

A scarce Edinburgh-printed pocket Psalms, which Library Hub records in NLs and BL only, in a pleasant wallet-style binding.

The second edition of Boswell's 'teaser' for his magisterial Life of Johnson, a record of the pair's journey through the Highlands to the Hebrides and a companion to Johnson's own 'Journey to the Western Islands'. Among the notable contents are Johnson's sceptical remarks on the authenticity of the Ossian poems, then at the height of their popularity.

The first edition of this entry in the popular series of 'Silent Traveller' illustrated accounts by expatriate Chinese poet and illustrator Chiang Yee (1903-1977), scarce signed.



Ruddiman's reprint, praised by Dibdin as 'desirable... as well on the score of accuracy as of rarity' (I p. 546) of George Buchanan's metrical translations of two of Euripides' plays, alongside the ancient Greek originals. Buchanan's translations were first performed in the 1540s and saw print in the 1550s. This copy belonged to conservative politician Sir John Trollope (1800-1874), second cousin to novelist Anthony Trollope.

The antiquary Alexander Gordon (c.1692-1754?) was inspired to investigate the Roman antiquities of Scotland by dismissive remarks of William Stukeley's concerning Scots interest in antiquity, and enabled by the patronage of the eighth earl of Pembroke. Gordon's travels 'led to the compilation of a record of great contemporary importance and some lasting value', specifically this 'lasting memorial in which work he not only enshrined the antiquities of Roman Scotland and traced the route of Agricola's campaign but also ensured his own immortality in the fiction of Walter Scott' (ODNB), being read by the titular character in The Antiquary. 7. A scarce history of the palace at Holyrood written by the bailie of the abbey and librarian of The Society of Solicitors in the Supreme Courts of Scotland.

The first edition of this collection of proverbs assembled by painter Andrew Henderson (1783-1835), with a lengthy preface by his friend, the poet William Motherwell. Henderson also provided the illustrations, which were omitted in its 1876 second edition.

A sharp copy of this Scots poetry book with a foreword by John Buchan, who writes 'Mr Hope Tait writes good classic

Lowland Scots, and belongs to the small class of "makkers" who use the vernacular not as a literary exercise but because it is the speech which most naturally fits the fancies and emotions which they seek to express'. Library Hub records 5 copies, at Aberdeen, Oxford, Cambrige, NLS and BL.



A scarce reissue in 4 volumes with new title-pages of the third edition of this collection of Kay's works, published in 2 volumes the previous year. The third edition was the last use of the original copper plates, which were touched up for this edition and destroyed afterward, so this edition must have been to use up surplus sheets, and probably in small numbers. We have only traced a single copy of it on Worldcat, at the Frick Museum in New York, as against 58 records for the 1877 edition.



James Kirkton (d. 1699) completed this history several years before his death, 'apparently in reaction to Scotch Presbyterian Eloquence' (ODNB), a satirical tract which had attacked him primarily. The history circulated in manuscript throughout the eighteenth century; this is its first appearance in print.

A scarce leaflet soliciting funds to commission a sculpture in memory of the poet Hugh MacDiarmid in his birthplace of Langholm in the Scottish borders. It is illustrated with photographic images of the site, and contains paragraphs about MacDiarmid himself, the Scottish sculpture Trust and its fundraising goals, and Macdiarmid's connection to Langholm. It also quotes liberally from his poetry, with extracts from A Drunk Man looks at the Thistle and the Second Hymn to Lenin. The appeal was successful and the sculpture by Jake Harvey was unveiled in



1985. Library Hub records just two copies, in NLS and NLW.

An anonymous rhyming translation of the first of Macpherson's Ossian poems, which was first published in Macpherson's blank verse in 1762. A version in 'English Heroic Verse' by Islay clergyman John Wodrow had appeared in an Edinburgh printing in 1771 but this is a different translation, one which was popular enough at least to reach a second edition in 1777.

A Scottish provincial printing, not a beautiful copy but in original boards. Roughly half of the book is taken up with poetry, the title poem being in several distinct parts, with the second half of the book being a primer of Scottish history with particular reference to Dunfermline. Library Hub records 8 copies.

The scarce first edition of a short but important work by the superintendent of the Royal Botanic Garden of Edinburgh, a post for which M'Nab had been headhunted from the Royal Botanic Gardens at Kew. Outside of Scotland Library Hub locates two copies of this edition (at

Kew and  $\ensuremath{\mathtt{RHS}}\xspace$  ) and one copy of the 1831 second edition (BL); the  $\ensuremath{\mathtt{NLS}}\xspace$ holds both while Aberdeen, St Andrews, and Edinburgh have firsts only and Glasgow a second only. Worldcat adds first editions in Harvard, NYPL and Botanical Garden, Guelph, and NLI, with the second in Wageningen, Delaware, and Yale.



A presentation copy of the first edition of the author's first book. Most of the verses here are in English with a few in Scots; Robertson would later publish Scots poetry under the name Hugh Haliburton.

A reissue of a set first published the previous year as part of a projected series of 'Lives of Eminent Scotsmen', of which this constituted the section on poets. No further volumes appear to have been produced however, or at least none under this series title, which presumably precipitated this reissue with a new title-page expunging almost all mention of the more ambitious project. The one remaining reference is on the first page of each of the six parts as a subheading.

The first separate publication of Ruddiman's introduction from his 1739 edition of Anderson's 'Selectus Diplomatum et Numismatum Scotiae Thesaurus', a work which even by 1773 had become 'a book of high price, exceeding scarce, and only to be found in the cabinets of the curious' per the preface. Originally in Latin, it has been translated for this edition. It was popular enough to be reprinted in 1782.

An attractive prize binding from Stanmore Park school in north London. The prize label is signed by headmaster Vernon Royle, who prior to his pedagogical career had been a first-class cricketer who played a single test match against Australia in 1879.

The press figures in this copy identify it as Todd and Bowden's second state, occasioned by the decision to increase the print run from 3000 to 6000 copies. They also note that gatherings O and Y-2G 'are generally browned'; the pages here are lighter than that although noticeably different in hue.


A privately-printed memorial volume for 2nd Lieutenant George Buchanan Smith by his father, the theologian George Adam Smith (1856-1942) and mother Lilian, following his death in action in the Battle of Loos. It is addressed 'To his brothers and sisters from their father and mother' and written explicitly for them (the book's subject was the eldest of seven children), beginning 'your brother George was born on the morning of St Luke's day'. It was likely therefore an extremely small print run, and is unknown to Worldcat and Library Hub, although the NLS holds a copy.

This copy was presented to Buchanan Smith's university friend Dr C.J. Kirk, who has annotated a group photograph reproduced as a plate with the identities of a few of the subjects, including himself, on the right-hand edge. He must have also communicated this to Lilian Smith, who refers to him as 'that awful ruffian' in the 'dreadful cap and scarf' in her letter, with a great deal of affection.

The greatly-expanded second edition of Smith's only novel, following the privately-printed first of 1947, which Hugh MacDiarmid proclaimed in The Voice of Scotland as 'that tremendous synthetic embodiment of all the uproarious scandalous, drunken life of the city [of Edinburgh]'. This copy has a lengthy inscription from Smith to BBC editor and journalist Robin Richardson, or as Smith has it, 'Monshoveller Rainbone d'Rhindhandsoon, with the complenishments & oferies of the bestest potable' and it is signed 'from his ancient Auk' and dated 28 December 1964.



Possibly the editor's own copy of the sole edition of this scarce memoir of Lieutenant-General Sir William Stewart (1774-1827), the creator and first commanding officer of the Rifle Corps, who had served with distinction under Nelson at Cophenhagen and somewhat less successfully under Wellington in the Penisular War. A lengthy biography serves as preface, followed by texts of Stewart's journals - the basis of 'the best account of the battle [of Copenhagen]' (ODNB) - and letters from Nelson and Wellington. The section titles for the letters each note on the verso that only 50 copies were printed.




The origins of the book are not publicly recorded, but this copy bears the bookplate of Horatio Granville Murray Stewart, William Stewart's grandson, who was likely the editor or at least instigator of the volume itself. William Stewart's only son Horatio (named so at Nelson's request) died young, leaving a single infant son Horatio Granville (the Murray was added later), who would have been in his mid-30s when the Cumloden Papers was in production. HGM was childless himself and his grandfather's sole male heir - his surviving family at that time were his mother Sophia, his wife, and possibly an aunt Louisa - and it seems unlikely that anyone else would have had the access or desire to see Sir William's papers printed. Another copy survives inscribed by Sophia noting that it was a gift from her son, another sign he was directly connected to its publication, though he has not left any notes or other signs of interaction with this particular copy beyond his bookplate.

An attractive set of engravings by father and son team James and Henry Storer, preceded in the first volume by a substantial history of the city of Edinburgh, in a handsome contemporary binding. This copy was given within the family of Daniel Sandford (1766-1830), Bishop of Edinburgh - the recipient was his daughter Francies Catherine Lane and the giver her older brother, the advocate Erskine Douglas Sandford (1703-1861), notable for being one of the last people to see William Hare alive.


The verso of the title-page is printed: 'The warranted correctness and established character of the Author's Books, induce him to inform the Public, That no copy of any of them is genuine but what is signed by his own hand, as under', followed by the author's signature. This 1768 text was reprinted many times well into the 19th century, though this was likely the last edition signed by Thomson, who died in 1807. WorldCat and Library Hub cite only three copies of this edition at the BL, NLS, and University of Aberdeen.

The author's own copy of three short papers on archaeological findings in the Pictish site in Burghead, Moray. The second and third papers here are reprinted from the Proceedings of the Society of Antiquaries of Scotland. Library Hub records just two copies, at NLS and Newcastle, both of which are the three pamphlets bound together as here, suggesting they were issued together despite the range of dates. Against this, the overwritten inscription to the title-page of 'Further Excavations' argues for its origin as a separate publication, with the illegible writing plausibly a presentation inscription that went unpresented. NLS notes the publication as one of 80 copies though there is no indication of that limitation here.
