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

ORNATELY PRESENTED CANON LAW INCUNABLE

1. Baysio, Guido de [ed. **Petrus Albinianus** Trecius, with additions by **Paulus Pisanus**]: *Rosarium decretorum*. Venice: Reynaldus de Novimagio, 12 December 1480.

This scarce incunable edition of Guido de Baysio's commentary on Gratian's *Decretum* — one of just 22 located copies worldwide — is impressive to behold. The huge codex is finely rubricated in two colours and survives in a blind-tooled binding associated with Metten Abbey in Bavaria. It is fitting that it found a place in the notable collection of Albert Ehrman (1890–1969). Founder of the Broxbourne Library, Ehrman's primary interests lay in the history of binding and early printing.

The *Decretum* compiled by Gratian of Bologna (d. c. 1145) was the core canon law text in the medieval period and beyond, ultimately becoming 'a model for all Western law, religious as well as secular' (Winroth). The present commentary on the text was the chief work of Guido de Baysio (d.1313), often known as 'Archidiaconus' in reference to his position of Archdeacon of the Church of Bologna. Baysio's commentary 'definitively updated' the *Decretum* by offering an important supplement to the Ordinary Gloss (Firey).

Our edition, the third overall and the first to be edited by Italian jurist Petrus Albinianus Trecius, introduced a new dedicatory letter that effectively became part of the textual tradition. The printer, Reynaldus de Novimagio (active 1477-1496), was originally from Northern Europe. Our copy has early annotations and underlinings, including to passages on the Immaculate Conception of the Virgin Mary, and on menstrual blood as a perceived source of contamination.



Description

One volume, folio, 41 x 29.5 cms (in binding), ff. 415 [lacks final blank]. Accurate foliation in pencil on every hundredth folio. Text mostly in two columns. Decoration: Approx. 20 large decorative initials in red and blue (typically c.8 lines in height). Smaller rubricated initials in red or blue throughout. A mixture of printed and handwritten guide letters often visible. Running titles on rectos in red (sometimes shaved). Bound in late sixteenth- or early seventeenth-century alumtawed pigskin over wooden boards. Both covers tooled in blind, the upper cover with the coat of arms of St Michael's Abbey, Metten. Replacement fastenings. Red edges.

Condition (binding): Overall well preserved, with some worming to both covers (mostly infilled), crack to upper joint at base of spine, a few scratches to lower cover. Condition (textblock): Headlines and marginalia sometimes shaved. Worming at start and end of textblock (often in blank areas,





but at most affecting about a dozen letters per page). Light browning and foxing, occasional small tears and losses to blank outer margins.

Provenance: Inscription (sig. a2r) and binding stamps connected with the library of St Michael's Abbey, Metten (OSB), which was dispersed in the early nineteenth century during secularisation. Formerly owned by Albert Ehrman (1890–1969), founder of the Broxbourne Library.


REFLECTING ON FARMERS' LIVES

2. Rolewinck, Werner: [a2r:] Incipit libellus de regimine rusticorum ... [Cologne, Bartholomaeus de Unkel, not before 1481].

Early edition - usually described as the third - of this unusual and fascinating book of moral advice for farmers. It follows the model of the medieval "mirror" genre of writing for kings, princes, and others, but is **the only book properly of this type written for agricultural workers** (Henn).

The prolific author (1425-1502) was a farmer's son, a famous chronicler, and a Carthusian monk of Cologne - which is also where our book was printed. This is the only known edition by Bartholomaeus de Unkel (active 1475 to mid-1480s). Unkel has a relatively small known output (35 entries in ISTC) and occasionally collaborated with other Cologne printers. Incunable editions of De regimine rusticorum are rare, with ISTC showing copies of any of the five pre-1501 editions at just six US libraries. Rolewinck (Rolevinck) explains to the farmer straightforward rules for a good life. They must fear God; live in simplicity and good will; respect the agricultural profession; obey superiors; love the clergy; pay dues; observe church rites; give to the poor; keep peace with neighbours; govern their families well; watch against evil; keep people's respect; confess sins; meditate on God's laws; reflect on death and the brevity of life and pray to God for direction towards eternal joys.


Importantly, farmers have high status: "the rustic dignity [...] is instituted by God [...] above other mechanical arts" (sig. b2 verso). They grow the materials for the Holy Communion: "[God] set it that they make his blessed body and precious blood" (b3 recto). This text addressing rural workers' lives and standing is especially notable in light of major rural unrest in




the German regions, for example the Bundschuh movement (1493-1517) and the German Peasants' War (1524-1526).

Description

One volume, 20.4 cms. x 14.6 cms. in binding, quarto, 69 (of 70) fols., signed a-h⁸ i⁶, lacking blank a1. Sig. i6, blank, present. 27 lines per page. Capital spaces, the first with printed guide letter. Most spaces with added red lombard initial (a few with lombard initial faded away). The first capital space, and others, were left blank. Printed initials slashed in yellow throughout. 19 short manuscript early marginal glosses (faded), reader's marks from same time. Binding of green goatskin, covers filleted in gilt, spine with five raised bands, compartments with lozenges ruled with dots with flower stamp at centre of each and crescent





to corners, second and third compartments with gilt lettering. Gilt filleting to sides and decorative rule to dentelles, marbled pastedown and endpapers, green silk ribbon, all edges gilt (binding slightly rubbed and worn but good). Light or medium browning, foxing, spotting and staining - including inky finger prints possibly from time of printing (sig. e1 verso). Margins neatly ruled in pink-purple ink, perhaps at time of binding (c.1780-1820).






3. Aristoteles: *Libri artis logice Porphyrii et Aristotelis cu[m] explanatio[n]e magistri Johan[n]is de Lapide* [Basel, Johann Amerbach, [not after 1495]).

An attractive and interesting copy - with a contemporary binding from an identified workshop in Basel and a later (16th-century) Swiss ownership inscription - of a rare landmark in the history of editions of Aristotle, the first printing of the Aristotelian logical corpus (*Organon*) with new commentary, by the humanist, philosophy professor, and printing entrepreneur Johann Heynlin von Steyn (Johannes de Lapide, 1425-1496).

With Aristotle, the publication has the famous medieval textbooks the *Isagoge* of Porphyry (d.305), and the *Liber*







sex principiorum attributed to Gilbert de la Porrée (c.1085-1154). Porphyry and Aristotle are in Latin translations from Greek by Boethius (d.524) and James of Venice (d.1147). Lapide adds two of his own works at end. Thirteen pages have woodcut diagrams. A sometime rector of the Sorbonne, Lapide is characterised as a philosopher as an adherent to the realist via antiqua school of St. Thomas Aquinas (as against the nominalist via moderna school of William of Ockham).

Part of the *oeuvre* of the printer Johann Amerbach (1440/45-1513), who placed Basel on the European map as a centre of original scholarly publishing (later to be succeeded by Johann Froben, who acquired his business). One of Amerbach's great collaborators was Heynlin, who had taught him in Paris and was at this time resident in the Charterhouse of Basel. Heynlin had in 1470 helped establish the first academic humanist printing press in France (which was also coincidentally the first printing press in Paris), and had the highest regard for Amerbach's attention to detail, stating this in a letter of 1492. At sig. V8 recto, a colophon stands out in our book for its setting in humanist roman type and as a statement of the printer's relationship and values: "thus happily finishes the Porphyrian and Aristotelian logic with the explanation of master Johannes de Lapide, in the most accurate impression, in Basel, by master Johann Amerbach, sometime Lapide's pupil".

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Our copy has been neatly annotated by different early readers and provided by them with pink underlinings and some additions of colour to diagrams. It has been sparsely rubricated by a professional - there is a fine nine-line strapwork initial in red ink at the beginning (sig. a2 recto), and the same worker may have struck through, in red, small printed capitals and paragraph marks on the same page. Possibly (although not certainly) by the same worker (rather than readers) is a seven-line red initial at sig. a5 recto and a 3-line initial at sig. b4 recto. The rubricator otherwise leaves initials blank. A window into book preparation practices in Basel.


The copy also has a hitherto unrecorded printing variation: at sig. t1 recto the gathering signature 't' is provided in manuscript where it is printed in the two other copies we have inspected, Bayerische Staatsbibliothek shelfmark Res/2 A.gr.b. 95 and British Library shelfmark IB.37523. This indicates, at the least, that that gathering of our book was printed at an early time in the edition's printing history.

Binding

Bound in contemporary blind-stamped and blind-ruled pigskin over wooden boards, partly bevelled at sides, covers with outer frame and central trellis design, spine with four raised





double bands. Binding decorated with tools identifiable as from the 'Punktquadrat' bindery of Basel (active 1481-1500) (EBDB workshop w000026; Christ monogram s001512, shrub stamp s001513, rosette stamp s001514). One clasp of two intact. Contemporary dual-colour end bands. Titled horizontally to bottom edge "Explanatio organi Johann. de Lapide", similar labelling also to top edge and top of fore edge. Titled vertically to bottom edge (close to and parallel with spine) "Logica Aristo.lis cu[m] com[men]t[ari]o Jo. de Lapide". (Binding slightly rubbed, worn and stained, slightly wormed, a small puncture in lower cover).

- Marginalia to c.119 pages, in different early hands; underlinings in black and pink ink; occasional decorations by owners including in red to diagram at sig. b4 verso; also likely by them rather than professionals, colouring in reddish-pink (repeating the colour found in underlining) and gold-brown to large diagram at sig. q8 verso.
- 16th-cent. inscription, "Ex libris Gu'berti à Salicib. nec

nô amicorum", to title-page. This is likely to be a Swiss nobleman, Gubert von Salis. Gubert was a name used by several generations of the von Salis family, who also periodically used the Latinised form "a Salicibus". One contender for our copy's owner would be Gubert von Salis (1511-c.1591). See Paul Herrmann, *Namensliste der Familie von Salis* (Chur, 1999), cited and linked to by S.J. 
LEGENDS IN THE MAKING

4. Jacobus de Voragine: Lombardica historia que a plerisque aurea legenda sanctorum appellatur. [Strasbourg: Georg Husner], 1502.

This post-incunable copy of the highly influential *Legenda Aurea* took a fascinating journey across central Europe in the sixteenth century, shedding light on the early Strasbourg/ Nuremberg book trade.

The hagiographies compiled by Jacobus de Voragine (d. 1198) in his *Legenda Aurea* were practically a cornerstone of medieval culture, their stories profoundly shaping depictions of saints in literature, paintings, stained glass, and manuscript illuminations. Our edition was printed in Strasbourg by Georg Husner in 1502. Soon after, this copy apparently travelled to Nuremberg in an unbound or semi-bound state and was possibly bound by the 'Madonna, Nuremberg' workshop (active until 1503). Our binder seemingly had access to waste material from a local printer; the rear pastedown derives from a work on the gospels printed by Friedrich Creussner in 1478. Creussner would ultimately be outcompeted by Anton Koberger, best remembered for printing the Nuremberg Chronicle.

At an early stage, hagiographic material relating to St Wolfgang of Regensburg was added by hand to blank parts of our book, notably engulfing the title. Perhaps he was a saint of local significance to the user. An inscription also connects the book to Christopher Collatinus, alias of Christoph Puhler (approx. 1500-1583). Born in Siklos, Hungary, this astronomer studied in Vienna under Peter Apian (d. 1552), a pioneering mathematician famous for his *Astronomicum Caesareum*.




Description:

29 x 21 cms in binding, folio, ff. 258. All blanks present. Variant with point after 'appellatur' on title page. Text in two columns, undecorated. Occasional foliation in pencil. Sixteenth-century manuscript addition of hagiographic material relating to Saint Wolfgang (Bishop of Regensburg, d. 994) on the title page (sig. 1-1r) and four of the five original blanks (sigs. 1-1v, 2-6r, N8r, and N8v).

Bound in contemporary calf over wooden boards, with blind-tooled decoration almost certainly completed in Nuremberg, possibly by the 'Madonna, Nuremberg' workshop (active around 1473–1503). Fragment from an incunable used as the rear pastedown. [Johannes de Turrecremata]: Quaestiones Evangeliorum de tempore et de sanctis. [Nuremberg: Friedrich Creussner, 1478], fol. 129r.





Provenance: Christopher Pühler (approx. 1500–1583), mathematician and pupil of Peter Apian (inscription sig. N7v).

Condition (textblock): Light browning, occasional staining, short wormtrail to outer margin (entirely blank) of some 23 leaves, single worm holes mainly towards beginning and end affecting the odd single letter. Else, neat repair to tear in sigs. D6 and D7, affecting two letters on each verso, small burn on sig. p2 obscuring a two-letter word on the recto, but overall in good condition.

Condition (binding): loss to head of spine, tears and loosening to tailcap, extensive historic worming to boards (and consequent dust); clasps missing, although the lower anchor plate and part of the upper anchor plate remain; rubbing and wear, gold fading. Some damage to pastedowns and front free endpaper, including to the incunable fragment used as pastedown at end.



NEW EDITIONS

5. Joachim, Abbot, of Fiore (pseudo-) [Meuccio, Silvestro]: Hec subieta in hoc continentur libello. Expositio magni prophete loachim: in librum beati Cirilli de magnis tribulationibus & statu Sancte matris Ecclesie [...] [Venetiis per Bernardinum Benalium] [after 4 April 1516]. [Bound with:] [Id:] Interpretatio preclara Abbatis Joachim in Hieremiam Prophetam. [Impressum Venetiis, per Bernardinum Benalium, 1525, die 20 Novembris].

Second editions of these prophetic books including works falsely attributed to Joachim of Fiore (1135-1202), both publications have illustrations not included in the first editions (Venice, Lazzaro de' Soardis, 1516) - and point to the rich textual and visual history of the Italian prophetic books genre. In the first, a collection of works in fact ascribed to different authors besides Joachim, a programme of 75 woodcut textual illustrations of varying sizes (Sander; similar, to and using woodcuts from, a programme of 73 illustrations found in the first edition) is supplemented by a splendid full-page woodcut with textual labels, of a seven-headed dragon (Leviathan from the Book of Job). It had appeared in an another spurious work by "Joachim" on Isaiah (Venice, Lazzaro de' Soardis, 1517). Common to both editions, besides the textual illustrations, are woodcut initials, and a woodcut figure to the title-page of a scholar sitting at his desk.

Our second work is a prophetic commentary on the book of the prophet Jeremiah. In our edition, the representation of Leviathan, that we see in the previous book, reappears (now with side-notes also identifying it with the seven-headed beast of Revelation). It was not printed in the prior edition. It is supplemented on **five more pages** by further **schematic woodcut illustrations** - comprising text and diagram (in one case incorporating the **serpent from Genesis**). None



of these, again, were printed in the first edition - although they had also appeared at the beginning of the 1517 pseudo-Joachim on Isaiah that we have mentioned. Appearing twice in our edition is a pictorial woodcut border showing the Passion, with, in the first case (title-page), the arms and initials of the dedicatee, Paolo Angelo, and in the second, the arms and initials of the editor, Silvestro Meuccio. The first edition of this second work had in fact only been illustrated on its title-page, with the woodcut of the scholar at study which we have on the title-page of our first book.

Our printer, Bernardino Benali, may actually have printed the first edition of the first book (Rhodes) - although it doesn't carry his name. In any case, there is a continuous development between the two editions, which is seen also in the text. Our edition of the first book now has (sig. A4rb) a new letter, from the dedicatee, Anselmus Bochturnius of Vicenza, to the editor, Meuccio. It also has, besides the new diagram, a new three-page table, and life and bibliography of Joachim taken from Johannes Trithemius. The second book has, besides the illustrations, a new twenty-six page table, as well as errata, and, replacing a letter to the reader from the deceased old publisher, the new dedicatory letter (13 June 1525) from the editor.

Collation of second: A⁸ a¹² b-c⁴ d⁸ e-f⁴ g⁸ h⁴ i⁸ k-l⁴ m⁶ n⁴. Roman letter, two columns, printed side notes, woodcut illustrations as discussed above. Light or medium browning, some spotting, foxing and staining, small hole to first title-page (legibility unaffected), slight damage to outer margin of final prelim. in second work, including a hole touching a printed sidenote (no actual loss of text), headlines



shaved. Bound in 18th-cent. calf, spine and sides decorated in gilt, label of red gilt-stamped goatskin, pink patterned pastedowns and endpapers. All edges blue. (Binding rubbed, slight wear to corners, wormholes to spine). Old stamp possibly incorporating a chalice to first title-page. 20th-cent. pencil inscription to front free endpaper, E.A. Berger Levrault, pencilled shelf mark (60B) probably of the same. **Early reader's marks and underlinings, the odd early annotation.**



Copy from an important Bohemian library of the editio princeps of the 1st-cent. CE historian Flavius Josephus (Yosef ben Matityahu). This copy has the large and distinctive bookplate, by Lucas Kilian (1579-1637), of the Bohemian bibliophile, industrialist, courtier, public administrator and Lutheran, Ferdinand Hoffman, Freiherr von Grünbühel (1540-1607). It was purchased by him in a French binding, identified by the style of the titling to spine, and the blind ruling to the spine panels. The wreath to the covers is similar to that on a binding from the workshop of Paris bookseller and royal binder Georges Drobet (d.1596). This binding is not the usual for a book from Hoffman's library.

Description

Editio princeps. One volume, 33.3 cms. x 23 cms. in binding, folio, pp. [12], 967 [1]. Title in red and black with red Froben caduceus device. Woodcut inhabited initial at beginning of preface, woodcut headpieces. Roman and (almost entirely) Greek text. Light browning and foxing, the final leaf repaired and with a small hole (1.9 cms. x 1 cms.) in the text. Bound in dark brown calf, filletted in gilt, with central gilt wreath device, 7.5 cms. x 5.4 cms., to covers. Spine with six raised bands. Gilt fleuron to six compartments, one compartment has stamped in gilt OPA IOSEPHI GRECE in a gilt cartouche



with bracketed sides (the 'p' in 'opa' ligatured). cracking to top joint of binding, careful repairs, mainly to bottom joint.



Annotated copy of a new pocket-format edition of the standard Latin translation of Galen's work on fevers. The handy practical volume incorporates printed side-notes (gloss) including some words in Greek, besides a thirteen-page index at end. We first have record of a sextodecimo of the text only in Lyon, 1547.

The present copy, which went to Italy, and it appears belonged to a Lorenzo Nuzzi of Perugia, has notes to front pastedown and front endpaper including a definition of the bregma (a point on the skull). At end is what appears to be a **clothes-list**, which includes three handkerchiefs, a hat, a pair of shoes, and two shirts. It appears that - as intended by the format - the owner kept the book close. They then used its blank space for whatever needs were at hand.





SPANISH REFORMER IN TRANSLATION

Copy in contemporary pigskin binding of the only German edition of Juan Bernal Diaz de Luco's highly popular and reform-oriented guide for parish priests. The ex dono note in this copy—and the circumstances behind the translation more broadly—shed interesting light on the diffusion of the Spanish reformer's ideas among the clergy in late sixteenth-century Passau.

Diaz de Luco (1495-1556), the illegitimate son of a clergyman, was vicar-general of the diocese of Salamanca and bishop of Calahorra. He fought for reform at the Council of Trent and encouraged missionary work in Spain's American colonies. Diaz de Luco's text was originally published in Spanish as *Aviso de Curas*, with the known editions comprising 'one prior to 1536, then 1539, 1543, 1545, 1547, 1550, and 1551, four of which were printed in Alcalá de Henares, where the new university was favourable to church reform.' (Colahan and Masferrer 2007, p. 12, n. 24).

This German translation, produced by Hector Wegman (d. 1589), Auxiliary Bishop of Passau, introduces a 36-page dedication to Urban Trennbach, Bishop of Passau (d.1598). The text includes chapters 34-36, which first appeared in the final Spanish edition of 1551 and respectively cover responsibilities to parishioners in purgatory, responsibilities to foreigners in the parish, and the importance of not spreading false doctrine. A censor's note at the end explains



the translation history, additionally mentioning an Italian version that we have not traced.

An interesting and attractively presented ex dono note on the rear pastedown indicates that our copy was given on the 28th of August 1597 to Joannes Radter, a newly-appointed priest in Aurolzmünster (in present-day Austria). The book was a gift from Stephanus Waedhover, his adoptive father and the *vicarius chori* of Passau Cathedral (about 20 miles north of Aurolzmünster).



Annotated copy of the first edition of the 6th-cent. BCE Greek poet Pindar by the Heidelberg professor Aemilius Portus (1550-1614). It is followed by a reprint of the popular edition of the Greek Lyric Poets by Henri Estienne (d.1598), which comes complete with author biographies. The most famous author in this latter collection is the 6th/7th-cent. BCE woman poet Sappho. Our copy is interesting for its evidence of how Pindar was studied, as shown in the sometimes dense added manuscript notes, in Greek and Latin, sometimes with crossing lines connecting note to text. The editor Portus was born in Ferrara to a Cretan Protestant, the scholar Franciscus Portus (1511-1581) - whose own commentaries on Pindar he had seen to press in 1583.

One of just two located copies, the only edition of this Italian pamphlet concerning the visit of King Philip IV of Spain to Seville in early 1624.

Celebrations for the king's visit included fireworks (sig. A4r) and a 'mascarata' (apparently a kind of masque or masquerade) involving twenty 'quadriglie' (quadrilles), each made up of ten people (sig A2r). The Palazzo Real was also decorated especially for the occasion (sig. A3r). Attending dignitaries are listed. No other works by the author, Luca Garcia Pizagno, have been located.






THE FATE OF THE BIBLIOTHECA PALATINA

Copy in contemporary binding of the first Cologne edition of a notable commentary on the Edict of Restitution (1629), a controversial proclamation issued during the counter Reformation. This study offers an interesting insight into one of the most significant episodes of book plundering in history. Proclaimed by Holy Roman Emperor Ferdinand II, the Edict of Restitution 'sought to enforce a strict interpretation of [...] the Peace of Augsburg of 1555, returning to Catholic possession a large number of monasteries, convents, and other institutions that had been secularised by Protestant states between 1552 and the outbreak of the Thirty Years' War' (Forster, p. 205). The edict was ultimately revoked by the Peace of Prague (1635).

This commentary on the edict was written by Carlo Carafa (1584-1644), bishop of Aversa and Apostolic Nuncio to Emperor. The earliest editions were printed in Aversa (1630, 1631) and Vienna (1630). Of book historical interest, Carafa



describes General Tilly's seizure of the Heidelberg Library in 1622 (p. 150), a large collection given to Pope Gregory XV as a symbolic gesture. In terms of the rarity of its manuscripts, the Palatinate Library of Heidelberg surpassed all other contemporary libraries in Germany and perhaps in Europe (raritate manuscriptorum omnibus aliis in Germania, & forsan in Europa bibliothecis anticellebat). Most of it is presently in the Vatican Library.



Copiously-illustrated emblem book for the ceremonial visit to the university of Naples by the viceroy, Iñigo Vélez de Guevara y Tassis, conde de Oñate (1597-1658), for the beginning of the school year. Things depicted include sea creatures, gem stones, a cicada on a guitar, a flagon of mercury, a clock, a ship, the sky, a globe, an elephant and a unicorn. At end are figures representing rhetoric, dialectic, physics, metaphysics, mathematics, medicine, jurisprudence, canon law and theology. The engraver, Nicolas Perrey (1596-1661) was of French origin.

The copy, which has an early binding, carries an ownership note dated 1686 of one Leonardus de Wilde, who may be the same as the student from Ghent who matriculated at Leuven university in 1663. An attestation perhaps of the international dimension and appeal of university emblem culture, which translated from print to copies in students' lecture notes.

Besides the frontispiece, the book has 63 further intaglio illustrations, of which 54 are emblems, and nine are full-page illustrations. All 63 of these illustrations have been bound so that a page of explanatory text (in other copies bound to the image's left as second page in a bifolium, following a blank first, with the image being the third page and the fourth being blank) instead follows the image as the fourth page of the bifolium, with the image beginning the gathering and with the two intermediates being blank. (As the illustration pages carry the signature, the binding error is an understandable one!) Light or medium browning, occasional slight soiling and staining, one word ("ingenti") scratched out in text to Emblem XI, the illustrations that follow the frontispiece numbered sequentially at an old date in manuscript. Bound with final endpaper but without front free endpaper (removed?), in an

HOLY ROMAN EMPEROR LOUIS IV

One of several undated editions with identical pagination of this work on Holy Roman Emperor Louis IV (d. 1347; known as 'the Bavarian'), it is purportedly after a 1636 Ingolstadt imprint, which is unlocated. No located editions can in fact be dated prior to ours. The text is attributed here to the historian and poet Nikolas Burgund or Nicolas de Bourgogne (1586-1649), who practised law in Ghent and was later appointed professor at the University of Ingolstadt. There is some suggestion, however, that the author is in fact the Jesuit Andreas Brunner (1589-1650), who studied at Ingolstadt and whose materials were used by Bourgogne (see *ADB*).



Probably one in a series of prints of the Apostles (as indicated by the Roman numeral), this striking and simple Early Modern woodcut portrait is an untraced image of Saint James the Less. Its good size and clear features suggest it was produced for hanging on a wall. The saint carries his attribute of a fuller's club, which by Christian tradition he was beaten to death with while preaching the Gospel in Lower Egypt.



Franciscan scholar's verse-by-verse literal commentary on the Biblical Book of Job, almost unknown outside mainland Europe. Henricus Jonghen (d. 1669) was reader in theology for the Franciscan province of Lower Germany (which encompassed the present-day Low Countries). He dedicates the commentary to Hermann Lisens, Franciscan provincial. The copy was early at (and perhaps bound for) the library of Buxheim Charterhouse in Bavaria. This was a high-status European institution, a free monastery of the Holy Roman Empire



First edition of this student textbook for Aristotelian physics, cosmology, elementalism, and psychology and ontology, for the Protestant Academy of Montauban, which had moved (1659) to Puylaurens (both towns of southern France). This academy closed in 1685.

Jean Bon (d.1682), professor of philosophy (1658-1682), had studied philosophy in Nîmes and medicine in Montpellier. He was a public and vociferous opponent of the philosopher and correspondent of Galileo and Descartes, David Dérodon (c.1600-1664) (Haag). It is interesting that our copy of this book of Protestant learning was accessioned by a Dominican convent.






FRONTISPIECE AFTER VESALIUS - CONFRATERNITY AUTHOR AND COPY

First edition - of which only three hundred copies were printed, on behalf of the editor, Münster physician Bernhard Rottendorff (1594-1671) - this book of considerations on death is illustrated with an intaglio frontispiece of a skeleton, after an image in the famous *De humani corporis fabrica* (1543), the key anatomical work by Andreas Vesalius. The copy's owner and inscriber - who may well have been gifted it - is likely to be Johann Gassel, sometime rector of Münster's house for the historic confraternity the Brethren of the Common Life. This institution was known as Fraterhaus Springborn, which would give sense to the rest of his inscription ("Ptus F: S:" = Praepositus (Rector) of Fraterhaus Springborn). The late author (d.1655) - sometime teacher of the editor - had been rector of the same place.

This book of broad learning includes biblical and patristic, and classical and ancient scientific quotations and citations, the last including Pliny, Galen, and Aristotle. On pp. 179-182 the author discusses named women saints, while on 226-228, named virtuous women of ancient Rome. On p.171 he refers to Christian martyrs of Japan, and on p. 207, to English king Henry VIII's break with Rome. At the end of the book is a 7-page poem by the editor, on the death of the author, and a one-page epitaph for the same, which is printed in capitals.





First edition of this book of advice on being a perfect favourite (valido) to a king. The Spanish king in question, Carlos II (1661-1700) was seven or eight at time of publication! This royal juvenile's oval portrait faces the first page of text. The author was majordomo to the regent, the queen mother Mariana de Austria.





Despite the king's young age, the favourite's role was emphatically not to teach him, but something more subtle. The author notes (sig. P2 r-v): "kings are born learned: with the blood they inherit all the doctrine they need for the government of their monarchy".





OLD PRETENDER VERY YOUNG

*21. [James Francis Edward Stuart] Der junge printz von Wallis [...]. [Germany] [1688-90].

Foreign-printed propagandist portrait of James Francis Edward Stuart ('The Old Pretender') - the only son of James II - as an infant. It appears to be a free reworking of a print of the infant made by Bernard II Lens (1659-1725) (see Royal Collection RCIN 603478). The baby wears plumes of the Prince of Wales; a vase with roses and thistles placed to left of the cradle carries further legitimising symbolism. The legitimacy of the royal child is proclaimed in the German text below.

The smartly dressed lady sitting to right is the infant's mother, Mary of Modena (cf. Royal Collection cataloguing of the Lens print). A story was circulating at the time that the prince was illegitimate and had been smuggled in in a warming pan (see the probably Amsterdam-printed pamphlet Consultation de l'oracle par les puissances de la terre, pour savoir si le Prince des Galles Dieu-donné, est supposé ou legitime). To show the child with his mother, Mary of Modena, would be a way to counter this.





It was also issued with a variant title-page and 142 pages of commentary at the end. The editor was Richard West (c.1671-1716) (Durham). 

Two devotional prints, probably, to judge by the identical shape of the image, from the same series, and made c.1700. They depict respectively the medieval saint Elizabeth of Hungary, and the Virgin Mary with Christ Child. 

A sammelband of early eighteenth-century works mostly written by Johann Heinrich Acker the younger (1680-1759) but also some by his father, Johann Heinrich Acker the elder (1647-1719). Notably, this Sammelband includes five unlocated publications and a rare copy of an augmented German translation of Francis Bacon's *De Augmentis Scientiarum*, itself an expanded Latin translation of his *Advancement of Learning*.

Bacon's Advancement of Learning, which has been described as 'arguably the first important philosophical work to be published in English', advocated that 'the intellectual life of Europe had reached a kind of impasse or standstill' and yet 'there was a way beyond this stagnation if persons of learning, armed with new methods and insights, would simply open their eyes and minds to the world around them' (Simpson *IEP*). It was first printed in 1605 and translated into French in 1624; but not, at this stage, into German (Gibson, 1950, p. xiv). In 1623, De Augmentis Scientiarum was first printed; it was an expanded Latin version of the Advancement of Learning, envisaged by Bacon as part of his *Instauratio*

magna, a proposal for a fundamental restructuring of learning (only one other part, the *Novum organum*, was ultimately completed).

De Augmentis Scientiarum was first printed in German in 1665 (VD17 23:651444U). Our translation was printed about fifty years later (Gibson 1950/1959 records no other early German editions of the work). Our edition closes with 'Ende des Ersten Theils' (i.e. 'end of first part'). However, our copy



has the same number of pages as the five copies reported on OCLC, and we have found no evidence to confirm the existence of a supplementary volume. Perhaps, like Bacon's own literary plans, Acker's full translation work never came to fruition. There is, however, a known appendix to part one of Acker's translation; it is publication [11] in our Sammelband.

The author appears to have been the younger of the two Johann Heinrich Ackers, who was rector of Gymnasium Rudolstadt. He is represented by eleven further publications in this sammelband, most of which are constituent parts of his expansive *Opuscula Eloquentiae* (one unlocated: publication 6). Several other parts of the *Opuscula Eloquentiae* recorded in VD18 do not appear here. His father, also called Johann Heinrich Acker, wrote various works of philology, literature, and church history. He is represented by two publications in this sammelband, one of which is a compilation of poetry that includes his own compositions (publication 1). The sammelband closes with two publications written by neither of the Ackers, one being an unlocated edition of Tacitus's *Germania* (publication 16).

Contents of the book include an account of the life of the young queen, proceedings following her death, the decorative scheme for the funeral, the texts used in the decoration, and the names of attendees at the funeral. Given its own titlepage is (145-166) the funeral sermon for the queen by the Dominican Manuel Garzo. The catafalque, depicted in the print, included statuary, candles, and a painting of the Fates and the three Graces. While still a teenager, the queen ruled Spain during the War of the Spanish Succession, while her husband was away fighting in Italy (7-10).





Rare commentary on Genesis produced for the Grande Congrégation Académique, a school in Molsheim (Alsace) that was founded by the Jesuit order in 1617. It includes six pages of chronological tables at end. The publication takes from the Pentateuch commentary of Cornelius à Lapide SJ (d.1637). Like that work, it contains a plot synopsis for each chapter of the biblical book, followed by verse-by-verse commentary. However, the chronological tables introduce new material that we do not find in the edition of Lapide that we have looked at (Antwerp, 1714). While Lapide has a chronological table of the world from Adam to Christ, our work has chronological tables including information on when and how long the principal characters in Genesis lived, who was contemporary with whom (and when), and when events of the book occurred. The headlines give a running commentary too.







Subjects in this last part include (758-762) preparation of food, and (817-825) sleep, fantasy and memory. Scholars discussed include René Descartes (69; for Cartesian laws of motion see 155-165; for his views on the creation of the world see 212-223; see also 257-8; 262-3; 299; 305; 328; 364; 365; 368; 752; 762); **Isaac Newton** (see 223-234 (Newtonian astronomy); 258; 482-486 (Newtonian colour theory); 368); and the anatomist Daniel Tauvry (1669-1701)) (762-763).


The lecturer approves of Newton! At the end of the section on Newtonian astronomy, the notes state: "From all these things it is therefore gathered that the Newtonian system is sufficient for explaining celestial phenomena, both physical and mechanical". First edition of this assorted medical work, rare outside Spain, advertised as a study of the waters of the village of Alaraz near Salamanca, with a section on the waters of Muñana near Ávila. A considerable focus is placed on offering receipts for different ailments. The most intriguing part is (115-132) a treatise on the manna (i.e. the food described in the Hebrew Bible that was sent to the Israelites from heaven), that appeared in localities of the diocese of Ávila on St. Bartholomew's Day 1751. 

Respectively, these texts cover the battle of Velletri (1744)—in which Bonamici participated—and the War of the Austrian Succession (1740-1748). Part two includes Bonamici's poetry in Latin and Italian.





Rare state, in contemporary tree calf binding, of the only contemporary edition of the statutes for the Real Maestranza of Granada (the Royal Cavalry Armory of Granada). The text is attractively presented with an engraved frontispiece, and includes articles relating to the obligations of farriers (p. 99) and the breeding of horses (p. 126). Founded in 1686, the Real Maestranza of Granada followed the model set by the Real Maestranza of Seville in aiming to promote equestrianism among the nobility. Members had to own their own horse and were obligated to practice at regular sessions at the riding arena as well as to attend the festival of their patron saint. They had a significant civic presence in Granada (see Franco Rubio 2006).

Until 1764, when this edition of their own statutes was published, the Real Maestranza of Granada had used the ordinances of the Maestranza of Seville as their model. The present edition survives in several states, with ours being the longest at 160 pages (versions with 151 and 156 pages are also recorded). Our version would appear to be very scarce: the only comparable examples we have been able to find are modern facsimile editions, based on a 160-page copy or copies unknown to us (see below).







This attractive illustrated document is a genealogy and pedigree of François-Louis-Antoine-Marie de Coustin (1753-1829), at the time of his elevation (1782) to the position of canon-count at the cathedral of Saint-Claude in the Jura region in eastern France. It is likely to be the work of a professional heraldry painter. The new job at Saint-Claude cathedral required proof of nobility, which is given here. The pedigree is signed by de Coustin's mother. During the French Revolution, de Coustin spent time in prison, and in exile in Switzerland. Notes and doodles on the reverse side include





a captioned illustration of a man in a hat (dubbed a "wise man") walking amongst trees ("neighborhood wood").



An interesting copy, a label to front pastedown shows that it was offered for sale in Valencia at the bookshop of the widow of the early nineteenth-century bookseller José Carlos Navarro. Unfortunately we do not know the widow's own name.

Rare, illustrated and **wonderfully-bound** publication for the Order of Minims of the province of Granada, containing theses for disputations that were to be held in the Minims' church of Santa Maria de la Victoria in the city of Écija (Andalucia), on 28 and 30 September 1789. The book is to a large extent a celebration of this city. The texts to be defended include a history of Écija to the present day, including its period under Muslim control and its capture by Christian soldiers. There are lives of famous Écijans including (34-35) the Dominican **Juan Bautista Morales** (1597-1664), missionary in China, and (36-37) the Franciscan missionary in present Latin America **Jerónimo de Aguilar** (1489-1531). Following these parts are histories of the world and of the Order of Minims.

The names of the people who were to defend the theses at the disputations are found on pp. 41 and 81. At p. 42, facing the armorial of the dedicatee, noblewoman Agnes Barradas Henestrosa Aguilar Fernández de Córdoba, is a page of arguments from Old Testament sources on the **virtues of women**. The book includes (p. 3) a woodcut illustration of the ancient Jewish custom of the twelve loaves of **presence bread** that were placed on a table in the Temple in Jerusalem (Exodus).









A copy with the three plates called for in the Italian SBN catalogue, sometimes the book is catalogued as having four (cf. entries on OCLC). This is probably an error resulting from the fact that the third plate has two illustrations, labelled Tav. III and Tav. IV.

Spanish edition of the 1786 work by Thomas Skeete (1757-1789), 'Experiments and Observations on quilled and red Peruvian bark: among which are included, some remarkable Effects arising from the Action of Common Bark and Magnesia upon each other'. The edition includes new long footnotes with observations by the translator. It is interesting to see knowledge transfer from the British colonial Americas to the Spanish reading public on the subject of American medicine. Skeete was born in Barbados, and initially trained there before coming to Britain.

On the third page of the book, Navas (who is otherwise known for a textbook on childbirth) is posthumously commemorated by his widow, children and friends. He is announced on the title-page to have been a professor, librarian and assistant director of the Royal College of Surgery of San Carlos in Madrid.





Neatly presented manuscript of a speech given at the University of Guatemala, 23 March 1801, by Miguel Talavera, in praise of his boss, the military officer Roque Abarca. A printed university broadside (otherwise unlocated) tipped to a stub in the volume shows that the two visitors also officiated that day at an academic legal disputation.

Roque Abarca came to fame later for being *Presidente* of Guadalajara and *Comandante General* of Nueva Galicia (an area of the Spanish kingdom of New Spain which included modern California, Texas and New Mexico) at the time of the Mexican uprising of 1810. In 1801, he was a colonel and government official in Guatemala. Born in Spain, we learn from Talavera's speech (24) that his earlier military career had seen him fight the British and Ottomans at the Strait of Gibraltar ("arch of Hercules").




GETTING MARRIED IN AUSTRIA

*41. [Heizing, Austria] Archive of letters and certificates. c.1820-1860.

This archive, of documents, letters, invoices, receipts, and administrative forms from the Austrian town of Heizing (now a suburb of Vienna), gives a fascinating insight into the ways in which the Habsburg state and the church combined in the regulation of everyday life, and especially with regard to marriage, over four decades from the 1820s onwards.

In order to marry, it was necessary to go through a number of administrative and ecclesiastical hurdles. The couple needed to present birth certificates; it was also mandatory, between 1820 and 1869, to obtain from the Bezirksamt (local government office) a Politischer Ehekonsenz, a certificate granted only when the couple could demonstrate to officials






that they had the means to support one another, and any children, without the risk of their becoming a burden to the state. This archive contains numerous examples; many again follow a simple printed form, filled in with the appropriate details and signed and stamped by the district governor, but we also find many that are entirely in manuscript, occasionally going into considerably more detail about the circumstances of the couple, as well as numerous letters written in support of applications

In addition to these civil requirements, it was also necessary to provide certificates of confession. These generally (but not always) took the form of printed slips, signed and dated by the priest, and sometimes accompanied by a letter from the archiepiscopal consistory; a number of examples are present, in various different formats. The result, finally, is the Ehe-Meldschein, an example of which we find here, which states the lack of either legal or canonical impediments to marriage, with the proviso that if the groom is a minor, he also needs the permission of the guardianship office. Besides these forms and letters, the archive also contains





a number of notices, issued by the Bezirksamt, including marriage banns and death notices, as well as extensive correspondence between district authorities, local church bodies, and residents; the majority of these appear as sent, complete with postage marks and seals. Although most are connected to Heizing, a few bear the stamps of neighbouring towns.

Archive of c.120 letters and certificates, various formats but mostly single sheet, including around 20 printed forms, completed in a variety of hands; on a mixture of plain and blue papers; almost all stamped and many retaining wax seals; dates ranging from the 1820s to 1859s, mostly Heizing, Austria, with some from neighbouring towns; some darkening around folds, and the odd torn edge (consistent with letteropening) but otherwise remarkably fresh throughout.

ROYAL ORDER OF CARLOS III

Copy in original marbled wrappers of a scarce reprint of an instructive pamphlet detailing the requirements for admission to the Real Orden de Carlos Tercero (Royal Order of Carlos III). Particularly notable is the large folding-out diagram depicting a schematic family tree.

Applicants are advised to provide documentary proof of their Christianity and legitimacy, and that of their ancestors—all compiled into a single foliated volume (*un solo volúmen foliado*; p. 17).

The Real Orden was established in 1771 as an order of chivalry with two classes: *las Grandes Cruces* and *las Pensionadas*. Palau records three later editions (1826, 1831, and 1838).



Doctors of Rostock can have the same dignities and privileges as doctors of Bologna, Siena, Padua, Pavia, Perugia, Paris and Leipzig, and other centres of study. And (underlined in this copy), the university has a full ordinary jurisdiction over its students (including the rights to punish, and order restitution), for both civil, and criminal matters! This is a second edition; the work was printed previously in 1560.


