Introduction

This collection is not intended to be a comprehensive history of the development of cloth bindings. Instead, it celebrates and charts the progress of the use of decorated cloth as a marketing tool, to encourage buyers by the 'packaging' as well as the content of the book. These volumes were bound not only to be attractive, but to last – all the items offered her are in tip-top condition.

Ordered here by decade (and alphabetically by author within each decade), we are aiming to demonstrate how decorative cloth changed over time as materials and processes became cheaper and as fashions for attractive bindings changed.

Beginning with the relatively simple designs of the 1830s when gilt lettering & decoration was first used, the catalogue concludes with a section of 'part works' (1850s-1910s) available to subscribers only, issued in multi-volume large-format sets of highly decorated cloth bindings and usually including numerous woodcut and chromolithographic illustrations.

Produced for the 'popular market', many of the titles in the catalogue are not rare. However, they do not often survive in the condition offered here; almost all are very good or fine. We show, I hope you will agree, just how attractive trade cloth bindings of the nineteenth century can be.

We hope you enjoy the catalogue and look forward to hearing from you.






¶ The first edition with this title; A series of progressive lessons on the game of chess: containing numerous general rules and remarks, also by Lewis, was published in 1831. By the celebrated chess theoretician William Lewis, 1787-1870, author of numerous works on chess. He is also remembered for his role in the elaborate hoax of the chess-playing automaton 'The Turk'. A fraudulent chess-playing machine, 'The Turk' toured Europe for a remarkable 84 years demonstrating its ability to play a strong game of chess. The fraud was that the machine was built to allow a human player (including Lewis) to be hidden inside and operate the machine.

The dedication leaf (the work is dedicated to Thomas Kelly, Alderman of the Borough of Farringdon) is signed Leapidge Smith who is given by the 1841 census as a 60 year old Stationer resident in Hackney. He was, as stated beneath his name, the late overseer of St. Faith-under St. Paul. The volume (consisting of illustrated verse and legend) was published to raise funds for William Abiah, discovered when just three weeks old, 'on one of the shambles of Newgate Market'. The final leaf, printed in blue, and dated May 1842, states that: 'Whereas it is proposed to raise a sum of money for the support and education of William Abiah, a foundling about twelve months old now under the care of Mr Leapidge Smith at Rectory Cottage ... Should the parents or either of them ever make their appearance and claim the said child then the trustees shall continue to hold the amount for his use or pay it as before mentioned to the Ward Schools at their discretion'.

He was also an important abolitionist and his home in Dundee Township, Illinois, was a stop on the Underground Railroad. In the 1850s, Pinkerton worked solving a number of train robberies for the Illinois Central Railroad, and here met Abraham Lincoln who sometimes acted as the company's lawyer. During the Civil War, he was the head of the Union Intelligence Agency and prevented at least one assassination attempt on Lincoln. After the war he continued to work on train robberies and he was hired by railroad companies to capture Jesse James. When his contracts were terminated for not delivering the outlaw, he continued to pursue James (unsuccessfully) with his own money.

Arthur Morrison, 1863 - 1945, journalist and writer specialising in low-life London and detective fiction. Morrison began his career as a journalist at *The Globe* in 1885 before taking up editorial positions at the *Palace Journal*, *The People* and the evening *Globe*. His first book, *The Shadows around Us* (1891), was a collection of supernatural stories first printed in *The People*. Morrison's first detective story *Martin Hewett*, *Investigator*, appeared in 1894, with the eponymous detective becoming a recurring figure in his work. His working-class upbringing in the East End of London influenced many of his novels, including his most famous book *A Child of the Jago* (1896), which was criticised by contemporaries for it's naturalistic depiction of an east London slum. In addition to his literary career, Morrison was a keen collector of Japanese and Chinese works of art, selling his collection of 1846 Japanese woodblock prints to the British Museum in 1906 and bequeathing the rest upon his death.
