From June 1809, the log covers the Ethalion's service in the Caribbean, sailing from St.Perris Bay [?] with landfalls including Vera Cruz, Havana, Barbados and Porto Rico [Puerta Rica]. This narrative of proceedings provides a vivid insight into the operations of a Royal Navy frigate in West Indian waters during the latter years of the Napoleonic wars. Ethalion sailed for Cadiz from Porto Rico on January 14th 1810, arriving February 17th. She remained in Cadiz for two months, then sailed in convoy for England, arriving in Portsmouth on June 2nd, where she was paid off on August 3rd. The short log for HMS Poictiers relates the start of a voyage, in company with the frigates 'Seine' and 'Shannon'.

HMS Ethalion was a 5th rate frigate of 36 guns, launched in 1802 and decommissioned in 1816. She survived till 1877, serving as a hospital ship and a breakwater. She had been serving in the West Indies since 1807 and took part in the 1809 invasion of Martinique.

HMS Poictiers was a 74-gun third rate ship of the line. She went on to see very active service during the War of 1812





Thomas Albert Glover was born in Nagasaki in 1870, the son of an English businessman. He founded the Nagasaki Trawling Company and his interest in the fish of the region led to him creating, over a 21 year period, his magnificent picture book illustrating 800 species of fish, mollusca and crustacea. Glover would visit the fish market early in the morning to obtain fresh specimens which would immediately be painted by professional artists so that the vibrant, fresh colours could be faithfully reproduced. Glover died in 1945 and his life's work was bequeathed to Mr. Keizo Shibuwasa, who donated it to the Faculty of Fisheries at Nagasaki University in 1950. Around 1971, funding was made available to the Faculty to produce a printed edition of Glover's Book of Fishes, the first time it had appeared in print. All 801 colour plates were reproduced, reduced in size, but with every effort made to retain the original colours. Morphological descriptions have been added, as well as commentary on distribution, catch, utlisation, etc., and specialist authorities were brought in to determine the identity of questionable species. The text of the separate index volume appears in both Latin and Japanese, with the foreword also appearing in English, otherwise any text is only in Japanese. Only 300 sets were published, with most if not all, being supplied to relevant institutions; this set being one of those and as to be expected, carries external shelf number labels and occasional discreet library stamps (not on the plates). The only recorded set in the UK is held at London's Natural History Museum

a good example of an early 20th century Royal Navy Midshipman's journal, with the added interest that Midshipman Owen Jones served on board the battlecruiser HMS Lion, famous as Admiral Beatty's flagship at the Battle of Jutland. The journal commenced on 31st March 1919, with Jones on board HMS Lion at Scapa Flow. The ship remained at Scapa Flow till the end of April, then sailed to Rosyth, before embarking on a round Britain cruise, finishing with a voyage down the west coast to Plymouth. Jones left HMS Lion in January 1920 and joined HMS Dublin (a light cruiser also on active service at the Battle of Jutland). HMS Dublin was based in the Mediterranean till December, and then sailed for West Africa, St. Helena, and on to South Africa, where she was based at Simonstown. The journal finishes on the 22nd August 1921. Written in a neat, legible hand, with the illustrations being the usual mix of well executed charts, maps, and technical drawings.














the letter was sent to Sir Philip Howard instructing him to send a Corporal and eight horsemen to convey a sum of money from New Cross, near Deptford, to Portsmouth, and return with goods to London. the letter is signed 'Albemarle' and also bears the signature of Sir Philip Howard, with his instruction to appoint Lt.Beale to see that the order is executed. At this time Monck had charge of The Admiralty, whilst James, Duke of York, commanded the fleet. London in November 1665 was still in the grip of the Great Plague, and Monck gained popularity by remaining in London, when most of the Government had fled to Oxford. Sir Philip Howard was Justice of the Peace for Westminster.








the true First Edition of Scott's first significant literary work. Volumes one and two printed in Kelso in 1802. volume three printed in Edinburgh in 1803. Volume three stated as 'second edition', but as explained in pencil notes to the foot of the title-page, it is in fact the first edition, as it was first published along with the second edition of the first two volumes. neat ink note to the top of volume one half-title states that 800 copies of volumes one and two were published, including fifty on large paper. An interesting association set - the paste-down book-plates are from the library of Sir Henry Hay-Makdougall Baronet of Makerstoun, a large estate to the west of Kelso. Sir Henry was born ca.1750 and died in 1825, and as a contemporary of Scott and a leading landowner in the Borders, it is quite possible that the two were acquainted. Sir Henry Hay-Makdougall was also the father-in-law of Sir Thomas Makdougall Brisbane, one time governor of New South Wales, soldier, and pioneering astronomer, who built two of his four observatories in the grounds of Makerstoun after he inherited the estate.

the first page comprises the order sent from the Commissioners of the Admiralty to the Flag Officers, Captains, Commanders and Commanding Officers of His Majesty's Ships, and the second page contains a translation of the original Spanish royal order explaining the change of colours. The order is signed by Sir Philip Stephens, First Secretary of the Admiralty, and Lords of the Admiralty, Richard Hopkins, John Leveson-Gower, and Lord Arden.

This printed price list was issued shortly after the sale of the magnificent art collection formed by the Dutch collector Pieter de Smeth van Alphen. Comprising lot number, name of the artist, buyer's name and price realised in Dutch guilders. The buyers were mostly art dealers, and in addition to the printed names, this unique copy contains manuscript marginalia recording the names for whom the dealers were buying, often other well known continental art dealers. It also identifies the eighteen lots that were unsold 'opgehoode', but listed in the printed price list as being knocked down to the Dutch art dealer De Vries. Also, three lots are identified as ending up in the British Royal collection; including lot 82, by Rembrandt ["Shipbuilder and His Wife"], the second highest priced lot, bought in the sale by the Dutch art dealer Theodorus Spaan, acting on behalf of the renowned French dealer Lafontaine, who sold it in London to the Prince Regent the following year. A full account of Pieter de Smeth van Alphen, his art collection and the sale, can be found in a 2018 article by Laurens Meerman in the Dutch art journal 'Simiolus'


