

DEFENDING INDIAN LOYALTY POST-MUTINY

The first edition of journalist Sambhu Chandra Mukherjee's (1839-1894) vindication of the loyalty of the Indian people towards the British Government in the wake of the Mutiny. Mukherjee, at great pains to deny any potential allegations of sedition, argues that the insurrection was 'purely military', and the people 'by their active and spontaneous assistance' actually rescued the Empire from downfall.

The third located copy of the sole edition of an anonymous proposal to link the port of Calcutta with the, then undeveloped, Mutlah river either by rail or canal; the former being found to be far superior and far more cost effective, with the members of the Mutlah Association convinced that 'a Railroad to Mutlah would be followed by most important and beneficial consequences to the Trading and Commercial interests of Calcutta especially, and the public generally.'

A first-hand account of operations at the East India Company garrison of Cawnpore (now Kanpur), besieged during the Indian rebellion of 1857. In July 1857, John Miller Adye (1819-1900) was sent to India as assistant adjutant-general of artillery. He arrived at Cawnpore on 21st November to find that his commanding officer had departed for the relief of Lucknow, and that the Gwalior sepoy division was advancing upon Cawnpore. He took part in the actions fought there on the 26th and following days. He was present at the battle of 6th December, in which the Gwalior division was finally routed.

The sole edition of the second and final published work of Mirzapur civil service officer Ahmad 'Azīzuddīn (1861-1940), a translation from his Urdu work entitled *Samrai Dyanat*, a novella on Anglo-Indian relations written with 'the object of giving the Public a thorough insight into the foul and annoying tricks, not uncommonly played by the Native officials of the old school, better known as the amla, and enabling the authorities to try to lay an axe at the very root of those mean acts, and save innocent people from the exortion of these men.'




An apparently unrecorded register of the authors represented in the Allahabad Public Library. Established in 1864, it remains the largest library in the state of Uttar Pradesh. The building was designed by resident East India Company architect **Richard Roskell Bayne** (1836-1901) in the Scots Baronial style, and served as the house of legislative assembly in the British Raj when Allahabad was the capital of the United Provinces.

The holdings are remarkably varied, ranging from Classics, to Indian history, to popular literature, including; Gibbon's *History of the Decline and Fall of the Roman Empire*, Shakespeare's plays, and the novels of Dickens.

No further parts are known to exist.








The sole edition of Indian civil servant, social reformer, anthropologist and sometime Bengali lecturer at Cambridge James Drummond Anderson's (1852-1920) collection of folk tales - presented in parallel Kachari and English emanating from the oral tradition of the Sino-Tibetan language speakers of the Boro people in the Assam region.

As the title to this work notes, it was intended to form a supplement to Sidney Endle's *Outline grammar of the Kachari language* (Shillong, 1884), 'as a reading-book for those who have acquired an elementary knowledge of Kachari, with 'rough' translations of 'these specimens of the folk-lore of a very simple and primitive people...collected during a tour of only six weeks' duration in the Kachari mauzas of Mangaldai, and cost only the effort of taking down the tales as they were dictated'.

Teach the natives of British India to prize the benefits which Thy good Providence has given them through the supremacy of this Christian land : and enable us to show more and more, both by word and good example, the blessings of Thy Holy Religion. May those who are now the slaves of a hateful and cruel superstition be brought to lay aside their vain traditions, and turn to Thee, the only true God, and Jesus Christ whom Thou hast sent. And so, if it be Thy good pleasure, establish our empire in that distant land on a surer foundation than heretofore, that we Thy people, and sheep of Thy pasture, may give Thee thanks for ever, and show forth Thy praise from generation to generation. These and all other mercies, we humbly beg, not for our own worthiness, but for Thy love, and through the merits and mediation of Thy blessed Son our Lord, to whom with Thee and the Holy Ghost be all honour and glory for ever and ever. Amen.



The following day the London Times carried reports from 159 places of worship in the London area. In the majority of sermons, it was concluded that the mutiny was a divine visitation caused by Britain's evangelical reticence; the Dean of St Paul's told his congregation that foremost amongst Britain's sins 'was neglect in spreading Christianity among the idolatrous and infidel populations of India'.





The Asiatic Society of Bengal, a scholarly society founded on 15th January, 1784, by British lawyer and Orientalist Sir William Jones (1746-1794) to encourage Oriental studies. An outstanding scholar from the University of Oxford, Jones arrived in Calcutta in 1783, as a supreme court judge. The society was founded shortly after his arrival. It had the support and encouragement of Warren Hastings, the governor-general of Bengal, though he declined its presidency. Until Jones's death it was the vehicle for his ideas about the importance of Hindu culture and learning and about the vital role of Sanskrit in the Aryan languages. Indians were first admitted as members in 1829.

This review of the Society's first hundred years includes a detailed history of the institution, an account of the Society library, and reports of their numerous publications.





'SORDID' INDIAN 'MELODRAMA'



An anonymously co-authored (the preface references 'The Authors' and is signed 'Alpha-Beta') Allahabad-printed novel centred upon the romantic affairs of the private secretary of the Viceroy.

The Literary World were excoriating in their review: 'The most flagrant of these mocking unrealities which we have seen is a stupidly sensational tale called A Romance of Bureaucracy. We say 'stupidly sensational,' because the author seems to be as unconscious of the impossibilities as of the improbabilities his story. It is improbable, for instance, that the private secretary of an Indian Viceroy, seeing an American girl act part of Imogene at a theatre in Chicago, should 'woo and marry' her without making any inquiry whatever into antecedents. It is improbable that such inquiry should have been before she was presented to the Viceroy. It is improbable that a man should placed on the Viceroy's Council as a representative of the commercial interests of the Empire, who was known to have done 'strange things and shabby things and shady things,' but that an American citizen should be selected for that post is out of the question...In our opinion the chief art displayed in the story is that contriving, by hints and shifts nomenclature, the means of hitching to persons actually living the parts in sordid and melodrama.'







A translation of an anonymous Persian manuscript entitled Gwāliyārnāmah (with a continuation to the present time by the translator) documenting the history of fort of Gwalior. First known from c. AD 525, the fort was under Hindu rule until 1232 and then changed hands several times between Muslims and Hindus until 1751; thereafter it remained a Maratha stronghold, though it was taken by the British several times. During the 1857 uprising, around 6500 sepoys stationed at Gwalior rebelled against East India Company rule. The British retook the fort the following year. In 1886, with British dominance in India secured, the fort was bequeathed to the House of Scindia.

Another edition, printed at the Durbar Press, Bombay, and extending to 91 pages, appeared in the same year.

A *sammelband* of four scarce pamphlets by civil engineer Sir Alexander Richardson Binnie (1839-1917) bound for presentation to C. C. Canney, likely Charles Campbell Canney, engineer who in the late nineteenth-century served the irrigation department of Bombay.

In 1867, Binnie was appointed an executive engineer in the public works department of India. He was stationed at Nagpur in Central Provinces where in 1873 he constructed the waterworks and supply from Ambajiri. He discovered coal at Warora (Chanda district); this led to the construction of the Wardha–Warora branch of the Great Indian Peninsula Railway and the opening up of the coalfield (worked from 1871 to 1906), for which Binnie received a commendation from the government of India. Upon his return to England, in 1875 Binnie was appointed waterworks engineer to the city of Bradford. Binnie understood the fundamental need for reliable hydrological data on which to base the design of reservoirs, leading to a significant publication *On mean or average rainfall and the fluctuation to which it is subject.*


This work is also the earliest example that we could locate of photozincographic reproduction used in a book published in Bombay. The process of photographing images down onto zinc for easier, faster - and most importantly cheaper - reproduction than was hitherto available was pioneered in England by **Colonel Henry James (1803-1877)**, Director of the Ordnance Survey in the late 1850s. With support of Gladstone's treasury (well aware of the number of manuscripts, such as pipe rolls, in their possession), James had demonstrated that unique items such as the Domesday book could be reproduced at scale. The process was also used by the Survey of India, and not abandoned until 1907.

He went on to publish a Santali-English Dictionary (Pokhuria, 1899-1902).







A choice copy in the original cloth of the first edition of a series of accounts of journeys to Bhutan, in particular that of administrator in India Ashley Eden (1831-1887). In 1861 Eden was appointed special envoy to Sikkim and, with the support of an army, secured from the maharaja a treaty guaranteeing free trade and the cessation of raids into British territory. In 1863 he was sent on a similar mission to Bhutan but without military backing and he found himself taken virtual prisoner by the Bhutanese and forced to sign a treaty humiliating to the British. The insult was liberally returned when Britain went to war against Bhutan in November 1864.

The sole located copy of a rare, practical guide, reprinted from the Journal of the Photographic Society of India, and produced in order to remove the need for 'guessing or estimating the actinic power of light as it appears to the eye or by the illumination of the ground glass screen' amongst photographers in 'India and the east'.

The author, George Ewing, who published the Handbook of photography for amateurs in India (Calcutta, 1895), notes in his introduction that these 'tables are based on the labours of Dr. Scott and Professors Burton and Eder', but are presented here 'simplified...as far as possible, so that now any one who can multiply and divide can expose correctly'. The tables are divided into three sections; for working near the equator, for the north latitude of 23 degrees, and for the north latitude of around 30 degrees.

The first, posthumously published edition of lexicographer S. W. Fallon's (1817-1880) dictionary of Hindustani proverbs, edited, with the assistance of Urdu translator to the Government of Bengal, Lala Faqir Chand, by army officer and oriental scholar Sir Richard Carnac Temple (1850-1931). Though it is an Urdu-English dictionary, in addition to Urdu and Punjabi proverbs, it includes many proverbs from Urdu's regional dialects such as Bhojpuri, Marvari (Marwari) and Maggah (Magahi, spoken in Bihar). Delhi's Asian Educational Services reprinted the work in 1998.





The first edition of a register of the artworks held by the office of the Secretary of State for India in Council, compiled by India Office employee and historiographer William Foster (1863-1951). Unsurprisingly, the majority of the 204 pieces depict significant moments or notable individuals from the history of the British controlled India, in particular the exploits of the East India Company. Foster gives a description of each, often accompanied by a note providing context. Further editions were published in 1902, 1906, and 1914 respectively.

The Birmingham Assay Office, one of the four assay offices in the United Kingdom, was founded in 1773 and to this day remains responsible for testing the purity of precious metals and issuing hallmarks of certification.



It includes family background, medical history and anatomical description of Laloo, and his parasitic twin, who worked for P.T. Barnum's and was a participant in the 1899 protest against the use of the classification of 'freak' in favour of the term 'living human curiosities'.

OCLC locates three copies of this work (with a Philadelphia imprint, at Boston Public library, Harvard and Pennsylvania); COPAC adds one further with a Glasgow imprint, at Oxford; we could find no other example of this edition with a Leicester imprint.





The first mentioned work, the bylaws for the lodge of Industry and Perseverance at Calcutta, is extensively marked by **Reverend Frederick Walter Robberds (d. 1898)**, recorded as a Deputy District Grand Master in Bengal. The volume was bound up in the late nineteenth century for inclusion in the collection of the Charlesworth Masonic Library.



The first edition of Irish administrator of British India and linguist Sir George Abraham Grierson's (1851-1941) significant illustrated study of the language, folklore and customs of the inhabitants of Bihar, where he was then posted by the Indian Civil Service. In his introduction Grierson notes that whilst 'this work professes to be a catalogue of the names used by the Bihar peasant for the things surrounding him in his daily life...in order to relief the dryness which such a mere list would possess, the writer has attempted to give a description, more of less complete, of that life and of its character and incidents'. He continues that 'every native word is written twice over - once with accuracy in the native character...and once in the English character for those who are not acquainted with the Indian Vernacular'.

The illustrations, which include representations of machinery and locals and are of significantly varying artistic quality, are described as 'from photographs taken by the author'; several are signed as lithographed by various students at the Government School of Art, Calcutta.

The first edition of a selection of traditional Assam proverbs, compiled and annotated by a district officer of the province. *The Journal of the Royal Asiatic Society* (1896, p.807) reviewed the book favourably: "The volume does not pretend to be exhaustive of the whole Province, but contains only a gleaning from the subdivisions of Sibságar, Nowgong, and Gaukáti. In transliterating the words from the Nágari alphabet to the Roman, the compiler has been guided by Sir W Hunter's "Practical Guide to Transliteration." "The Proverbs have been classified according to objects, not subjects, this being thought the best method after consideration." 



The first edition of British Army officer Henry Bathurst Hanna's (1839-1914), somewhat fanciful, extended thought experiment analysing the prospective success of a Russian invasion of India. Hanna ultimately concludes that such a venture would be futile, owing predominantly to the invulnerability of the Indus frontier, which he deems impassable by sufficient numbers to warrant a threat. *The Asiatic Review* (July-October, 1895, p.217) received the work favourably, commenting that: 'Our gallant author's painstaking book should be read by all who have heart the maintenance of the Empire; for it shows admirably at least one side of a vital question which should be studied from each of its points of view.'



First printed in the Calcutta printed journal of ornithology Stray Feathers, Hume notes that his list 'includes the Birds of the whole Empire, except Beluchistan, Afghanistan, Badakshan, Wakhan, &c., on the North-West; the Maldives, the Mergui Archipelago, and the western half of the Malay Peninsula', and references other works where full and complete descriptions are often found.

Rare; OCLC locates just three copies (Chicago, Field Museum and Harvard), and COPAC adds just one further (Natural History Museum).

The Conference supported intercaste marriages while condemning polygamy. It notably launched the 'Pledge Movement' to encourage people to take an oath to opposing child marriage.

Jeffreys spent some thirty years in India, holding appointments as Staff Surgeon at Cawnpore and Civil Surgeon at Futtehguhr. Though primarily remembered as the inventor of the respirator, he devoted much of his career to the study of the adverse effects of heat on the body. In this book Jeffreys put forward the novel concept of body heat loss by radiation, evaporation, conduction, and convection. In consequence of this, he would champion the development of protective materials suitable for use by British armed forces, including the, then revolutionary, suggestion of heat reflecting fabrics. For many years he tried to persuade the East India Company to put his inventions to the test but to no avail.




