

The special edition of this illustrated history of Holyrood Palace and Abbey, 'containing additional matter and illustrations' as per the limitation statement. It seems to have been a somewhat slapdash production - the limitation statement provides a space for copies to be hand-numbered but every example we have seen is unnumbered, and no consistent method of counting can support both the title-page claim in this edition to have 49 illustrations and that in the regular edition to have 46. Compared to the regular edition, this one has three extra pages concerning historical seals, but with only two images among them - and it omits the substantial advertisement section that closes the regular version. 3. An attractively-bound copy of the memoirs of the celebrated Edinburgh lawyer, judge and biographer Henry, Lord Cockburn (1779-1854).

A scarce early edition of this popular guide to running a household in the British Raj, first published in 1888, reprinted with an index in 1889, and then revised and updated for this third edition, sometimes also appearing in Urdu translation. It reached a seventh edition by 1909 with further printings into the 1920s, and in 2010 OUP produced a facsimile of the second edition. The authors were Grace Gardiner and Flora Annie Steel, each the wife of a British civil servant, writing from their own experience. Relatively little is known of Gardiner but Flora Annie Steel (1847-1929), born in Forfar, was an indefatigable auto-didact, educationalist, and writer; she later turned her hand to fiction, earning the description 'the female Rudyard Kipling'.

Naturally seeing heavy use in environments unfriendly to books, no copies of the first edition of this manual are known to survive, and Library Hub locates copies of this third in Oxford Brookes and the Wellcome only. Though co-published in Edinburgh and presumably sold in both places, the Bombay bookseller's stamp in this copy suggests it was one of those that started life in India.

Reminiscent in scope and style of his near-contemporary John Kay's 'Original Portraits', Crombie's engravings of the notables of Edinburgh society date from the last decade of his life and were collected by Kay's publisher Hugh Paton in 1851. A. and C. Black added copious biographical information on the sitters for this edition, reusing the original plates, which were then destroyed following this printing.

A handsome example of the first edition of Scottish novelist John Galt's best-remembered work, which reached a second edition the following year.

An attractively-bound copy of Galt's Irvine-set novel. The Provost so impressed Coleridge that he wrote in his own copy 'this and The Entail would alone suffice to place Galt in the first rank of contemporary Novellists [sic] - and second only to Sir W. Scott in technique.'




A scarce promotional booklet for some of Johnson's more exotic yarn offerings - among them camel, musk ox, llama and angora - with text written by the firm's chairman elaborating on their origins. It is strikingly presented, with attractive arts and crafts style borders printed in red or black, a number of attractive illustrations of the various animals, and, regrettably, a racist depiction of a black woman. Library Hub records just three copies, at Edinburgh, NMS, and London Met, with a 1938 limited printing at NLS.

The third edition of Rev. Kirk's landmark treatise on fairies and the second sight, and the first trade publication. It preserves Andrew Lang's notes from the 1893 Bibliotheque du Carabas edition (limited to 550 copies), and adds a new introduction by R.B. Cunningham Graham. The manuscript dates from 1692, although its first appearance was in 1815 in an printing of 100 copies edited by Sir Walter Scott. This copy contains a promotional bookmark from the publisher advertising two related publications: The Fairy Knowe, a one-act play about the disappearance of Robert Kirk, and The Prophecies of The Brahan Seer, another work on Highland second sight.

The first edition of Leyden's poem 'notable for combining nostalgia about Scotland's past with anxiety about its future' (ODNB). It also contains some Arthurian elements - in the years prior to its publication Leyden had been assisting Walter Scott's gathering of folklore for Scott's Border Minstrelsy of 1802, contributing poems and other material, which may have influenced this work's mythic bent.



The first edition of the second volume of sermons by celebrated folklorist and minister George MacDonald, best remembered for his books of fairy stories Phantastes and The Princess and The Goblin. The first volume was published in 1867 and a third volume followed in 1889. Shaberman specifies that there is no table of contents in the BL copy, as here - it is unclear whether he found it in other copies.

An early edition of the first volume of sermons by minister and author George MacDonald, best remembered for his books of fairy stories Phantastes and The Princess and The Goblin. It was first published in 1867; further volumes followed in 1885 and 1889. This printing follows the 1874 'fifth' and at least one other from different publishers.



Association copies of the first two volumes of the essays of the Highland Society, formerly owned by Sir James Grant, (1738-1811), 8th Baronet and chief of Clan Grant, brother-in-law to Henry Mackenzie (1745-1831), a director of the society and editor of these volumes, though best remembered for his sentimental novel The Man of Feeling. Mackenzie also penned the introductions. Further volumes followed between 1807 and 1824.



A generous gathering of documents on witchcraft in Renfrewshire first published in 1809. Beginning with Mackenzie's 'A Treatise on Witchcraft' from his Laws and Customs of Scotland, there follows an account of Sir George Maxwell's bewitchment (1622-1677). Most of the testimonies centre on the accusations made by Christian Shaw (1685-1737) in 1696 and the trials that followed in 1697. Upon witnessing Katherine Campbell, one of the household maids, steal a drink of milk, Christian reported her, and Campbell is said to have cursed the young girl in return. Of the seven people indicted, at least five were put to death on the Gallowgreen, with varying accounts on whether the accused were burned alive. It was the last mass execution for witchcraft in western Europe.

A previous owner has neatly added in manuscript to the rear the text of a sermon delivered in Paisley in 1697 by James Hutchinson, concluding on the front flyleaves, where it is joined by extracts from Chambers' Domestic Annals and the Statistical Account of Scotland in the same hand; to the rear pastedown is a newspaper clipping concerning the aforementioned Sir George MacKenzie, Lord Advocate.



A sharp copy of a small-format Gaelic grammar by Kintyre schoolmaster James Munro (1794-1870), who had also penned a Gaelic primer in 1828. Library Hub records five copies, at NLS, Glasgow, Edinburgh, Manchester and the BL.

A bright yellowback edition of Jane Porter's 1810 historical novel loosely based on the life of William Wallace. It was popular and reprinted many times through the 19th century and into the 20th, often undated. This copy is from Ward Lock's Select Library series and must date from between 1884 when they opened their Melbourne offices and 1891, when James Bowden became a partner in the firm – probably earlier in that range as yellowbacks were superseded by gilt cloth by the 1890s.

A bibliographically interesting and substantially annotated copy of the first printing of the foundational digest of Scots law. The editor, Sir John Skene of Curriehill (c.1540-1617), spent a decade compiling this vital resource on medieval Scots law, based on documents thought wholly lost after Edward I's confiscations and invasions but rediscovered in the fifteenth century. The privy council then recommended that it be published at public expense in both Latin (for non-Scots) and the vernacular (for Scottish subjects).

In this copy, gathering D in the second sequence contains an unusual misprinting, presumably a mistake in the cancellation process: if so this copy contains the cancelled bifolium and its replacement but another bifolium has been wrongly taken out instead. Gathering D in the second sequence runs as follows: correct D1 & D2, then what should be D3 is a duplicate of D1r with D3v, what should be D4 is D4r with a duplicate of D6v, and correct D5 and D6. The net result is an incomplete text, with no version of D3r or D4v present and D1r and D6v present in duplicate. A previous owner has noted another error of arrangement - two leaves towards the beginning have been swapped - but appears not to have noticed the larger error later on.



Another, earlier owner has also substantially annotated this copy, adding frequent cross-references and longer marginal notes in an early hand, sadly often shaved by the later binder.

An attractive first edition of Sir Walter Scott's first published book. Considered an important record of Scottish ballads, the collection inspired some indignation at the time, including from Margaret Hogg, whom James Hogg quoted in his 'Domestic Manners and Private Life of Sir Walter Scott' of 1834 as declaring the ballads 'made for singing an' no for reading; but ye hae broken the charm now, an' they'll never be sung mair. An' the worst thing of a', they're nouther right spell'd nor right setten down.'This copy belonged to Robert George Wyndham Herbert (1831-1905), the first Premier of Queensland, Australia.

Todd and Bowden's 'second edition, first issue', although using mostly first edition sheets. The gatherings B to O in volume 1 have been reset, correcting a spelling error on p. 31 but retaining the incorrect numbering of chapter 6. Per Todd and Bowden 'it must have been prepared immediately after the first, for leaf N6 is still subject to cancellation'. In this example leaf N6 in vol. 1 is not cancelled, and is the variant without the press figure to the verso. This work was the first of Scott's works of fiction to have his name in it - albeit signing the introduction in vol. 1 rather than on the title-pages.

The 50 illustrations cover the Waverley novels up to and including 1823's 'Quentin Durward'; the frontispiece is the engraved title-page from a similar publication, 'The Waverley Keepsake', complete with that title retained.







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The first two parts - of three in total - of the magnum opus of Dugald Stewart (1753-1828), professor at the University of Edinburgh and a leading figure of the Scottish Enlightenment. Stewart's first volume was published at London in 1792 and he intended to complete his scheme shortly afterward, but found that so much more work was required that it was 22 years before the second volume was ready for the press. It duly appeared at Edinburgh in 1814, with a preface indicating that the third volume was nearly finished - and yet it took a further thirteen years before the third volume saw print, this time back at London. These separate publications, from different publishers in different cities over a period of 35 years, would have stymied most attempts to purchase the complete set and so it is almost never now found complete - even to have the first two together in matching bindings is unusual.
