





Elizabeth Appleton (c. 1790-1849), married name Lachlan, educationalist and author. She became popular in the field of women's education after the 1815 publication of her 'Private Education, or, A Practical Plan for the Studies of Young Ladies.' She Appleton went on to found a school for young ladies, but lost much of her credibility following an evangelical conversion around 1830, after which she gained a reputation as a fanatic.



Flamsteed's most significant achievement was his star catalogue, 'Historia Coelestis Britannica', which recorded over 3,000 stars with remarkable accuracy. Though portions of his work were published prematurely and controversially by Isaac Newton and Edmond Halley in 1712 (without his full consent), Flamsteed eventually published his authorised version posthumously in 1725.



Joseph Fox, the prominent English dentist in 1803, invented a metallic filling material to be put into a cavity in a tooth in liquid form which when it cooled would solidify to the exact shape of the cavity. He referred to it as "Fusible Metal". However, it was Thomas Bell who conceived the idea of mixing coin silver filings with mercury to make an amalgam filling material that would be soft during insertion and harden very quickly.

First edition, early state of the first work published on Australian Aborigines. With the pre-publication watermark date of 1811 on some of the plates. This being the scarce separate issue of the plates, also found issued together with Orme's 1814 "Foreign Field Sports, Fisheries, Sporting Anecdotes."

"This book was the first to be published about Aboriginal life and customs. It is unknown whose work the plates are based on but it seems unlikely that Clark ever visited Australia. The plates and essay were also included in later works like Foreign Field Sports, Fisheries, Sporting Anecdotes." (State Library of New South Wales). Although it is now believed that John William Lewin is the most likely source both of plates and text, adapted by Clark.

"The plates here represent in vivid style and delicate detail various aspects of Aboriginal life in the bush. Some of the plates show hunting scenes such as kangaroo hunting, fishing, bird hunting, and smoking out possums. Other plates represent aspects of tribal life such as a corroboree, trial by spear, a war party, and a night scene in a camp. The plates are justly celebrated and are without question the most attractive and sympathetic of the early European depictions of the Aboriginal inhabitants." (Australian Book Auctions)







Provenance: Henry Beaufoy was a son of the astronomer and physicist Mark Beaufoy (1764-1827), a founder member of the Society for the Improvement of Naval Architecture. It was Henry who in 1834 was to publish his father's experimental research into the relationship between hull shapes and water resistance.

A relatively little-known contribution to military technology by William Congreve (1772-1828), best known now for his designs for military rockets, and also deeply involved in artillery innovation. This work reflects his attempts to improve the accuracy and effectiveness of traditional artillery through mechanical and optical improvements.

The Sheffield Female Anti-Slavery Society was a bold and organised group of women who used pamphleteering, boycotts, and public advocacy to press for immediate abolition. Their efforts not only influenced national policy but also laid groundwork for future humanitarian and feminist movements. By lectures and pamphlets, the society successfully boycotted to decrease sales of West Indian goods produced by slaves, such as coffee and sugar, and in 1827 it became the first anti-slavery society in Britain to call for the immediate emancipation of slaves. The volume, edited by two members of the Sheffield Anti-slavery Committee, contains an account of the formation of the society and general remarks on the slave trade in the West Indies. This is then followed by a series of short anti-slavery narratives and poems.
