



The first British edition of Auden's annotated anthology of his favourite passages.

The half-titles and title-pages advertise this as the seventh and eighth volume in a ten-volume set of Austen's Novels edited by Reginald Brimley Johnson but as Gilson notes, the novels were all issued separately, and reprinted at different times. This is the second edition of Emma, from December 1892, two months after the title first appeared in this version. The illustrations are by William C. Cooke and were short-lived for Dent; the publisher reissued the text of this set in 1898 but with new, colour illustrations by C.E. and H.M. Brock supplanting Cooke's efforts.




The first is an early reprint of Burke's second great speech on America, arguing against punitive measures or war in the dispute with the colonies that became the American War of Independence. Of the 34 copies of this printing listed in ESTC, only 2 are in the UK (BL and Oxford), with the majority of the remainder in North American institutions.



The penultimate work Fletcher published in his lifetime, contributions to the parliament begun in May 1703 to settle the question of royal succession following the death of Queen Anne. It became a question of whether Scots would accept the Hanoverian line of succession, to which Fletcher sought to assign conditions reducing the powerlessness of Scotland in the arrangement: 'his proposals were designed to put the existing union of the crowns on a more strictly confederal footing. Again and again he insisted that the root of the problem was ministerial dependence' (ODNB). This is the scarcer of 2 variants recorded by ESTC, which locates 14 copies.





The second book, Grace And Miss Partridge, was initially rejected by publisher Marion Boyars in 1965, only for her to ask for it again two years later, as 'she had found it unforgettable' (ODNB).

The woodcut illustrations are by Garnett's first wife Ray, while the dedicatee is Garnett's lover (and future father-in-law) Duncan Grant.



The first edition of this collection of essays including a substantial section dedicated to reflections on Malthus. Coleridge and Southey also feature among more directly political characters like Burke, Pitt, and Fox.


The first edition of Archie Hind's only novel, a portrait of a working-class Glasgow writer that won Guardian Fiction Book of The Year Award. In 2005 it was selected as one of the 100 best Scottish books of all time by The List magazine, and its reputation has grown in recent years following Hind's death in 2018: it has been republished by Canongate with an introduction by Hind's close friend Alasdair Gray, and in 2024 its manuscript was acquired by Strathclyde University with the rest of Hind's papers.





The first British publication of Lawrence's account of his RAF service (a small number of copies had been printed in the USA two decades earlier for copyright reasons), in its unexpurgated limited issue. The simultaneous trade edition has had potentially offensive words blanked out.



Bentley's 'new edition', only the second proper printing, of Maturin's iconic and influential 1820 gothic novel. Sales were evidently slow as this printing is most often found in a cloth binding, as here, blocked with the name of Macmillan on the spine - a result of the sheets becoming remaindered and being purchased by Macmillan along with the rest of Bentley's business in 1898. Melmoth, a Faustian tale of a pact with the devil laced with anti-Catholicism, has cast a long shadow over fiction since, with the name reoccurring




in Maturin's descendant Oscar Wilde's chosen pseudonym for his years of exile in France, the sobriquet of Humbert Humbert's car in Nabokov's Lolita, and the major inspiration for and namesake of Sarah Perry's 2018 novel 'Melmoth'. This edition is scarce and the first edition now almost impossible to obtain.

The fourth novel of Australian novelist and communist organiser Katharine Susannah Prichard (1883-1969). 'For Miles Franklin it represented 'the breaking of a drought' for the Australian novel. A passionate, lyrical celebration of the intuitive lives of the small community of timber-getters in the Western Australian karri forests, Working Bullocks reflects both Lawrence and Hardy in its symbolic patterns as well as demonstrating the explicit, if idealized, Australianisms of Prichard's fiction.' (Australian Dictionary of Biography). Library Hub records 7 copies.


A scarce early reprint of Radcliffe's first novel, originally published in 1789. A gothic tale of murder and revenge among Scottish noblemen, it establishes a formula that would gain her fame in the 1790s with The Mysteries of Udolpho. Library Hub records just two copies, at Oxford and the library at Attingham Park administered by the National Trust.

An advance readers' copy of the second Potter book, which was unusually produced with the artwork that was to feature on the first American dustjacket to its wrappers, as opposed to the generic wrappers more usually used for ARCS. Interviewed about the proof for Sorcerer's Stone which was similarly bedecked, publisher Arthur Levene called it 'elegantmadding 'we wanted to make a big splash' (quoted in Errington).

The first edition of an influential fishing book by William Scrope (1772-1852), 'an excellent classical scholar, a keen sportsman, and one of the ablest amateur artists of his time' (ODNB). It was reissued in 1854 but without the tinted lithographs of this edition, printed by Day & Haghe.





The first edition of the collection of work primarily composed by Wallace for various scientific journals over the preceding 35 years, revised and rewritten for this book, with a handful of original pieces also included. They are organised thematically, including sections on Earth studies, descriptive zoology and the theory of evolution. These copies are designated 'Presentation Copies' by a publisher's embossed stamp to the title-pages.

A rare Scottish novel, recorded in just the NLS by Library Hub, with Worldcat adding only Monash University Library in Australia. The NLS attribute it to historian and novelist James Henry Froude (1818–1894), almost certainly because of his use of the pseudonym Zeta for his 1847 novel Shadows of the Clouds, but that was a semi-autobiographical novel of apostasy, while this is a Glasgow-set romance. Additionally the preface is signed from Perth, while Froude was an Oxford Fellow at that time. Neither Sadleir nor Wolff record it, and Monash attribute it to Sir Zachary Cope, who wasn't born until 1881.
