Related with elan, and peppered with humorous flourishes, the narratives document Barrington's life in both Ireland and France at the turn of the nineteenth century, recording the tumultuous period of the Irish Rebellion of 1798, the rise of Napoleon, and life in Paris before and after Waterloo.

Little is known of Welsh bookbinder John Pritchard and his successors; of their work Ramsden, rather unfairly, remarks: 'All their work is rather rough, and they were primarily stationers in all probability'.

No one esteemed Baxter more highly than Sylvester. For this very reason, however, no one could have been a more unhappy choice as editor. Weighed down by his responsibility - 'My Heart akes exceedingly', he wrote in his preface, 'at every remembrance of my incumbent Trust' - and 'Deeply sensible of my inability for such Work; even to discouragement, and no small Consternation of Spirit', he was quite unable to take the drastic measures necessary to reduce Baxter's 'great quantity of loose Papers' to order. As a result, the chronology of the *Reliquiae's* narrative is confused and impaired by an inconsistent formal arrangement.

It is tempting to speculate that the author, a resident of Chancery Lane, Holborn, was Fleet Street journalist Felix Barker (1917-1997), who, though primarily remembered as a film and drama critic, did publish several historical works such as London as it Might Have Been (1975), Highgate Cemetery: Victorian Valhalla (1984), and The History of London in Maps (1990). 

The narrative, aimed at a popular rather than professional readership, provides a brief history of the conflict, placing it into the context of the events leading up to the outbreak of the Second War (1852-3), and vividly conveys the complexities of warfare waged in inhospitable terrain. Doveton's descriptions of Burmese life, landscape, and customs are replete with anecdotal flourishes, including his surprise at the natives playing chess, and his experience of having a tattoo.

An apparently unrecorded printing of a devotional poem in which an emigrant to North America wistfully recalls the memory of his parents and recitations from the family Bible. In 1867, Musician in Ordinary to Queen Victoria William Christian Sellé (1813-1898) published a piano score composed to accompany the poem. No record of the author of the hymn has survived. Intriguingly, the title page of Sellé's publication bears an illustration with the same caption as here; that version was lithographed by Thomas Howell Jones, whereas here the engraving is signed 'JW'. The hymn was printed in its entirety in at edition of *The Sunday-School Magazine* (June, 1850) recording a speech delivered by a well-travelled gentleman who claims to have learnt it whilst in the United States in 1847; remarkably, he sets the scene prior to his recitation with a close approximation of the aforementioned caption.





A twentieth century typescript transcript of the late Georgian journal of John Hanson (1759-1839) of Osmanthorpe, Leeds and latterly of Great Bromley Hall, Essex, and Russell Square, London.

Hanson was an early fossil hunter, and recollects a sojourn to the coast of Walton-on-the-Naze in 1805, where he discovered 'a great collection of antediluvian remains of animals of immense size and the tusks and teeth of the elephant and rhinoceros, of the horns and heads of deer of extraordinary dimensions embedded in one mass of the lower soil'. He remarks that due to the fragility of the bones and submergence by the tide and covering of sand retrieval of the remains was complicated. He later states: 'after keeping the collection 25 years, I have lately presented a large proportion of them to the Zoological Society and many are yet retained in my possession'. The physician and pioneering palaeontologist James Parkinson (1755-1824) recounted his visits to view Hanson's collection in his book Organic Remains of a Former World, (1820). 





The first edition of Francis Hardy's (1751-1812) biography of his friend and political ally James Caulfeild, First Earl of Charlemont (1728-1799); Irish statesman, Commander-in-Chief of the Irish Volunteers, and first President of the Royal Irish Academy. Hardy, though an active member of the Irish House of Commons, is primarily remembered Charlemont's biographer and, certainly, the memoirs are his best-known literary work. He died just weeks after the publication of its second edition, on 26 July 1812.

A tract volume comprised of provincially published editions of two devotional works; Daniel Herbert's (1751?-1833) collected ecclesiastical verse; and Particular Baptist minister John Macgowan's (1726-1870) *Priestcraft Defended*, an excoriating sermon, first published in 1768 under his pseudonym the Shaver, castigating Oxford University for expelling the six young men for 'praying, reading, and expounding the Scriptures'.

Little is known of Sussex-based printers, bookbinders, and stationers Francis Burnett and Charles Nathaniel Blanchard beyond a record of the dissolution of their partnership in 1894 (it would appear Blanchard continued as a sole trader). Remarkably, their edition of Herbert's *Hymns & poems* is the firm's only institutionally recorded production, with the usual databases locating a single copy at Emory.





In 1815 the Gurney, Hoare, and Fry evangelical Quaker banking interests coalesced to form the London-based Society for the Improvement of Prison Discipline; Venning became intensely involved with this society, which was established to implement the prison reformer John Howard's recommendations following his revelations of appalling conditions prevailing in prisons throughout Europe. He had argued that prisons should be rigorously supervised by the public authorities and administered according to proper health practices, with the provision of work, exercise, pastoral care, and aftercare, and appropriate classification of all prisoners.





The sole Elizabethan English edition, in Italian, of the original eight-canto satirical poem *The Golden Ass* by Renaissance polymath Niccolo Machiavelli (1469-1527).

Albeit bearing a false imprint, this work was one of five by Machiavelli issued by English printer **John Wolfe (c. 1548-1601)** for the domestic market during Elizabeth's reign. Given Wolfe had perfected his printing trade - following an apprenticeship to John Daye between 1563 and 1570 - in Italy, and it is perhaps unsurprising therefore that his press was to be the origin of all the sixteenth-century Italian-language editions of Machaivelli. Issued under false imprints (Rome, Piacenza and Palermo were all used), he was presumably aiming for the educated market of Italian-speaking England at the court, amongst the wider aristocracy and at the universities.

Fittingly, Wolfe's later prosecutorial actions as a Beadle of the Stationers' Company were singled out by Martin Marprelate as 'alias Machivill...most tormenting executioner of Waldegrave's goods'.



'The bones of brave Napoleon that lay mouldering in the grave / In that great city of Paris a tomb has been erected / So splendidly, to contain his ashes and his heart, / Rich and poor who go that way, do joyfully tribute pay, / To the immortal memory of Napoleon Bonaparte'.





The sole edition of a Malaya-printed recipe book, the only published work of P. C. B. Newington who states in his prefatory remarks: "Good Food" came into being during the period I was interned [sic] in Changi Criminal Prison and Sime Road Camp, Singapore, by the Japanese from February 1942 up to date of our release in August 1945. It is an extraordinary thing how one's thoughts turn to food when one is starving. Our food had steadily been decreased until our staple dish in May 1945 was 4 ozs of rice a day. I started in the Changi days by writing down in a note book all the recipes that I could remember and when I was transferred to Sime Road Camp I started a Gourmets Club which was called "Good Food." The Club would meet on the embankment outside my hut, once a week and for an hour food was discussed'.



The sparse manuscript notes added to this copy pay particular attention to the section marked in the contents as 'a petition for the parliaments libertie'.



The fourth known copy of a provincially published set of instructions for the manoeuvring of cavalry in combat by William Penny, Sergeant major of the 20th Regiment of Light Dragoons. Intended for the use of volunteer cavalry regiments, the work is dedicated to Prime Minister Henry Addington (1757-1844), then Captain Commandant of the Woodley Corps, Berkshire. When Addington stood in the House of Commons to announce the resumption of war with France in 1803, he described the readiness of the British people to join the volunteers as 'an insurrection of loyalty' - a phrase that playfully conflated contemporary anxieties about military activity, political unrest, and loyalism. Significantly, he chose to address the House for this speech in the uniform of the Woodley Cavalry Volunteers.



A remarkably survival of the separately published panoramic issue of the engraved plates depicting the funeral procession of Queen Elizabeth I, published in *Vetusta Monumenta*, Vol III (London, 1790-6). Originally presented in a paper cylinder - here replaced with wooden rollers - the engraving was executed by James Basire (1730-1802) after, as noted by the series' title, drawings thought to have been executed by William Camden, depicting 377 figures along with the image of the chariot which bore the Queen's Coffin (although, interestingly, not the coffin itself).



Noted mourners include Cecil, Egerton and Raleigh, and as is to be expected of a Camden production, the attention to detail of heraldry and ceremonial dress is remarkable. The Queen's death, much like that of our own Elizabeth, brought an end to a reign which most living Englishmen and Women could not have remembered starting; the formal funeral procession of Elizabeth I, represented here, was similarly swelled with thousands of English mourners.

The third known copy of the sole edition of antiquarian John Reynolds of Oswestry's second, and final, published work; a remarkably wide-ranging work of genealogy which commences with a detailed examination of the ancestry of Christ, continues with an examination of the lineages of the English monarchy and the House of Hanover, and concludes with remarks on the peerages and heraldry of North Wales.

In his *Bibliotheca Heraldica Magnae Britanniae* (London, 1822), Thomas Moule notes: 'This Book is dedicated to Frederick Prince of Wales. It is stated by Philip Yorke Esq of Erthig to be more copious than Davies 1716...but less correct. - Preface to Royal Tribes. The Tract is very scarce and was marked in a late Catalogue of T. Rodd. Bookseller.'



The exceptionally baroque allegorical title page, representing the Apostle Saint James hewing down Saracens, and the two plates (depicting Philip IV and the immaculate conception respectively) are the work of **Pedro de Villafranca Malagón (c. 1615-1684)**, Madrid-based painter and printmaker and sometime engraver-in-ordinary to Philip IV. Such was the impact of the title page illustration, it was repurposed in 1719 for Aguado de Cordova's *Bullarium equestris ordinis* [see item no. 1.]

A satire on British nobility, described in the language of heraldry; for example, the entry for **George Walpole**, third **Earl of Orford (1730-1791)**, nephew of Horace Walpole, reads: 'Arms. Or, a park vert. / Supporters Two rein-deers gules. / Crest. The ace of spades proper. / Motto. I fly the haunts of men.' The entry for **William Byron**, fifth **Baron Byron (1722-1798)** is rather more barbed and no doubt a reference to his notorious duel in 1765 against William Charworth, whom he ran through with a sword: 'Arms. The children in the wood. / Supporters. The dexter, Famine; the sinister, Silence, proper. / Crest. A sword. / Motto Thou canst not say I did it.'





The large paper issue, with remarkably generous margins, of historian John Strype's (1643-1737) monumental biography of Archbishop of York and of Canterbury Edmund Grindal (1516x20-1583). In a notorious sermon published in 1709, *The Perils of False Brethren, both in Church and State*, Church of England clergyman Henry Sacheverell (bap. 1674, d. 1724) fiercely denounced the contemporary ministry in the guise of an attack on Grindal. The controversy the sermon stirred up was the immediate provocation for Strype to bring publication of his memoir forward, which may not otherwise have seen the light of day but for subscription list which included many prominent churchmen and Whig politicians (including Robert Walpole (1676-1745) who lead the impeachment trial against Sacheverell) offended by Sacheverell's remarks, as well as a healthy number of London booksellers.



A rare survival of an early example of Parliamentary lobbying literature appealing against both the Corporation and Test Acts. The Corporation Act of 1661 provided that no person could be legally elected to any office relating to the government of a city or corporation, unless he had within the previous twelve months received the sacrament of the Lord's Supper according to the rites of the Church of England Civil. The Test Act, enacted twelve years later, enforced upon all persons filling any office, civil, military or religious, the obligation of taking the oaths of supremacy and allegiance and subscribing to a declaration against transubstantiation. The Acts would not be repealed until 1828.

A remarkably rare survival of the sole edition of author and traveller Philip Thicknesse's (1719-1792) petition to Queen Charlotte (1744-1818).

Thicknesse had been commander of the garrison at Harwich when Queen Charlotte first arrived in England in 1761. Shortly afterwards Thicknesse acquired a portrait of Frederick Prince of Wales, which he hoped to present to the royal family, and indeed contrived to do so via the French traveller and writer Louis Dutens, and John James Majendie, English tutor to the Queen. Although the Queen liked the portrait, she was unable to accept the gift, but the portrait was not returned to Thicknesse for six weeks, despite his repeated efforts - a circumstance he attributes here to some dubious machinations by the two Frenchmen. Some years later, in 1766, Thicknesse moved to France, when he contrived again to gift the portrait to the Queen, this time successfully. By 1791, Thicknesse had been reduced to penury. The present petition is a rather desperate attempt to extract money from the crown: 'Whether your Majesty...may think it right to make me some compensation, or return the picture, (which certainly is of some value) I humbly submit to your Majesty's consideration; certain it is, that if crowned heads cannot receive, with propriety, presents from subjects, something is due to those who contrive to convey to the hands of Majesty such a thing which they wish to possess'.

As alluded to in the editor's advertisement, much of the material is extracted directly from Hutchins's History of Dorset. An exception is a segment on the present state of Weymouth that reveals the eighteenth-century origins of the town as a resort, including all seven 'Rules and Orders' of the public rooms, with 'IV. That no Lady or Gentleman be permitted to dance in coloured gloves' and 'VIII. That Gentlemen will be pleased to leave their swords at the door' particularly anachronistic highlights. Also of note is an abstract on the circulating library in St. Thomas's Street 'now enlarged to consist of many thousands of volumes' that is 'rather calculated as a collection of books of elegant amusement than a selection for the use of the learned; it is proper however, to add, that nothing licentious or immoral is admitted'. A second, enlarged edition, with the addition of plates, was published in 1789.
