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




## **Sir Anthony Eden (1897-1977)**

British foreign secretary (1935-38, 1940-45, and 1951-55) and Prime Minister (1955-1957). Following active service in the First World War, Eden read Oriental Languages at Oxford. He was elected to the House of Commons in 1923. In 1935 he was appointed foreign secretary, a position he resigned in 1938 to protest Prime Minister Neville Chamberlain's appearement of Nazi Germany.

When Churchill became Prime Minister in 1940, he was named secretary of state for war, and later during the Second World War once more served as foreign secretary. Eden succeeded Churchill as Prime Minister in 1955. In 1956, his failure to respond effectively during the Suez Crisis, and the subsequent loss of party and public support, ultimately lead to his resignation from office in 1957. He was knighted in 1954 and created Earl of Avon in 1961.



## Ferdinand Otto Miksche (1904-1992)

Austrian-born army officer and military theorist. Miksche joined the Czechoslovakian Army in 1927. A veteran of the Spanish Civil War, during which he served with the International Brigades on the side of the Republicans, he held various positions with the Allied Forces during the Second World War. He saw action in France in 1940 and was later attached to Free French forces, serving on the personal staff of General Charles De Gaulle.

After the war he was appointed Czechoslovakian Military Attaché for both France & Belgium, but when the communist regime took power in 1948, he accepted a commission in the French Army. In 1950, he became a professor at the Portuguese Insituto de Altos Estudos Militares. In 1955 he returned to France and was posted as a Military Engineer Officer in the French Army Defence Office. He was the author of, among many other works, Blitzkrieg (London, 1941), Paratroops: the history, organization and tactical use of airborne formations (London, 1943), and Atomic Weapons and Armies (London, 1955). He continued to write on politico-military affairs into his dotage, producing widely read and influential works.

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



In the modern types of dive-bombers the pilot is able to concentrate his attention on exact aiming and need not concern himself as to how to pull the machine

In dive-bombing, the accuracy of the aim, of course, is much greater than in any other form of bombing, and almost approaches the precision of an artillery bombard-ment. Nature beself has furnished us with a model of diving Like a bird of prey, the machine hurls itself on its victim, under an angle of 60 to 70 degrees. The advantages of divebombing are:

- 1. As the pilot before his dive observes the area from a relatively great height, the first of the great advantages of the dive-bomber is the relatively easy possibility of an accurate choice of target and of attacking the chosen target from the right direction.
- 2. The pilot dives with his machine directly towards the target. The longitudinal axis of the aeroplane is directed towards the target, almost like the barrel of a gun. Thus the bomb is aimed in the same way as a projectile. There is no need to allow for the bomb's forward travel as a separate disturbing factor, and the necessity of determining the height, direction, and speed of the plane at the moment of releasing the bomb is largely eliminated.
- 3. The bomb has a very high initial velocity towards the target, that is, the diving velocity of the plane, 400 ile per hour. If this is compounded with the acceleration of the drop, the resulting velocity is higher than can be reached and any other method. But the higher the velocity, the smaller the disturbance due to meteorological factors. In dive-bombing the bomb is



Summing up, we can say that unless Africa becomes EuroAfrican it will become, with Moscow's help, Asio-African.
Therein lies a deadly peril for Europe—and for America.
Viewed from Moscow, the Asio-African development is the
indispensable stepping-stone to the victory without war of world
Communism, the condition for the enslavement of all Europe by
Pan-Slavian Bolshevism as conceived by Peter the Great.

Prominent statesmen and soldiers have often insisted that only atomic superiority saved the West from an attack by Moscow. However, it is questionable whether the Soviet leaders have ever given serious thought to overrunning Europe in the Hitler manner. Their strength lies in their native inborn conspiratorial peasant cunning which Western diplomacy has never really understood and for which it was never a match. The arguments of Western statesmen and soldiers, based as they are on purely material considerations, show the extent of that miscalculation. America relies on its technical achievements to keep the peace. The Soviet Union thus to a large extent receives a free permit to instigate revolutionary outbreaks against which our present defence system is powerless. To the peoples of Africa and Asia, Washington appears in an unfavourable light as the power which is threatening atomic war, while the population of Europe gradually comes to feel itself abandoned. The strategic planning of the West is based mainly on the idea of defending Europe against a general attack, whereas the Russians will certainly not unleash an atomic Pearl Harbour and are even unlikely to cross the Elbe with force. Why should they lightly expose their 'Socialist achievements' to the danger of total destruction? Too often the bogy of an atomic Pearl Harbour has been dangled before us, although of all conceivable hypotheses concerning an initial act of war, such a rash onslaught by Moscow is the least probable. The psychosis thus created is reminiscent of the well-known fable of the shepherd boy who cried 'Wolf!' for a joke and who was not believed when one day the wolf actually attacked his flock. This is not to minimize the Soviet danger: on the contrary, the menace is much more threatening than many people will admit and much more

serious than an atomic Pearl Harbour. But the outbreak of a general war is actually conceivable only in connection with complications arising outside Europe. The victor in the struggle between East and West will be the one who succeeds in bringing the evolution of the coloured peoples under his control.

The Suez crisis opened the way to Soviet penetration in the Middle East and Africa The main danger threatening the West lies in the pendulum policy of many states of this area which swing between East and West his state of affairs compels us to a new definition of the defence of Europe. What is decisive in this matter is not the question of who is right but what is right in the given situation. The problem in fact is to eliminate this pendulum policy, if necessary by the threat or use of force. As, however, every such intervention would inevitably set off a chain reaction which would extend to Europe, the preservation of our interests outside Europe is impossible so long as we in Europe are not militarily covered. Certainly, since the end of the war the West finds itself in the political sense on the defensive, but a policy or strategy which excludes a priori preventive action condemns itself to failure, as it leaves one of the most important trumps—the initiative—to the enemy. The atomic paralysis from which the West suffers robs it of its ability to underpinits policy/militarily. Who would think of knocking a fly off his own head with a hammer?

The Soviet Union seems to regard its military power in the sould be seen as a means of political pressure enabling it to pursue its subversive campaigns more effectively of seems. It is difficult to see how the West can protect itself against this strategic conception with atomic weapons. The Atlantic Powers have declared that they will never use these weapons for a preventive war, and the policy of the East will carefully avoid offering a tangible target for them. The Anglo-Irish poet and playwright, remembered as one of high society's greatest wits, suffered a criminal conviction for gross indecency and was subsequently sentenced to two years hard labour - the bulk of which was served at Reading Gaol.

This second edition was produced swiftly after the first sell out run - just twelve days later - in an edition of 1,000 unnumbered copies, on 24th February, 1898. This was followed by several other editions, though Wilde was not officially revealed as the author until the seventh edition, published a whole year after the sixth (23rd June, 1899) named him in brackets under the previous alias 'C.3.3.'.



An early sexology treatise by English author, philosopher, and early gay-rights advocate Edward Carpenter (1844-1929).

This is one of four decidedly fin-de-siècle works on human sexuality which were described by novelist Edith Ellis - wife of the early sex psychologist Havelock Ellis - as 'sex bombs'.

Carpenter's writings, ideas, and way of life laid the bedrock for many of the left-leaning movements of the twentieth century, in both literature and society.

Corresponding patterned endpapers, fore and bottom edge untrimmed. Boards a little rubbed with the corners worn, the sunned spine a trifle warped. Internally bright and clean, with the expected seven illustrations throughout the text; two portraits, two facsimiles, two signatures, and the headpiece to 'The Vision of the Mermaids'.

Gerald Manly Hopkins (1844-1889), was a revolutionary English Victorian poet and Jesuit priest, who went largely unpublished in his lifetime.

A deeply conflicted figure, Hopkins burned much of his poetical works in 1868, giving up writing entirely for seven years. His conversion and subsequent devotion to his Jesuit Priesthood, after some years as a Catholic - an earlier conversion from Anglicanism that estranged him from his staunchly religious family - Hopkins would go back and forth between the two passions for the rest of his life. While never gaining recognition in his lifetime, he is now credited as a precursor to much of the poetical styles of the twentieth century. His concept and execution of both sprung rhythm, and inscape and instress, are now widely recognised as some of the most original literary advances of his century.


#### IN THE RARE DUSTWRAPPER

Laurence Housman (1865-1959) was a prolific writer, poet and illustrator whose career spanned from the Edwardian Era to the middle of the twentieth century. He was an active Suffragette, Humanist, and member of the Order of Chaeronea, a secret society dedicated to the ascetic homosexual ethos.

One of only three works edited by Housman, the best-known being the universally panned A.E.H.: some poems, some letters and a personal memoir by his brother Laurence Housman (1937).

The rare first Czech edition of Irish novelist and acting manager Bram Stoker's (1847-1912) infamous vampire novel *Dracula*, translated by J.H Khun, of whom little is known other than his involvement in the early Esperanto movement.

The translation of this Gothic cornerstone into Czech preceded both French (1920) and Dutch (1928) translations, and coincided with the break-up of the Austro-Hungarian empire, parts of which - it should not be forgotten - provide the early plot's setting and the eponymous characters origin story.

Published in a two volume paperback which featured decorative illustrated wrappers, but presented here in a fitting if rather interpretive modern binding with 'blood-spatter' marbled boards. Very few copies appear to have survived either in commerce or institutionally; other than this copy none seem to appear in the auction records, and OCLC locates a single copy at the Czech national library.

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



The Second Slovakian edition (the first, translated by Stefan Jasny, was published privately in Scranton, PA, 1922) - but the first illustrated, fittingly, with stills from Murnau's classic German expressionist silent film of 1922, unofficially adapted from Dracula, and featuring Orava castle in Slovakia.

Published in Bratislava in the year after Czech uprising, it was translated by Jozef Kot (from the Arrow Books edition London, 1963) and issued by Tatran as the second volume of their Horror-Thriller-Western series. Whilst printed in large numbers (purportedly 40,000), few copies appear to have survived. We could trace no copies in OCLC of this edition.

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
