

# <u>CAMDEN LOCK BOOKS</u>, Jason Burley, CATALOGUE of 600 <u>MINIATURE BOOKS</u> - in these 261 items

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1. ABC or Alphabetical Railway Guide. January 1929. [no publisher. London]. Hampton's railway guide of the 1850's reproduced as miniature facsimile in January 1929. 62 printed pages (a few leaves with corner tips creased; printing quality is not sharp). Includes advertisements for Hotels Cecil, Great Northern Hotel, Liverpool Street Station, Belgravia, Metropole, Grand, Majestic, &c. On the inside rear cover is an ad for the National Provincial Union Bank. On the inside front, ads for Aertex Cellular and the Isle of Man Steam Packet Co. Along the spine it advertises Schweppes Table Waters. 12 x 20 mm. Original tan card cover (slightly rubbed). A similar copy is in the Library of Queen Mary's Dolls' House and can be seen on the Royal Collection Trust website. This edition was published January 1923. Photographic reproduction, apparently not given away nor sold in any numbers, as this is the only the second one I have seen in commerce. Bondy calls it scarce in 1981. Spielmann says it is "a curiosity, of considerable rarity" (1961). Bondy, 153. Bromer, 114 (photo). Spielmann, 1. Welsh, 8. 2.Affection's Gift. A love-offering in poetry and prose. Rock Brothers and Payne. London. 1853. 192 printed pages. Frontispiece and 7 engraved plates. Printed by Petter, Duff and Co. Playhouse Yard, Blackfriars. Small brown marks at bottom of pages 170-1 and 186-7. Inner hinge cracked but holding firm. Somevery slight age-toning to some pages. All edges gilt. Original yellow endpapers. Contemporary owner's ink inscription on front free endpaper. 47 x 50 mm. Original dark green morocco; spine with gilt titling and gilt decoration; covers with rococo stylised gilt decorative borders and tulip motifs; front cover with 'Afffection's Gift' in gilt. Edges very slightly rubbed; minuscule patch of gilt on spine slightly discoloured. Not in Bondy, nor Spielmann. Welsh, 68. OCLC, 244205815 . WorldCat locates 1 copy of the later 1855 edition worldwide (Virginia University Library), but none of this edition.

3.Affection's Token. In poetry and Prose. Johnson, Samuel Jun. 48 Church Street. London. 1848. 191 printed pages + one page of publisher's adverts at the back. Frontispiece and 5 engraved portraits. Plates slightly foxed. All edges gilt. Original pale yellow endpapers. Contemporary ink ownership signatureand gift dedication with poetry by Tennyson on all endpapers in legible hand. Provenance: Terence G. St. Palgrave. Original publisher's red decoratively embossed cloth; gilt roccocco style decoration to spine and front cover. Somewhat rubbed with wear to hinges and spine ends; corners bumped. Welsh, 67. See OCLC, 771022386 for 1846 Liverpool edition held only by the British Library. WorldCat locates no 1848 copies worldwide.

# 4. Aide-Memoire Etui. Palais-Royal. Paris. Circa 1820].

Stunning French aide memoire etui in mother of pearl, circa 1820, of rectangular form engraved and infilled with silver and gold with oval panels of trophies within leaf sprays and borders, the curved top inscribed to one side 'Souvenir', to the other 'Damitie', interior with mark to upstand, provision for note book and complete with stylus, 4.2 x 8 x 0.8 cms. An étui of this quality would have been a luxury item, and very likely to have been originally sold, at some expense, at the Palais-Royal arcade in Paris, at about the time of the death of Napoleon Bonaparte. ### 5. Almanach 1879. Germany. Novel brass folding case.

16 oblong strips of paper, 22 x 50 mm. all neatly folded in half. Printed in a German gothic script. Jewish calendar in the year 5640 completes the creation of the world, 18th June 1879. Lists festivals like Schebat and Purim. Equinoxes. Dates of Royalty. Weather forecasts. Measures. Conversion from pfennig to kreuzer. Saints days. Calendar from17th july to 16th December. An ephemeral German almanac - probably incomplete - in a neat portable brass case. An unexpected survivor. Ingeniously held in a brass oval clip, marked D.R.G.M. With two folding covers. Original loop on top. Mildly patinated brass case and loop. WorldCat locates no copies worldwide.

6. Alphabet des Guten Tons. [Weise, Gustav. Stuttgart. 1885]. 63 printed pages in German. 32 x 46 mm. Original embossed grey taupe card covers; titling on spine and, within borders, on front cover; back cover with central black decorative design. Front cover withvery slight concave bowing. This is one of a set of 12 similar miniature books, that, according to Pistner the German version was published in 1896 and by G. Weise in Stuttgart. The German version was known as Miniatur-Bibliothek fur junge Madchen. The publishing house was founded by Gustav Weise, the former co-owner of Julius Weise's court bookstore, in Stuttgart in 1863. In 1921, A. Tuneewa referred to a German version held in the Odessa State Library, that she attributes to the writer Klara Reichner (pseudonym for Klara Jochner). The number of pages differs in the German edition from the even less common Dutch edition. All pages eveny age-toned. Not in Bondy, nor Spielmann. Welsh, 193. OCLC, 1453187737. 7. Alphabet. Miniature letters of the Alphabet - hand-carved. Circa 1812. About 128 bone, handcarved letters of the alphabet in capital majuscule letters with serifs. The sizes are not precisely uniform and there is some variation in shape. These could have been made by Napoleonic Prisoners-of-War, or manufactured by an employee in a large country house for the owners' offspring. Some damage to several projecting edges and corners. Typically about 12 mm. in height. Contained within an attractive cylindrical, hand-turned sycamore box with domed removable lid. Decorated with a red and charcoal Continental pattern marbled enamel with a miniature bronze coin-shaped disc at the pinnacle. The inside and bottom surfaces with original olive green paint. The letters and box go well together and may well be contemporary. A few minor chips to the edges of the box and its lid.

Art Deco 'blook'. Book pattern pencil holder. Circa 1920. Continental silver metal and silver gilt novelty in the shape of a book (or 'blook'). Silver stripes engraved with vertical parallel lines. Loop to the side. 25 x 40 mm. Four marks struck above loop that are indecipherable - possibly French manufacture around 1920. Original silver metal pencil. The word 'métal' on the side of the pencil. Minuscule dents to ball finial of pencil. Scattered surface scratches. 8mm diagonal slight dent to one side.

# 8. Art Deco 'Blook'. Book pattern pencil holder. Circa 1920.

Continental silver metal and silver gilt novelty in the shape of a book (or 'blook'). Silver stripes engraved with vertical parallel lines. Loop to the side. 25 x 40 mm. Four marks struck above loop that are indecipherable - possibly French manufacture around 1920. Original silver metal pencil. The word 'métal' on the side of the pencil. Minuscule dents to ball finial of pencil. Scattered surface £150 scratches. 8mm diagonal slight dent to one side.

Complete in 2 volumes. xiv, 248 pages, 92 plates; xiv, 383 pages, 24 plates, a total of 32 plates in colour, duplicate paper spine labels tipped in at end of each volume. Published by permission of H.M. the Queen. Printed by W.H. Smith & Son, the Arden Press, London S.E.1. Limited, numbered complete se, number 50 out of 1,500. All edges untrimmed. This copy together in original card slipcase as issued. 28 x 21 cm. Publisher's linenbacked boards with Mary's crowned gilt monogram on upper covers, paper spine labels. Original dust-jacket missing from volume one, and the spine missing from volume two. Label on volume one slightly foxed and chipped. Spines slightly sunned. First volume describes the doll house designed by the architect Sir Edwin Lutyens which was made as a gift to Queen Mary of England in 1924. The Dolls' House was packed in 45 wooden cases for transportation, and exhibited in the 'Palace of Arts' at the British Empire Exhibition, conceived by the British Government to boost public morale in post-war Britain. It is a one-twelfth replica of a Royal palace, to which 1,500 artists and manufacturers gave their miniature contributions, and is now housed at Windsor Castle. The second volume describes the library and includes facsimiles and specimen pages of books and paintings made expressly for the doll house by Rudyard Kipling, Arthur Conan Doyle, A.A. Milne and others. The library includes 132 printed books, newspapers, or magazines. Many of these had already been published, and were gifts sent in by donors, approved by Lutyens to ensure they were of the correct scale. A selection in facsimile from the volume of verses by Rudvard Kipling, written and illustrated by the author"-Volume 2, plate XIV (opposite p. 192). Rudyard Kipling selections include: If, The children's song, The road through the woods, Merrow down, The fairies' siege, A charm, Recessional, The prayer, Mother 'o mine, and Eddi's service. 10. Bible in Miniature. McDowall, T. & W. Edinburgh. Circa 1845. Dark chestnut morocco. 272 printed pages including green tipped-in title-page with gilt print and elaborately decorative border. Separate title-pages for New Testament and for Psalms of David in Metre. Front paste-down endpaper slightly damaged, front free endpaper lacking. All edges gilt. Original plain endpapers. 32 x 41 mm. Original publisher's dark chestnut morocco; spine with 'bible' in gilt between two horizontal gilt lines and above floral gilt device; single gilt fillet borders on covers. Slightly rubbed at edges and with a few minuscule scuffs. Not in Adam. Adomeit, B68. Bondy, 34 - for 1830 edition only. Not in Spielmann. Welsh, 1040 - one copy [1850] only. Adomeit lists 5 copies (Adomeit, Edison, Massmann, Wightman & Winterstein) but none with the green title-page of this edition (a subsequent edition had a different title-page but was probably printed from the same type - Adomeit B71). All edges gilt. Original marbled endpapers. Contemporary ink owner's inscription on front free endpaper, dated 1824. Provenance: William George Pickering. Blank leaf after page 256 excised. 30 x 47 mm. Original gilt black morocco; centre of covers has red oval onlay with sacred monogram of a cross and initials 'JHS' with minuscule angels' heads, encircled with golden rays, elaborate gilt tooled borders and intricate £2,000

corner-pieces; spine in three compartments with densely hand-tooled gilt designs. Very slight rubbing, generally in very good condition. The black morocco bound copies are considerably less common than those in brown calf and those in red moroccco. Much scarcer and rarer imprint than the later 1780 published Newbery thumb-bible. Exceedingly scarce abridged children's Bible in its original binding, Hariss's "Bible in Miniature" is the second of its kind in England, preceded only by the 1727 "Biblia" printed for R. Wilkin (the date being altered by hand to 1728 in many copies). It was re-published by Harris in 1774 and in this 1775 edition. Adomeit, B23 (lists copies at six locations). Bondy, 33-4. Roscoe, J28. 12. Bible in Miniature. London printed. Circa 1795. Full brown calf. 220 printed pages. 5 of 7 woodcuts, reverse of 1780 Newberry edition, depicting significant figures and scenes, including Adam and Eve, Shem & Isaac, Aaron, King David, and the Nativity. Lacking the Crucifixion and Moses. Most known copies contain seven or fewer woodcuts. Adomeit identifies this as the second iteration of at least two issues, which feature reset title pages and texts and locates just two copies. This issue has the following 'points' on page 7 - the 'k' of book missing, there is no comma after 'book', God is in larger type and there is 'A4' and the catchword 'God' at the foot of the page. Lacks 02 and corners of 03-4 are missing. No free endpapers. Ink marks on title and title of New Testament. Some corners creased. A few light pencil marks. Pages generally age-toned. 38 x 40 mm. Contemporary full calf; spine with four horizontal gilt lines. Slight scuffing and mild rubbing to some edges. Adomeit, B76. Spielmann, 20. Welsh, 1015. OCLC, 6829845. WorldCat locates 2 copies worldwide (British Library and Juniata College, Pennsylvania). This is a very early example of the so-called 'Mozley variants', twelve editions published between 1795 and 1815, by the printing press 'Mozley in Gainsborough' and under the same imprint as this, 'London Printed'.

13. Bible in minuiture [sic]. Newbery, E. London. 1780. Red morocco- IHS. First state. [ii]-250 pages 2 engraved title-pages, 14 engraved plates opposite pages title-page, 25, 52, 58, 74, 93, 122, 127, 143, 151, 173, 218, 221, 247. Set in Brevier (8-point) Caslon Old Style, ten lines to a page. Marbled endpapers. All edges gilt. Ink inscription on verso of front free endpaper dated 1934. Old glue residue on inner hinges of frontispiece and first title-page. Later ink owner's inscription on verso of front free endpaper, dated '18.9.34'. Uniformly toned pages. 30 x 45 mm. Original red morocco. Central oval red morocco onlay circled by golden rays and bearing the Christogram to both covers. Very slightly rubbed with small old split on front cover. Probably the earliest imprint of the best known miniature thumb bible & a very close copy of the J.Harris edition. Elizabeth Newbery was the widow of Francis who was nephew of John Newberry (hugely successful publisher and promoter of children's books). A charming copy of this first appearance of Elizabeth Newbery's enormously popular Bible in Miniature. Although this is the first edition to have the Newbery name in the imprint, it was effectively a new edition of Harris' miniature bible first printed in 1778, which in turn was based on earlier printings by W. Harris as early as 1771. Following J. Harris' original closely, the text was entirely reset but was almost word for word the same as Harris', with the same number of pages, a similar title and fly-title for the New Testament and with engravings of the same subjects: creation, Adam and Eve, Moses, the birth of Christ, the Epiphany etc. The print run must have been considerable as it was still listed as for sale in 1800, at the original published price of 1s, and it is one of the easiest thumb bibles to find today. It was reprinted well into the nineteenth century by the Newbery family and in collaborative editions with Harris, Darton and Harvey. This issue has the page numbers enclosed within brackets and has no imprint at the end of the text, simply concluding with the 'Finis' on p. 256. Some rarer issues contain the imprint 'Crowder & Hemsted, Printers, Warwick-Square' or simply 'Hemsted, Printer'. This issue does have the mistake 'miniuture' to the title, which was later corrected; and the plate of the engraving of Adam and Eve, at p. 25, with a tree bearing apples. Copies vary in size and binding. They were issued in plain calf, crimson morocco with gilt tooling and a central onlay in black or dark green, with the sacred monogram and in green morocco with gilt tooling and crimson central onlay. 14. Bible in minuiture [sic]. Newbery, E. London. 1780. Later red morocco- Challenger? 1st state.[ii]-250 pages 2 engraved title-pages, (64mo) (43 x 30 x 20 mm). 256 pages. Engraved title-page plus second title-page after p. 148 to mark start of the

New Testament. 14 engraved plates facing pages 10, 25, 52, 58, 74, 93, 122, 127, 143, 151, 173,218, 221 and 247. The earliest issue, without an imprint on p.256, and with parentheses enclosing the page numbers. Old glue residue on inner hinges of frontispiece and first title-page. Marbled endpapers. All edges gilt. Ink inscription on verso of front free endpaper dated 1934. 30 x 45 mm. Later full red morocco believed to be by L.G. Challenger. Central gilt Shakespearean coat of arms to both covers; Spine with 12 horizontal gilt lines, gilt 'Bible',& 'Newberry 1780' and three gilt hand-tooled decorative motifs. Complete with leather bound purpose-built bible box with blind stamped matching heraldic covers; spine gilt ruled 'Newberry bible' titled and with four oval decorative gilt stamps. Upper cover simply repaired down split hinge. Very slightly rubbed with small old split on front cover. Encased in a specially-made paste paper storage box whose design mimics the binding, stamped and tooled in gilt; front and

back boards blind-stamped; front panel detached. Slight erosion to edges of first three leaves, all endpapers present, binding tight and secure. A good to good+ copy. First published by W. Harris in 1771 and reprinted in 1778 by J. Harris, this London 1780 edition printed for Elizabeth Newbery, publisher, includes engraved title pages for both the entire volume and the New Testament, and an additional fourteen engraved plates. The 256-page text of brief biblical summations includes scriptural references for each of the adaptations. A note on the binding: this is a variantn oncontemporary binding with a herald stamped front and back on the panels, and on the box in which the volume is enrobed. The herald, with a helmet above two spurs, the spurs positioned both dexter and sinister, may refer to the Order of the Golden Spur, a papal order of knighthood conferred upon those who have rendered distinguished service in propagating the Catholic faith, or who have contributed to the glory of the Church. 15. Bible. [Allies Bible]. Bryce, David & Son. Glasgow. [1913]. 876 printed pages.Illustrations. The 15 printed pages comprising the Four National Anthems, Evening Prayer of a People by Neil Monro and Recessional by Kipling have been excised and the Bible was contemporaneously rebound in a unique binding of full black morocco. Possibly an uncommon survivor that had belonged to a wealthy soldier and/or officer from World War 1 whilst on active duty. All edges red. 30 x 46 mm. Contemporary full black morocco; spine with 'HOLY BIBLE' in gilt with horizontal gilt lines; covers panel mitred in gilt. Normally found bound in khali buckram, for the use of soldiers on campaign. Bondy, 110. Garbett, 22. Not in Welsh.

16. Biblia ofte Inhoud en kern der gantschen H. Schrift. Blyvenburg, Willem. Gravenhage. 1719. 143 [1] pages in Dutch. Page numbers flanked with printer's devices; title-page with decorative borders. 7 - newly designed for this Dutch edition - engraved plates all with very good impressions - at pages [3] - 'H. Heylig. H.', 12 - 'Door't woord', 28 - 'Verborgen', 50 - 'Ontdekt', 97 - 'Het Eynde', 111 - portrait of Christina Everardina, and at end, a folding plate, 'Oud en Nieuw Testament' of a cityscape, 's Gravenhage', with Moses and Jesus depicted. Colophon, 'In 's Gravenhage, gedrukt by, Willem Blyvenburg, 1719'. Complete with contemporary brown calf covered card slipcase, with partial marbled paper lining - missing the uppermost panel and rubbed. All edges gilt. Original green and pink decorated endpapers. 26 x 40 mm. Contemporary red morocco; spine with two raised bands and gilt horizontal rules; covers with gilt pointillé tulip desin within scrolling gilt borders and floral corner-pieces. Spine rubbed, gilt faded; corners and edges slightly abraded. The Ganshorn Biblia was the basis for the English 1727 Biblia. A literal Dutch translation from the German of Georg Christoph Ganshorn's 1704 Altdorff Biblia - the first German Protestant Thumb Bible. This copy is the most complete surviving copy of a rare and early Dutch thumb bible - unrecorded by Doris Welsh and only known to exist other than this copy in four examples, all of which are incomplete. 64mo. [48], pages, with 12 full-page engravings of of Samuel, Eli, Simeon, Infant Jesus, Jonah, Bearing the Cross, Aaron, Praise, Moses, Mary Magdalen, David, and Balak, - the Virginia University copy has illustrations of Christ, John, Moses, Luke, Mark, Job, Daniel, Matthew, Abraham, Ruth, Samson, and Adam and Eve - that appear to have been used from an edition of a Thumb Bible, possibly re-worked from qn 1806 harris edition. 3 1/2 -point typeface equivalent. Stab sewn, as issued. 28 x 17 mm. Original midnight blue glazed paper wrappers. 1st year of publication. Continued stereotyped almanac traditions of Schloss but without original poetry. Thomas Goode was one of a number of publishers to produce cheap imitations - David Bogue was another. The contents here are partly financial, and include a list of bankers, transfer days, and bill stamps. A similar example of this book can be found in Her Majesty Queen Mary's Dolls' House at Windsor Castle. Library Hub records copies at the BL and NLS only. Spielmann, 55. OCLC, 1122742772. 18. Bijou Almanac for 1854. Bogue, D. Fleet Street. London. [1853]. Riveted steel binding. Engraved title-page and 27 leaves( engraved throughout). 3 1/2 -point typeface equivalent. Four full-page engraved portraits of Gulnare, Maid of Athens, Kaled & Jeptha's Daughter. Gold and black book plate on front pate-down endpaper of Eileen Cummings, President of the Miniature Book Society in 2007 (purchased from Eileen in 2024). Some page edges with minuscule chips. Inner hinges cracked. No endpapers (as issued?). What appears to be a tiny tape repair to lower corner of title-page. All edges gilt. 25 x 20 mm. Original black calf spine with contemporary polished and riveted steel covers (10 minusule rivets each side); original loop and ring at bottom; original matching clasp at side. This binding is exceptionally uncommon - nothing similar has ever been seen reproduced in the major reference books. Mild and sparse tarnishing on covers. Compares favourably with earlier Schloss almanacs. A similar example of this book can be found in Her Majesty Queen Mary's Dolls' House at Windsor Castle. "The Almanacs with the Bogue imprint were frequently issued for the same year as those of T.Goode, but are superior to them in workmanship and general quality" (Bondy). Bondy, 44. Publisher's black limp morocco, gilt stamped "BIJOU ALMANACK 1855" within decorative gilt tulip frame and border, on front cover. Spine very slightly rubbed. A similar example of this book can be found in Her Majesty Queen Mary's Dolls' House at Windsor Castle. Bondy, 44. Not in Spielmann. Welsh, 1263. OCLC, 1122791366. Original yellow endpapers; back endpapers slightly stained and with a minuscule tear at the top. 35 x 44 mm. Original black morocco; spine with roccocco style ornamental decoration in gilt; front cover with gilt titling; both covers with central lozenge motif and with borders matching the decoration on the spine, all in gilt. Elaborately gilt

stamped on both covers and spine. (See similarly bound 'History of England') Adomeit B78 writes no first edition has been located. Welsh 1037/1039 for second editions. Contains Old Testament paraphrases only Adomeit dates as ca. 1845-50, but P.A.H. Brown, London publishers and printers, ca 1800-1870, dates the firm Rock Bros. & Payne as active 1844-83, so possibly issued later. Welsh, 1039. OCLC, 226318842. The Royal School of Art Needlework was founded in 1872 to create employment for women and to restore ornamental needlework to the significant place it once held among the decorative arts. The school made some embroidered bindings, but more frequently created painted vellum bindings. Blank vellum bindings were made by either Zaehnsdorf or Morrell's trade binderies and were embroidered or painted by the women workers at the Royal School of Art Needlework to be sold. Often the designs were of themes, characters, or scenes not at all related to the book's text. The woman who embroidered this vellum binding is not identified, as was often the case for RSAN bindings. This embroidered vellum binding is reminiscent of eighteenth-century crewelwork: Tudor roses and stylized carnations. The Arts and Crafts and Aesthetics Movements and the early designs of the Royal School of Art Needlework were very inspired by historic needlework. Crewelwork was a very popular method of decorating domestic textiles in the 16th, 17th, and 18th centuries. This binding is post-1903, when the school moved to Exhibition Road near the Victoria and Albert Museum, and pre-1922, when it was renamed 'Royal School of Needlework'. Complete and very uncommon set of 14 signed miniature engravings of Royal Castles and famous buildings in London and the Home Counties by Frank Willis, A.R.E., who was born and died in Windsor, but also lived in Kent. The miniature artworks were commissioned by Princess Marie Louise as a contribution to the Library of Her Royal Highness, Queen Mary's Dolls' House. 643 artists representing the best in their field/artistic pulse of the nation in the UK gave 774 works on paper for the Library's cabinets. This collection has tremendous significance for the understanding of British art in the early 1920's and there is no other comparable collection of works on paper in existence. Willis was the student and son-in-law of the engraver Charles William Sharpe (1818-1899). From 1891 to 1895, Willis studied under Carl Ernst Forberg as the only student in his engraving class at the Düsseldorf Art Academy. His etchings were exhibited between 1894 and 1898 in the Eduard Schulte Gallery at Alleestraße 42 in Düsseldorf and he was an Associate of the Royal Society of Painter-Etchers and Engravers. A letter from Willis to a Mrs. Williams, dated 1923, stated that several sets of the engravings were printed, but that he felt unwilling to monetise them "as a matter of courtesy" - any duplicate sets were given away for one guinea, the cost of printing them, to a few friends of his wife in Berkshire. Everyone who acquired a set had to give their words that they would only show them in their own homes to their own private firends. Of the roughly nine or so sets printed, about four, appear to have survived, including this one, and the one at Windsor Castle. (Royal Collection Trust inv. no. RL 27512).
