prior to the nineteenth century present.



The fourth known copy of a catalogue of the holdings of the Manchester Geological Society as of February 1875. The society was founded in 1838, predominantly under the guidance of noted geologist and philanthropist Edward William Binney (1812-1881), who paid particular interest to providing free public access to the society's museum, established in Peter Street, Manchester in 1850 in conjunction with the Manchester Society of Natural History. By the 1860s both societies encountered financial difficulties and, on the advice of the evolutionary biologist Thomas Huxley, Owens College (now the University of Manchester) accepted responsibility for the collections in 1867. The museum in Peter Street was sold in 1875 after Owens College moved to new buildings in Oxford Street.

The, surprisingly diminutive, catalogue arranges the holdings into eleven distinct divisions (local geology, mineralogy and mining, American and Canadian geology, works in French etc.); the library being comprised primarily of prominent nineteenth-century publications, such as an early edition of Darwin's *The Voyage of the Beagle*, the only notable exception a copy of the 1557 edition of Agricola's treatise on metallurgy *De re metallica* (1556).





A Regency manuscript inventory, in a single legible hand, of the contents of Kilmory House, Argyllshire, the estate of Jamaican plantation owner Peter Campbell (1766-1828). In addition to the furnishings and a plethora of farming utensils and associated paraphernalia, five pages are devoted to cataloguing the library; an intensely practical collection of encyclopaedias, agricultural texts, and works of natural philosophy. The notable exceptions are a three-volume set of Smith's *Wealth of Nations*, Robertson's histories of America and Scotland, and an octodecimo book of common prayer. Precious little shelf space was provided for anything so frivolous as a novel.

In 1826, Campbell's daughter and co-heir Eliza married Sir John Powlett Orde, 2nd Baronet (1803-1878), who following the death of both his wife and father-in-law inherited Kilmory. Orde rebuilt the house in a Gothic style to a design by architect Joseph Gordon Davis, and remodelled the grounds with the aid of William Jackson Hooker. Kilmory is now the headquarters of Argyll and Bute Council.



Algernon George Percy, sixth Duke of Northumberland's (1810-1899) own copy of a detailed chronological catalogue of the manuscripts held in the library of his seat of Alnwick Castle.

The catalogue was compiled as a part of the third report of the Royal Commission on Historical Manuscripts and is comprised of extracts from calendars made by William Douglas Hamilton (d. 1894), and supplied by the Duke of Northumberland to the Commission, edited by barrister and antiquary Alfred John Horwood (1821-1881).

The primary part of the collection was comprised of letters, original papers, and copies of papers dating between 1139 and 1696 mounted in twenty-two folio volumes half-bound in red morocco. Horwood commences the report by offering a series of highlights: 'There are a few documents of the 14th and 15th centuries, many of the 16th, and several hundreds of the 17th century. In 1384 is a treaty of truce between the stout Earl of Northumberland and the doughty Douglas of that time. In the 16th century is an account of the arrest of Cardinal Wolsey by the Earl of Northumberland...a letter by Walsingham in 1586 telling of the advice given by Parliament to Queen Elizabeth with regard to Mary Queen of Scots...many letters of interest during the Civil War; including some about the destruction by the rebels of the Earl of Northumberland's Castle of Wressell...letters about the Restoration and the ornamentation of London streets at the Coronation of Charles II.'

The second known copy of a catalogue for the Religious Loan Library at Brighton, founded in 1834, housed in the Countess of Huntingdon's Connexion chapel.

Selina Hastings, Countess of Huntingdon (1707-1791) founder of the Countess of Huntingdon's Connexion - a nonconformist Calvinistic movement within the Methodist church - established the Brighton chapel in 1761. The church went through numerous renovations prior to being entirely rebuilt in 1871. The library, open to subscribers at sixpence a quarter, comprised 384 volumes of religious texts and improving literature.

The Gaisford copy of the 1855 third edition of the combined membership lifts, book catalogue and rules of the Roxburghe Club; the world's oldest society of bibliophiles, whose membership is limited at any one time to just forty.

First printed in 1845, this copy, from the recently dispersed library of G.B. Eyre of Bramshaw in the New Forest, features an 1864 dated membership list which includes Charles Towneley, the 77th member, elected in 1853, as the most recent addition to the club's bibliophilic ranks.

Necessarily limited in number, as with all Roxburghe Club books, OCLC lists only the Glasgow copy in the British Isles, and just five further in United States libraries (Columbia, Huntington, Michigan, Newberry and NYPL). COPAC adds a single further copy, at Trinity College, Cambridge.



An archive of administrational ephemera, spanning the final decades of the nineteenth-century, relating to the Roxburghe Club; the world's oldest society of bibliophiles.

The spur to the Club's foundation was the sale of the extensive library of John Ker, third Duke of Roxburghe (1720-1804), which took place over 46 days in 1812. The auction was eagerly followed by bibliophiles, the highlight being the sale of the first dated edition of Boccaccio's Decameron, printed by Christophorus Valdarfer at Venice in 1471, and sold to the Marquis of Blandford for £2,260, the highest price ever given for a book at that time. That evening, a group of eighteen collectors met at the St Albans Tavern for a dinner presided over by the second Earl Spencer, the greatest collector of his age, and his panegyrist Thomas Frognall Dibdin (1776-1847). It was subsequently decided that the dinner become an annual event, thus the Club was formalised, with Spencer presiding and Dibdin serving as first secretary.




The Roxburghe is generally recognised as the first text publication society. Each member was, and remains, expected to sponsor the publication of a rare and or curious volume. Initially the volumes were editions of early blackletter printed texts (the first, in 1814, was the Earl of Surrey's translation of parts of Virgil's *Aeneid*, originally printed in 1557); but from as early as 1819 they began to include texts taken from manuscript originals.

Included here are two pamphlets; the first (dated May 17th 1895) a draft of proposed revisions to the Clubs rules, the second (undated, but presumably contemporary) presenting the amended regulations.

The preponderance of the loose articles are devoted to announcements on the proceedings of the general and anniversary meetings of the society. Topics of discussion include, inter alia, endeavours to fill up vacancies, the treasurer reports on the state of the Clubs finances (the account balance varying wildly, though at its lowest still comfortably in the region of two hundred pounds), notification of imminent publications, and the election of new members. The majority conclude with a price list for books currently available through the society to 'members whose subscriptions are not in arrear'.

Given that the society is composed of only forty members at any one time, the print runs of these announcements, as with all Roxburghe Club publications, would have been necessarily small; indeed, all are apparently institutionally unrepresented (except in the archives of the Club itself).





Upon his death he left a personal estate of in excess of £2.5 million. His third wife established a library in his memory, today a part of the University of Manchester.





The first edition in book form, previously serialised in eight parts from 1836 to 1840, of engraver Charles John Smith's (1803-1838) profusely illustrated bibliographical compendium comprised of facsimiles of historical manuscripts and depictions of notable places relating to prominent authors, including; the will of Napoleon, the signature of Shakespeare, a part of a letter written by Horace Walpole at Strawberry Hill, a view of the residence of Sir Isaac Newton, and the final letter written by David Hume. Smith did not live to see the conclusion of his work; the production was completed by publisher Henry George Bohn (1796-1884).



The first printed catalogues of the Society of Antiquaries to be issued since their inception in 1707. According to the Encyclopedia of Library and Information Science (Vol. IV, 1970), the catalogue of the printed books 'was reputed to be the first true dictionary catalog; it used the duplicate entry approach within a single alphabet, including catchword or subject word for anonymous works as well as for those the authors of which were known. This practice, however, was followed to a limited extent in the Philadelphia Association Library Company Catalogue of 1765.'

The sole edition, published at five shillings in boards, of a collected work consisting of two catalogues from the sale of the effects of numismatist Richard Southgate (1729-1795) entitled 'Bibliotheca Southgatiana' and 'A catalogue of the elegant and curious collection of shells', an extended catalogue of his coins and medals which was not the actual sale catalogue, and a prefatory memoir by man midwife, bibliophile, and coin collector Charles Combe (1743-1817).

Thomas Frognall Dibdin (1776-1847), in his *Bibliomania; or book madness* (1842), said of the publication: 'This catalogue possesses, what every similar one should possess, a compendious and perspicuous account of the collector. My copy is on large paper; but the typographical execution is sufficiently defective.'

Southgate's 'elegant and valuable library' was sold in 2,599 lots by Leigh and Sotheby from 27th April to 9th May 1795, for £1,332 12s. His small collection of shells and other natural curiosities was sold on 12th and 13th May. The sale of his coins was planned for May, but the whole collection was purchased by connoisseur **Samuel Tyssen (1756-1800)** for 1800 guineas prior to the sale (with the resulting duplicates being auctioned in July.)

The complete six parts of the small paper edition (40 copies on large paper were issued) of the catalogue for sale by auction of the voluminous library of Prince Augustus Frederick Duke of Sussex (1773-1843), extensively priced in an early manuscript hand.

Sussex, sixth son of King George III, formed the collection from about 1815 with the assistance of the surgeon and bibliographer Thomas J. Pettigrew. At the time of his death, the collection consisted of more than fifty thousand volumes, twelve thousand of which were theological. It included a very considerable number of early Hebrew and other rare manuscripts, and was pre-eminent in the field of Bibles, containing about one thousand editions.

The auction, conducted by Evans of Pall Mall, commenced on 1st July, 1844; the first part of which continued for twenty-three days (Sunday excepted). The primary buyers were Sir Thomas Phillipps and the British Museum. Part I. offered the Bibles (a copy of the 1462 realising £170), part II. manuscripts, III. History & Topography, IV. Greek Classics, Foreign History, &c., V. Poetry, Drama, &c., and VI. miscellaneous books.

Notably, the sale included Sussex's copy of the Gutenberg Bible (Lot 536), which, unsurprisingly, was furnished with the most extensive description to appear in the catalogue: 'It would be superfluous to expatiate on the extreme rarity and importance of this article. It must always form the most prominent feature in a Collection of Books of the XVth Century; for what book can be more interesting to the Collector than the First Production of the Art of Printing?...Of this First Edition of the Bible, only Four Copies are known upon Vellum, only Fourteen upon Paper, and of the latter, Eight Copies are in Public Libraries.' The book sold for the attractive sum of £190.

The first edition, with a bookseller's manuscript receipt in the year of publication, of Swift's controversial history of the final parliament during the reign of Queen Anne. Beginning in 1712/3, Swift worked on the book intermittently throughout the remainder of his life yet was never able to bring it to a satisfactory and timely completion. When finally published posthumously thirteen years after the author's death, purportedly from various manuscripts and transcripts edited by Swift, immediate doubt as to the authenticity of the text arose, with notable scholars such as Samuel Johnson and later Thomas Macaulay casting doubt over authorship. The later revelation of manuscript fair copies would seemingly confirm Swift as author and silence the debate.


BOOK CLUB PATRONAGE

An apparently unrecorded playbill advertising a performance of Richard Brinsley Sheridan's (1751-1816) perennially popular comedy *The Rivals* 'by the desire' of the Gentleman's Book Club of Wakefield, West Yorkshire.

The Rivals premiered at Covent Garden on 17th January, 1775. It was universally vilified for its length, bawdiness, and the poor performance of actor **John Lee (1725-1781)** in the role of Sir Lucius O'Trigger. Sheridan withdrew the play immediately and over the course of ten days rewrote it extensively. The play reopened on 28th January (with a more capable actor in the role of the comic Irishman) to significant acclaim, and has remained a standard of English theatre ever since.

The sole edition of a catalogue of the library of Calvinistic Methodist minister Owen Thomas (1812-1891), totalling some 7,500 volumes, presented on his death to theological seminary members of that denomination at Bala. The publication of the catalogue was occasioned by the resolution to make the library available to ministers and preachers who were not attendees of the college and allow them to borrow up to two titles for a month at a time. The library itself was unsurprisingly primarily comprised of devotional, ecclesiastical, and theological works, though did contain a selection of historical and philosophical texts, and a number of books in the Welsh language.







The first edition of an anthology of verse suited to the bibliophage. Dedicated to 'the printers, booksellers and others connected with the art of typography', the collection includes compositions by Byron, Coleridge, and Pope; a plethora of panegyric poems on the printing press; a smattering of literary lyrics on such subjects as Caxton, first editions, and paper production; and the occasional ballad addressed to booksellers (all of which are very poor and, frankly, occasionally objectionable).



A fascinating London-printed manual with 'practical instructions for learners'. Nothing is known about its author, except that, according to 'English Mechanic and World of Science' (XXVII, 1878), he was not a professional printer. That this is the second edition suggests that his work was nevertheless successful. The first part introduces printing techniques (e.g., imposition, colour printing, press work, making rollers), summarising the topic with final instructions on how to print one's professional printer's trade card. The second part discusses specimens of press machinery, especially smaller ones which could be owned by individual amateurs or very small businesses.

The fourth known copy of a pamphlet announcing the inclusion in the *Index Librorum Prohibitorum*, due to their questioning of the supreme authority of the Roman papacy and the use of 'langue vulgaire', of select works by French Jesuit theologians Michel Rabardeau (1572-1648), Étienne Bauny (1564-1649), and Louis Cellot (1588-1658). It contains the censorship by Pope Urban VIII dated 18th March, 1643, an extract (in French) from the minutes of the assembly of the clergy held in Mante on 12th April, 1643, and the censorship by the Archbishop of Bordeaux Henri de Sourdis (1593-1645) dated 1st June, 1643.



The catalogue for the auction sale of the library of bibliophile Ralph Willet (1719-1795) conducted by Leigh and Sotheby from the 6th to 24th December, 1813, together with a rare survival of the printed list recording prices realised.

On his father's death, Willet succeeded to the family estates in the West Indies which enabled him, for the remained of his life, to indulge his passion for book collecting. His library at Merly in Canford, Dorset, grew to comprise some eight thousand volumes, containing more than eighty incunabula, including seven Caxtons and four block books. The majority of the books were in fine bindings, and many on vellum and large paper.



The Merly library was auctioned by Leigh and Sotheby over seventeen days, the 2720 lots of books fetching £13,223 7s. 6d. The sale excited great interest, and many of the choicer items found their way into the Spencer, Grenville, Devonshire, and White Knights collections. Thomas Frognall Dibdin helped compile the catalogue, and it was while examining the block books at his house in Kensington that William Young Ottley's interest in the origin of printing was first aroused.
