

Emma was first, in 1948, followed by Pride and Prejudice in 1951, Mansfield Park in 1957, Sense and Sensibility in 1958, and Northanger Abbey and Persuasion rounding out the set in 1961. In this example Emma is a 1954 3rd printing and all the others are firsts, each uniformly-bound and illustrated with watercolours by Philip Gough.




The scarce first edition of William 'Buffalo Bill' Cody's first autobiography, exceptionally rare inscribed by the man himself. The text was probably ghost-written by Prentiss Ingraham, author of dozens of Buffalo Bill dime novels, and it is reported that only a few thousand copies were sold, most of which would have undoubtedly been read to destruction. Cody had by 1879 achieved some fame but it was a few years later that he founded his Wild West show that established the iconic depiction of the American frontier, the format of the rodeo, and the mythologisation of the cowboy figure; a further autobiography (also ghost-written) was required by the time of his death.





This copy has lost (or never had) two leaves of preliminaries but retains an early inscription in Cody's hand, to a J. Anderson in December of 1882, the fertile period when Cody was creating his formative show: in July of 1882 Cody had staged 'The Old Glory Blowout', and the 'Wild West' itself began in May of 1883.

We have been able to trace only one other inscribed copy in commerce, the Doheny copy inscribed to Joseph Gordon Bennett, which sold for \$1650 in the 1988 Christie's Doheny sale and again for \$3575 in






The first edition of Clare's final work published within his lifetime. Clare (1793–1864), poet and farm labourer, 'rightly acknowledged by many to be England's finest nature poet' (ODNB) published his first book in 1820 and became an immediate celebrity, feted in London's literary world and seeing his book go through 4 reprints within a year. By the 1830s however his health and fame were waning; he was first institutionalised in 1837 and lived most of the rest of his life in close contact with asylums. He continued to write for the rest of his life although his later works didn't see print until the 20th century, during which his stock continued to rise, with a memorial in Poets' Corner erected in 1989.

This copy is in Carter's 'B' variant binding of blind-stamped cloth.






Freshfield was inculcated into Alpinism from an early age by his mother, the mountaineer Jane Freshfield, and made the first ascent of Tour Ronde in 1867 at the age of 22. Latterly he served as president of the Royal Geographical Society and the Alpine Club, editing the journal of the latter organisation in the 1870s. This book details his excursions into the mountainous region to the south of Russia, and reproduces striking photographs by Italian mountaineer and photographer Vittoria Sella (1859-1943) in photogravure, many of them representing the first photographs taken of these areas.



The correspondence between Dr Johnson and his friend and confidante Hester Piozzi, edited by the latter 4 years after Johnson's death and 2 years after publication of her 'Acedotes' of Johnson's life drawn from her diaries. It predates Boswell's 1791 Life of Johnson and represents 'the first publication and canonization of a large body of [Johnson's] correspondence (some 338 letters)', though it received 'some justified abuse from Boswell, who detected some manipulative editing, and less deserved rancour from the disgruntled Baretti. Arthur Murphy declared that the edition revealed the



great man "in the undress of his mind" (Monthly Review, 78, 1778, 326), and her editorial practice has largely been vindicated by modern editors who reserve their disapproval for the self-conscious over-dressing of her own revised letters to Johnson' (ODNB).

A pioneering documentarian of the natural world, Kearton's photographs illustrated many of his brother Richard's (1862-1928) books and he is credited with capturing the first film of London from the air (in 1908) and the first recording of birdsong in the wild (in 1900).

This copy has been signed by Kearton, and this signature has been incorporated into a contemporary gift inscription.

An important and luxurious edition of the full breadth of Marvell's writings, bringing together his poetry and political writings, and indeed his political poetry, as this edition reprints his poems in praise of Oliver Cromwell that were omitted from previous collections of his works as being too scandalously anti-monarchical. This new collection, with greater emphasis on Marvell's radicalism, was well-timed: subscribers, who paid 'three guineas per sett' per the list, numbered among them radical John Wilkes and signatories of the American Declaration of

Independence Samuel Adams and John Hancock, as well as Edmund Burke. The editor of the set was Edward Thompson, naval captain and poet, who had worked with another subscriber, David Garrick, on some Drury Lane theatrical productions in the 1770s.

Worldcat records just 6 copies, all in North American institutions, alongside 3 holdings of the separately-catalogued sequel. Library Hub records an 1827 printing at the BL only, and an undated Hughes printing at the V&A.







The third edition of this tour-de-force production of the Mekhitharist congregation of Benedectine monks of the Armenian Catholic Church on San Lazzaro, Venice. The monastery, which moved there during the Seventh Ottoman-Venetian War (1714–18), established a printing press, mainly for the production of classical Armenian texts for export to Constantinople. However, the press retained a stock of various typefaces and

expertise in numerous languages, and produced several of these compilations of the daily prayers of St Nerses IV the Gracious translated into 24 (or more) languages. The languages and scripts here include Armenian, English, German, Russian, Syriac, Polish, and Georgian, among others. The fourth edition of 1837 (featuring a slightly different selection of 24 languages) is the most commonly met with, earlier editions such as this being much scarcer.

The first trade edition of Virginia Woolf's sixth novel, famous for the gender exploration of its titular character. Woolf dedicated the work to Vita Sackville-West, the inspiration for the androgynous poet, noting in her diary on October 5th, 1927: 'And instantly the usual exciting devices enter my mind: a biography beginning in the year 1500 and continuing to the present day, called Orlando: Vita; only with a change about from one sex to another. I think, for a treat, I shall let myself dash this in for a week...' (Woolf, A Writer's Diary, p. 116, 1953). The two women shared a romantic and sexual relationship, and maintained a deep friendship thereafter, with Vita's son Nigel Nicholson declaring



'Orlando' to be 'the longest and most charming love letter in literature'.
