A collection of memories from friends and colleagues, led by a short biography by Ackerley. Macfie was a prodigious collector of Gypsy books, a scholar and linguist, and spent much time with Gypsies. He was secretary of the Gypsy Lore Society from 1907 to 1914, when he joined up for the first world war, and editor of the journal from 1907 to 1914 and again from 1933 to 1935. He wrote many scholarly papers and books on Gypsies.

Very good.

This book marks the development of a new, authorative academic approach to Romani studies which leaves behind the patronising racism of experts in "Gypsy Lore" and locates itself in the problems identified by Romani people themselves.

3. Thomas Acton & Morgan Dalphinis. (Edited by). LANGUAGE, BLACKS AND GYPSIES. LANGUAGES WITHOUT A WRITTEN TRADITION AND THEIR ROLE IN EDUCATION. 2000, London, Whiting & Birch, ppxi + 252, black and white frontispiece, printed wrappers. Very good.

A collection of academic papers relating to language as a form of ethnic defence; the implications of the emergence of literary forms of languages without a written tradition; the social position of speakers of these languages; educational strategies for supporting students from these communities; and multilingual education and its political implications.

- **4. Lucie Adelsberger.** AUSCHWITZ: A DOCTOR'S STORY. 1997, Bath, Large Print, reprint, ppxxiv + 190 + (i), blue laminated boards. Very good. **£20.00** Includes a chapter on the Gypsy Camp. Europe's Gypsies fell under the Race Laws of 1935 promulgated at Nuremberg. They ranked below Jews on the ladder of life considered 'unworthy to be lived'. Both Jews and Gypsies were in official language 'parasites'.
- **5. Marta Adler.** MY LIFE WITH THE GIPSIES. 1960, London, Souvenir Press Limited, first edition, pp204, black and white portrait frontispiece, orange cloth.

 Bottom part of spine of dustwrapper missing, otherwise good.

Marta Adler, a 'gorgio', was brought up in Germany between the wars. She married three Gypsies, Rasko, Pitzo and Ninna, and her life with them and their tribes are described in detail here. The penultimate chapter concerns the Nazi campaigns to destroy Gypsies; the enforced sterilisation laws and the gas chambers in the concentration camps. Her final chapter is full of hope; despite Hitler and the Gestapo, the Gypsies of Europe have survived.

Very rare pamphlet, with no copy located on OCLC online. Rodney Smith ("Gipsy Smith") was a Methodist evangelist, born at Wanstead, Essex, England, March 31,1860. He was of Gipsy parentage, and was converted at the age of sixteen. In 1877 he became an evangelist under the auspices of the Christian Mission of London, and preached successfully in various places, particularly at Whitby, Sheffield, Bolton, Chatham, Hull, Derby, and Hanley. Meanwhile, the Christian Mission had developed into the Salvation Army, and in 1882 Smith was dismissed for a technical breach of discipline. He continued to preach in Hanley, however, Hull, Sweden, in 1889 he visited the United States, conducting services in various cities, returning to England later in the same year and becoming connected with the Manchester Mission. In 1891 he again visited the United States. In 1892 he conducted services in Edinburgh, and from this grew the Gipsy Gospel Wagon Mission, devoted to evangelistic work among his own people.

Bataillard (1816-1894), was an archivist for the French state with more than a passing interest in Gypsies. He collected a huge library of material in many languages, many rare pamphlets, and made many manuscript notes and translations which he stored in about fifty box files. This collection was bequeathed to Manchester Central Library, where it has remained hidden in the stacks, uncatalogued, ever since. I was lucky to be offered the chance to view this collection some years ago when there was talk of disposing of it to raise funds, but as far as I know it is still intact, gathering dust. OCLC locates five copies; three in France, Boston Atheneum, National Library of Wales.





Belton's powerfully original book examines Gypsy lives against the framework of social theories that illustrate how identity arises from the cultural complexity of individuals, families, and communities. Addressing the lack of contextual and social perspectives in the existing literature and the underlying assumption of a consistent Gypsy lineage, Belton explores the subject of identity to include the broader social context in which the population exists.


Exceptionally readable and scholarly account of the history of Gypsies throughout Europe.

Sven and Juanita left St Ives in 1953 with their two young children in a horse-drawn Gypsy wagon. The couple settled in the New Forest, in the Shave Green area, where they were accepted into the local Gypsy community.

> Sven's autobiographical work inspired by his living with Gypsies in the New Forest, and his quest for their way of life. The original working title for the book was "Tents of Kedah". Sold with Sven's rough design of the dustwrapper, a proof of the wrapper, and several manuscript notes both typed and in Sven's hand. A unique example of the working pattern of a fascinating character, unique in the history of twentieth century British art. [Part of a number of items I purchased from the estate of his third wife, Julia, who died in 20211.

Sven Berlin (1911-1999), was a writer, sculptor and artist, born in Sydenham but moved to St Ives in 1938, where he became an important part of the St Ives movement, along with Ben Nicholson and Barbara Hepworth. He wrote and published the first work on the naive painter Alfred Wallis, and was a founding member of The Crypt group; his rift with the modernists and the subsequent clash of egos led to his book the Dark Monarch, which was withdrawn just after publication, and resulted in him being squeezed out of the St Ives artistic community, which, some would say, severely restricted his career.


Initially set out to be a useful guide for scholars to see at a glance what work had already been published, thereby omitting duplication. Two copies were sent out to each member of the society, blank on recto, and one to all concerned librarians, with the object of correcting any mistakes or omissions. Anyone returning their copy with amendments or additions would receive a free copy of the updated version.

14. George F. Black. Ph.D. A GYPSY BIBLIOGRAPHY. 1914, London, ppviii + 226 + 12, green paper wrappers. Wrappers a bit chipped and creased, repaired with tape on spine, contents good. **£75.00**

Black (1866-1948), described his aim "to give an account of the literature relating to Gypsies - good, bad, and indifferent. A complete bibliography of the subject, it is needless to say, is almost impossible, the indirect material being so abundant. The list includes, besides separately published books and pamphlets, papers in the proceedings of societies or periodicals, magazine articles, important references in books dealing principally with other subjects, etc". In addition to the whopping 4577 entries, Black gives us an exhaustive index and a list of all the articles published in the Gypsy Lore Society Journal. He also formed a large collection of books on Witchcraft.

Unusual, scarcely-seen photographic images of inter-war European Gypsies.

Borrow had a large library of Spanish books in his summer house at Oulton which he had collected on his travels and had used when writing his Spanish travel books. Watts-Dunton had written several novels with Gypsy characters and was a friend of Borrow, writing the introductions to the Minerva Library, and other, editions of Borrow's works, and wrote his obituary for the "Athenaeum".

Still one of the most respected and reliable works on the language, from the pen of the man who inspired so many generations of readers and writers.

Tony Boxall's chance encounter with Jim, a Gypsy travelling in southern England in 1964, led to a four year photographic project which, by equal good fortune, recorded the most significant transition in Gypsy culture in several hundred years. His photographs depict one Gypsy family's experience of the decline of the horse-drawn way of life and show another family of travellers coming to terms with the motorised era.

A remarkable collection of writings from a remarkable group of writers (including Angus Fraser) exploring the rights and aspirations of Roma.

Interesting photographs with accompanying text published to coincide with the author's successful Yorkshire TV film, based on his travels with the Smith family. Ironically, the UK's provincial, regional independent production companies have all disappeared faster than the Romanies.

Francisco Adolpho Coelho (1847-1919), Portuguese philologist. OCLC locates only two copies in the UK; BL and Oxford. George F. Black, "A Gypsy Bibliography", 908; Leeds University Romany Catalogue, 51. One of the very few Portuguese works on Gypsies.

24. Tim Coughlan. NOW SHOON THE ROMANO GILLIE.TRADITIONAL VERSE IN THE HIGH AND LOW SPEECH OF THE GYPSIES OF BRITAIN. FOREWORD BY SIR ANGUS FRASER. 2001, Cardiff, University of Wales Press, ppx + 486, green cloth in dustwrapper. Very good. **£45.00**

When the Gypsies first arrive in the British Isles in the second half of the fifteenth century, they brought with them their own language and, it may be assumed, a body of traditional song, little of which is preserved today. This book gathers together the largest published collection of extant traditional verse in Welsh Romani and Romani English. An invaluable resource for students of the Gypsy language and traditional song.

25. James Crabb. THE GIPSIES' ADVOCATE; OR OBSERVATIONS ON THE ORIGIN, CHARACTERS, MANNERS, AND HABITS, OF THE ENGLISH GIPSIES: TO WHICH ARE ADDED MANY INTERESTING ANECDOTES ON THE SUCCESS THAT HAS ATTENDED THE PLANS OF SEVERAL BENEVOLENT INDIVIDUALS WHO ANXIOUSLY DESIRE THEIR CONVERSION TO GOD. 1832, London, Sold by Nisbet etc, third edition, ppxii + 9 - 199, full purple cloth, gilt lettering on spine. Boards faded and chipped top and bottom of spine, scattered foxing.

Despite his obvious desire to introduce Christianity to the Gypsies he encountered around Southampton, Mr Crabb does seem to have had a genuine affection for, and understanding of, their way of life. A note on the title page says that the profits from this work will be devoted to assist the "reformed" Gypsies, the infants' schools and other religious objects in Southampton. The work ran to several editions, the first being quite scarce, so presumably the profits would have been quite useful. Black, 971; Leeds University Romany Collection, 379.

Rupert Croft-Cooke has written on various aspects of Gypsy lore, and has advanced a few of his own theories drawn from his own intuition and experience of Romani ways. He tells of traditions of their music and singing; of superstition and convention about love, marriage and death. He has also attached to each essay a memoir or story illuminating it. One of the best books on Gypsies from one of our best writers.

27. Robert Dawson. NORTHERN TRAVELLER TALES. RECORDED FROM THE TRAVELLING PEOPLE. 2003, Derby, Robert Dawson, 4to, pp89, black and white illustrations by Amaletta, burgundy cloth in dustwrapper. Very good.

"Why do some travellers look like donkeys? And who dares to tell them? Who's the man with three eyes, four noses but only one leg? I ask, because he's looking at you now. And have you ever had to stand guard over a coffin containing a body covered in bandages...a body which suddenly gets up and leaves the coffin for a smoke? Read this book if you dare." Hard for me to add to this description, really.

28. Norman N. Dodds. GYPSIES, DIDIKOIS AND OTHER TRAVELLERS. 1966, London, Johnson Publications, first edition, pp I 66, black and white illustrations, blue cloth in dustwrapper. Dustwrapper torn, with a small loss on the rear board, otherwise good.

Dodds was Labour MP for Erith and Crayford from 1945 until his sudden death in 1965, and was an ardent campaigner for the unfortunate and under-privileged. Throughout the last fifteen years of his parliamentary life he was concerned with the increasingly urgent problem of the Gypsy population of the British Isles.

Dorph (1783-1858), was a Danish philologist and translator; Rector of Horsens, later a professor. Very rarely appearing on the market, this is a work on the Gypsies of Jutland and contains a Rotwelsch vocabulary. George F. Black, "A Gypsy Bibliography", 1158; Leeds University Romany Catalogue, 54.

30. Jerzy Ficowski. THE GYPSIES IN POLAND. HISTORY AND CUSTOMS. No date, circa 1980, Interpress Publishers, 4to, pp304, colour and black and white illustrations, cream rexine in dustwrapper. Very good.

Ficowski was Poland's prominent but unorthodox poet, a fervent Christian who celebrated Polish Roma culture and memorialised in verse the Jewish victims of the Holocaust. He was respected for his lifelong contribution to the struggle to free his homeland, first as a youngster during the Nazi occupation, then as a patron of, and participant in, the human rights campaign against communist rule. In 1943 he spent several weeks in the Gestapo prison at Pawiak, in Warsaw. During the 1944 Warsaw uprising, when the Polish underground rose against the Nazis in the hope of liberating the capital before the arrival of the Red Army, Ficowski served with the famous Baszta regiment. The uprising lasted for 63 days and more than 200,000 Poles died, after which Hitler destroyed Warsaw. Along with many other survivors he ended up in a camp in Germany. After the war Ficowski subsumed his patriotic dreams in a broader vision of those who had suffered even more than the Poles under the Nazis - the Roma and the Jews. For some years he travelled with Gypsies across Poland, submerging himself in their secret world and learning their language. In 1965 he wrote a brilliant sociological study of the Gypsy way of life, Gypsies on the Polish Road. His prose and poems were translated widely in the west and the emergence of Solidarity in 1980 brought his works back to Poland's bookshelves.

'This marvellous book is a collection of stories told by three travelling people...These are no whimsical fairy tales for genteel escapists, full though they are of magical tricks, talking animals and superhuman feats.'

36. Will Guy (Edited by). BETWEEN PAST AND FUTURE. THE ROMA OF CENTRAL AND EASTERN EUROPE. 2001, Hertfordshire, University of Hertfordshire Press, ppix + 429, black and white illustrations, pictorial wrappers. Very good.

Will Guy was lecturer in Sociology at Bristol University, and in the 70s undertook doctoral research on the Czechoslovak Communist assimilation policy, while living with Roma in the segregated settlements of Slovakia, and acted as interpreter for the Czech Roma delegation to the first World Romani Congress in 1971. He was also an observer at the Fifth World Romani Congress in 2000.

This book concerns the period when the former Communist states applied to join the EU, which required a guarantee of respect for minorities, against a background of segregation and widespread racist attacks.

A fictional story of a young Gypsy girl abandoned at birth and fostered by Socialist parents - a family that becomes victim to the ugly machinations of Nazi politics in a small Austrian town in the 1930s.

38. Ian Hancock. THE PARIAH SYNDROME.AN ACCOUNT OF GYPSY SLAVERY AND PERSECUTION. 1987, Michigan, Karoma Publishers Inc, ppxii + 180, black and white illustrations, printed wrappers. Very good.

Himself a Gypsy, the author was a professor of English and Linguistics at the University of Texas in Austin, the United States Representative at the United Nations for UNICEF for the World Romani Union, and former Special Advisor to the United States Holocaust Memorial Council. While the Romani people have held permanent NGO status in the UN since 1979, they remained the only ethnic minority in America against whom laws exist.

39. Ian Hancock. WE ARE THE ROMANI PEOPLE. AME SAM E ROMANE DŽENE. 2003, Hertfordshire, Centre de Recherches Tsiganes, ppxxii + 180 + (vi), black and white illustrations, pictorial wrappers. Very good.

A work intended primarily as a source book for teachers, social workers and others interacting with Romanies in - or from - Central and Eastern Europe, but invaluable to anyone who wants to know more about these fascinating people who left India a thousand years ago.

40. Denis Harvey. THE GYPSIES. WAGGON-TIME AND AFTER. 1979, London, B.T. Batsford Ltd., first edition, 4to, pp 144, sepia and black and white illustrations, green cloth in dustwrapper. Very good. **£50.00**

Without doubt the best photographic record of Gypsies from the sixties and seventies.

This new and expanded edition tracks the impact of the 1994 Criminal Justice Bill and Public Order Act on the lives and fortunes of Gypsies in Britain. Confrontation between the Gypsy and the state carries implications for the way British society caters for the needs of all minority groups, and the book argues that Gypsies and Travellers are one of the least regarded minority groups in Britain.

John Hornby was a well-known writer for children, and this introduction to the Romanis tells of their origins, their history, rulers, laws and customs, of their music, cooking and healing lore, and of the great gathering at Saintes-Maries-de-la-mer. Charmingly illustrated by David Gentleman.

43. Cledwyn Hughes. WEST WITH THE TINKERS. A JOURNEY THROUGH WALES WITH VAGRANTS. 1954, London, Odhams Press Limited, first edition, pp223, black and white illustrations, green cloth in dustwrapper. Top of spine of dustwrapper pulled, otherwise good. **£20.00**

An unusual view of the Welsh countryside - a day-by-day account of a summer journey by horse-drawn cart through rural Wales in the company of Johnny Powell and his son Corgi - two Welsh tinkers of Gypsy origin. Beginning in Shrewsbury, they travel through the Severn valley, Welshpool, Llanidloes, the Wye Valley, Llangurig, Rhayader, Builth Wells, Brecon, Llandovery, Carmarthen, Cardigan, Aberystwyth, Machynlleth, Dolgellau, Harlech, Snowdoniapassing through Aber, Llanfairfechan and Conway, Bala and Berwyns to their home town of Llansantffraid.

44. [G. P. R. James]. THE GIPSY; A TALE. 1835, London, Longman, Rees, Orme, Brown, Green, & Longman, three volumes, first edition, ppiv + 336; 330; 341, ornately blind-stamped half blue morocco over marbled boards, with binder's tickets in each volume for T. Kilkenny "opposite the White Hart Inn, Enniskillen". Volumes one and two have lost their labels, otherwise good.

Curiously the three volumes have different binder's labels - one slightly larger and one on coloured paper, but all have the same typeset.

45. Eldra Jarman and A. O. H. Jarman. THE WELSH GYPSIES. CHILDREN OF ABRAM WOOD. 1998, Cardiff, University of Wales Press, first paperback edition, ppx + 228, black and white illustrations, pictorial wrappers. Very good.

A remarkable study of the most famous family of Welsh Gypsies, combining historical and linguistic scholarship with inside knowledge drawn from the family tradition. The family of Abram Wood first arrived in Wales in the eighteenth century; a tawny-skinned people speaking a language close to Hindi and Sanskrit. Welsh society found their customs strange and sometimes unacceptable, and the Gypsies lived their nomadic lives separate from the Welsh community for several generations.

46. The Rev. Dr. Frank Jennings. MEN OF THE LANES. THE AUTOBIOGRAPHY OF THE TRAMPS' PARSON. 1958, London, Oldbourne, first edition, pp222, black and white illustrations, grey cloth in dustwrapper. Fore-edges foxed, otherwise very good.

Each year for nearly a quarter of a century Dr Jennings spent some time on the road, working among tramps, Gypsies and circus people. He was known to the press as 'The Tramps' Parson', although his work was befriending and assisting rather than evangelising, and he saw it as a way to understand the people and enrich his own life.

47. Donald Kenrick. GYPSIES: FROM THE GANGES TO THE THAMES. 2004, Hertfordshire, University of Hertfordshire Press, ppxii + 126 + (vi), black and white illustrations, pictorial wrappers. Very good.

Kenrick considers the many controversial and conflicting theories about the origin of the Gypsies, then compares the lives of their distant relatives who stayed in India, or settled somewhere on the way, and how modern links are being forged between these groups.

48. Cathy Kiddle. CHILDREN IN CHARGE 8. TRAVELLER CHILDREN. A VOICE FOR THEMSELVES. 2000, London, Jessica Kingsley Publishers, second impression, pp I 74, printed wrappers. Some pencil marks in margins, otherwise very good.

A child-centred work offering valuable insight to community and social workers, and anyone involved in education of Traveller children.

49. John M. Kirk and Dónall P. Ó Baoill. TRAVELLERS AND THEIR LANGUAGE. 2002, Belfast, Cló Ollscoil na Banríona, ppix + 196, pictorial wrappers. Very good.

A collection of some fifteen papers on Travellers' language, some presented at a Symposium on Travellers' Language as part of an International Conference on the Languages of Scotland and Ireland, Queen's University, Belfast, 2000, and some appearing for the first time.

"It's the end of the war, we've survived. After every darkness comes the dawn. But after every dawn also comes the darkness. Who knows what's in store for us."

The author records the evidence he personally found of the racial memories preserved in the folk-ways and speech patterns of the Gypsies. He also makes a plea for more systematic research into Gypsy history in India, and urges that Gypsies of other countries be enabled to visit India to study at their institutions. Increasingly hard to find a copy of this work.

A Doctoral dissertation with a rather poor print quality and binding.

Juliet Jeffery was for some time fascinated by Gypsy caravans and when her paintings started to take up too much space in her parents' cottage she bought a wagon to use as a studio. The man from whom she bought the van told her about Appleby she vowed to go some day, and the illustrations here represent that experience.

54. Patrick 'Jasper' Lee of the Purrum clan. WE BORROW THE EARTH. AN INTIMATE PORTRAIT OF THE GYPSY SHAMANIC TRADITION AND CULTURE. 2000, London, Thorsons, ppxvi + 320, black and white illustrations, pictorial wrappers. Very good.

Patrick Lee explores the history and culture of his people and their knowledge of the ancient arts of healing and prophecy. He includes chapters on their origins and customs as well as looking at their potions, spells, charms and curses in an open and accessible way. A unique and fascinating work.

 - In this book we meet Canada's Gypsies and see the world's oldest independent people, their time-honoured trades grown obsolete, struggling against the indignities and indifference of Canadian society and finding their plight one with that of all the other slum dwellers of our Eastern cities.

Curiously the publishers seem to have missed out a "third edition", as both Black and Leeds only have the first, second and fourth. It is, however, a very readable and reliable work containing many translations of Gypsy stories and fables with the original Romany versions alongside.

Dedicated to "A friend, David Cobb; Negro soldier US Army; who was hanged in England during the Second World War", the novel is concerned with capital punishment, Llew Evans being a fictional Gypsy character. "This Author's Note ends on a somewhat gloomy note, but I can promise the reader that all is not gloom in this novel. Its pages unfold an account of true love, and are full of descriptions of the comings and goings of Gypsies and of the natural beauties of field, river and forest, to soothe the mind".

New York seen through Gypsy eyes, with surprising information concerning its large Gypsy population, which is nomadic, and hidden from those whom the Gypsies do not regard as friends. Herbalist and Traveller, Juliette de Baïracli Levy wanders through the streets accompanied by her two young children and her Afghan hounds.

60. Jean-Pierre Liégeois. GYPSIES. AN ILLUSTRATED HISTORY. 1986, London, Al Saqi Books, reprint, pp 192, numerous black and white photographic illustrations, pictorial wrappers. Very good.

Jean-Pierre Liégeois is one of Europe's leading authorities on Gypsies and the author of several ground-breaking books and articles. This work is translated from the French by Tony Berrett and is packed with seldom-seen black and white photographs of Gypsies throughout Europe.

A curiosity of adventure by one of the nineteenth century "Gentleman Gypsies", but an interesting read nonetheless. Mr Lowndes and his pals decide to go camping in December... in Cheshire, Dartmoor, Wales and Shetland.

A collection of English poems and ballads, some on Gypsies, with verse translations into Romani. Sir Donald Macalister of Tarbert (1854-1934), was a Scottish physician who became Chancellor of the University of Glasgow. He was a member of the Cambridge Apostles intellectual secret society, and became President of the General Medical Council. In addition to his many talents in the fields of mathematics and medicine, he spoke twenty languages well. Leeds University Romany Catalogue, 757.

63. Andreas (Mui Shuko) [R. A. Scott Macfie]. GYPSY COPPERSMITHS IN LIVERPOOL AND BIRKENHEAD. 1913, Liverpool, Henry Young and Sons, pp66, five black and white illustrations, brown boards. Very good. **£95.00**

LURC 401. The author's initials appear in the border of a device on the title page. Macfie's thoughts and sketches are followed by a Romany tale and its translation - "The Fool and his Two Brothers".

Gypsies have lived in England since the early sixteenth century, yet considerable confusion and disagreement remain over the precise identity of the group. The question 'Who are the Gypsies?' is still asked and the debates about the positioning and permanence of the boundary between Gypsy and non-Gypsy are contested as fiercely today as at any time before. This study locates these debates in their historical perspective, tracing the origins and reproduction of the various ways of defining and representing the Gypsy from the early sixteenth century to the present day.

A primary motive given for the 1992 legal reforms was financial: that the cost to the public purse of providing sites for Travelling People was unjustifiably high. Yet no study was ever done in to the costs of *not* providing sites".

The title page mentions other titles authored by Morwood including "Clarissa the Gipsy", and "The Gipsy Scare", neither of which Mr Black was able to track down in 1914, and I have not seen in the meantime.

Tramping, wandering in the Sussex countryside with an innate understanding of the Gypsy way of life in an era now long gone. Her chapter on some Irish buskers she meets on the road is particularly evocative.

In 1852 he travelled to Egypt and Palestine, publishing a bestselling account "Sinai and Palestine in Connection with their History", and was a founding member of the Palestine Exploration Fund, committed to a scientific, non-religious, non-political approach.

Starkie's beautiful, rich prose guides us through Spain before the ravages of the civil war.

On the shores of the Camargue in Provence - like an immense ship of granite - rises the shrine of Les Saintes Maries de la Mer. It is here that every year Gypsies migrate from the corners of the earth. On the 24th May they hold their ceremony in the unconsecrated crypt of this ancient fortress church. By light of torch and candle flame they worship their Saint Sara. Dr Starkie writes of a world of which he has had unique experience, and writes of the lives and fortunes of the people - particularly important in the light of the second world war and nationalism.

Striking dustwrapper designed by Lacey Everett, and an attractive bookplate for Theresa and Wesley Phillips.

More Gypsies have been killed in racist attacks in the first post-communist years than in all the time since World War II. This book is about the refusal of one group of Hungarian Gypsies - the Rom - to abandon their way of life and accept assimilation, despite persecution, hostility and racism.

But this is no romantic tale he recounts the struggle of finding work, falling foul of the law and serving prison sentences, and the murder of his father.

An authoritative collection of essays on Romani legal procedures and identity, including topics such as the US criminalisation of many aspects of Gypsy law, parallels between Jewish and Gypsy law, and legal distinctions between Romani communities.

Wim attempts to explore the ambivalence shown towards Gypsies as both social outcasts and romantic outsiders, and to trace the origins of this stigmatisation. He has written extensively on the history of travelling groups, especially Gypsies.
