

An attractive copy of Adichie's second novel, and winner of the Woman's Prize for Fiction in 2007.


An Irish printing of barrister Charles Barton's (1768-1843) first book, first published in London in the same year. 'This short work aimed to be a scientific deduction of the proceedings used on the equity side of the courts of exchequer and chancery, tracing each of the steps from the institution of a suit to a decree' (ODNB). This Hibernian issue is scarcer than the London printing, particularly on this side of the Atlantic - ESTC records 12 copies, all of them in North America. List 90: Recent Acquisitions





The 38th and final Ariel Poem pamphlet from Faber and Faber, with attractive illustrations by Barnett Freedman, that to the first page in full colour.

The first English edition of Dostoevsky's fourteenth novel, which was later translated as 'The Devils' and 'The Demons'. It is the third volume of publisher Heinemann and translator Constance Garnett's project to bring his novels and short stories into English, many of them, as here, for the first time. Written after the author's return from Siberian exile, it was called his 'most confused and violent novel, and his most satisfactorily "tragic" work' by Joyce Carol Oates. Garnett's translations were hugely influential: 'Conrad, for whom Turgenev



was Constance Garnett, compared her to a great musician interpreting a great composer. For Katherine Mansfield, Constance Garnett transformed the lives of younger authors by revealing a new world. Without her translations, H. E. Bates believed, modern English literature itself could not have been what it is' (ODNB).

The 17th and penultimate volume in Heinemann and Garnett's series translating the works of Dostoevsky. The 'Other Stories' of the title are 'Uncle's Dream', 'A Novel in Nine Letters', 'An Unpleasant Predicament', 'Another Man's Wife', 'The Heavenly Christmas Tree', 'The Peasant Marey', 'The Crocodile', 'Bobok' and 'The Dream of A Ridiculous Man'. Of the 10 stories collected here, 7 are appearing for the first time in English.

The first appearance of Constance Garnett's translation of Dostoevsky's 1859 novel, the 12th and final volume in Heinemann's 'Novels of Fyodor Dostoevsky' series. The other story alluded to in the title is 1849's Nye-tochka Nyezvanov, an unfinished novel which still accounts for some 150 pages. This is the latter work's first appearance in English.



A single-volume selection from the historical collections of John Somers, 1st Baron Somers (1951-1716), taken from the 16-volume set published between 1748 and 1752. The chronological ordering instituted here was also the principle for the second edition of the multi-volume work, edited by Walter Scott beginning in 1809.



An Irish mathematical work by the Quaker schoolmaster and printer Samuel Fuller (d. 1736), which was first published in 1730. Fuller himself published the first two editions in 1730 and 1736, and a London printing had followed in 1751. This fourth and last version was produced by Fuller's erstwhile assistant and fellow Quaker Isaac Jackson (1705-72), who purchased Fuller's printing business following the death of Fuller's widow in 1737. This was the first to credit Fuller as the author; previous editions were signed simply 'A Lover of Mathematics'. ESTC records 9 copies of this printing.





A snapshot of the political and social state of Ireland in 1828, provided by the Society for The Improvement of Ireland, formed in that year 'for the humane and charitable purpose of Providing Profitable Employment

for the poor' (their prospectus, quoted on p. 48). The statement itself fills the first sixteen pages, with the remainder of the text the appendix, mostly reports of society committees – on trade, agriculture and canals (construction of a ship canal being their first major proposal) which paint a picture of a land unsupported and exploited. An early owner has continued these appendices with two of their own, meticulously handwritten on lined paper inserted to the rear: detailed records of Irish trade and finances from 1790 to 1831 with some commentary and observations.



Although the Society was not nationalist per se, focussing on improving the lot of Ireland within the union, the documents

here paint a dispiriting picture of lack and want in the Irish population. One of the handwritten tables to the rear enumerates 'causes which account for the present prevailing discontent in Ireland' listing six problems, focussing on increased taxes, falling productivity and absenteeism. 21. A scarce schoolbook by English poet William King (1663-1712), designed to 'serve as an easy introduction to the understanding of the Classicks'. ESTC notes only half a dozen copies in UK libraries, with only eight more copies located worldwide between ESTC and WorldCat. A second edition followed in 1711 with more engravings and a copious index.


Seven of the tales in this popular children's improving anthology are by Mary Lamb, the remaining three by her brother Charles. It was first published in 1809, a project of the Lamb's regular collaborators Mary Jane Godwin and her husband William, father of Mary Shelley.


A scarce jingoistic and virulently Francophobic screed, enumerating in great detail both historical invasions of Britain, from Caesar in 55 BC through to a failed French attempt in 1797, and various and lurid French cruelties, including but not limited to the beheading of pregnant women and the drinking of human blood. ESTC records 3 copies, at Oxford, Cambridge and NYPL, but dates it [1795?] and makes no mention of the plate (in which the public executioner of Paris, having no-one left to guillotine, guillotines himself). It was reviewed in the London periodicals in the autumn of 1798, and while the reviewer for The Critical Review complains



that much of it was cribbed from William Cobbett, none venture an attribution. The NYPL copy has an early inscription to its title-page, attributing the work to a Mr Charles Stuart - perhaps meaning Charles Stuart, 1st Baron Stuart de Rothesay (1779-1845), or his father Sir Charles Stuart (1753-1801). The latter was a general who spent 1797-98 commanding a force defending Lisbon and then was sent with 3000 men to attack Menorca, leaving him little time to pen anonymous agitprop, while the former was, by the time of Waterloo, British ambassador to France but was 19 years old in 1798 - possible but by no means unquestionable attributions.



A provincially-printed anthology of Northern English verse with a mythological bent, including Matthew Gregory Lewis's ballad 'Sir Guy The Seeker' (first published in his 1808 collection Romantic Tales), a claimed 13th-century account of the Laidley Worm of Spindleston Heugh, and an anonymous account of Queen Mab's fairy court at Fawdon Hill. It is illustrated with 11 woodcut vignettes that Hugo attributes to Thomas Bewick; Tattersfield does not and omits the volume.



The first published work of English writer Alan Sillitoe (1928-2010), his translation of Luis Ripoll's account of Frédéric Chopin's stay in Majorca with George Sand in Valldemosa, a recently abandoned monastery, where he composed some of his famous preludes. The stamp of the monastery on the title-page here may indicate that this copy was purchased at the private museum dedicated to Chopin and Sand, which began operation in the 1930s in the room in which they had stayed.

The rare Dublin reprint of Elizabeth Sophia Tomlins' (1763-1828) third novel, initially published in London in the same year. ESTC and WorldCat between them note only 2 copies outside the USA, both in Dublin (Marsh's and Trinity), with a further 5 copies in us institutions (Minnesota, NY Society, Rowfant Club, UNC, and Princeton); the first edition is recorded in a single copy at the BL. Tomlins' novels tend towards the sentimental and moralistic, though in this and her final novel, 'Rosalind de Tracey', she inserts 'portrayals of the marginalized, especially the poor working woman... such as governesses, and women lacemakers dying in squalid conditions as they ply their trade to bedeck the



rich' (ODNB). Having never married herself, she spent a number of years acting as governess to her father's younger children, as well as aiding in his professional work. Only after he died did she move away to live with three women and their mother in a cottage in Surrey.

An updated edition of Worrall's long-lived catalogue, the first to follow Worrall's death in 1771.
