The sole edition of the first published work of Bath-based poet and Church of England clergyman Robert Montgomery (1807-1855); a collection of verse juvenilia which boasted both Joanna Baillie (1762-1851) and Thomas Haynes Bayly (1797-1839) among its subscribers.

The poems, many of which were initially 'circulated among a few private friends', are chiefly sentimental in tone and frequently romantic in theme with three notable exceptions of a more martial nature; 'The Soldier's Return', 'The Warrior's Death', and 'Haste Thee Warrior', which reflect on the devastations of warfare.

An apparently unrecorded Guernsey-printed alphabet primer preserved in original unsophisticated state - to which is appended a catechism of the Anglican Church, and various sacred sonnets and prayers for youth.

Evidently compiled for the benefit of the bilingual youth of the Channel Islands, the pamphlet is primarily comprised of lengthy registers of one, two, three, and four syllable words. The terminal leaf departs from the linguistic concerns of the rest of the work, providing mathematical tables concerning multiplication, addition and subtraction, and fittingly, 'Mesure de Guernesey'; a short list of comparative measurements, for example '2 pintes font une quarte, 4 quartes, ou 8 pintes, font un gallon'.

Neither this seventh edition, nor indeed any other, appear in the usual databases.



An apparently unrecorded and provincially published verse alphabet issued by Somerset-based printer Thomas Whitehorn as a part of their New Juvenile Library series. Few examples of Whitehorn's publications survive, those that have are predominantly intended for a juvenile readership.

The lines selected to accompany each letter, and facilitate the rhyming scheme, are on occasion somewhat inappropriate for children: 'D was a Drunkard, who liv'd at an inn', and in some instances simply nonsensical: 'I or J Stands for Jane, and also for John'.

There is no indication as to why this chapbook may be considered a 'London' alphabet, except perhaps as an effort by the publisher to instil in the public of Watchet and environs a sense that this particular ABC contains a certain cosmopolitan sophistication.







The battledore was an offshoot of the hornbook, and was printed for the double purpose of serving as a literacy aid for the use of children when in school, and, during recreation, as a paddle in the game of shuttlecock and battledore, an early form of badminton.







This collection includes 34 such examples, demonstrating his range from practical alphabets to engaging riddles, theological classics such as Watts' *Divine songs* and classic ballads like the *Children in the Wood*.




Though recorded by Marjorie Moon's *John Harris's Books for Youth: 1801-1843* (in printed yellow wrappers) this edition does not appear to be represented institutionally.



The work has the distinction of being one of the earliest to employ the term 'pic nic' in its modern English sense. In the late eighteenth century, if you dined in the French style, faire á pique-nique, one would be expected to contribute to the meal or pay a part of the bill. The custom was largely unfamiliar to the English, with the exception of the Pic-Nics, a London social club who adopted the French manner of dining, but notably only dined indoors. The 'pic nic dinner' devised by Harris features a diverse cast of characters of animals gathered around a picnic cloth laden with a sumptuous feast including cherry pie and 'currant wine'. The plate depicting this scene is somewhat ambiguous in terms of the setting, whether the bestial brethren are dining indoors or out. This is corrected by the 1814 edition, when they are clearly shown feasting beneath an oak tree.







A collection of short comedies for young children by French novelist Stephanie Felicite, Comtesse de Genlis (1746-1830). First printed between 1779 and 1780, the first translation into English appeared in 1781. Intended for both the entertainment and the moral instruction of a wide juvenile readership, by the publication of the fourth volume, Genlis nonetheless observed that works of this nature were traditionally targeted at the children of the better off. To rectify this, the final volume is intended solely for the education of the working classes, specifically the children of merchants and craftsmen, as well as young chambermaids and female shop workers.

A charming Victorian children's card game, of which we can find no records institutionally, in which a 'golden egg' is passed between players when egg cards are drawn. The winner is the one who is holding the egg once all cards are played.

The game was first issued by London-based publisher David Ogilvy - prolific maker of table games and dissected puzzles - and then, following Ogilvy's retirement, John Jaques & Son. Ogilvy initialled issued the game, within a decorated chestnut box, for the considerable sum of three shillings and sixpence; though in the latter decades of the century issued sets in cheap cardboard boxes for a mere shilling.



OCLC records a single copy of a version of the game issued by Albany-based publisher and lithographer **Richard H. Pease (1813-1869)** in 1847 (AAS); and a single copy of another issued in 1890 by McLoughlin Bros. of New York (Trinity College). The former of these includes a sheet of instructions; if the present edition was issued with a similar sheet, it is no longer extant.



A rare late eighteenth-century pocket-sized epitome of English history, designed for a juvenile audience and beautifully adorned with finely 36 finely engraved plates of medallic representations of English monarchs.

As noted to the title, and in the preliminary advertisement, the medallic portraits were engraved (by Charles Pye) after the medallic productions - all bar the final two, of George III and his Oueen Consort - of Genevan engraver and medallist Jean Dassier (1676-1763). The engravings themselves had first been published in folio format in 1797, 'engraved on six Plates, six Medals on each', and as noted in the preliminary text of this volume, the print run was limited to '100 impressions'. This pocket sized version, with accompanying text relating notable events in the reigns of the sovereigns depicted, is largely epitomised from the the seventeenth-century Anglo-Irish herald Francis Sandford's A Genealogical History of the Kings of England and Monarchs of Great Britain...from the Conquest, anno 1066, to the year 1677 (London, 1677).



The history of the more contemporary reigns were obviously not sourced from Sandford's work, and include references to developments in both America (In 1773, an attempt was made to tax the Americans by laying a duty on tea, which they resisted, and formed a Congress, wggucg declared the compact void between the two countries. Several battles were fought, before the Americans declared their Independence') and Australia (In 1786, a Colony was estasblished in New South Wales, by sending the convicts there to cultivate the soil, and subsist by their own labour').

Understandably rare, given this work's diminutive size and intended audience, ESTC locates just five copies worldwide (Birmingham, BL, Cambridge, Oxford and UCLA).



The second edition, in original state, of Barbara Hofland's (bap. 1770, d. 1844) Minerva Press printed primer on European history; presented in the form of a dialogue between a mother and father and their nine children. The conversation does not progress chronologically, though does conclude with discussion of the predominant event at the time of the publication of the first edition in 1813; the then ongoing Napoleonic Wars. Indeed, it would appear that the final section of the text has been altered from the first edition, as the family meet once again in 1819 and discuss the conclusion of the conflict and the exile of Bonaparte.

With the exception of the fourth and final chapter, 'The Walk', in which the pair saunter through the countryside discussing minerals, the 'many things' related to the reader are confined to 'Dogs', 'Ants' and 'New Zealanders'. The inclusion of this latter chapter distinguishes the book as the earliest recorded children's text with New Zealand content. The chapter relates Captain Cook's encounters with the natives and experiences of Moyhanger, a Maori brought to London.



A choice presentation copy of the first edition of the only prose work specifically written 'for the use of children' by novelist and poet Amelia Opie (1769-1853). Norfolk-printed and published in the same year as Opie joined the Society of Friends, largely at the encouragement of the Gurney family, it is surely most likely that the recipient of this presentation copy was Elizabeth Freeman, companion of the Gurney sisters Louisa (later Gurney-Hoare), Priscilla and Betsy (later Elizabeth Fry).

The four tales in this work all concern a single landed family, headed by 'Sir George and Lady Pemberton', the parents of two sons, Henry and Edward. Imbued with morality to be gleaned from life, the tales follow the children's adventures at a nearby fair or with a friend's lame dog, as well as when they hear of the experiences of others in adversity, such as in French Gaol or English workhouse. In the final story, a cousin of the Pemberton's, Merrick, comes to stay. Like one of the Pemberton twins, he intends to become clergyman, with the motive of enjoying a life of hunting and shooting. Lady Pemberton attempts to influence Merrick by providing an account of the exemplary lives of a clergyman and his wife who devoted themselves entirely to their parishioners regardless of their own comfort. Her hopes are dashed, yet she stoically concludes: 'what a blessing it is to children to be well taught.'

The work of educationist Sarah Trimmer (1741-1810), Fabulous histories, first published in 1786, aims to teach young children to treat kindly all the animals of creation through an innovative narrative which juxtaposes the lives of a human family with a family of robins. Such was the popularity of the robins that the titles of later editions were altered to place more emphasis on the children. The fables continued to be printed in numerous, occasionally bowdlerized, forms throughout the nineteenth century.



Following introductory verses defining several geographical terms, the rhyming couplets explore "The world', 'Europe', 'England', 'Wales', 'Scotland', 'Ireland', 'Asia', 'Judea', 'Africa' (Including the lines 'In Africa's the negro's home, And there they live content and free, Till cruel men from Europe come And drag them into slavery'), 'America', 'The Sea' and, perhaps most interestingly, 'New Holland': '...The animals there are a singular class, Sloths, large bats, opossums, green frogs, kangaroos; Majestic black swans down the smooth rivers pass; Birds seven feet high are the long-legg'd Emus'.


