



FIRST EDITION, 16mo, pp. 54. Original plain wrappers, integral tissue-jacket printed in black and red, top edge red, others untrimmed. A little minor spotting. Tissue-jacket slightly toned and spotted.

The first edition of the scarce second book of verse by Marion Angus (1865-1946), a significant figure in the Scottish literary renaissance. She did not begin writing poetry until late in life, with her first book, The Lilt (1922), appearing around the same time as the first published writings of Hugh MacDiarmid, three decades her junior, and though lesser-known today her use of Scots was also important in the transition from the legacy of Burns to modern Scottish literary language.





Two of Annand's celebrated poetry collections for children, each signed and with additional material. Loosely inserted are two further poems by Annand: The typed text of the poem Mavis, which is the first poem in the first collection, and the source for the titles of both books, which has been signed by the poet; and a manuscript copy of the poem Mince and Tatties, signed and dated Xmas 1978. This latter poem saw print in a further volume of verse for the juvenile market in 1979, 'Thrice to Show Ye'



The first British edition of John Berryman's fourth poetry collection, which won the 1965 Pulitzer Prize for poetry.

A scarce pocket edition of the poems of Burns, which Library Hub locates in NLs only. This copy has an ink sketch and transcription of the grave of fellow Scottish poet Robert Fergusson (1750-1774), the stone of which was paid for by Burns, to the blank verso of the title-page, dated Sunday Dec. 23, 1821. The artist has accurately rendered the shape and lettering of the stone, including the four-line epitaph by Burns, and had added imaginary buttresses topped with lamp-posts, between which is strung a banner with a twelve-line elegy for Burns, adapted from the poet's own Elegy on Captain Matthew Henderson.

The first duodecimo printings of Pope's landmark, much-reprinted translation of the Odyssey, in a contemporary matching binding. It was also issued in folio and quarto editions, probably more-or-less simultaneously -Griffith tentatively assigns these printings the same




month of issue as their larger-format brethren. The fifth volume also contains a translation of Homer's Battle of the Frogs and Mice, following the index.







An attractive copy of the fourth London printing of Ramsay's collected poems, the first to update the contents from how they had appeared in the author's lifetime. It adds substantial prefatory matter including remarks by Alexander Fraser Tytler, Lord Woodhouselee and a life of the poet by the editor, George Chalmers (1742–1825), and formed the basis of most further printings until the Scottish Text Society's decades-long scholarly edition in the 20th century.



The only poetry collection published by celebrated novelist and nature-writer Nan Shepherd (1893-1981), best known for her 1977 work 'The Living Mountain' and recently but firmly elevated to the firmament of Scottish letters by appearing on a Royal Bank of Scotland five pound note. The nature writer Robert Macfarlane, who wrote the foreword to the 2011 Canongate reissue of 'The Living Mountain' that did so much to bring Shepherd's work to a new audience, wrote in The Guardian in 2013 describing 'In The Cairngorms' as a book which was 'first published 80 years ago in a tiny print run, and has since been almost impossible to find.' A reissue in 2015 (with another foreword by MacFarlane) made the text available again but first editions are rare in trade and generally scarce elsewhere as well - Library Hub records 7 locations: Aberdeen, BL, East Anglia, Oxford, St Andrews, Scottish Poetry Library and NLS.

Worldcat locates 4 copies on three continents: St Mary's and Newman Colleges, Melbourne Australia, University of Delaware, Bibliotheque National de France, and Biblio et Archives National de Quebec. This copy bears the bookplate of Sir Robert Milliken-Napier, 9th Baronet, and the ownership signature of his wife Anne.



The eighth edition of Yeats's important and successful collection, which saw revised editions through almost the entire span of his writing life. This edition is only a slight revision of the seventh - further reprints followed before the next major revision in 1927 - and it adopts the cheaper binding style of blocking the front board in blind instead of gilt which was introduced for part of the run of the previous edition, probably due to wartime economies.
