

Strongly immersive group of images recording the activities of Rabbi Wentworth A. Matthew's Commandment Keepers, an African-American Jewish community in and around their synagogue at Mount Morris Park West. The photographs bear many stylistic similarities to those in Lawrence N. Shustak's rare portfolio Black Jews, but there are no

direct matches. 23 vintage silver gelatin prints, one a duplicate, most " 8×108 ", c.210 \times 270 mm or the reverse; all but one with the Europress agency stamp.

Albers developed an "experimental way of studying color and teaching color", inaugurated in his colour course at Black Mountain College. 



Peter Pan opened in America at the New National Theatre in Washington on 17 October 1905 with Adams in the title role, to a rapturous response. Over the following decade, Adams revived her role several times on Broadway. The recipient of this work is likely a member of the family of Broadway dramatist Clyde Fitch; Maude Adams was associated with some of his work. Original cloth, with dust jacket.






Blackwell's extensively annotated copy, offering unique insight into her engagement with this landmark socio-economic text during her most committed period of reform activity. This copy was presented to Blackwell and her adopted daughter Katharine "Kitty" Barry by their close friend and confidant Zoe Dana Underhill. This later edition (first 1879) is inscribed in her hand on the half-title, "Dr E. Blackwell. Rock House. Hastings". Blackwell's marginalia are heaviest in the chapters on the laws of interest, on wages, and on population. The correspondence between Zoe, Blackwell, and Barry is housed at the Library of Congress as part of the Blackwell family papers. Original blue cloth.



Later, Jeans would praise Bohr and recognize his major contributions to the field, and the two men corresponded and studied each


other's work. Just over a decade later Bohr was awarded the Nobel Prize. Original brown cloth.





Not one for half-hearted hobbies, Cassady was a fanatic chess player, battling his fellow Beats, while he and Carolyn shared many an evening "cozily relaxing" over a game.





Eden wrote to Churchill from Downing Street upon receiving the first volume to thank him, and noted: "It is tough going here, but we are surviving"; on receiving the third volume: "it is grand writing and proud reading"; on receiving the fourth: "I have already dipped, out of order, into the American Civil War, superbly told"; no thank-you message is recorded for the second volume, but as it was inscribed in the midst of the Suez Crisis, this is not surprising. 4 vols. 
A UNIQUE AND APPARENTLY UNPUBLISHED EXAMPLE OF COLLINS'S WORKING METHOD

The author's own copy of this exceedingly rare and privately printed work, extensively annotated and revised by him in ink and pencil, offering an extraordinary glimpse into Collins's perceptions of his most celebrated and enduring work. In an effort to capitalize on the popularity of the novel, Collins adapted it for the stage in 1877, resulting in the present work. He routinely participated in dramatic performances, and had a keen understanding of the process from drafting to acting. It was performed at the Royal Olympic Theatre 17 Sept.—17 Nov. 1877.

AN EXTRAORDINARY ARTEFACT OF JAPANESE BUDDHISM'S FORMATIVE PERIOD

A scarce and outstandingly preserved volume, with a pleasing provenance, from an early Japanese manuscript of one of the core texts of Mahayana Buddhism. Ritualized copying of sutras was key to both Buddhist devotional practice and the religion's spread across East Asia. This example was brushed by a skilled scribe midway through the Nara period (710–784) in a style evoking sixth-century Chinese calligraphic traditions. 

KOREAN WOODBLOCK PRINTING OF THE 11TH CENTURY

An exceptionally rare and well-preserved 11th-century testament to the vital role of print in spreading Buddhist thought throughout East Asia. This fascicle, from a major Chinese-language critical edition of the Flower Garland Sutra (Huayan Buddhism's foundational text), was printed in Korea from blocks engraved in Hangzhou, China. Collections of different fascicles are found institutionally in East Asia; this is the only example traced in commerce in the West. Slim quarto, concertina-style. 24 woodblock-printed sheets, bound within early, perhaps contemporary, indigo-dyed paper covers.





A superbly provenanced copy in an unrestored period binding of the very rare first edition of Erasmus's Complaint of Peace, a founding text of pacifism; from the library of the Swiss humanist Peter Tschudi, a figure active in Reformation intellectual circles. Tschudi was studying in Basle in 1517 when the book was published. Quarto, in four parts, the first three with separate title pages. Contemporary blind-stamped calf over paste paper boards, a remarkable example with traces of tawed ties on all board edges.





Original manuscript first draft for the screen adaptation of You Only Live Twice, released in 1967 starring Sean Connery, with Dahl's signature boldly

HERALDING "A NEW DAY FOR INTERRACIAL WOMEN'S ABOLITION'

Exceedingly scarce first edition of one of only two addresses published in the wake of the Anti-Slavery Convention of American Women's inaugural meeting. The 1837 session was a historic milestone, being both "the first public political meeting of US women" and "the first interracial gathering of any consequence" (Sterling, p. 3). We cannot trace any copies of the Appeal in institutions outside of the US, where WorldCat traces around 25 copies, and no other first editions have surfaced at auction; Rare Book Hub traces just two other appearances of this title, in both cases the second edition (Boston: Isaac Knapp, 1838). 
THE FIRST BOOK DEDICATED TO SURFING

First and only edition of this important handmade booklet, a noted rarity with fewer than ten copies



known. This is the first known book dedicated entirely to surfing and inspired the genre of surf photography. The photos include two of Gurrey's most famous images of Duke Kahanamoku, his close friend and favourite subject. The first, showing Duke surfing with his arms outstretched, facing directly towards the viewer is arguably the best-known image of the renowned surfer. The second, showing Diamond Head in the background has been credited





for the boom in early Hawaiian tourism. The Gurrey gallery closed in 1923, having been damaged by both fire and flood, in which it is believed that all the original negatives for Alfred's photographs were lost, making examples of his photography uncommon. These photos of Hawaiian landscapes include two images of an outrigger, possibly the Gurrey family's own canoe "Kamaaina", donated to the Outrigger Canoe Club in 1908. Small quarto. A single paper leaf from the Gutenberg bible, the first complete book printed with moveable type in Europe. This "Noble Fragment" originates from an imperfect copy of the Gutenberg Bible, which was divided by Gabriel Wells, the New York book dealer, and dispersed as single leaves or larger fragments, inserted into a morocco portfolio by leading American bookbinders Stikeman and Co. This leaf contains part of the First Letter of John, on the love of God's children for another.

GIVING THE PULP FICTION TALES AN UNEXPECTED PATINA OF THE HAUTE MONDE

In this fine example of Raymond's art, Secret Agent X-9 is on the case of a missing girl, the final panel including a get-away in an autogyro. 4-panel cartoon strip, pen and ink with blue pencil shading over graphite on Bristol board.

First edition, with exceptional provenance, of this landmark geopolitical analysis, one of only 38 copies completed before it was suppressed and the author imprisoned. Completed 60 years before Commodore Perry's arrival, it first suggested that Japan could not remain isolated and needed an outward-facing military policy and modernized weaponry. Today, eight copies survive institutionally; this is the only copy traced at auction. 16 parts in 3 vols. Original brown paper wrappers. An attractive copy.

Endymion was the second of only three lifetime publications by Keats, comprising his longest single sustained poem, famous for its opening line: "A thing of beauty is a joy for ever". This copy is from the library of noted American collector and bibliophile Natalie Knowlton Blair, with her book label. With a pencil portrait of Keats inserted.

INSCRIBED TO A PROMINENT LAWYER, FAMILY FRIEND, AND FUTURE JUDGE

First edition, presentation copy, inscribed by Kennedy on the front free endpaper: "To Walter Cummings Jr. With very best wishes John Kennedy".

Cummings was appointed solicitor general of the United States by President Harry Truman in 1952, at age 36 the youngest ever. In July 1966 President Johnson nominated Cummings to the United States Court of Appeals for the Seventh Circuit. He later served as chief judge of the same and as a member of the Judicial Conference of the United States. Original black cloth, spine lettered in red, with dust jacket.




First edition, presentation issue of 85 copies only, inscribed by Jacqueline Kennedy to David and Sylvia Ormsby Gore, close friends of the Kennedys. Following a tradition established by F. D. Roosevelt, the Kennedys planned to distribute this deluxe volume to their inner circle to commemorate the holiday season in 1963. Kennedy had no time to sign them before his assassination, but Jacqueline persevered with the project, inscribing the copies herself.

Ormsby Gore had known John F. Kennedy since Kennedy's pre-war years in London and was made British Ambassador to the United States in May 1061. Two passages of Kennedy's inaugural address are highlighted in pencil to the margins by him. Additionally laid in is Jackie Kennedy's card in a hand addressed envelope. First edition, inscribed by all four creators of the show that redefined Broadway: choreographer Jerome Robbins, composer Leonard Bernstein, playwright Arthur Laurents, and lyricist Stephen Sondheim.

Clive Hirschhorn, theatre and film critic for the Sunday Express newspaper, bought the book in 1958 in his home town of Johannesburg and painstakingly sought contributions from the four creators with Robbins adding his inscription in the year of his death.
