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
The books in this list - some in extravagant goatskin, others in plain calf - have been collected by us over the past few years and put aside because of the details of production which their form provides. Many have come from large libraries and accumulations; often obscurities plucked from the norm. Some were deliberately selected by previous owners, such as Robin de Beaumont, for their binding; others were given as gifts, or prizes, and sometimes acquired, as most books are, for their contents.

The reference works of Marianne Tidcombe and Charles Ramsden, and the bookbinding database at the British Library are obviously invaluable to the history of English binding; but we include many books here from small, often provincial binderies which have not troubled the indexes of binding historians. We hope that the tickets, and sometimes scant biographical and company details gleaned from directories or other digitised works and presented in this catalogue may be of help to future cataloguers in the book trade and beyond.

One final note: we were unsure how to title this catalogue. The trade norm is 'fine bindings'; but we have deliberately included the plain, and occasionally workmanlike too, if interesting and/or signed.

The prepossessing binding, evidently inspired by the fashion for the Arts and Crafts movement, though proficient, lacks finer finishing detail (particularly in regard to the lettering) suggesting that the mysterious 'M' was an amateur.





Charles McLeish the elder learnt his craft at the Edinburgh-based workshop of Andrew Grieve in Edinburgh. He later settled in London where he was employed first by Riviere before moving to the newly established Doves Bindery as the firm's finisher; a position he held for sixteen years until 1909, when he entered into partnership with his son, Charles McLeish the younger, who had apprenticed under Roger de Coverly.



The curious binding, the design of which is entirely unrelated to the contents, was executed by renowned Florentine bookbinders Giulio Giannini. The firm, established in 1856, remains in operation to this day.





Bumpus benefitted from a reputation for remarkably well-executed bindings in classical designs from its foundation in 1780 well into the twentieth century. In reality, the 'bindery' never produced a single binding, instead outsourcing the work to esteemed firms including Sangorski & Sutcliffe and Rivière.

An early edition, in a charming fin de siècle Riviere binding, of salonnière Marie Josephine de Suin, comtesse de Beausacq's (1829-1899) compilation of maxims and aphorisms gathered from contemporary intellectuals including archaeologist and explorer Jane Dieulafoy (1851-1916), painter Henri-Jean Guillaume Martin (1860-1943), and satirical poet and anarchist Laurent Tailhade (1854-1919).

Robert Riviere (1808-1882) initially established himself at Bath as a bookseller in 1829, and subsequently turned to bookbinding. Around 1840 he moved to London, where he commenced business solely as a binder, attracting the patronage of a wealthy clientele, including royalty. The output of Riviere, like the majority of binders of this period, is lacking in innovation; contemporary tastes predominantly calling for the production of 'retrospective' bindings, frequently in a style not even remotely suitable for the books they contained. However, in all other aspects - from the quality of the materials employed, to the delicacy of the tooling - the bindings of Riviere are richly deserving of admiration; particularly considering that he was apparently entirely self-taught. On his death Riviere bequeathed his business to Percival Calkin, the eldest son of his second daughter, who had been taken into partnership by his grandfather in 1881, when the style of the firm was altered to Riviere & Son. The company continued to operate until 1939. The goodwill and the tools were sold to Messrs Bayntun of Bath.





The International Exhibition of 1862: The Illustrated Catalogue of the Industrial Department (p.87), issued to accompany the event, states: 'The publishers of London show together in a collective case, where may be seen some of the most luxurious volumes produced by the leading houses. The reprint of the first edition of Shakespeare; the Bibles of Bagster and Spottiswoode, are also in this collection.'





Founded by Samuel Bagster the elder (1772-1851), who was succeeded in the by his sons Samuel Bagster the Younger (1800-1835) and Jonathan Bagster (1813-1872), Bagster and Sons was renowned in the early nineteenth-century for bringing a wealth of rare scholarly Bibles and Liturgical texts to the mass market, most notably Polyglot Bibles and reprints of early protestant translations by Tyndall, Wycliff and Cranmer. Their efforts in producing affordable (yet finely printed) versions of Biblical texts allowed the Bagsters to pioneer the avoidance of the monopoly printing of the Authorized version.



The sole edition of sometime colonial secretary in Van Diemen's Land James Ebenezer Bicheno's (1785-1851) critique of the severity of the British criminal code, in which he notably objects to burdening 'the colonies with the refuse of our prisons'.

Carrs was greatly admired by Thomas Dibdin, who in his *Northern Tour* (1838) described his as 'a Glasgovian, and a cunning man...the favourite bookbinder among the cognoscenti of Glasgow'. Ramsden first lists Carss in 1810; the firm remained active until at least 1837.

The sole Brindley edition of the only surviving work of Roman historian Quintus Curtius Rufus, Historiae Alexandri Magni, a biography of Alexander the Great, that though weak in areas of geography and military strategy, succeeds in conveying the character and attitudes of the classical emperor. This edition includes the supplements by German scholar Johann Freinshemius (1608-1660) which attempt to restore the final two of the original 10 books lost to time.

As to the identity of the previous owner, a likely candidate is Church of England clergyman Shaw King of Mereland, Kirby-le-Soken, Essex.






Considered the eminent binder of his generation, **Henri Marius Michel (1846-1925)** believed passionately 'that bookbinding needed a new vocabulary of ornamentation in order to express the mood and spirit of contemporary authors' (Duncan & De Bartha, *Art Nouveau and Art Deco Bookbinding*, New York, 1989). He found in the 1878 International Exposition a convenient and appropriate forum through which to promote the revolutionary style of decorative ornaments based on nature, a style he called 'La Flore Ornamentale'.






Michel was at first viewed as impudent and rebellious, and his work was objected to on theoretical grounds as being too much like 'art', and too little like a product of the binder's craft. But, in the words of Duncan & De Bartha, 'the young man's fervent convictions, as well as his superb technical skills, as both a binder and a gilder, won him an increasing number of supporters. By 1885 his designs were seen as a viable alternative to traditional bindings for certain books'. Other binders began to imitate his approach, but Marius Michel the younger was the 'undisputed leader of the new movement, [his] incomparable technique, harmonious selection of colour, and infinite variety of plant motifs [placing] his work above those of his contemporaries'.



'The objects aimed at in this book, which follows naturally on the original Dictionary of London, have been to give practical information to oarsmen, anglers, yachtsmen, and others directly interested in the river; to serve as a guide to the numerous strangers who annually visit the principal places on its banks; to furnish a book of reference for residents; as well as to provide in a concise form a useful handbook for those connected with the port of London and its trade.'

The final edition of a singular guide to the Thames and environs compiled by Charles Culliford Boz Dickens (1837-1896), eldest son of the novelist, first published in 1879.

The Guild of Women-Binders was established by bookseller and antiquary **Frank Karslake** (1864-1917) in 1898 to promote the work of female artisans. In addition to selling the work of established binders, such as Florence de Rheims, the society provided training opportunities. The Guild - which Tidcombe highlights was nothing of the sort, but merely a business opportunity operating for Karlake's profit (Tidcomde, *Women Bookbinders* 1880-1920) - ceased activities in 1904.







The first edition of the collected works of poet Ernest Dowson (1867-1900), handsomely bound by Harrison & Son, with tooling imitating the Art Nouveau pattern of the original publisher's cloth binding designed by Aubrey Beardsley.

Sir Anthony Eden (1897-1977), British foreign secretary (1935-38, 1940-45, and 1951-55) and Prime Minister (1955-1957). Following active service in the First World War, Eden read Oriental languages at Oxford. He was elected to the House of Commons in 1923. In 1935 he was appointed foreign secretary, a position he resigned in 1938 to protest Prime Minister Neville Chamberlain's appeasement of Nazi Germany. When Churchill became Prime Minister in 1940, he was named secretary of state for war, and later during the Second World War once more served as foreign secretary. Eden succeeded Churchill as Prime Minister in 1955. In 1956, his failure to respond effectively during the Suez Crisis, and the subsequent loss of party and public support, would ultimately lead to his resignation from office in 1957. He was knighted in 1954 and created earl of Avon in 1961.

A revised and expanded edition of a monumental historical survey of British West Indian colonies, first published in two volumes in 1783, by planter and politician Bryan Edwards (1743-1800). A comprehensive and important work - with a great deal of material relating to the progress of the African slave trade and character of enslaved peoples - the fifth and final edition appeared in 1819, by which time it had further expanded to five volumes.

Ramsden records an entry for Plymouth-based publishers and bookbinders Vicary & Co. in a local directory for 1814; besides this, no further information regarding the firm, nor their publications, appears extant.



Bumpus benefitted from a reputation for remarkably well-executed bindings in classical designs from its foundation in 1780 well into the twentieth-century. In actuality, the 'bindery' never produced a single binding, instead outsourcing the work to esteemed firms including Sangorski & Sutcliffe and Rivière.



Exbury House was acquired by Banker and politician Lionel Nathan de Rothschild (1882-1942) in 1919 and remains in the family to this day. Many of the books in the library were inherited from Alfred de Rothschild (1842-1918) of Halton Estate, notably considered one of greatest art collectors of his day.

John Keble (1792-1866), English poet, Anglican clergyman and leading light of the Oxford movement. *The Christian Year*, a collection of 103 well executed devotional verses, was first published in an edition comprised of only 500 copies in 1827. It was immensely successful; hundreds of subsequent editions appeared before the end of the nineteenth-century. Later referred to as the 'Victorian Churching of Romanticism', Keble's heady mix of popular, emotional and approachable verse and high church ideals presaged his later involvement in the Tractarian Oxford Movement.







Originally intended for use by the Catholic Infanta Maria Anna of Spain after her proposed marriage to Prince Charles, the chapel was instead used by Queen Henrietta Maria, and later hosted Charles I's final communion on the morning of his execution.





Previous editions of this work, a collection of sacred anthems by Croft, Greene, Gibbons, Purcell, Tallis and others, were edited by **Anselm Bayly (1719-1794)**, who preceded Thomas Pearce as Sub-Dean of the Chapels Royal. The chapels were regularly supplied with newly-bound Bibles and devotional texts for the use of the Royal household; when new editions or newly-bound copies were introduced, older copies were distributed to the members of the Ecclesiastical Household as a perquisite of office. As such, whilst similar examples are to be found in collections indeed, a similar binding with comparable corner ornaments is found on the 1749 edition of Anthems for the Chapel Royal in the Henry Davis Collection (Foot, Henry Davis Catalogue, II, no. 167) - they are rarely preserved in such condition as here.






Gaius Plinius Caecilius Secundus, (c. 61-c. 113), administrator of part of the Roman Empire. Pliny the Younger, adopted by his uncle Pliny the Elder, studied philosophy and rhetoric under Nicetes Sacerdos and Quintilian, eventually rising to the political court, where he prosecuted provincial governors on charges of corruption and extortion. He achieved the ranks of both Praetor and Consul (in 100 AD). Friend of Tacitus, Martial and Suetonius, Pliny was likewise a published author with these 10 books of letters, issued between 100 and 109 - collectively they form almost the entirety of Pliny's surviving work and offer a valuable insight into the Roman world of the 1st Century. They deal with various issues, including one of the few accounts of the eruption of Vesuvius made by an eyewitness (for the Younger Pliny had accompanied his uncle and adoptive father) to the area in 79 AD, describing the event in detail in a letter to Tacitus (VI).



The binder, German-born Charles Hering (d. 1809), was called 'the artistic successor to Roger Payne, the doyen of English bookbinders'. His remarkably successful West End business was patronised by many leading collectors and catered to a wealthy clientele, including Lord Byron.





William St Clair (1937-2021), British scholar and senior civil servant, notable as the author of *The Godwins and the Shelleys, The Biography of a Family* (1989) and *The Reading Nation in the Romantic Period* (2004).

An exquisitely bound late nineteenth-century Continental edition of the Roman Missal.

The Roman Missal, with origins in the high Middle Ages, is the liturgical book from which the text and rubrics for the celebration of Catholic Mass, with both prayers and music. One of the major advances of the Council of Trent, the Catholic counter to the Protestant Reformation, was to standardise the Missal. Pope Pius V, acting on the concilliar deciion, formalised this in his Quo Primum on 14 July 1570 - insisting that the standard form of the Missal was used throughout the Church except where a local missal could be proved to be of two centuries antiquity. Perhaps one of the most controversial Counter-Reformation decisions made at Trent, the use of a standard Missal prevented the celebration of the Mass in vernacular languages and signified a further strengthening of Papal authority: particularly as all printed editions were prefaced by the Pope's order of standardisation. The Missal of Pius V was further edited by Clement VIII in 1604, and later by Urban VIII in 1634.



Robert Riviere (1808-1882) initially established himself at Bath as a bookseller in 1829, and subsequently turned to bookbinding. Around 1840 he moved to London, where he commenced business solely as a binder, attracting the patronage of a wealthy clientele, including royalty. The output of Riviere, like the majority of binders of this period, is lacking in innovation; contemporary tastes predominantly calling for the production of 'retrospective' bindings, frequently in a style not even remotely suitable for the books they contained.






However, in all other aspects - from the quality of the materials employed, to the delicacy of the tooling - the bindings of Riviere are richly deserving of admiration; particularly considering that he was apparently entirely self-taught. On his death Riviere bequeathed his business to Percival Calkin, the eldest son of his second daughter, who had been taken into partnership by his grandfather in 1881, when the style of the firm was altered to Riviere & Son. The company continued to operate until 1939. The goodwill and the tools were sold to Messrs Bayntun of Bath.

Provenance: John Taylor Coleridge (1790-1876), nephew of the Romantic poet, Samuel Taylor Coleridge, judge, and sometime editor of the *Quarterly Review*.



A handsome copy, likely bound for presentation, of the sixty-second annual report of The Royal Humane Society, a British charity dedicated to lifesaving intervention in cases of accidental and sudden death, such as drowning, strangling, apoplexy, and suffocation. Founded in 1774 as the Society for the Recovery of Persons Apparently Drowned, for the purpose of deploying first aid in situations of near drowning, the organisation gained the patronage of the Queen by 1886 and awarded money and medals to those who engaged in lifesaving and drowning prevention.





A choice copy, in a wildly elaborate binding, of one of the most significant works, and inventive parodies, of the Romantic era. The brothers Horace (1779-1849) and James Smith (1775-1839), within the conceit of Rejected addresses from a supposed poetry competition, successfully send up the major (and several minor) poets of the Romantic age, including Byron, Coleridge, and Wordsworth.



The first Parisian edition, strikingly bound, of the complete works of Robert Southey. Printing single-volume collected editions of the romantics in the late 1820s Paris, Galignani proudly advertised 'Splendid Editions. Cheapness and portability. 200 Volumes compressed into 15 Volumes Octavo, and at One Sixth of the London Prices; beautifully printed on super-fine hot-pressed paper'. In addition, otherwise suppressed poems frequently were collected against the wishes of their authors. In the case of Southey, the seditious 'Wat Tyler' appears here despite the legal action brought against William Hone on its appearance in 1817.



As to the rather elusive binders, Hering and Muller, Ramsden comments on the former:

'The initial "r", though not recorded in the Almanachs, is said to occur on individual bindings, or on bindings signed R, Hering and Müller...It would greatly help if one could trace an undoubted signature of "R" Hering.'

and of the latter:

'It is almost as difficult to follow this binder (or binders) as to trace the Herings...Muller seems to have worked with Hering between 1821-26 (and even again about 1834) and then possibly about 1826 joined Thouvenin, who states that it was only by about 1830 that he was able to build up a really competent team of binders.'

William St Clair (1937-2021), British scholar and senior civil servant, notable as the author of *The Godwins and the Shelleys, The Biography of a Family* (1989) and *The Reading Nation in the Romantic Period* (2004).





Tennyson's 'In Memoriam', is an elegy for his friend Arthur Henry Hallam, and reflects both on his personal experience of grief as well as the natural processes of life and the questions of materialism.

The binding, though attractive and rather competent, is not particularly well finished - the lettering in particular - suggesting that the unidentified binder was an amateur.

In 2017 Duke received a British Empire Medal for services to the craft.




