

Madden had already discovered in the Bodleian Library and edited for the Roxburghe Club a unique early 14th century manuscript of Havelock the Dane; now he announced an even greater find among the Museum's manuscripts; a romance till now entirely unknown, to which he gave the title Gawain and the Green Knight. Scott was "too great a master of every thing related to the early poetry of Scotland" Madden wrote, to need any proof of the value of such a discovery. Would the Bannatyne Club like to publish the poem with engravings of the four curious illuminations that illustrated the manuscript? Scott shared Madden's enthusiasm but was obliged to tell him that the Club's treasury was too straitened to undertake the publication. He and other members, however, would be glad, he knew, to subscribe individually to its appearance. "You may rely on my losing no time in getting as strong a subscription as the circumstances will admit..." (Johnson, Sir Walter Scott, The Great Unknown 11. 1121). By 1836, however, the Bannatyne Club had resolved upon its full support for Sir Gawayne, which proved to be a far greater work than that first envisaged.] [Terry 61]

The Duke cordially agreed; he desired his donation to be in proportion to his fortune. The work, Scott observed happily, "would be a great credit to the




