


A scarce later printing of this perennial clandestine bestseller of reproductive health. There were multiple printings with this conveniently common publisher's name in the imprint, this one matching examples dated to between 1850 and 1860 by various library catalogues.

Two scarce provincially-printed medical books, bound (possibly from the parts, given inscription about binding) in a volume and presented by a Lancashire mother, Penelope Vavasour, to her daughter Julia in the year the latter gave birth to her second child.

The first work is in two sections. The first section concerns itself with matters more physical, with chapters on conduct during pregnancy, a section on childbirth, and proper food for infants; the second with matters more spiritual, with chapters on the origin of pride and vanity, the choice of toys, and books. Library Hub records 2 copies, at the BL and NLS, while Worldcat adds 4 more, 3 of which are in New York: Columbia, NYPL, SUNY and Virginia.

The second work is a reprint of John Wesley's 1747 medical guide printed in the Staffordshire town of Burslem. Library Hub records just a single copy, in the Wellcome Collection, to which Worldcat adds 2 copies, both in the United States: the National Library of Medicine and Wesleyan College, Georgia. To the rear are bound the contents leaves and a leaf from the introduction of an edition of William Buchan's Domestic Medicine; given the similarities in paper and print with the pages that immediately precede it, it seems likely to be from Tregortha's 1812 Burslem-printed edition (two American institutions only in Worldcat), and therefore possibly appended by accident in the print-shop.

A scarce work of Indiana local history by clergyman and historian Timothy Horton Ball (1826–1913). Worldcat records just the one copy, in Indiana State Library, amid a welter of facsimile reprints and digital and microfilm holdings.



The first English-language edition of the book that has (so far) spawned II films. The same translation was published in Britain the following year under the less-evocative title of *Monkey Planet*.

The first edition of the third pamphlet in a series published with the Labour Press by socialist writer and early gay activist Edward Carpenter (1844-1929). The first three titles, 'Sex-Love, and its Place in a Free Society', 'Woman, and her Place in a Free Society', and this one, were all published for public circulation, while the fourth, 'Homogenic Love, and its Place in a Free Society' was privately distributed. Carpenter argues here for the advancement of women's rights, stating that current law 'as in actual marriage... still leaves woman uncertain as to her rights over her own body, or in politics, where it still denies to her a voice in the framing of the laws which are to bind her', and he declares 'As true Freedom cannot be without Love, so true Love cannot be without Freedom' (pp.34-35).

An early publication of the Society for the Diffusion of Useful Knowledge, heavily based around the narrative of John Rutherford, (fl. 1796-1830) an English sailor who returned to England in 1828 having spent some years among the Maori people and acquired their traditional facial tattoos. He related a tale (now disputed) of 10 years' captivity with the Maori following a shipwreck involving cannibalism, forced tattooing and a daring escape, but also containing a wealth of detail about daily life in 1820s Aotearoa. These portions of the book were edited and republished as John Rutherford, The White Chief' in 1908.

Three works by diplomat, poet and bishop Giovanni della Casa (1503-1556), produced by the Florentine Giunti family printing firm. The works were issued together but the second two retain title-pages, one dated 1561 in error and the other 1571.


A scarce printing of Fénelon's popular novel, which Worldcat records in just 2 locations, both in Switzerland, in a worn but still attractive contemporary binding. This copy belonged to a P. Lindesay of Musselburgh, most likely Sir Patrick Lindesay (1778-1839), soldier and colonial administrator, the namesake of 2 mountains and one river in Australia.

The second edition of a slim book first published the previous year, the first work of celebrated literary hostess and society beauty Marguerite, Lady Blessington (1789-1849). Both editions are scarce, with 10 copies recorded in Library Hub in total, of which 4 are this 2nd printing.


A scarce early work from the prolific and eclectic author Catherine Laura Johnstone, who also penned

children's bible stories, a travel journal of Canada, a biography of Tsar Alexander II and 3 volume novel 'Tyrants of To-Day, or The Secret Society'. Library Hub records only 6 copies of The Archer and the Steppe all dated [1860] by their respective institutions, while Cambridge have a holding dated 1861; either an even scarcer second edition, or an error in their catalogue.







The complete published work of working-class poet Mary Leapor (1722-1746), who wrote verse while working as a kitchen maid in Northamptonshire. Her poetry and plays caught the eye of local gentlewoman Bridget Freemantle, who attempted to get one of Leapor's plays staged in London. This attempt was unsuccessful, but Freemantle's continued efforts saw some 600 subscribers to the first volume in 1748, albeit too late for Leapor herself to enjoy the fruits of it, the poet having died of the measles two years prior. Subscribers to the second volume included Elizabeth Montague and her sister Sarah Scott, the latter of whom may

have taken inspiration for her feminist utopian novel *Millennium Hall* (1762) from Leapor's poem Crumble-Hall 'whose hospitable Door/ Has fed the Stranger, and reliev'd the Poor' (p. 112); both describe stately homes unusually welcoming to women.

It is somewhat unusual to find the two volumes together. Library Hub records 10 copies of the first volume and 12 of the second, with BL, NLS, Oxford, QMUL, St Andrews, Strathclyde and Wellcome holding both volumes.

The first London printing of Marcus Aurelius's *Meditations* in the original Greek, with facing Latin text, taken from the edition by Wilhelm Xylander (1532-1576) and corrected by Méric Casaubon (1599-1671). Causabon had already published his own English translation in 1634, and for this edition was aided by a manuscript emended by his father, the famous scholar Isaac, which he claimed was 'of more use to him than all the preceding editions' (Dibdin p.268).

The 81st West African Division was formed in 1943, intended for jungle warfare in south-east Asia, with the Kaladan valley forming part of the boundary of the states of India and Burma, present-day Myanmar. It was composed of troops from various West African regiments from Nigeria, Ghana, Gambia and Sierra Leone, and among their officers was Seth Anthony, the first black African to be commissioned in the British Army.





The photographs in this album are in two distinct groups: The first 30 are larger, have typewritten captions pasted beneath them and are clearly posed, professional work issued as a set, comprising the 'official' photographs of the typed title-label. They are a mixture of portraits and scenes of daily life in the army, most featuring African troops. The second group of photographs are smaller in format and are more of a mixture: some professional Egyptian tourist views by Lehnert and Landrock and views of the Ismailia train station and war memorial, interspersed with some probable amateur snapshots, among them views taken aboard ships and some portraits, singly and in groups, of servicemen whose uniforms and distinctive slouch hats mark them out as fighting in the Burma campaign.

Library Hub records just 2 copies of this reprint of Pope's 1733 poem, which is accompanied in this printing with two of Pope's shorter devotional works.

There seem to be two issues of this dystopian fantasy novel, with no established precedence: this one, in red boards, bound without flyleaf or half-title and with a Falcon Press colophon to the spine, and a variant in grey boards, with flyleaf and half-title and with 'Grey Walls Press' to the foot of the spine. Falcon and Grey Walls were partner presses from 1948, sharing resources (and debts, with both presses folding in 1954), and Falcon Press are listed as Canadian distributors to the verso of the title-page. This variant was perhaps bound for export but issued domestically - the dustjacket is priced in shillings on the flap.





A complete set of a major undertaking: the complete works of Shakespeare in elegant large-format letterpress, set in 16pt Monotype Baskerville with Caslon Display by Gloucester Typesetting Services, with printing requiring the services of three different firms across England and Germany, and the binding in quarter goatskin completed by Lachenmaier in Reutlinge. Each play volume is numbered and presented with a companion volume of



the sheets of the Oxford University Press text and commentary of the corresponding work, specially-bound for this edition. The volumes are colour-coded, with the comedies being in green, the histories in blue and the tragedies in red, plus the volume of poetry in turquoise. The project began ambitiously, with the first 12 volumes in a limitation of 3,750 numbered copies (plus 25 lettered); it was then scaled down and the remainder were produced in runs of only 1,000 numbered copies, apart from the poems, for which 1,980 numbered copies (and 20 lettered) were produced. Complete, continuously numbered sets are already difficult to acquire.

A scarce edition of Virgil, printed in close imitation of Baskerville's famous 1757 edition: on laid paper, with a type that closely resembles Baskerville's, and laid out in a similarly spare style (though plainer still, without decorative touches such as line numbers, italics, and drop capitals). The printer provides a preface in which he praises the famous beauty of




Baskerville's edition, but criticises its text and choice of emendations and readings. His response is to print this edition, combining as it were beauty and brains, by joining R.F.P. Brunck's recently published text to a version of Baskerville's mise en page. Library Hub locates only five copies, at Oxford, Cambridge (2 copies), BL, and Glasgow, and Kallendorf indicates that only 200 copies were printed..



25 issues of a current affairs bulletin produced for training purposes by and for the New Zealand armed forces, in a workmanlike but contemporary binding. Topics covered include war in Russia and the Pacific and brief overviews of contemporary developments in Italy, and France in the context of the war, as well as issues on democracy in America, health services, soil fertility and one titled 'About Houses'. From issue 18 onwards the publication had a small change of name to NZ Services Current Affairs Bulletin, better reflecting its distribution and scope.

Scarce, with Worldcat recording only 2 holdings, both in New Zealand. Library Hub records that the BL holds a partial run, all of which postdate these editions.
