





1. ALLINGHAM, Margery **The Tiger in the Smoke**

First edition of the fourteenth novel in Allingham's Albert Campion series. Critics have called it the finest of the Campion mysteries and her best book.

Margery Allingham was considered one of its four "Queens of Crime" from the "Golden Age of Detective Fiction", alongside Agatha Christie, Dorothy L. Sayers and Ngaio Marsh. Her character, the gentleman sleuth, Albert Campion, was initially believed to be a parody of Dorothy L. Sayers's detective Lord Peter Wimsey. Campion, however, matured into a strongly individual character, part-detective, part-adventurer, who formed the basis for 18 novels and many short stories.



Thomas Taylor (15 May 1758 – 1 November 1835) was an English translator and Neoplatonist, the first to translate into English the complete works of Aristotle and of Plato.



The series captures well the appeal of his first-ever television series 'Zoo Quest' that ran on the BBC from 1954-1964.

Reissue of the Steventon Edition(?) with the text printed in black rather than brown. The Steventon Edition was the last complete edition published by Bentley. Gibson D13 notes “Keynes 32 records a reissue of the edition in 1886, but I have not seen this”.

From the library of Major John Rowland Abbey with his 1933 paper bookplate in each volume.



Major John Roland Abbey was the largest English book collector of his time. His book collecting started in 1929 buying books from various private presses, eventually gaining complete collections of books from the Kelmscott, Ashendene and Gwasg Gregynog presses. He also became interested in modern bindings, and in 1931 commissioned examples from Sybil Pye and, as here, from R. de Coverly & Sons. He also collected antiquarian books, starting from the sale of Primrose's collection and building it up from 1936 to 1938 thanks to sales from the Mensing, Moss, Aldenham, Schiff, and Cortlandt F. Bishop collections, eventually holding over 1,300 books. He died on 24 December 1969 in London, and, with the exception of manuscripts given to his family and a group of books donated to the Eton College Collections, his remaining texts were sold for £993,509 between 1970 and 1975.

With loosely inserted an autograph note signed from Handasyde Buchanan to Major Abbey, on G. Heywood Hill Ltd headed paper dated Dec 3 1957.

“Dear Abbey, Thank you very much for your letter and for accepting my offer. I enclose a cheque for £140. I shall always wonder whether Redlynch House is Jane Austen’s Kellynch Hall in *Persuasion*. It was just about


where you are, and if you ever get any confirmation please tell me. Don't bother to acknowledge the cheque. Yours ever Handasyde Buchanan." Sadly, we do not know what books Buchanan was buying from the Major.

Songs of Innocence is a collection of 23 poems by Blake which he first printed in 1789, producing around 17 or 18 copies. The Trianon Press published this excellently produced facsimile of the Rosenwald copy of the *Songs of Innocence* at the Library of Congress, believed to be one of the earliest coloured and issued by the artist and part of a group of 8 copies executed between 1790 and 1794 which are characterised by the simplicity of the watercolour washes and by the fact they were printed on both sides. After this time the colouring was more elaborate and the books were printed on rectos only.

It includes 'The Lamb' which is one of the greatest poems ever written about Christianity and which was famously set to music by John Tavener.

Facsimile edition, from an edition of 726 total copies, this one of the first 50 have which have additional material and are in a special binding. The fourth additional volume of this deluxe edition contains collotypes without the plate marks, extra plates, negative, and copper plate.

Volume I is an introductory volume, followed by three volumes of plates.

"In about 1818 Blake revised *For Children: The Gates of Paradise*, giving the work the new title of *For the Sexes: The Gates of Paradise* and adding three new text plates at the end (Plates 19-21). All twenty-one plates

are intaglio etchings/engravings. Plates 19-20 contain brief interpretive statements keyed by number to the preceding design plates. The final plate is addressed to Satan as the "God of This [fallen] World." (Blake Archive).



Always fascinated by the *Book of Job*, Blake's engravings were based on a series of watercolours executed between 1805 and 1806 for his patron Thomas Butts concerning a debate between Satan and God concerning Job's piety. The plates are noteworthy as being the last complete series of engravings completed before Blake's death in 1827.



First edition, one of 60 numbered copies (No. 27), signed by the author on the limitation leaf. Blunden has warmly inscribed the book to Siegfried Sassoon and his wife with a nod to his publisher and a play on William Blake: "Siegfried & Hester with Edmund's love Heysterbury 4 June

1939 / A Peer of the Realm, on printing bent, / Is surely as good as the House of Dent. / - Auguries of Innocence."

Sassoon's friendship with Blunden, "one of the best and most fruitful" of his life, was exceptionally close: "He brings with him his aura of enthusiasm for literature. He creates a special atmosphere which inspires me with certainty that I am a privileged person sharing the mysteries of the noble craft of letters... to have known Blunden is to have known a divine poet..." (Siegfried Sassoon Diaries)

The Corvinus Press was founded in 1936 by Viscount Carlow, an Anglo-Irish aristocrat and RAF pilot, with the intention of producing books "beautiful beyond all those yet produced." The press printed only 58 books, all in small editions. Other authors published included T E Lawrence (Carlow's close friend), James Joyce, Walter de la Mare, Wyndham Lewis and Stefan Zweig.

An appealing presentation copy between two of the First World War poets who survived the war.

Georges-Louis Leclerc, Comte de Buffon (1707-1788) was a French mathematician who was considered one of the leading naturalists of the Enlightenment. An acquaintance of Voltaire and other intellectuals, he worked as Keeper at the Jardin du Roi from 1739, and this inspired him to research and publish a vast encyclopaedia and survey of natural history, the ground-breaking *Histoire Naturelle*, which he published in forty-four volumes between 1749 and 1804.


The Natural History of Birds, first published between 1770 and 1783 and translated into English in 1793, contain Buffon's survey and descriptions of birds from the *Histoire Naturelle*. Based on recorded observations of birds both in France and in other countries, these volumes provide detailed descriptions of various bird species, their habitats and behaviours, and were the first publications to present a comprehensive account of eighteenth-century ornithology.

William Smellie (1740–1795) was a Scottish printer who edited the first edition of the *Encyclopaedia Britannica*. He was also a naturalist and antiquary. He was a joint founder of the Royal Society of Edinburgh, co-founder of the Society of Antiquaries of Scotland, and a friend of Robert Burns.




On *Time Magazine's* list of the 100 best English-language novels written since 1923; named by Modern Library and its readers as one of the 100 best English-language novels of the 20th century and a cornerstone of twentieth-century British fiction.

The basis for the 1971 movie of the same name directed by Stanley Kubrick with Malcolm McDowell, Patrick Magee, Michael Bates and Warren Clarke. The author thought the film was a masterpiece but resented having to defend the film on television and in print as it was not his own work. Burgess gave the movie a positive review for the *Listener* after the film went on general release in January 1972: "technically brilliant, thoughtful, relevant, poetic, mind-opening. It was possible for me to see the work as a radical remaking of my own novel, not as a mere interpretation, and this the feeling that it was no impertinence to blazon it as *Stanley Kubrick's Clockwork Orange* is the best tribute I can pay to the Kubrickian mastery"


Includes a new preface by Camus and his essays "Summer in Algiers", "The Minotaur, or The Stop in Oran", "Helen's Exile", "Return to Tipasa", and "The Artist and His Time".

Camus's absurdist treatise on the philosophical problem of suicide was first published as *Le Mythe de Sisyphe* in 1942. Addressing his English readers, Camus comments that, "written fifteen years ago, in 1940, amidst the French and European disaster, this book declares that even within the limits of nihilism it is possible to find the means to proceed beyond nihilism... This book is in a certain sense the most personal of those I have published in English". It acts as a non-fictional companion to his novel *L'Étranger* (1942).

The first issue of this paperback edition had been published a few months earlier in the same year.




Fiske notes on the recto of front blank fly-leaf of Vol. I: 'This fine copy comes from the library of C. J. Britton, the Nelson author and authority. It comprises a good copy formerly belonging to Edward Charles Fletcher (see his book-plate) and some leaves salvaged from a poor copy formerly belonging to Nelson's old 'Sea-Daddy', Capt. Wm. Locker. These leaves had brief annotations by Locker and were kept in the original full calf covered boards (no spine) which had Locker's gilt stamps on the front. When it became necessary to re-case Fletcher's volumes I had Locker's duplicate pages inserted and adding his gilt stamps in the form of a book-plate. The extra illustrations and letters which Britton had inserted have been retained. The loose ones have been collected and inserted by myself. RCF'.

Fiske is mistaken in believing that the duplicate leaves were from William Locker's copy (he had died in 1800). Rather they were from his son, Edward Hawke Locker's copy (see List of Orders Vol.1 p.9). A short note by C.J. Britton attests to this.

There are 2 duplicate leaves in volume 1 (pp. 15 and 303) and 6 duplicate leaves in volume 2 (pp. 55, 79, 83, 85, 257 and 453).

Also taken from the Locker copy and tipped into volume 1 is a contemporary (watermarked 1794) manuscript copy of the "A Few Remarks Relative to Myself in the Captain, in which my Pendant was Flying on the Most Glorious Valentine's Day, 1797". This original manuscript is noted in a letter from Nelson to Locker of Feb 21st 1797. The "Remarks" are reproduced on pp. 349-351 of Volume 1. Together with two sheets from Nelson's journal (apparently in the handwriting of a clerk)

The extra manuscript documents contained within this copy include:

- James Stanier Clarke (1766-1834), an A.L.S. circa 1809, three pages mounted on card 'I have got another name for the Nelson Life that has been omitted, like many others. The fault does not rest with me. And I send you the letter I have received. Pray take care that a copy, with proofs, is sent in the course of the day to Lord [?]'s [?] whose [?] lives at 35 Margaret Street Cav[endish] Square. Your Hon. Servant J.S. Clarke" (Loosely inserted Vol. 1 p. iv)

- George Rose (1744-1818), an A.L.S. dated July 5th 1796, three pages supporting an application by Lt. Gen Giles Stibbert (1743-1809);(Bound in Vol.1 p.102)

- Sir William Hamilton (1730-1803), an autograph letter headed 'Naples' and dated May 17th 1785, four pages but incomplete as final leaf excised at foot; (Bound in Vol.1 p.260)

- Admiral Edward Vernon (1684-1757), autograph letter signed dated 15th Sept 1708, two pages, Sept 17 Bishopmark, some browning, part losses and repairs; (Loose in Vol.2)

- General Thomas Graham, 1st Baron Lynedoch (1748-1843), A.L.S. headed 'Citadel of Messina' and dated 22nd June 1799 to Sir William Hamilton (1730-1803), three pages (Loose in Vol.2).

- James Stanier Clarke (1766-1834), another undated A.L.S., three pages listing various personages to whom proof prints and copies of the work are to be sent; (Loose in Vol.2)

- Rear-Admiral Sir John Lockhart Ross (1721-1790), an A.L.S. headed 'Royal George Spithead' and dated May 20th 1781, two pages '...we are returned after supplying the garrison of Gibraltar with plenty of provisions, the Spanish fleet of 30 sail of the line hearing'. (Loose in Vol.2)


- Richard Howe, 1st Earl Howe, (1726-1799), signed printed notice with added manuscript dated 9th October 1790 respecting the signal flag, white with blue cross. (Loose in Vol.2)

Captain William Locker (1731-1800) was a Royal Navy officer and correspondent of Horatio Nelson. In 1777 Locker commissioned the Lowestoft for the West Indies. A nineteen-year-old Nelson, then just promoted, was at the same time appointed one of the Lowestoft's lieutenants, and remained with Locker for about fifteen months. More than twenty years afterwards (1799) Nelson wrote to Locker: 'I have been your scholar; it is you who taught me to board a Frenchman by your conduct when in the Experiment; it is you who always told me 'Lay a Frenchman close and you will beat him;' and my only merit in my profession is being a good scholar. Our friendship will never end but with my life, but you have always been too partial to me'.



Mugby Junction is a set of short stories written in 1866 by Charles Dickens and collaborators Charles Collins, Amelia B. Edwards, Andrew Halliday, and Hesba Stretton. It was first published in a Christmas edition of the magazine *All the Year Round*. Dickens penned a majority of the issue, including the frame narrative in which "the Gentleman for Nowhere," who has spent his life cloistered in the firm Barbox Brothers & Co., makes use of his new-found


freedom in retirement to explore the rail lines that connect with Mugby Junction. Dickens's collaborators each contributed an individual story to the collection. *Mugby Junction* includes the famous ghost story *The Signal-Man*.

The novel *No Thoroughfare* was first published in 1867, in the Christmas number of Dickens's periodical *All the Year Round*. There are thematic parallels with other books from Dickens's mature writings, including *Little Dorrit* (1857) and especially *Our Mutual Friend* (1865).

A facsimile of the famous Columbus Spanish Letter, the first printed account of the New World, which Christopher Columbus wrote to King Ferdinand and Queen Isabella to inform them of his discovery of the Americas. The letter was soon printed after Columbus's return, this earliest version printed in Spanish in Barcelona in 1493. Only one copy of this version printed in Spanish is known. It was bought by London antiquarian bookseller Bernard Quaritch from a French dealer in 1890 and sold by him in 1892 to the Lenox Library in New York (now part of the New York Public Library). In 1891 Quaritch issued this facsimile of the letter under the supervision of Michael Kerney who was the chief cataloguer at Bernard Quaritch at the time and who was behind many of the firm's distinguished catalogues and productions. Kerney was responsible for an enduring contribution to scholarship, producing this first authoritative study of the Spanish Letter of Columbus document. A natural linguist with an extensive knowledge of books and early manuscripts he taught himself Arabic, Persian and other eastern tongues to add to his Greek, Latin and various modern European languages.

The Spanish Letter is, by common acclaim, the most valuable item of printed Americana ever to have appeared on the market.

Soon after the Columbus letter was published in Spanish in Barcelona, another version was published. This was translated into Latin and was published in Rome by Stephan Planck. In 1893 Bernard Quaritch also produced a facsimile of this letter, issued with a Preface, but without a translation, as "that work has already been done several times". The Quaritch Preface and facsimile of the Latin Letter was then reproduced as part of *The*

Columbus Memorial edited by George Young (Jordan Bros Philadelphia, 1893). A copy of this section of *The Columbus Memorial* (pp. 49-55 Preface and [8] facsimile) has been tipped into this copy of the Spanish Letter facsimile. The Latin letter is smaller in format.

Also loosely inserted is a 9 page manuscript copy reproducing parts of the Critical Notes made by Julia Rae for an 1889 facsimile edition of *The Spanish Letter*. This facsimile was made from a letter that turned out to be a forgery. The notes do, however, provide more background research on the publication history of Columbus's letter.



Elsie de Wolfe (1859-1950) was an actress and socialite and the first prominent women interior designer. Her collaborations with Anne Morgan, Anne Vanderbilt and the Frick sisters dragged the fashionable interiors of New York out of the Victorian era and opened up a new field of employment for women. "Her success as a career woman led the way for the acceptance of American women in the professional world." (ANB)

She lived openly with the pioneering theatrical agent and producer Elisabeth Marbury for 27 years. Marbury's clients ranged from the French Academy of Letters to playwrights Oscar Wilde and George Bernard Shaw; to the dance team of Vernon and Irene Castle. Her 1923 autobiography *My Crystal Ball; Reminiscences* includes a chapter *The Last Days of Oscar Wilde*.

In 1938, at the time of the inscription, De Wolfe styling herself as Lady Elsie Mendl (as she was through her marriage of convenience to an eccentric British diplomat), was living with Marbury at their home in Versailles throwing extravagant parties as the Nazis marched closer. The inscription reads "To [a] great woman from a new friend, Elsie Mendl. Versailles June 6th 1938." A pencil note underneath identifies the 'great woman' as Gertrude Stein. There are photos and known details of a luncheon hosted by De Wolfe and Marbury in honour of Gertrude Stein and Alice Toklas in May 1938.

The story is continued on the facing endpaper where a pencil annotation in French notes that this was one of a number of books from Gertude Stein's wartime residence in Burgey which she gave to Nicole Llewellyn Picot in August 1941. (The note is written in the third person but signed with Nicole's "N".) The books were given to help Nicole learn English and there are indeed numerous instances of French words being pencilled above the English throughout the book.

In April 1943 Nicole divorced M. Picot and in July 1943 married Bernard de Vesian and as Nicole de Vesian she went on to have a brilliant career as a fashion designer, notably for Hermes scarves, and later as a garden designer.

The story does not end there, however: It appears that as a lieutenant in the French army Bernard was captured whilst he had this book in his possession as it also contains the censor's ink stamps from Oflag II D, a POW camp in northeast Poland, as well as his name pencilled above "Bl. IV BC" perhaps indicating that he was held in block four. Somehow the book made it back to Nicole as the book was gifted one last time "To a great boy with love and admiration, Nicole." This final inscription, which plays on the first inscription to Stein, has been dated in a different, green pen, "1988."


Nicole died in 1996. Her garden "La Louvre" in Provence is still visited and admired.

The inscription is embellished with Fermor's usual cloud and flying bird ornaments. With Natasha and Stephen Spender's bookplate designed by John Craxton loosely inserted.

Natasha Spender (1919-2010) was a concert pianist, academic, and the wife of the poet Stephen Spender. She made history in 1947, performing Beethoven's Piano Concerto No. 2 in B-flat at the Last Night of the Proms—the first concert in the world to be televised.

This third issue of the Gennadius Library's magazine *The New Griffon* is dedicated in toto to George Katsimbalis. In addition to Fermor's contribution there are, inter alia, articles on the correspondence between George Sefaris and George Katsimbalis, a poem by Scottish poet Brian Johnstone, and an essay on Edward Lear "The landscape painter of Greece". The essays are printed in Greek, English with some also in French.

The Gennadius Library opened in 1926 with the 26,000 volume collection of diplomat and bibliophile Joannes Gennadius. The Library houses today 145,000 titles of rare books and bindings, research materials, manuscripts, archives, and works of art that illuminate Hellenism, Greece, and neighbouring civilizations from antiquity to modern times. Rare maps of the Mediterranean, early editions of Homer's *Iliad* and *Odyssey* and a laurel wreath belonging to Lord Byron are just some of the unique items to be found here. The library also has the original manuscript of this essay by Fermor.






“It was The Nonesuch Press of London which originated the idea for The Ten Great French Romances. Nonesuch approached André Maurois in Paris, in the year 1939, and asked him to gather a Committee of France’s ten leading men-of-letters who would select what seemed to them the ten greatest romances in the whole of France’s literature.

This they did. The titles? The Princess of Cleves; The Charterhouse of Parma; Mademoiselle de Maupin; Candide; Dangerous Acquaintances; Madame Bovary; Old Goriot; A Woman's Life; Germinal; The Gods are Athirst.

The ten great men-of-letters were asked to write the introductions for the books, each to select his favourite.

Then a Committee of English writers who know their French was asked to select the best translations-into-English. James Laver, A.S.B.Glover, Jacques Le Clercq formed this Committee.

These books are of course being distributed in London by The Nonesuch Press. But, while *Candide* and *Dangerous Acquaintances* were the first two books and were completely produced in France, the remaining volumes are now being produced in America. *Candide* was distributed to the members of The Heritage Club in April 1940; and *Dangerous Acquaintances* was distributed to the members of the Club in May of 1941. It was the enthusiasm of the members of this Club, for both of these books, which caused us on this side of the water to make the suggestion to The Nonesuch Press, that the remaining books in this Series be printed on this side of the water." This quadruple issue also contains several other pieces by Marinetti himself (including “Hors du possible noir en plein azur absurde! (Chant futuriste)” (pp.66-69) and “La Morte prese il volante. (Visione futurista d'una corsa d'automobili)” (pp.70-71)), as well as numerous pieces of Futurist poetry, with contributions by Paolo Buzzi, Federico De Maria, Corrado Govoni, Robert Scheffer, Libero Altomare (“Canti futuristi”), Fred G. Bowles, Georges Perin, Henry Bataille, and others, in addition to a European press review section pp.12-34 concerning reactions to the new movement.





Grahame's tales of the riverbank started life as bedtime stories that he read to his son. *The Wind in the Willows*, is however a far more interesting book than its popular and often juvenile audience might suggest. First, it is the work of a writer who had known considerable success in the 1890s as a young contemporary of Oscar Wilde and also an admired contributor to the literary quarterly *The Yellow Book*. At that point, Grahame was employed by the Bank of England but, still in his 20s, was publishing stories in literary magazines, work that became collected in *Dream Days* (1895) and an even more successful publication, *The Golden Age* (1898). The text of *The Wind in the Willows* also encrypts a family tragedy. In 1899, Grahame married and had one child, a boy named Alastair who was troubled with health problems and a difficult personality, culminating in the boy's eventual suicide, the cause of much parental anguish. When Grahame finally retired from the Bank of England (as Secretary) in 1908, he could concentrate on the stories he had been telling his son, the stories of the Thames riverbank on which Grahame himself had grown up." (Robert McCrum).

C.S. Lewis and his fellow inkling J.R.R. Tolkien were both devotees of *The Wind in the Willows*. Tolkien writing appreciatively about "this excellent book" in his essay on fairy-stories.





One of the most interesting portions of *Old Diplomacy* are Hardinge's reminiscences of his posting to Persia from 1896-1898. Tehran at the time was considered a backwater and his chapter offers a valuable description of Persia at the time.


My Indian Years covers the most important years of Hardinge's career as a diplomat, with his appointment as Viceroy of India in 1910. One of his first tasks as Viceroy was to implement the Morley-Minto reforms and deal

with the consequences of Curzon's Partition of Bengal. The book also covers the Durbar and the notorious Delhi conspiracy case where Hardinge was nearly killed.

The theatre director Hugh Hunt [1911-1993] worked extensively at the Abbey Theatre, Dublin and the Theatre Royal, Bristol, before becoming Artistic Director of the Old Vic company in London in 1951. In 1961 he was made the first Professor of Drama at Manchester University and oversaw the building of its theatre, which became the home of the professional Contact Theatre Company.

John Masefield, then poet laureate, had recommended him to W. B. Yeats to help the Abbey Theatre compete with the popular Gate Theatre. Employed from 19 August 1935, he directed twenty-two new Irish plays in a three-year period. He enjoyed success with 'Boyd's shop' (1936) by St John Ervine in January 1936, but offended Yeats the same month with his decision not to stage Shakespeare's 'Coriolanus' in coloured shirts suggestive of a fascist organisation. Yeats forbade him

to stage classic plays of the literary revival after his productions (July, Aug. 1936) of 'Playboy of the western world' (1907) and 'Deirdre' (1906).


In 1932 Hunt was a 21 year old undergraduate at Magdalen College, Oxford. That year George Devine, the President of the Oxford University Dramatic Society (OUDS), invited John Gielgud to direct an OUDS production of Romeo and Juliet. The cast of male undergraduates -- among them Terence Rattigan, James Lees-Milne and Hunt himself (as the Friar) -- were supplemented by two female guest stars: Peggy Ashcroft as Juliet, and Edith Evans as the Nurse. The show was the first Gielgud ever directed; three years later he directed a landmark production of the play, again starring Peggy Ashcroft, at the New Theatre, London (now the Noel Coward Theatre).

The Russian director and designer Theodore Komisarjevsky [1882-1954] had a deep and lifelong influence on Gielgud's work, particularly in his playing and producing of Chekhov and Shakespeare. In 1926 had Gielgud played Tusenbach in Komisarjevsky's production of The Three Sisters to great public and critical acclaim, and in his memoir Stage Directions (Heinemann, 1963), Gielgud writes that Komisarjevsky 'influenced me greatly, teaching me not to act from outside, seizing on obvious effects and histrionics; to avoid the temptations of showing off; to work from within to present a character, and to absorb the atmosphere and general background of a play. These were things I had never thought important before.' Komisarjevsky's book -- part memoir, part manifesto -- is a significant gift for Gielgud to have made to Hugh Hunt, his young company member. Ninety years on, it links three names which were highly influential in the development of twentieth century Shakespearean performance.

A fascinating Isle of Man cookery book, sponsored and paid for by Thomas Crellin of Oakland California. Crellin was secretary of the Morgan oyster company and prominent in San Francisco and Oakland business circles. He was shot by a revolver owned by E. M. McMillan, deputy and fish commissioner in 1909 when the Fish Commissioner's pistol exploded. The Crellin family had moved from the Isle of Man to Oakland.

Sophia Morrison, the editor, whose mother was Louise Crellin, was a Manx cultural activist, folklore collector and author. Through her own work and role in encouraging and enthusing others, she is considered to be one of the key figures of the Manx cultural revival. She is best remembered today for writing *Manx Fairy Tales*, published in 1911, although her greatest influence was as an activist for the revitalisation of Manx culture, particularly through her work with the Manx Language Society and its journal, *Mannin*, which she edited from 1913 until her death.

The 243 page book is printed on thick paper and has advertisements at front and rear, including one for Robertson's Golden Shred marmalade.

The selection of recipes includes on pp. 172 - 203 Manx recipes written in Manx and English, followed by Irish and Other Recipes (pp. 204 - 222), and South African Dishes (pp. 223 - 225), Ancient Recipes and Household Hints. The specifically Manx recipes include Broit Skeddan (Herring broth), Carroo Fuinnt (Baked Carp), Prinjeig (Haggis) and Feeyn Berrish Tramman (Elderberry Wine)

The Peel Parish Church, now the Island's Cathedral, had its tower and the spire taken down in 1907 due to foundation problems.

The Satanic Verses was Rushdie's fourth novel, and caused huge controversy when it was initially released due to its depiction of the prophet Muhammad. The title refers to the satanic verses, a group of Quranic verses that refer to three Pagan Meccan goddesses: Allāt, Uzza, and Manāt. The novel employs elements of magic realism interspersed with a sequence of subplots that take the form of intricate dream narratives relayed by the protagonist. American theorist Timothy Brennan would later praise The Satanic Verses as, "the most ambitious novel yet published to deal with the immigrant experience in Britain".

The scandal that ensued surrounding creative censorship was extremely divisive. A year after publication Ruhollah Khomeini, Supreme Leader of Iran, issued a fatwa ordering Muslims to kill Rushdie for blaspheming against Islam. A fatwa cannot be revoked in the Shia Islamic tradition. Pakistan banned the book in 1988 and the importing of the book was forbidden in India. Many translators of *The Satanic Verses* have suffered serious injury and, in the case of Rushdie's Japanese translator, death. In fact, in 2022, Rushdie was himself attacked on stage whilst talking at an event. Subsequent to this stabbing, he lost sight in one eye and the ability to use one hand. Remarking on the extreme controversy surrounding The Satantic Verses, scholar M.D. Fletcher considered

the irony, "that some of the major expressions of hostility toward Rushdie came from those about whom and (in some sense) for whom he wrote."


Speaking of his own work, Rushdie has defined his intentions as being, not about Islam at all, but rather a novel concerned with issues as varied as; "migration, metamorphosis, divided selves, love, death, London and Bombay". The complex controversy surrounding *The Satanic Verses* continues to impact. It is an influential novel which explores, amongst many other subjects, the disillusionment suffered by characters in between identification with competing cultures. It is a novel which, through unusual surreal depiction, highlights identity crises whilst binding its text in powerful parallel stories with roots in diverse religious history.

Christian apologetics, satirising infidelity and championing the blessings of the Lord and the desire of salvation. Original published separately, each of the nights achieved immense success, the first five soon requiring multiple editions. Young was given to refining and extending the work, making the rhetoric increasingly dramatic, long after demand began to wane. In excess of 100 collected editions of the *Night-Thoughts* were published over the subsequent five decades, with translations into a majority of European languages. The work remained influential well into the 1800s, being studied by Coleridge and Wordsworth, and inspiring a series of illustrations by Blake.





Albert Schweitzer (1875-1965) was an Alsatian polymath, humanitarian, and Nobel Peace Prize winner. He earned multiple degrees during his lifetime in the fields of music, philosophy, theology, and as a medical doctor. Despite being a Lutheran minister, Schweitzer fought to join the call of The Society of the Evangelist Missions of Paris, eventually opening a hospital in Lambaréné, then a French colony (now Gabon), in 1913. Towards the end of the First World War, Schweitzer and his wife were returned to France by the French military, prompting Schweitzer to pursue his French citizenship by having his parents' status reinstated. He returned to Lambaréné in 1924 to rebuild his hospital, by then in a state of disrepair. Schweitzer spent much of the rest of his life dedicated to the hospital at Lambaréné, though he considered his contributions to the ethical philosophy his greatest achievement. 'Ethics is nothing other than Reverence for Life. Reverence for Life affords me my fundamental principle of morality, namely, that good consists in maintaining, assisting and enhancing life, and to destroy, to harm or to hinder life is evil'.


The most inspiring voyage of the Heroic period of Antarctic exploration, Shackleton's party had hoped to cross the continent via the South Pole. They ran into problems from the outset which culminated in their being trapped and then crushed in the ice. Not only did the party endure months in the ice, but also an open boat voyage to safety. Shackleton's incredible leadership ensured the crew survived.

Due to paper shortages at the end of the First World War, the first impression was printed on inferior paper stock which invariably brown with age. This second impression on better paper was produced the following month.







The first edition of Robert Southey's account of Pedro de Orsúa's 1560 expedition down the Amazon River in search of the mythical golden Kingdom of El Dorado and Omagua, and of Lope de Aguirre's (1510-1561) subsequent mutiny. Based upon an extended article which originally appeared in the *Edinburgh Annual Register*, the work was originally intended to form a chapter in Southey's *History of Brazil*, but the author subsequently decided it formed too much of a diversion and so issued it as a separate publication.

A pleasing association copy in its original binding, owned by the prominent judge and literary enthusiast John Taylor Coleridge (1790 - 1876), nephew of fellow Romantic Poet and Southey's sometime literary collaborator, Samuel Taylor Coleridge.

John Taylor Coleridge and Robert Southey had met in 1811 through his uncle Samuel Taylor Coleridge. In a letter to his wife Southey wrote that John Coleridge was "a man perfectly unassuming, and of very prepossessing manners and promising abilities."

Coleridge's close friendship with Southey lasted a life-time, and Southey's patronage in the London periodical world had considerable bearing in John becoming first a contributor and then a (short lived) editor of the *Quarterly Review*.






The book was published by the Sunday Referee, which was a Sunday newspaper that had launched their 'Poets Corner' feature in 1933. On September 3rd 1933 Dylan's "That Sanity Be Kept" was published and the editor described it as 'the best modernist poem as yet I have received.' On October 29th 1933 they also published Dylan's "The Force That Through The Green Fuse Drives the Flower" and called it 'cosmic in outlook.... a large poem, greatly expressed. Dylan became a staple poet of the Referee in 1934 with a further five poems published.

It was then decided that the young poet from Wales would receive a poetry award and have a collection sponsored by the newspaper. He chose thirteen poems from his notebook and then he wrote five more in the months that followed. The Referee had difficulty finding a commercial publisher however, but eventually connected with David Archer of the Parton Bookshop who occasionally printed books. David Archer had a desire to help young poets succeed. It was finally published on 18th December 18, 1934 as a joint effort, with The Sunday Referee periodical and the Parton Bookshop, sharing the printing costs. Only 250 copies were bound at the time of publication.





The two men clearly sailed in similar circles. In the letters Villiers refers to various mutual acquaintances, Jan Junker, Frank Villiers, Gunnar Boman Captain of the barque Moshulu on which Sowerby had worked.

“Wavell became Commander-in-Chief in India in July 1941. Initially his command covered India and Iraq so that within a month of taking charge he launched Iraqforce to invade Persia in co-operation with the Russians in order to secure the oilfields and the lines of communication to the Soviet Union. Following the Japanese declaration of war in December 1941, he was made Commander-in-Chief of American-British-Dutch-Australian Command (ABDACOM), responsible for the defence of India, Burma, Malaya, the Dutch East Indies and the Philippines.

Again finding himself vastly outnumbered and under-resourced, he was unable to prevent Malaya and Singapore falling into Japanese hands in 1942.

Following the dissolution of ABDACOM, Wavell returned to India as commander-in-chief. His most urgent task was the defence of Burma, where the British position quickly deteriorated.

As the Japanese pushed northwards, the surviving Allied troops carried out a fighting retreat to India across 1,000 miles (1,600km) of difficult terrain. One of Wavell's most important acts at this time was bringing General William Slim from the Middle East to assist with the retreat.

In order to wrest the initiative from the Japanese, Wavell ordered the Eastern Army in India to attack the Arakan in September 1942. But after initial success, the Japanese counter-attacked. By March 1943, the British position was untenable and the force was withdrawn.

Wavell also sanctioned the Chindits. Their attacks behind the lines in Burma raised morale and demonstrated that British soldiers could live and fight in the jungle.


In September 1943, Wavell was appointed Governor General and Viceroy in India, effectively ending his military command duties.

In this role, he tried to alleviate the Bengal famine of 1943 by ordering the Army to distribute relief supplies. He also helped control the communal tension and civic strife that later exploded during the Partition of India.”

I am to say that you will be able to read all about the new Resident in it.”

The “new Resident” refers to Vincent Glenday, a British colonial administrator. He was the Governor of Somaliland Protectorate from 1939 until the Italian occupation and British Resident in Zanzibar from 1946 to 1951.

Eric Dutton was a British veteran, civil servant, and writer. He passed the Indian Civil Service examination in 1920 and in the same year was appointed as private secretary to Sir Robert Coryndon, Governor of Uganda and subsequently of Kenya. Dutton worked with Coryndon until 1925 at which point he became private secretary to Lieutenant Colonel Sir Edward Grigg, Governor of Kenya (1925-1930).

In 1942 he transferred to Zanzibar where he was chief secretary (1942-1952), chairman of the Town Planning Board (1943-1952), and chairman of the Central Development Authority (1946-1952).

Lilibullero or The Golden Road is Dutton’s reminiscences of the Northern Frontier District of Kenya in the first half of the twentieth century. Vincent Glenday features strongly (hence the reference to the “New Resident” in the tipped in letter). Also featured is Arthur “Tich” Miles. Miles arrived in Kenya in 1909 at the age of nineteen, where he made a name for himself as a soldier, entrepreneur, administrator, and raconteur, dying in 1934 at the age of 45.






Lady Egerton (1800-1866) and her husband, the politician and poet Francis Egerton, 1st Earl of Ellesmere (1800-1857), visited the Holy Land during their travels on their yacht around the Mediterranean in the winter and spring of 1839 to 1840, and 'her journal followed the course she took with her husband, starting at Rome, and finishing on the way home from Rome. Having landed at Jaffa, Lady Egerton went to Jerusalem, Bethlehem and Jericho before visiting the Dead Sea, and returning to Jerusalem. She travelled on to Beirut, taking in a range of sites on the way, before making an excursion to Baalbec. Her way back to Italy was by way of Rhodes, Smyrna and Athens. In 1947 Taylour enrolled at Trinity College, Cambridge. A keen archaeologist since his time at Harrow, he devoted himself to the study of Mycenaean pottery, the subject of his doctoral thesis published in 1958. He studied under Grahame Clark and Glyn Daniel. From 1949 onwards, he took part in numerous excavations in Greece, in particular at Mycenae with Alan Wace, and at Pylos with Carl Blegen.


After Wace's death in 1957, Lord William Taylour became director of the British School at Athens excavations at Mycenae, working jointly with Ioánnis Papadimitriou and George Mylonas of the Archaeological Society of Athens. Their work led to an in-depth knowledge of the citadel of Mycenae and the development of the complex of buildings that he described as the cult centre. His 1964


