


sole Edition, 8vo, pp. 49, [1]. Original card wrappers, front wrapper printed in black. A little spotting. Sometime backed in green cloth, boards a little toned and soiled. Modern binder's ticket of Riley, Dunn & Wilson to inside rear wrapper. £60

A scarce, slim travelogue, attributed by Halkett and Laing to David Dakers Black despite the text being signed 'T.G.'. Black was not the visiting stranger the text would suggest, but laird of the Kergord estate, and responsible for the clearance of the Weisdale valley through the 1850s, in which upwards of 300 crofters were evicted in favour of sheep.

Library hub records 4 copies, 3 of which are in Edinburgh: NLS, Royal College of Physicians Edinburgh and the University of Edinburgh, with the outlier being the University of Glasgow.

The first edition of this Viking romance that was very influential in shaping to annual Up Helly Aa festivities, giving them their Viking theme. Burgess also wrote the Up Helly Aa Song, sung at every iteration of the festival since 1897. This copy belonged to his fellow Shetland author and antiquarian, W. Fordyce Clark.

The author of this provincially-printed history of Shetland was three years a missionary on the archipelago.

The sole publication of Lerwegian poet Margaret Chalmers (1758-1827), published by subscription in Newcastle. 'The volume was badly printed and publicized, and many subscribers were lost by delay. It did not attain the financial success which, for its literary panache and the interest of its subject matter, it deserved.' (ODNB). Alongside poems on her native archipelago the volume includes some verses in imitation of Robert Burns and a poem addressed to Sir Walter Scott, on the publication of his *Lady of The Lake*.



A scarce overview of the archipelago: Library Hub records just 4 copies, at Aberdeen, BL, Oxford and Tyntesfield, Somerset, care of The National Trust. It includes chapters on topography, the flora and fauna of the islands, and knitting. Edmonston was a native of the Shetland Island of Unst and mother of the novelist Jessie Saxby.



Holbourn was an academic and co-founder of Ruskin College, Oxford, but also laird of Foula, the most remote of the Shetland islands, from around 1900. This copy survives in its striking dustjacket, rare in commerce.





The first edition of the text of two lectures given by pioneering scholar of the Norn language Jakob Jakobsen (1864-1918), following his fieldwork in Shetland between 1893 and 1895. It was reprinted in 1926.





An early production by Shetland-born Jessie Saxby, who published her first book in 1868 and supported herself and her children from her writing following her husband's death in 1873.

A Shetland-set improving tale for children by the Unst-born author and first professional Shetlandic author, Jessie Margaret Edmondston Saxby (1842-1940). Library Hub records 5 copies: NLS, Oxford, Aberdeen, Cambridge and BL.

A scarce and undated album of photographic reproductions of Shetland, produced by Lerwick bookseller and stationer Thomas Mathewson. Despite the title, one of the photographs depicts a woman carrying peat,



another depicts Shetland ponies. One of the views specifies it was taken at midnight on midsummer, 1889.

A complete set of Shetland anthologies - 4 volumes of The Hjaltland Anthology (the Norse name for Shetland) and its scarce companion volume for the town of Lerwick. Each volume is an edited compilation of antiquarian material - legal papers, kirk records and other manuscript material - edited and assembled by Edwyn Seymour Reid Tait, with occasional assistance from Christina Jamieson. Library Hub records 9 holdings of The Hjaltland Miscellany, some specifying 4 of 5 volumes, others appearing to be a single book; complete sets are rare in commerce.
