

#### 1. POE, Edgar Allan, Edgar Allan Poe Poetry and Tales, Limited Edition, Suntup Press, 2023.

A unique set that includes the original Oil Painting commissioned for the dust jacket art. A must for any Poe collector.

Poe was best known for his poetry and short stories and who invented the detective story. This edition from Suntup Press includes the complete works by the author, including his macabre short stories, poetry, his only play and complete novel as well as his unfinished second novel. The work was edited by Patrick F. Quinn and first published in 1984, great care was taken to select the authoritative text for each work.


Suntup released 2 editions, the Artist (750 copies), Numbered (310 copies) and Lettered (26 copies). Each edition features 10 black and white illustrations by Kelley Hensing as well as a new exclusive introduction by Michael J. Deas. Dust Jacket art by Frans Smit.

This listing includes a copy of the Artist edition, which was additionally remarqued by Frans Smit, signed on dust jacket as well as the laid in bookmark.






#### LE FANU, Joseph Thomas Sheridan. The Chronicle of Golden Friars. London: Richard Bentley and Son, 1871 First editions

M. R. James (his copy.) volumes 1 and 2 from the library of M. R. James, with his ownership inscription "M. R. James, The Lodge, Eton College, 1927" to the first blank of each volume, and with a couple of his page references in pencil to volume 1, p. 155 and p. 272 (each referencing the other). James described Le Fanu, a prolific Irish horror writer, as "absolutely in the first rank as a writer of ghost stories" (Sullivan, p. 235). Provenance: from the library of Lord David Cecil, whose uncle was Lord Hugh Cecil, successor to M. R. James as provost of Eton. 3 volumes, octavo (184 x 118 mm). Sympathetically rebound to style in blue half calf, red morocco labels, compartments decorated in blind with a wave-like scroll between raised bands with gilt rolls, marbled sides. 














#### 3. ZELAZNY, Roger. The Doors of His Face, the Lamps of His Mouth and Other Stories. New

A beautiful copy of Zelazny's second collection of stories, includes many of the stories that made Zelazny famous, including the Nebula Award winning short story "Doors in his Face", but also includes the celebrated "A Rose for Ecclesiates".

A near fine book, bright navy boards, tight binding seems unread. Few stains on the fore-edge. "With Compliments Doubleday" stamped on the front endpaper. Inscribed on the dedication page; "For Joe - Good fishing. Don; t let the big one get away. Roger Zelazny".

## 4. FRENCH, Paul (Aka Isaac Asimov), Lucky Starr Set. Garden City: Doubleday &

Company.

Written under the pseudonym Paul French. The first 4 titles are all inscribed and signed by Asimov to Stephen Landan, with the final two novels signed via stickers / bookplate. These books are rare on the market with several having no copies available with dust jacket (signed or unsigned). Signed copies are particularly rare and I have found no history of a complete set being available for sale.

An exceptional set and I believe each copy individually just about the best copy available at time of listing.

David Starr Space Ranger

David Starr is NF book in green boards, peach topstain and some normal toning internally, but otherwise fine. Inscribed on title page. NF unclipped DJ showing some toning to white pages very minor edgewear and now in brodart jacket.

Lucky Starr and the Pirates of the Asteroids

Lucky Starr and the Pirates, VG+ book, general wear and fading to boards. Blue topstain with possible dampstain, internally in fine condition but with toning on endpapers. Inscribed on title page, VG DJ, showing dampstain along spine, visible inside and on edge and bottom of the back panel and backflap, Unclipped with some edgewear and small closed tear on the bottom back. Now with brodart cover. Lucky Starr and the Oceans of Venus

Oceans of Venus about NF, minor wear to the boards, crips black lettering on spine. Internally fine and inscribed on the title page. VG+ DJ, showing some chipping mostly on top and bottom of spine, unclipped and now with brodart jacket.

Lucky Starr and the Big Sun of Mercury

Big Sun of Mercury, NF or better book. Crisp boards and lettering, some toning to end papers and old dogear fold visible on page 45. Inscribed by Asimov on front endpaper. VG+ unclipped jacket, some minor edgewear and chipping. Small closed tear and fold on back panel, ow with brodart jacket.

Lucky Starr and the Moons of Jupiter



# An extremely rare first edition set



#### ANGUS, John. The Homecoming - a Tale of Two Ages. London: Hutchinson, 1935.

An exceptional copy of this first edition in the rare dust jacket. Book is about near fine or better, front top corner bumped, browning of the ffep, but otherwise remarkable clean internally, and some dust staining to the top edge. Square with lettering on spine and front board in green.

DJ for this title is rare and this is an exceptional example of the DJ. Showing virtually no browning or toning, unclipped and small 7mm closed tear at the top of the spine. It will be hard to find a better example.

This is the second of Angus's Fantasy novels following on "The Sheltering Pine" in 1934. Hutchinson had a peculiar way of promoting both books, seemingly to be quite disparaging of fantasy novels, while praising Angus's attempt at Fantasy.

Quote from DJ; "It is customary in this modern age to deride fantasy, to ridicule the faerie element in life and to concentrate on what are known as "hard facts". When John Angus published The Sheltering Pine and courageously told his strange story of the deathless "Little Folk" of Celtic legend, few expected for it the success it finally achieved. Now, in his second novel, Mr. Angus, with the same brilliance of imagination, in the same quiet style so well suited to the mysticism of his subject, tells a story in which the past and present are inextricable involved, and of a warlock who cheated death five hundred years ago, played havoc down the centuries, and met his final defeat in out present century." The homecoming is even more steeped in Scottish history than its predecessor, taking place in fifteenth-century Scotland. Noted in Locke 1/21, Reginald 1/15 and Bleiler 1978 p.5.

### LE FANU, Joseph Thomas Sheridan. The Rose and the Key. London: Chapman & Hall,

Ltd., 1871

An extremely rare first edition set of Le Fanu's Victorian Sensational Novel (one of the few works without supernatural elements). Originally serialized in Charles Dicken's "All Year Round" in 1871, this is the first hardcover edition, consisting of three volumes.


The book is set in England rather than Ireland to boost sales. The herione, Maud is deceived into entering a lunatic asylum. It has all the components for a thrilling Gothic mystery: A beautiful young herione, a cruel unfeeling mother, a one-eyed spy, a mesmerist and a lunatic asylum.

All three volumes with contemporary 1/4 leather binding, showing some minor edges around the corners, in particular at the top of the spine of Vol 1. Minor Foxing early / late in books but generally in fine condition internally.

Ex-libris for Henry Whitehead in the front of each volume (quite possibly the American horror and fantasy author 1882-1932). One of the more difficult works by Le Fanu to acquire, showing only one auction appearance in 1964.
















### STEVENSON, Robert Louis. Strange Case of Dr Jekyll and Mr Hyde. London: Longmans,

Green and Company, 1886.

The first English edition, first issue in wrappers, with the year at the bottom corrected from 1885 to 1886. (viii), 141, (3) pp; including half title and one page of ads at the rear.

Publisher's stuff tan wrappers, printed in blue and red, small contemporary bookseller's sticker at bottom. Wrappers slightly worn, spine worn but sound, all edges trimmed. Front wrapper and first several leaves slightly creased, kept in a cloth folding case.

Originally intended for a December 1885 release, but held back to not get lost in the Christmas numbers and eventually released on the 9th January 1886, preceded by the Charles Scribner's first US edition by 4 days. A well preserved first English edition in wrappers.

All 5 prints are number #18 of 50 copies and signed by Fritz Eichenberg in Pencil.



Heroic Heretic Erotics" by William Platt and "The Devil's Debt" by James Platt.

A rare collection of ghost stories including the very rare dust jacket, which is almost never seen.


Book is in remarkable condition, clean boards, some toning on endpapers from glue and internally clean, Fine.

#### ATWOOD, Margaret. The Handmaid's Tale. London: Jonathan Cape, 1986. Uncorrected Proof.

The UK proof copy of Atwood's well known futuristic dystopian novel, the basis for the TV series that debut in 2017.

A tale of powerless women in a patriarchal society. The novel won the Governor General's Award in 1985 and the first Arthur C. Clarke Award in 1987. It was also nominated for the 1986 Nebula and Booker Prize and the 1987 Prometheus Award.

This copy with an early trial jacket (a modernist woman in red clutching a handbag), which was changed entirely for the eventual publication, reportedly due to objections from the author (David Rees 6/97 - Quill and Brush Author Guides).

About a VC+ proof in red wrappers with the trial jacket about VC showing lots of edgewear and minor chipping, now with brodart for protection.


A hard to find copy of the Sponsor's Edition, limited to 26 lettered copies, this being Copy K.

Limited edition print of Yellow Arum Lily #11 of 26 after the limitation page. Bound in full green leather (the collector's edition of 100 copies was bound in 1/4 leather). 116 colour plates, 8 colour photographs with a grey-clothed slipcase with a plate-sunked illustration.

A fine copy in a fine slipcase, very unusual to find on the market. Edited by Marion Arnold and authors John Rourke, Dee Snijman, John Manning & Peter Goldblatt.

Editor's note. "Remarkable images of plants created by the most talented of botanical artists, are housed in store rooms of botanical institutes and museums. Yet the oil paintings, etchings and watercolours of "fine' artist - depicting the same plants - are located in art galleries. Why are plant portraits classified differently, and kept apart? Is plant imagery to do with science, or with art? Do the two "kinds" of art ever meet? This unique and ground-breaking book metaphorically "peels back the petals' to explore southern African plant portraiture and discovers the meanings ascribed to the genres of "botanical art" and 'flower painting'. Well known for their particular contributions to botany, art, and art history, authors Marion Arnold, Peter Goldblatt, John Manning, John Rourke and Dee Snijman examine plant portraiture in southern Africa over several centuries. They provide engrossing and sometimes revelations on a broad spectrum of issues, including species "discovery", insect pollination, biological classification, specimen collection, plant naming, portraiture, and the manner and style of artistic representation. The texts are enhanced and liberally illustrated by works of some of the countless travelers, botanists an artists who have so passionately and meticulously recorded South Africa's rich floral heritage."


#### GREENE, Graham. The Name of Action. London: Heinemann, 1930. 1st Edition, 1st Printing

Greene's 2nd book in the rare first state DJ. The book was badly received by critics, selling poorly. Greene repudiated the book along with his 3rd Novel (Rumour at Nightfall) and it has been out of print since, being the only UK edition.

Greene was quoted saying; "I was trying to write my first political novel, knowing nothing of politics". Supposedly only 2000 copies sold.

First state jacket with the 7/6 price and review for The Man Within on the back. About a near fine book, square with bright navy boards and clear gold lettering on hthespine. Some foxing on edges and internally some foxing on first few and last few pages. Includes the scarce first state jacket. Browning of the spine, some chipping in particular top and bottom of spine and jacket folds. Bottom of spine has some vertical loses. Now with a brodart jacket. #### ANGELOU, Maya. Music, Deep Rivers in My Soul. New York: The Limited Editions Club, 2003.

A unique publication for The Limited Editions Club, with this also being the first edition, written specifically for the members of LEC.

Dean Mitchell provides 3 color etchings for the book. Wynton Marsalis brings a 3rd dimension, who composed a 30min interpretation of Angelou's as a celebration of Jazz.

A CD of the composition, which includes Maya Angelou reading her poem is included in a special compartment of the case.

The book was very well received by critics, Michael Kimmelman from the New York Times, dedicated almost the entire front page of the April 26th 2002 edition to Mitchell's art.

Book comes in one volume 23 x 20 inches, with a CD by Wynton Marsalis and Maya Angelou. This copy being #249 of 400, signed by Angelou, Mitchell and Marsalis. Slipcase in NF condition, with a small mark on the front cover.

#### HUGHES, Langston. Sunrise is Coming after While. New York: The Limited Editions Club, 1998

One of the later Livre d'Artiste editions of the club, with a specific focus on African American art, authors and poets.

Elephant Folio, 54pp housed in rough purple cloth clamshell case with a gilt stamped black leather cover label. Poems for this edition was selected by Maya Angelou, with several LEC Livre d'Artiste edition of her own work as well.

The book is illustrated by 6 silkscreen prints by Phoebe Beasley, who has twice been awarded the coveted Presidential Seal for her work. Her works avers a deep desire to express "the love and humor that comes from Black family life". Her work therefore captures the spirit of Langston Hughes's poetry perfectly.

Langston Hughes is also perfectly described by his biographer; "To many readers of African descent he is their poet laureate, the beloved author of poems steeped in the richness of African-American culture. To many readers who love verse and are also committed to the ideal of social and political justice, he is among the most eloquent of American poets. For still other admirers he is, above all, the author of poems of often touching lyric beauty beyond issues such as race and justice".

Clamshell box is in NF condition, with only slight wear to the corners. The book is as new with the original Monthly Letter 585 laid in, along with an invoice from The Limited Editions Club. This being #262 of 300.

The 11th book from the 5th Series and 59th publication by the LEC. This copy being #1253 of 1500 copies. Illustrated & signed by Valenti Angelo and book design by George Macy.

Printed by The Printing House of William Edwin Rudge and set in linotype Cloister on Arak paper. Bound by H. Wolff in half natural cowhide with printed paper sides designed by Angelo.

A Near Fine set in exceptional condition for this publication. Slightly differently aged spines, internally in fine condition. Kept in the original slipcases, about VG, with splitting and general wear. This set is rarely found in this condition.

#### RIMBAUD, Arthur. Vowels. New York: The Limited Editions Club, 1996

One volume (15 ¼ x 12 3/4). The book is illustrated with three watercolor woodblock prints by Henri Cartier-Bresson. Each print required between 23 - 30 woodblocks, one for each color used in the prints.

The book is signed by Cartier-Bresson, with this copy being #103 of 300. The beautiful textured paper was hand-made in Japan and the book was hand-bound in the same natural linen used for the box. Arthur Rimbaud was a forerunner of the surrealist and wrote all of his extant poems before the age of twenty, incl 'Sonnet des Voyelles' - Vowels, contained in this book. The English translation by Wallace Fowlie.

A very collectable copy with the original monthly letter laid in (#578) as well as the original LEC invoice at \$3000. The clamshell case in NF or better condition and the book as new.

Printed at the Wild Carrot Letterpress and Heritage Printers. Text set in monotype Scotch by Dan Carr & Julia Ferrarie at Golgonooza Letter Foundry. Book design by Benjamin Shiff. The photogravure plates were made by Jon Goodman, and editioned by Bruce Chandler, Peter Pettengill, Catherine Mosely and Greta Lintvedt.

#### PASTERNAK, Boris. My Sister Life. New York: The Limited Editions Club, 1990.

My Sister Life was written in the summer before the 1917 October Revolution, it was very well received and established him as a genius of Russian poetry. The English translation was done by Mark Rudman.

The acclaimed Russian born artist, Yuro Kuyper provides 6 etchings for the publication, printed on Hannemule paper in Paris. The paper used for the text was hand-made by H. M. P. Mill in Connecticut to resemble the sort of stock produced in 1920's Russia, even incorporating bits of Russian newspapers with rags and cotton pulp.

The book is in near fine condition, with the only defect being some sunning to the spine. The slipcase in VG or better, showing some sunning. The book is signed by Yuri Kuyper and this copy is #212 of 250. The original LEC invoice for \$4000 laid in.

#### SENGHOR, Leopold Sedar. Poems. New York: The Limited Editions Club, 1996.

Large Folio (17 ¼ x 22 ¼) bound by hand in full purple linen by Carol Joyce of the Academy Bindery, Four poems in the original French and the English translation printed in letterpress on textured Arches paper and printed by The Wild Carrot Press.

The book includes 5 silkscreen prints from Lois Mailou Jones, one of America's most celebrated Black artist. Four of Senghor poems appears in this edition. Leopold Senghar became the first Black member ever induced into the French Academy. In 1960 he was elected the first president of Senegal and re-elected four times, As a poet, he represented the literary and artistic expression of the Black African experience.

This volume is #171 of 300 and signed by both Senghar and Jones. The slipcase is NF or better with a Fine book.

The lihtographs were printed at Pondside Press by Melissa and Ted Braggins. The paper used for this edition is mould-made Rives Buff Text and the paper for the lithographs is Rives Buff Cover. Bound in Leather by Jovonis Bindery with the original slipcase.

The book is about NF, few marks on the leather. Slight fading to the spine and as small mark at the top of the spine. Internally the book is in fine condition. Near fine slipcase.

The Aquatint plates were made by Peter Pettengill and editioned at Wingate Studio on Richard de Bas paper. Binding done at Jovonis Bindery.

#70 of 300 copies, signed by the author who also provided the photographs for this edition. An account of the first ascent of the Eiger by the author. A fine book with pieces of granite from the eiger on the front cover. Kept in a NF clamshell case. A beautiful collectable copy.

#### 25. The Revelation of St John the Divine.

#### New York: The Limited Editions Club, 1995.

Ist Edition. Revelation was written at the height of Christians prosecution by the Romans and the book as inspired many past literary masterpieces by the likes of Dante and Milton. For this edition the great American artist Allan Rohan Crite was inspired to produce fifteen relief engravings for possibly the ultimate illustrated edition of the book of Revelations. Revelations passionately speak against the power of evil and encourage Christians to resist even at the cost of martyrdom. Many critics considers this to be Crite's finest religious work.

One volume (16 x 22 inches) Relief engravings were printed on Japanese paper and mounted on heavy paper handmade in Pescia Italy. Volume is handbound in burgundy linen and the solander box covered in black Italian cotton. The inset is Nigerian goatskin and the title stamped in 22-karat gold.

The book is in NF condition with a few slight marks visible on the cover, but internally clean and Fine. The box also showing slight fading and general wear and in NF condition. The original Monthly letter #575 laid in with the original LEC invoice for \$3000.

#### 26. The Declaration of Independence. New

York: The Limited Editions Club, 2010.

For the moment the final publication from LEC.

Frontispiece Photogravure by Robert Frank. Dr David Armitage provides the afterward and includes a section the delegates deleted.

Here Jefferson speaks of the horrors of slavery, charging that the George III, "...waged cruel war against human nature itself... Determined to keep open a market where MEN should be bought & sold...".

# Interview with founder Christo Snyman

Featured on ABA News 15 March 2024 by Antiquarian Booksellers' Association

# Welcome to the ABA! Can you introduce us to your business in a nutshell?

I'm a relatively new dealer based in Cape Town, South Africa - currently dealing mostly online, but on the lookout for a retail location in the near future. We deal predominantly in 20th Century Fiction, with a specific interest in speculative fiction, fine press books and signed modern firsts.

# What was your route into the book trade?

I have a history of starting new ventures in my areas of interest. My other businesses include adventureinc.co.za and thewineroom.co.za. Working from home during covid, I found myself gravitating towards reading and taking my personal book collecting more seriously. One thing led to another and - a few large auction purchases later - I had a new venture to juggle.

# If you had to choose just one, what would you say your key specialism is, and what drew you to it?

A difficult question. Ultimately, I always gravitate back to speculative fiction, with a focus on science fiction, fantasy, gothic, and horror.

# What is your favourite aspect of working in the world of rare books?

The excitement of discovery: nothing beats finding an important copy of your favourite author or following the rabbit-hole of new information. There is always something new to learn, experience and see.

# Are you a collector yourself, and if so, what do you collect?

I am a collector and frequently find myself in a position of not wanting to sell new books coming in. I collect important science fiction and fantasy (specifically Hugo and Nebula Award winning novels); small press books (Centipede Press, Subterranean Press and more); natural history books (I have an academic background in Zoology and evolutionary processes); as well as fine press books, specifically from The Limited Editions Club. For the latter I am working on an updated checklist and bibliography along with Carol Crossman Porter (ABAA), hopefully to be published soon.

# What do you think is the impulse behind book collecting?

Naturally I think collecting is a very deeply instinctual human behaviour, with books offering the ideal avenue for indulgence of this need. Regardless of of one's interest in life, books are an ideal source of information with variety and novelty that could keep any collector busy for many lifetimes.

# Do you have a favourite item currently in stock?

Difficult question and depending on my mood the answer could vary greatly. Right now, I would have to say it is my copy of The Chronicles of the Golden Friars by S.J. Le Fanu, a virtually impossible title to find. In this case it was also formely M.R. James's copy, which makes it even more unique

# Have you observed any recent collecting trends that have surprised, delighted, or bewildered you?

In my area of interest, I would say the massive popularity of small press publishers like Centipede, Suntup, Subterranean and more. They mostly focus on speculative fiction titles, with a heavy weighting towards horror titles. I believe they are doing a sterling job in introducing a new generation of collectors to the trade.

# Encouraging new blood in the trade is important, but it's a tough time to set up a business. What would be your advice for people who want to begin dealing rare books?

Firstly, follow your passion and you will eventually attract like-minded collectors to your business. Secondly, although less exciting, I would strongly suggest that one builds a working understanding of basic accounting and business practices; a lack of which more often than not causes the demise of many a small business.

# What are you most excited and most concerned about in the current landscape of the rare book trade?

Most exciting might be small press publishers introducing an entire new generation of collectors to the trade. Most concerning would be the growing problem of counterfeit items hitting the market and seemingly lack of interest to combat this. I'm frequently reporting problematic accounts on online retail platforms, only to see them trading the same material a week later. I'm also surprised to see how many problematic items are listed by important auction houses.

### Do you have a favourite book fair?

Being based in Cape Town I have to date only attended the Chelsea Book Fair, where I was also an exhibitor. I loved meeting many other ABA members there, and I very much look forward to attending Firsts London and Worldcon in Glasgow later this year.
