

During his twenty year career Rex Whistler was prolific in many areas of art and design. His graceful, often humourous illustrations feature in books and periodicals, and on designs for dust jackets, bookplates, and advertisements.

In this short catalogue we have brought together 16 items by and about Rex Whistler. The list includes dust jacket designs for books by Cecil Beaton and Walter de la Mare, a map of the City of London, bookplate designs for Duff and Diana Cooper, and Adelaide Livingstone, and illustrations for Edward James and Edith Olivier.

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Edith Olivier's first book and Rex Whistler's second





Following the death of her beloved sister Mildred in 1924, Edith Olivier was encouraged by Stephen Tennant, Rex Whistler and other friends to put together a memorial volume. Texts were provided by Dorothea Ponsonby, Gladys Meyrick-Wood, Cecily Foyle, Dorothy Tomlin, Dacres Olivier, Yoi Maraini, Christina Gibson, Rosemary Olivier, Gwendolen Plunket Greene, Brian Howard and Pamela Grey of Fallodon. Olivier herself wrote the preface and it is her first published piece of writing. A delicate drawing of Mildred by Tennant is used as a frontispiece and Rex Whistler provided ten small text decorations, including drawings of the Palladian bridge and column at Wilton House. It is an early example of Whistler's illustration being the second book he illustrated. The book was privately printed and only 112 copies were distributed.






Rex Whistler's bookplate design for his friends and patrons, the Duff Coopers

Ex Libris Bookplate designed by Rex Whistler for Duff and Diana Cooper


The ex libris bookplate designed by Rex Whistler for Duff and Diana Cooper. Whistler's design is packed with a classical and modern mix of elements including a rococo cartouche, bottles of champagne, scrolls, dispatch boxes, a trailing vine, swags, canopy, and a named bust of Diana as the Huntress. Whistler wrote 'I hope the bust of you isn't too libellous - it looks haughty but I think busts SHOULD look rather haughty don't you'. There is some discrepancy around the ownership of the bookplate, with some sources citing Duff and others, Diana. Fuller and Whistler assign it to both. The design of the plate supports this, with the lower portion filled with elements relating to Duff and the upper portion more reflective of Diana. The couple were both well-read and books from their library should be attributed to Diana, as well as Duff.


Little Innocents. Childhood Reminiscences


The Next Volume

A first edition of Edward James' privately-published collection of poems. The Next Volume is beautifully illustrated by Rex Whistler. Edith Olivier writes in her diary in 1932 - "Rex is making drawings for some poems by a Mr James - the best drawings I have seen of his in some ways. Such a sure touch. An amusing one of New York - skyscrapers towering over a park in which the trees look like cabbages. It has great beauty.". James halted the binding of the first edition because "of how awful that first poem [At the Grave of Shelley] was", meaning that there are likely far fewer than the stated 525 copies.

Ex Libris Bookplate designed by Rex Whistler for Adelaide Livingstone

The ex libris bookplate designed by Rex Whistler for Dame Adelaide Livingstone. Livingstone was born in America but spent the majority of her life in Britain. During and after the First World War she channelled her energies into repatriating displaced persons and tracing those who had died or been taken prisoner abroad. She was given her Damehood in 1918 and in later years she organised the Peace Ballot. Whistler's bookplate design for Livingstone is filled with symbolic objects. The sea and ship beyond the curtained window signal her trans-Atlantic origin. The books, hunting horn and flowers denote pre-War pursuits. The smoking classical urn perhaps denotes the fire for peace and public duty.

Rex Whistler's map of the streets and markets of the City of London

The Financial News. Prospect of the City of London

A humourous map designed by Rex Whistler and issued by *The Financial News* to celebrate the 50th anniversary of the paper. The map depicts a 'Prospect of the City of London, Being a Map for the Merchants, Bankers and Brokers & other Venturers trading into that City. 1934'. A street plan of the City of London features a prominent St. Paul's and the major exchanges labelled, including Diamonds, Fur Skins, Textiles, Coal and Rubber. In the top left, Gog and Magog support Temple Bar atop a cloud and point to a medallion showing Dick Wittington and his cat. Old Father Thames reclines in the lower left corner and the arms of the City and a title-cartouche are placed in the right-hand corners. The map was published in a special 'City of London' supplement of *The Financial News*, which is also present.


'I advise all good children to break open their parents' money-boxes and buy it.'

A collection of seven stories for children by Walter de la Mare, including 'The Lord Fish', 'Dick and the Beanstalk' and 'The Old Lion'. Rex Whistler's attractive illustrations grace the text and the dust jacket, making this a beautiful gift volume. The date or edition is not given. This edition was likely published shortly after the first (1933). The dust jacket is pink-tinted, rather than the original yellow-tint.

Whistler's comic illustrations of society types complement the Guinness-themed text perfectly. Some were enlarged by the firm for separate illustrations.

The Masque was a post-War publication designed to keep its readers abreast of the latest developments in contemporary theatre. It begun with the intention to devote each issue to a review and illustrations of a recent play, therefore No. 1 is devoted to Laurence Olivier's production of King Lear at The Old Vic. This intention did not hold and No. 2 is dedicated to Rex Whistler's designs for theatre, as are Nos. 4 and 7.


Ashcombe. The Story of a Fifteen-Year Lease

Rex Whistler was closely connected to the house, visiting often and helping Beaton make decorative and architectural changes. The dust jacket reproduces his painting of the house.



A fanciful written description to accompany Whistler's mural sequence at the Tate Gallery




A Guide to the Duchy of Epicurania with some Account of the Famous Expedition In Pursuit of Rare Meats

'Being the Story of the Rex Whistler Murals in the Tate Gallery Restaurant' is the subtitle for this fanciful written description to accompany Rex Whistler's mural sequence. The mural was completed by Whistler in 1927 after a year and a half of work. It features a dream-like, pastoral landscape through which travels a mis-matched hunting party. Olivier and Whistler had the idea of writing a guide to the painting in the form of a children's story. Olivier went on to write the text which is published here posthumously.




The Work of Rex Whistler




Rex Whistler. The Triumph of Fancy

The catalogue for an exhibition on the work of Rex Whistler held at the Brighton Museum and Art Gallery in 2006. It was the first full-scale exhibition of Whistler's work since 1960. The curator Stephen Calloway provides an essay on Whistler's life and work and then illustrates a selection of Whistler's art including paintings, drawings, stage designs, illustrations and book plates. The catalogue ends with a list of mural decorations and designs for theatres, and a selective list of book illustrations.
