


A reprint of German schoolmaster Johann Franz Ahn's popular language textbook, with a 'Caution' printed to the verso of the half-title advising against spurious, unauthorised editions of his work. Ahn also adapted his new, practical easy method to produce guides to Spanish, French, Italian and Portuguese. This edition is unknown to Library Hub and Worldcat, both of which record multiple similar editions from the 1850s to 1870s, usually in single copies.







The Left Book Club edition of an important feminist dystopia, first published in 1937. Set 700 years after a Hitler victory in World War II when women have no rights or status save as childbearers, it anticipated both alternate history fiction about the war and the war itself, with this, second edition containing a publisher's note outlining the author's changes of opinion on the corruptive power of Nazism. Following this edition the novel was not republished until the Feminist Press edition of 1985, when the authorship of Katharine Burdekin (1896-1963) was established and its status has continued to grow since then - Darragh McManus wrote in The Guardian in 2009



that 'Swastika Night can be seen as a companion piece to Nineteen Eighty-Four, exploring the other side of the totalitarian coin with equal insight, prescience and humanity.'




A small, scarce book by jobbing Scottish writer Robert Menzies Fergusson, whose other written output includes a cyclist travelogue through Holland and Belgium, a volume of Ochil fairy tales and a book of poetry. This book seems to have been produced owing to an excess of (ill-) feeling on Fergusson's part - he views vagrants as 'regular loafers, lookers for work without the desire to find it, migratory tramps who accost every traveller they meet and glibly tell a made-up story of dire misfortune, with which the prey upon the kindly feelings of the unthinking, who hand them a few coppers in order to get rid of their melancholy pleadings' (p.12). His uncompassionate solution is large-scale labour colonies, which in the short final chapter he also advocates as a desirable thing for Scotland's epileptics, calling such a colony an 'urgent necessity.' Library Hub records 7 copies.





The first edition of prolific Scottish writer George Robert Gleig's (1796-1888) third work of fiction, published while he served as chaplain at Chelsea Hospital. It was his first novel published as such under his own name, following an anonymous story and his best known work, a collection of articles based on his experiences in the Peninsular War, along with various non-fiction books.



A reprint of the adapted script for Jonson's Alchemist, with the frontispiece featuring David Garrick as Abel Drugger, a role that helped launch his career. Garrick had retired from the stage in 1766, but stayed on to manage the theatre until 1776, returning to the stage that year for a series of farewell performances.

First published in 1817 as 'Apicius Redivivus', in this third edition Kitchiner states that the book is 'almost entirely re-written, -- He has not printed one Receipt-- that has not been proved in His own Kitchen' (p. xiii). The text was popular, much-reprinted, and influential - especially on Mrs Beeton. The introduction contains a 3-page list of cookery books published between 1513 and 1814 reportedly consulted by the author ('my tedious progress through these books - many of which did not afford the germ of a single idea', p. 27).



The second edition of Lindsay's most famous and influential novel, which CS Lewis called 'shattering, intolerable, and irresistible'. It was first published in 1920, and was, per Gollancz's introduction, 'a plain flop' (p.5) with only 596 copies sold and 834 remaindered. This was the first time it was reprinted, the inaugural novel in Gollancz's series 'The Connoisseur's Library of Strange Fiction', which ran to four titles, half of them by Lind-

A pamphlet reprinting a speech made by Sir Thomas Maitland (1760-1824), politician, soldier and diplomat, who was concurrently Governor of Malta and High Commissioner of the Ionian Islands in the early 19th century. His address touches on events in mainland Greece that became the Greek War of Independence from Ottoman rule and he counsels strict neutrality in these matters on the part of the legislators.

The anonymous author, Frederick Malkin (1802-1830) was the second son of Benjamin Heath Malkin, the schoolmaster and promoter of William Blake. Despite the generic title this is an original work, in fact unusually so for something produced to be an affordable text for the general public (text in double-columns, etc.). Malkin died young, with this being his only published work.

The first English translation of the second collaborative work between Jules Michelet (1798–1874) and his second wife, Athénaïs Michelet (1826–1899), who is credited with inspiring and encouraging her husband's interest in natural history. Though only his name is printed, in their first collaborative work 'The Bird' Michelet acknowledges his wife's integral role: 'The book which I now publish may be described as the offspring of the domestic circle and the home fireside... of the two souls to which it owes its existence, one was the more powerfully attracted to natural studies by the fact that, in a certain sense, it had been born among them, and had ever preserved their fragrance and sweet savour.'

The second edition, published a month after the first, of Milne's collection of poetry for children. The poem 'Teddy Bear' features the first appearance of Winnie The Pooh, here given his formal name of Edward Bear; one of E.H. Shephard's illustrations here ultimately formed the basis for the Disney version of the character.

A scarce early printing of Planché's vampire play, first performed in 1820 and freely adapted from a French drama of the same year, Charles Nodier's 'Le Vampire'. Both of these stage productions are ultimately based on John William Polidori's short story 'The Vampire', which first saw print in 1819, attributed to Lord Byron. Planché's tale retains the Scottish setting of Nodier's play, despite Planché's firm belief that the setting was wrong, at the insistence of theatre manager Samuel Arnold, who had Scottish costumes in stock at the Lyceum. Planché's own preference was to set it in Hungary. Following its 1820 run the play was revived in 1829, possibly occasioning this reprint; the cast lists of both productions are printed here. Library Hub records 3 holdings, BL, Cambridge and NLS.

It is bound with a further 7 plays, all save one from publisher John Cumberland's series 'Cumberland's British Theatre' with prefaces by George Daniel. The interloper is from a very similar series produced by Thomas Dolby. Of particular note among these others are three Shakespeare plays: Othello, Hamlet and The Comedy of Errors, each of them (as with The Vampire) having an attractive frontispiece by Robert Cruikshank.

The first edition of this lasting and important translation of Plutarch's Lives, frequently reprinted throughout the nineteenth century. This was the first translation of Plutarch into English done from the original Greek, and though criticised for its prose style, it became the standard version, displacing the one published under Dryden's name in the 17th century.





John Speidell's (fl.1600-1634) book of geometrical problems was first published in 1616 and must have sold slowly, with the same sheets being reissued in 1617 and 1627, when appended to his 'Breefe Treatise of Sphaericall Triangles'. This 1657 edition therefore represents the second actual printing of the work. This copy belonged to a Nathanael Jones, possibly the Merionethshire poet (c.1624-1683); the other man in the inscription would likely therefore be William Salusbury (d. 1677) who was Sheriff of Merioneth from 1661-2. It has had a hard life - not unusual for a book meant for use - but has been skilfully restored.



A selection of the published findings of Josiah Wedgwood in his attempt to perfect a high-heat thermometer, as reported to the Royal Society, here in a variety of formats and editions. Wedgwood, famous for his pottery, made several attempts to find a way of measuring temperatures higher than the 356°C boiling-point of mercury, in the pursuit of high-temperature glazes for his wares. Although later superseded and inaccurate in its conversion to centigrade, his clay-expansion measurement model proved useful in producing replicable temperatures for his firings. Wedgwood was made a fellow of the Royal Society in 1783 and read a series of papers relating to his work over a period of years, which were mostly published in the Society's Philosophical Transactions.



The earliest paper here is a duodecimo pamphlet, a separately-issued work printed by Joseph Cooper, which ESTC records in 8 locations, and is based on a paper Wedgwood gave two years earlier, though it was not published in the Philosophical Transactions until 1784. The second is a quarto offprint from the same issue of the Transactions that the earlier paper was published in, following up on his earlier research, and very scarce in this format (2 locations in ESTC). The third, from two years later, is here an extract from a full issue of the Transactions.
