






A rare illustrated guide by magician and author Val Andrews (1926-2006) to visual jokes to aid the magician and stage entertainer. In his introductory note Andrews cites the advent of commercial television as a driver for demand of gags of this nature; Andrews went on to write scripts for comedic magician and tv star Tommy Cooper. This copy was owned by another magician with a television show, Paul Daniels (1938-2016), with his embossed stamp to the first page. This title is unknown to Library Hub, with Worldcat recording just a single copy, at the University of Maryland.

This edition reprints the John Tenniel illustrations first used in 1865. In addition to the 1000 copies printed on paper, a further 12 were issued on wellum

The first British edition of the sixth Poirot novel, first serialised in Liberty Magazine the previous year (and briefly preceded by the American edition), in an unusual binding, possibly a remainder issue. The usual states – with some disagreement over precedence – are recorded as a reddish-orange finely-woven cloth lettered in black, and a black cloth lettered in gilt, each with lettering reproducing the typography of the title-page. This copy is in a lighter orange cloth and the lettering is plainer in style, suggesting a later, cheaper issue – though not by much, since a second impression was required only two months after this first.



The first British edition of this late Conrad novel, published in August 1919, following the American edition of April and serialisation in Lloyd's magazine beginning in 1918. 'Although not ranking as a Conrad princeps, the First English Edition of The Arrow of Gold is yet a desirable book to the reader as well as the collector. Its text embodies certain corrections which, though duly forwarded to America, did not arrive there in time for incorporation in the original edition of the novel' (Wise).

The Left Book Club edition of an important feminist dystopia, first published in 1937. Set 700 years after a Hitler victory in World War II when women have no rights or status save as childbearers, it anticipated both alternate history fiction about the war and the war itself, with this, second edition containing a publisher's note outlining the author's changes of opinion on the corruptive power of Nazism. Following this edition the novel was not republished until the Feminist Press edition of 1985, when the author-




ship of Katharine Burdekin (1896-1963) was established and its status has continued to grow since then - Darragh McManus wrote in The Guardian in 2009 that 'Swastika Night can be seen as a companion piece to Nineteen Eighty-Four, exploring the other side of the totalitarian coin with equal insight, prescience and humanity.'

This copy belonged to Communist organiser Fred Westacott (1916-2001), author of the autobiography 'Shaking the Chains'.

Textually something of a 'Frankenstein' book, in which parts of three of Delafosse's works have been finessed in translation to produce one book for the English-speaking world. It was overseen by publisher and scholar Carter G. Woodson, the only child of American enslaved parents to obtain a PhD, and the second African American after W.E.B. Du Bois to obtain a PhD from Harvard. Woodson was dedicated to promoting


with his work and his publishing house elements of black history and culture typically overlooked by academia and society in the 1920s and 30s, and instituted Negro History Week in February 1926, recognised as the genesis of the later Black History Month.

Maurice Delafosse (1870-1926) was a French colonial administrator and linguist whose disagreements with the French government curtailed his career, later in life he served on the League of Nations committee on slavery.

A companion to the earlier Marijuana Consumer's and Dealer's Guide, this scarce pamphlet offers a recipe for making DMT in your kitchen, extolls the virtues of hashish over grass and closes with a calculation of how much weed was smoked at the then-recent Woodstock festival (2,811 lbs) and a prayer for legalisation. 
The very scarce first appearance of one of the most important Scottish novels of the 20th century, the first part of Grassic Gibbon's Scots Quair trilogy. Revolutionary in its realism and use of a modified Scots language, it has been several times adapted for stage and screen including a 2015 film by Terence Davies.

The first uk printing of Anaïs Nin's first short story collection, which she initially published herself in 1944. This edition includes two extra novellas, and it preceded the New York reprint by Dutton in 1948.

The scarce expanded second edition of a pro-Nigerian independence pamphlet by Amanke Okafor, a Nigerian studying law at King's College, London. He was at that time under surveillance by British Intelligence Services for his communist beliefs and his file (declassified in 2005) contains a copy of the first edition of this pamphlet from the previous year, which a security liaison officer describes elsewhere in the file as having 'marked Communist tendencies'. Both editions have a foreword by actor and activist Paul Robeson.

Orwell's third novel, influenced by his time working in a Hampstead bookshop. Not a lovely copy but spared the overzealous ink-stamping sometimes seen in circulating library copies of this period, with a single stamp from Lee's Library, 162 Byres Road, to the otherwise-blank flyleaf.



a 'brief over-all survey of the Colonial Problem in British Africa' (introduction, p. 9) by Pan-Africanist and anti-imperialist George Padmore, (1903-1959), with an overview of independence movements and native administrations in British colonial possessions across the continent. Padmore had an intimate knowledge of these matters following decades of organising work across three continents culminating in the 5th Pan-African Congress in Manchester in 1945 with this book's dedicatee W.E.B. Du Bois; also present at the gathering were Hastings Banda, Jomo Kenyatta and Padmore's close friend Kwame Nkrumah, delegates from Malawi, Kenya and Ghana respectively, each of whom would be the first leaders of their countries post-independence.

This copy has been neatly signed by Padmore to the flyleaf.

A well-preserved example of a fragile guide to various magic tricks. Library Hub records just a single copy, at Senate House; Worldcat adds a further 7 holdings: 5 in North America, 2 in Australia. This copy is from the library of magician Paul Daniels (1938-2016).

A complete set of the volumes comprising the survey of the county of Argyll - by far the largest project in the series of inventories produced by the Royal Commission on the Ancient and Historical Monuments of Scotland. It was also the last, with no further volumes produced after the seventh volume of Argyll in 1992, more than two decades after the first Argyll volume. It is unusual to find the all seven together.
