Rare Oration Recited at Pernambuco

1. BRAGA, Bernardo de [or Frei Bernardo da Purificação], O.S.B. *Sentimentos publicos de Pernambuco na morte do Serenissimo Infante D. Duarte. FIRST and ONLY EDITION of this oration recited at Pernambuco, dedicated to D. João IV of Portugal, whose younger brother, D. Duarte, had died in captivity. D. Duarte de Bragança (Vila Viçosa, 1605-Milan, 1649), fought with distinction under the Hapsburg Emperors in the Thirty Years War. Shortly after his brother declared himself King of Portugal in December 1640 D. Duarte was arrested and moved from one prison to another under harsh conditions, ending up in Milan, then under Spanish rule, in 1642, remaining there until his death. Frei Bernardo de Braga (a.k.a. Frei Bernardo da Purificação, Braga, 1604 [or 1598 according to João Francisco Marques]-Bahia, 1662), one of the most celebrated pulpit orators of his time, was elected Abbot of the Benedictine Convento de Tibães in 1632, becoming Procurador Geral for his order. In 1640 he set out for Brazil, arriving early 1641, teaching philosophy and theology at the Colégio of Bahia, before becoming abbot of the order's monastery of Pernambuco, serving from 1647-1650. He was elected Provincial for Brasil, serving from 1650-1656. Returning to Bahia, he was once more elected Provincial in 1662.

Possibly a clandestine edition, since it bears neither title page nor colophon. The presumed first edition, Evora: Officina desta Universidade, 1668, bore a dedication to the governor of Rio de Janeiro, D. Pedro Mascarenhas, not present here or in the other undated edition. Nor do either of the undated editions contain the neo Latin epigram to the author by Father Francisco Aranha, S.J., or the unsigned sonnet in praise of P. Manoel Carneiro in Spanish which are found in the dated edition. There is at least one other undated edition in a different setting of type, but closely following this one. None of the bibliographies which cite an undated edition without title page or colophon differentiate between these different editions. We were able to differentiate ours from the JCB copy, which has been digitized, as are the two undated editions cited by Porbase. All three editions contain a reference to Rio de Janeiro in the text.

The author was born in 1630 Mesão Frio, Villa Real (Diocese do Oporto). Arriving in Brazil as a child, he joined the Society of Jesus at Bahia in 1647 and was confessor to the Governor of Rio de Janeiro, D. Pedro de Mascarenhas. He died of yellow fever at Olinda in 1686.

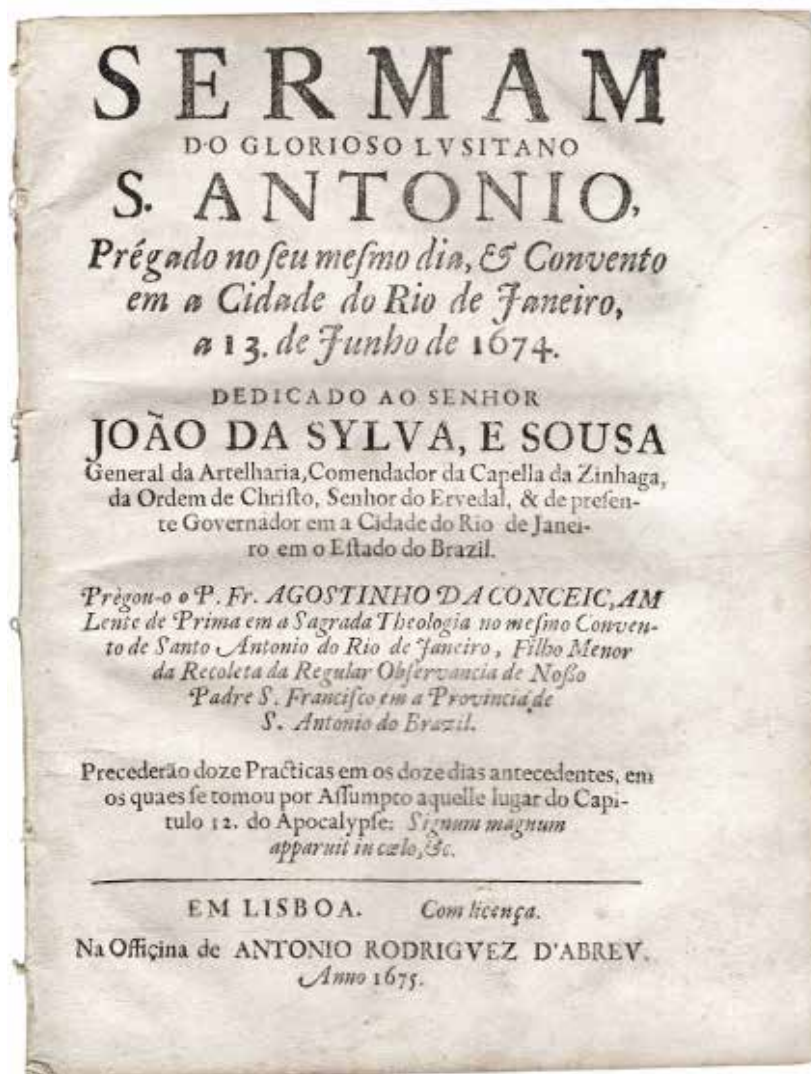
FIRST and ONLY EDITION. Although issued anonymously this *Pastoral* was authored by D. Vicente da Soledade e Castro (1763-1823), a native of Porto, who was consecrated archbishop of the Archdiocese of San Salvador da Bahia and Primate of Brazil in 1820. He entered the Benedictine Order in 1788. Elected in 1821 to the Cortes Gerais e Extraordinárias da Nação Portuguesa, he served as its President for several months, and remained loyal to Portugal at the time of Brazilian independence.

The politically active Archbishop exhorts his flock to become better Christians and better citizens: “estamos h’uma dellas [revoluções], carissimos Irmãos Nossos, no meio da qual combinar os deveres de Christão com os de Cidadão he de summa importancia para vós, e do Officio daquelles que presidem na Igreja” (pp. 19-20). On pp. 15-17 the Archbishop describes the state of Brazil 300 years ago, and the benefits Christianity has brought to it.

FIRST EDITION. A second edition appeared in 1688.

Frei Agostinho da Conceição was a noted preacher whose many sermons were much appreciated in his time. This is one of only three which were published. Born in Lamego, as a soldier en route to Brazil, he was one of the few survivors of a shipwreck, resolving to abandon the secular life and joined the Franciscan Order at Rio de Janeiro. He founded the Convento de Nossa Senhora dos Anjos in Cabo Frio, Rio de Janeiro province, and died there in 1693.

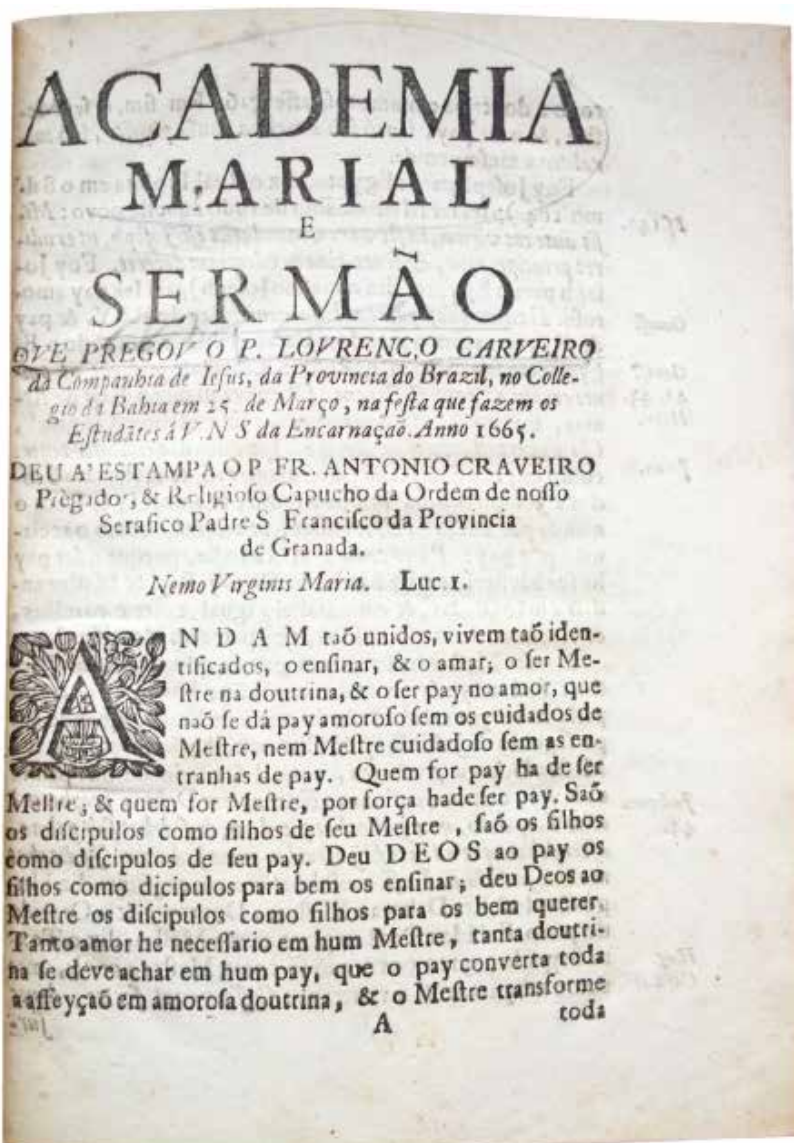

FIRST EDITION [?]. There is another edition, also with a caption title and with the same imprint in the colophon, but with only 24 pages. We have compared it to ours, and find that it is in a completely different setting of type, and there are some differences in orthography. Based on the fact that the present copy contains 28 pages, it is our educated guess that it is the earlier of the two.

Innocência (translated in Borba de Moraes) points out that this sermon preached at Bahia is “noteworthy as an example of how the gospel was preached in Portugal and her dominions at the same time as the voices of Bourdaloue and Bossuet were ringing from the pulpits of Paris! Father Craveiro’s sermon, or *merenda*, is divided into six parts ... as follows: first dish, chicken for the sick; second, quail for the convalescents; third, lamb and kid for the favoured; fourth, veal for the healthy; fifth, venison and game for the diligent; sixth, eagle for the learned! It is more than likely that the sermon left his hearers, if not entirely converted, at least with a keen appetite.”

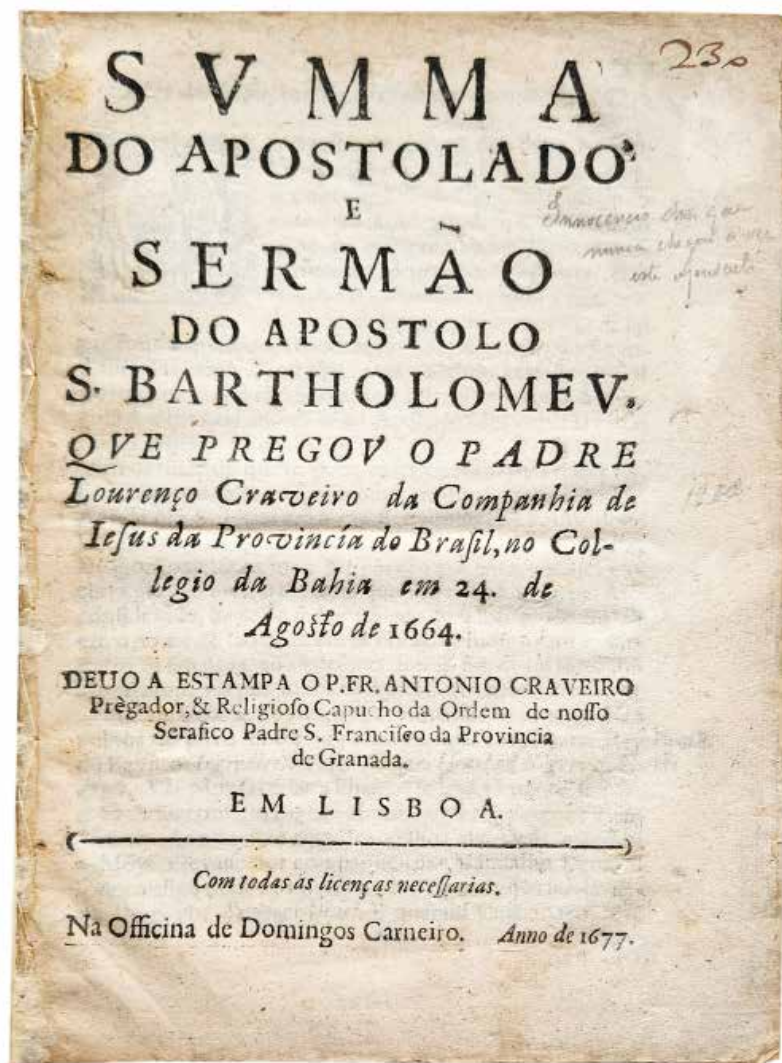

FIRST and ONLY EDITION, rare, of this sermon presumably preached in the Bishopric of São Paulo on the life of the fifteenth-century Saint Francis of Paola, who founded the Minims, a rule even more ascetic than the Franciscans (Menores): they were allowed to eat no animal products of any kind.

The author, probably a secular priest, about whom almost nothing is known, states on the title page that he was "do Bispado de S. Paulo". We cannot determine if this means that he was born there, or merely working there. The Diocese of São Paulo was erected by Pope Benedict XIV on 6 December 1745, on vast territory split off from the then Diocese of São Sebastião do Rio de Janeiro. It included territory in addition to that of the present Metropolitan Diocese of the city of São Paulo, those territories which today comprise the dioceses of Curitiba, Campanha, Botucatu, Campinas, Ribeirão Preto, São Carlos do Pinhal, Taubaté, Sorocaba Santos, Bragança Paulista, Santo André, Metropolitan Aparecida, Mogi das Cruzes, Jundiaí, Campo Limpo, Osasco, Santo Amaro and São Miguel Paulista.

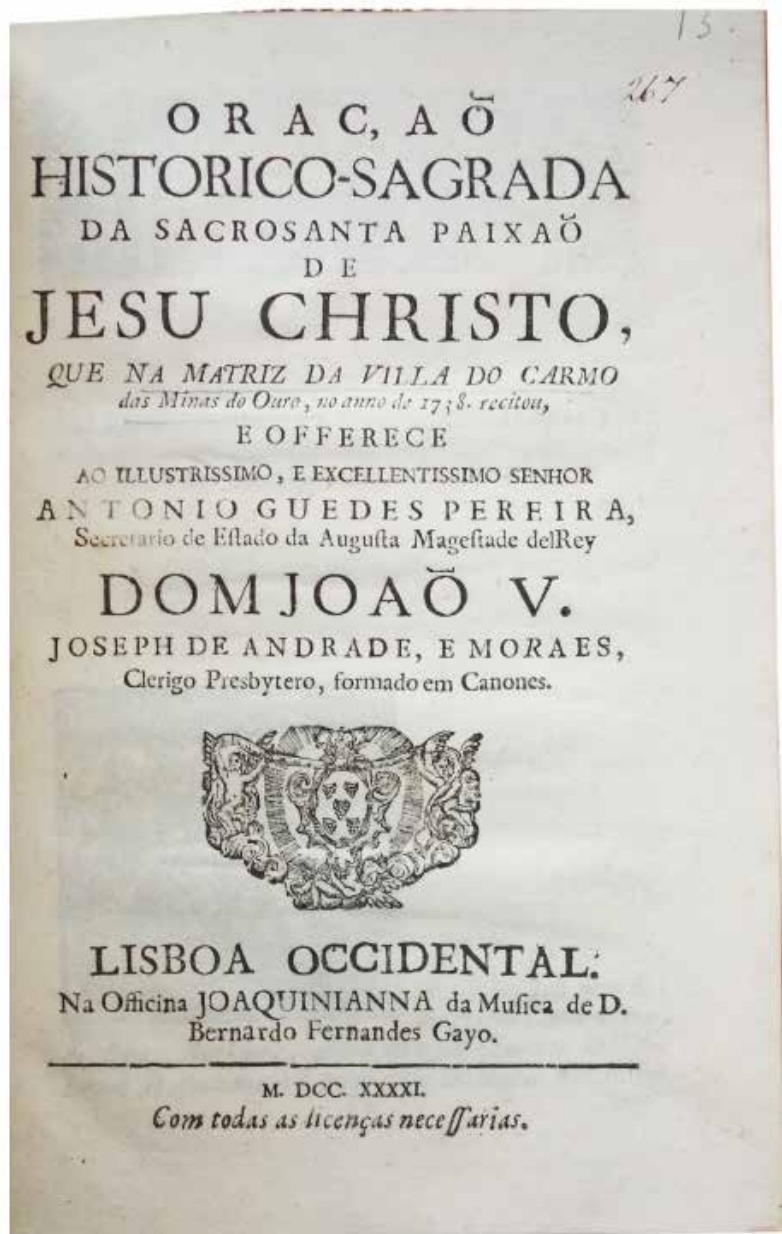

A secular priest who also practiced law, he participated actively in the ceremonies described by Francisco Ribeiro da Silva in the *Aureo throno episcopal*, and the *Triumfo eucharistico* by Simão Ferreira Machado.

It was published as part of José Ferreira de Matos's *Diario historico das celebridades, que na Cidade da Bahia se fizeram em acção de graças pelos felicissimos cazamentos do Serenissimos Senhores Principes de Portugal, e Castella, Lisboa Occidental: na Officina de Manoel Fernandes da Costa, 1729*. Preceding this sermon were a description of the celebrations of the royal marriage (pp. 1-61) and Acção de graças, pp. 63-7. The preliminary leaves here include a separate title page and a lengthy dedication to Archbishop of Bahia Luis Alveres de Figueyredo.

The sermon commemorates the marriage of D. José, Príncipe do Brasil (the future D. José I), with D. Mariana Victoria, eldest daughter of Philip V of Spain, Infanta of Castile.

Sebastião do Valle Pontes, a native of Bahia (1663-1736), was a member of the Brazilian "Academia dos Esquecidos." Educated at Coimbra, he was a renowned preacher, although only a handful of his sermons survive (see Sacramento Blake).

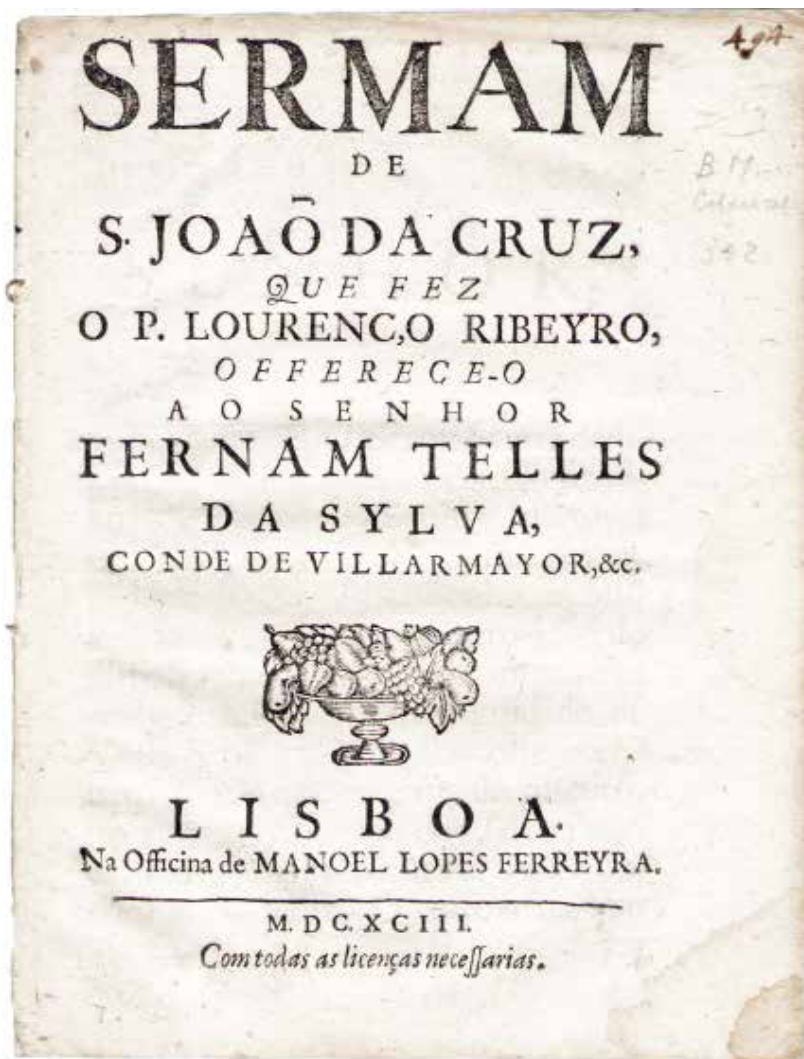

Lourenço Ribeyro (1648-1724), was a native of Cotegeipe (Bahia). He studied at the Jesuit collegio in Bahia. A secular priest, he was for many years vigário of Nossa Senhora da Enarnação in Bahia. Aside from being a celebrated speaker, he was also a highly regarded poet. However, none of his poetic works have survived.

Fernão Telles da Sylva (1662-1732), 3.º Conde de Vilar Maior, later 2.º Marquês de Alegrete, to whom this printing is offered was the son of Manuel Telles da Sylva (1641-1709), 2.º Conde de Vilar Maior and 1.º Marquês de Alegrete. In the preface, pp. [3-4], the author states that the sermon itself is dedicated to the father.

Father Inácio Rodrigues [de Gusmão] was born in Santos in 1701, joining the Jesuit Order in 1716, teaching philosophy at the College in São Paulo. He was the brother of the King's Secretary, Alexandre de Gusmão, and of the pioneer of lighter-than-air airship design, Father Bartolomeu Lourenço de Gusmão. Inácio Rodrigues was the first to preach sermons written in the French style and not in the baroque manner observed by other preachers. He restored pulpit oratory and was greatly influenced by the works of Malbranche, Massillon, and Bourdaloue. Inácio Barbosa Machado wrote that these sermons should be engraved in gold letters. They were reprinted at the end of the eighteenth century as models to be followed by José Caetano de Mesquita e Quadros in his book, *Instruções de Rhetorica e eloquencia dadas aos Serminaristas do Seminario do Patriarchado*, Lisbon, 1795. Father Rodrigues favored protection of indigenous Brazilians. Returning to Brazil from Lisbon in 1745, he took part in the 1752 expedition termed "guerra guarani" commanded by Gomes Freire de Andrada against the indigenous peoples and their Jesuit supporters in enforcement of the Tratado de Madrid. Professor of theology in Bahia in 1757, he was expelled from Bahia in 1759 and deported to Lisbon. Father Rodrigues abandoned the Jesuits in 1760 for reasons of ill health, later returning to Brazil, where he presumably died, date and place unknown.

Innocência comments, "Todos os criticos são concordes em consideral-o como orador de linguagem mui pura, de estylo correcto e elegante, e finalmente como um dos que mais se approximaram de Vieira, ou antes como seu melhor discipulo." He worked primarily in Bahia and Recife, although after spending a few years in Portugal, he became so popular there that he was almost forbidden permission to return to Brazil. His sermons were often collected and reprinted, but the separate editions are of considerable rarity: none are listed in the Bosch catalogue, Azevedo-Samodães, or Ameal. Palha, Monteverde and Avila-Perez list only one each, and BMC lists only three sermons in a total of five editions.

FIRST EDITION thus, with the description of the obsequies held in Minas Geraes for D. João V. It is sometimes stated that Salgado's sermon also appeared separately in 1751, as *Oração funebre nas exequias do Fidelissimo Rey, e Senhor D. João V celebradas pelo Senado da Camara da Villa de S. João de ElRey, nas Minas Geraes da America Portuguesa* However, examination of the two, side by side, reveals that they contain completely different texts. During the mid-eighteenth century Minas Geraes produced most of the world's gold and diamonds, and São João del Rey was one of the most important and wealthy mining centers in that province: as might be expected, its funeral ceremonies for D. João V were lavish.

The description of the obsequies ("Relaçam fiel das reaes exequias da defunta Magestade do Fidelissimo, e Augustissimo Rey o Senhor D. João V," pp. 1-30) includes a reference to Governor Gomes Freire de Andrade announcing D. João's death to the king's subjects in Brazil. The obsequies in São João delRey were finally held after 2 months of mourning and the preparation of a suitably spectacular catafalque based on a design by Sargeant Antonio de Moraes Sarmiento. The "Relaçam" describes the monument in great detail, including its many emblems, whose symbolism is thoroughly explained. It also transcribes all the Latin and Portuguese poems that appeared on it. For the actual ceremony, it describes the decorations on the church's altar, the performances of the choir, the number of priests involved, and the church's illumination by innumerable candles.

Lacking in this copy is the large folding plate (53 x 34 cm.) that shows the catafalque. It was engraved by G.F.L. Debrie after Stefanus de Andrade. Soares notes that the *Monumento* is "raríssima" and the plate "raras vezes aparece."

Pages 31-50 are Mathias Antonio Salgado's sermon at the funeral obsequies. Salgado, born in Lisbon, 1699 or 1700, obtained a doctorate in theology, as well as a baccalaureate in Canon Law at Coimbra University, and was vicar at the principal church in São João del Rey. He was first a Jesuit (from 1716), then left the order to become a secular priest.

The "Relaçam" is the work of Manuel José Corrêa de Alvarenga, whose name appears in print on p. 30. Corrêa e Alvarenga, a native of Braga, also published 2 poems, *Braga triunphante*, Coimbra, 1742, and *Relação dos estragos que desde o dia 3 de dezembro até 6 do mesmo mez do presente anno de 1739 infelizmente causou n'esta cidade de Coimbra uma sempre memorada tempestade*, Coimbra, 1760.

FIRST and ONLY EDITION. It is sometimes stated that this sermon also appeared in *Monumento do agradecimento, tributo de veneração, obelisco funeral do obsequio, relação fiel das reaes exequias ... do D. João V ...*, printed in Lisbon in the same year. Examination of the two, side by side, reveals that they contain completely different texts. During the mid-eighteenth century Minas Geraes produced most of the world's gold and diamonds, and São João del Rey was one of the most important and wealthy mining centers in the province: as might be expected, its funeral ceremonies for D. João V were lavish. The author notes that the town felt a special sympathy for D. João: "Assim como o nosso Augusto Monarcha, como João, devia amparar também esta Villa, como mais prejudicada nesta morte, se deve distinguir nos excessos do sentimento, como se distingue na gloria do nome" (p. 2).

P. Mathias Antonio Salgado, born in Lisbon, 1699 or 1700, was first a Jesuit (from 1716), then left the order to become a secular priest. On p. 23 he refers to "minha sagrada Religião, a Companhia de Jesus." He obtained a doctorate in theology, as well as a baccalaureate in Canon Law at Coimbra University, and was vicar of the principal church in the villa (now city) of S. João d'El-Rei in Minas Geraes, Brazil. The date of his death is not known. The dedication to the widow of the deceased, Queen Mother D. Mariana de Austria, occupies leaves *2 recto to *4 recto.

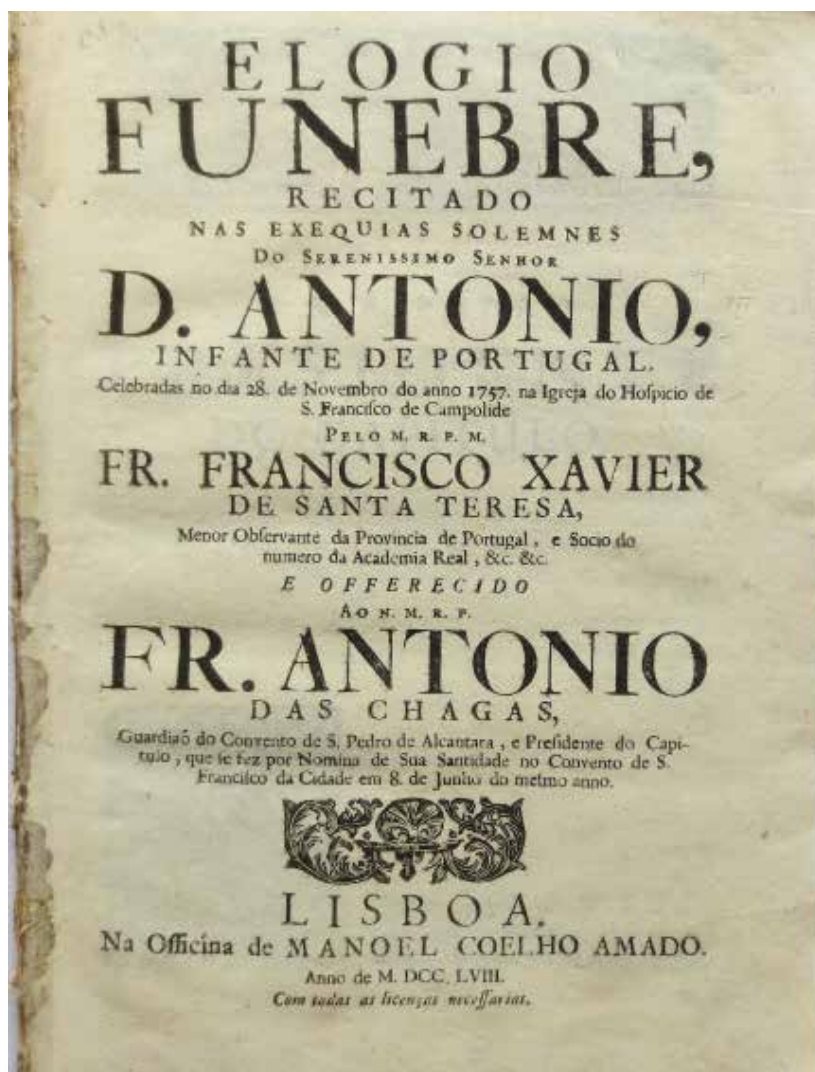

FIRST and ONLY EDITION of this funeral elegy for the Infante D. António, third surviving son of D. Pedro II of Portugal and Queen Maria Sophia Isabel of Neuburg. He was a brother of D. João V, and uncle of D. José I. Born in Lisbon on March 15, 1695, he died unmarried and without issue in the same city on October 20, 1757 and is buried at the Royal Pantheon of the Bragança Dynasty, at the Mosteiro de São Vicente de Fora in Lisbon. Something of a rogue, he spent most of his life estranged from the royal court. D. António took great interest in music, playing the harpsichord and piano, and was a student of the Italian composer Domenico Scarlatti.

The famous Franciscan Fray Francisco Xavier de Santa Teresa (1686-after 1759), a native of Bahia, who joined the Franciscan order at the convento de Sergipe do Conde, in 1702, merited inclusion (with numerous errors, including an erroneous early date of death), in Pereira da Silva's *Varões ilustres do Brasil*. He studied at the convento de Olinda prior to moving to the island of Madeira, then to Lisbon, where he took Holy Orders. Professor of theology, he was Penitenciário geral of his congregation. When D. João V sent a fleet at the request of Pope Clement XI in 1717 to expel the Turks from Corfu, he was present as chaplain, and was gravely wounded, causing the amputation of his left leg. Fray Francisco knew French, English, Italian and Latin; he made several trips within Europe, visiting England and the Low Countries; during a stay in Italy he was incorporated into the Arcádia Romana. He was a member of the Academia Real de História. A number of his sermons, elegies, orations, and poems were published during his lifetime; others remained in manuscript.

FIRST and ONLY EDITION. The dedication to the King D. José occupies leaf *2 recto and verso. There is an "Advertencia" on *3 recto, followed by elaborate licenses from *3 verso to 2*3 recto. From 2*3 verso to 2•4 verso is a "Relação da festa, que os homens de negocio da cidade de Bahia fizeram em acção de graças pelas melhoras de Sua. Magestade Fidelissima."

The author, a naturalized Brazilian by reason of the 1824 constitution, was born in the Algarve and died in Bahia at an advanced age. A secular priest, "cavalleiro lateranense" [knight of the Order of Saint John of the Lateran?] and member of the Academia Brasileira dos Renascidos, he was sent back to Portugal in 1763 by the Archbishop of Bahia, accused of loose living.

D. Romualdo Antônio de Seixas (1787-1860), a native of Cametá, Pará, became Archbishop of Bahia and Primate of Brazil. He was the diocesan to the Portuguese Constitutional Assembly. A secular priest ordained at Belém in 1810, he played an important role in the politics of the Brazilian Empire, becoming conde (1858) and marquês de Santa Cruz (1860). He was named parish priest for Cametá in 1810, and presided over the Junta Governativa Provisória of the province of Grão-Pará e Rio Negro from 1821 to 1822, and also in 1823. D. Pedro I nominated him Archbishop of Bahia in 1826; the nomination was confirmed by Pope Leo XII in 1827. A member of several learned societies, he corresponded with Carl Friedrich Philipp von Martius and Johann Baptiste von Spix.

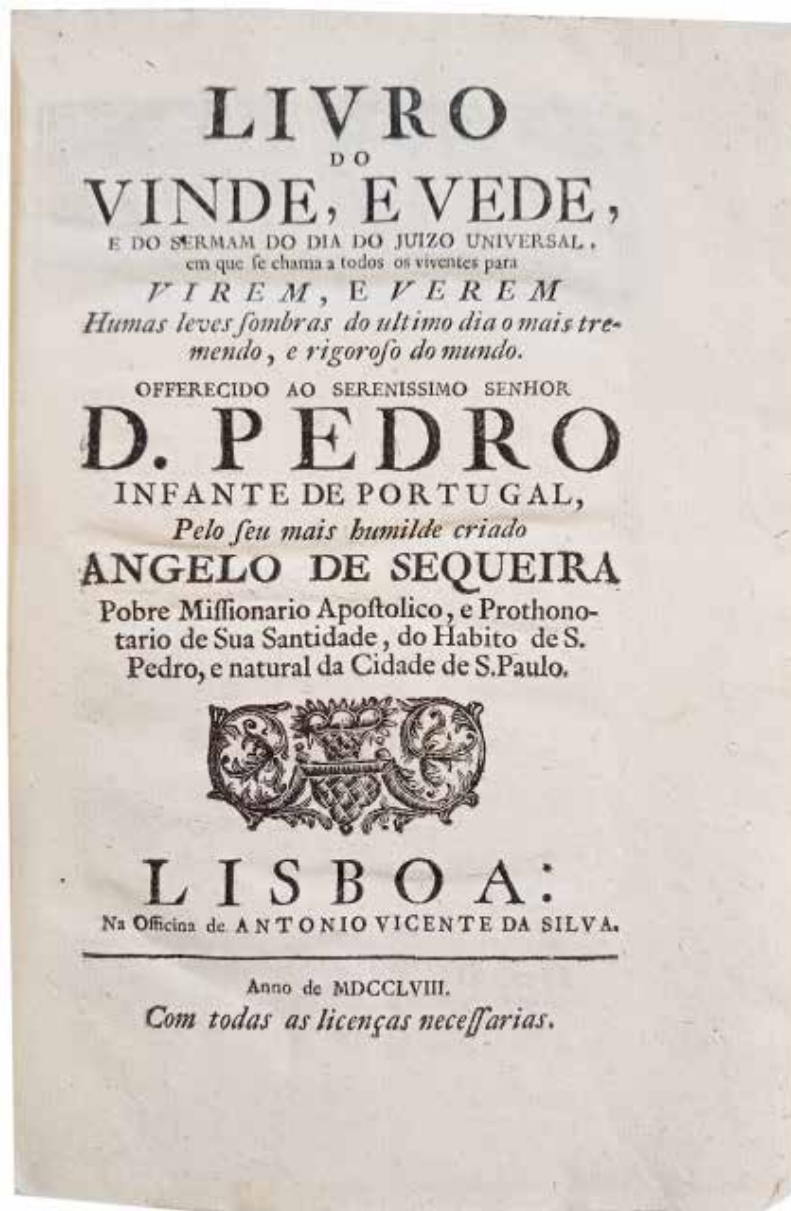

FIRST EDITION, first issue of this sermon by a Paulista from a well known "bandeirante" family, who was almost a contemporary of the gold and diamond discoveries in Brazil. The sermon, "em estilo patético" on the Day of Judgment, includes a description of a dungeon in the fortress of Santos (p. 15) so terrible that prisoners would beg to be immediately condemned to death rather than awaiting sentencing there, and a description of a prison on the Ilha das Cobras (p. 17) where it was said that Jews condemned by the



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Inquisition were incarcerated. Both are compared to Hell's torments. Ribeiro de Sequeira preached this sermon throughout Portugal and Brazil for 17 years, and was constantly asked by his listeners for copies of it. A second edition appeared in Lisbon, 1763.

Born in Parahyba (S. Paulo), the author trained and practiced as a lawyer before becoming a monk of S. Pedro and serving as missionary to the provinces of Portugal and Spain. Finally he returned to Brazil and founded the seminary of Nossa Senhora da Lapa in the province of S. Paulo, where he died in 1776. Borba points out that this is the only sermon of Ribeiro de Sequeira's to survive—his other published works are orations and devotional books—and this sermon "E portanto obra necessária para se poder apreciar seu estilo."

Other copies we have seen contain a final preliminary leaf inserted between leaves C3 and C4 (the initial leaf of text). The catchwords of C3 and C4 show that the extra leaf was at best an afterthought. Moreover, these other copies contained a final leaf with additional licenses, dated 21 to 26 June 1758. The approval in the preliminary leaves contains licenses dated 29 December 1757 through 25 February 1758. Upon comparing the present copy with one which contains these two additional leaves, it was noticed that the present copy has an earlier version of the errata page, which occurs on leaf Mm3 verso (the unnumbered verso of p. 255). An additional four lines of errata were added in the press to the other copy. Thus we may suppose that in this earlier issue, perhaps the extra preliminary leaf and extra license leaf are not required. None of the bibliographies cited mention this issue point.

FIRST and ONLY EDITION of these six Lenten sermons, preached in Recife by a

secular priest, native of Bahia. P. Antônio da Silva (1639-?) studied at the Jesuit College in Bahia before receiving a degree in canon law from Coimbra University. Reputedly he was an eloquent orator. The author's dedication to Gil Vaz Lobo Freire, a member of the royal Conselho de Guerra, Mestre de Campo Gernerall da Provincia do Alem-Tejo, Governador das Armas da Beira, Alcaide Mór das Villas de Villar Mayor, Cudisseiro, & Carapito, Comendador das Comendas de Santa Maria de Montalvão, Santo Estevão de Purcos, Santa Maria da Graça de Villa Nova de Mil Fontes, etc., occupies leaf ã2 recto and verso.

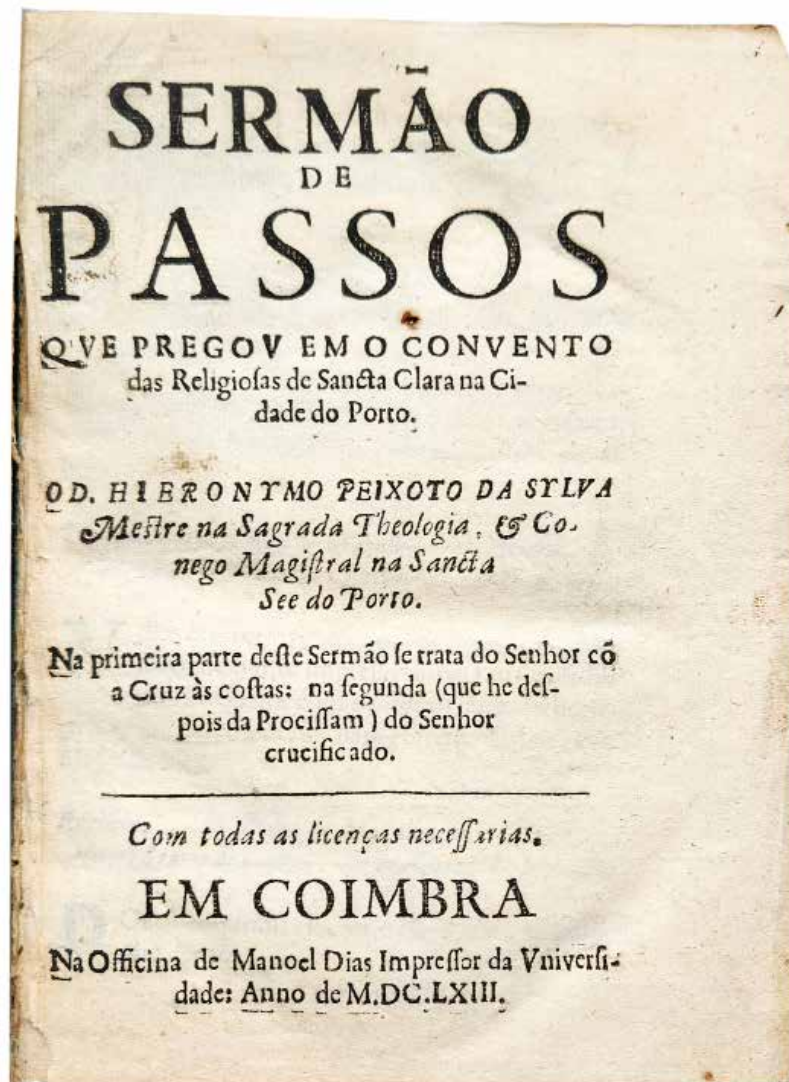
The dedication and licenses in this copy are smaller, clearly from another copy and have old ink foliation of 339 and 338. The dedication leaf is signed ã2, while the following leaf (p. 3) is signed A2. Many copies do not contain the two leaves with licenses and dedication, and others have these leaves at the end of the book, where they are surely meant to have been placed. However, at least one copy with the two unnumbered leaves at the end of the book reports them as signed M3-4 (Biblioteca provinciale-Salerno via the ICCU).

FIRST EDITION of this Good Friday sermon preached at the Convent of Santa Clara, Porto. There appear to be two editions with this same imprint. Aside from the cataloguers of the Biblioteca Nacional de Portugal, via Porbase, none of the other sources appear to distinguish between the two, although it is easy enough to see that Arouca describes a different edition. The present edition would appear to be earlier, with Ci- / / dade divided on lines 5 and 6 of the title, and with the wrongly numbered pages. There are also editions of Lisbon: António Craesbeeck de Mello, 1671, and Coimbra: Joam Antunes, 1715.

The author (Lisbon, early 1600s-Porto, 1666), was a distinguished pulpit orator, many of whose sermons appeared in print. He obtained a doctorate in theology from Coimbra University, and served as canon of the Cathedral at Faro in the Algarve, then serving in the same capacity at the Porto Cathedral, where he was buried.

Fourth or fifth edition? At least one other edition exists with the same imprint of this Lenten sermon preached in Lisbon at the Collegio de S. Antam; priority has not been established, nor are these different editions even noted by any authorities. There are editions of Lisbon: Paulo Creasbeeck, 1645 and 1646, an undated edition said to be of 1645, as well as one of Coimbra: Officina de Manoel Rodrigues d'Almeyda, 1686.

P. Joeronymo Ribeiro de Carvalho (Braga 1609-Val de Flores, Tras-os-montes, 1679), entered the Jesuit Order in 1623 and left in 1653. He then received a doctorate in theology, was Conductario at Coimbra University, Conego magistral of the Braga Cathedral, and finally Chantre at the Coimbra Cathedral. As a Jesuit he did not use the name Carvalho.

Frey Manuel Guilherme (1658-1730), a native of Lisbon, joined the Dominican Order in 1676. He was instrumental in the reconstruction of the Convento de São Domingos in Lisbon, and in the augmentation of its library, said to have contained over 16,000 volumes of printed books and numerous manuscripts.

Frei Agostinho da Conceição was a noted preacher whose many sermons were much appreciated in his time. This is one of only three which were published. Born in Lamego, as a soldier en route to Brazil, he was one of the few survivors of a shipwreck, resolving to abandon the secular life and joined the Franciscan Order at Rio de Janeiro. He founded the Convento de Nossa Senhora dos Anjos in Cabo Frio, Rio de Janeiro province, and died there in 1693.

FIRST and ONLY separate EDITION. Bluteau's collected *Sermões* ... 2 volumes, 1732-1733, are uncommon and highly esteemed. This individual sermon is very rare.

Born of French parents in London, Rafael Bluteau (1638-1734) spent over fifty years in Portugal, including his late childhood and adolescence, and died in Lisbon. He became fluent in Portuguese, and is best known for his ten volume *Vocabulário Portuguez e Latino*, in effect the first Portuguese lexicon, a work still of immense influence today. Passing from England to France, from France to Portugal, from Portugal to Italy, etc., he could also speak and write in English, French, Italian, Spanish, Latin and Greek. He served on a diplomatic mission to Italy under Duarte Ribeiro de Macedo. When Ribeiro de Macedo died along the way, Bluteau became chief of the mission. A favorite of Queen D. Maria Francisca Isabel of Savoy, wife of D. Afonso VI and then of his brother D. Pedro II, Bluteau participated in the "Conferencias discretas e eruditas" of the third Conde da Ericeira, later becoming close as well to Ericeira's son, the fourth Conde. Bluteau participated in diverse literary Academies favored and sponsored by the Ericeiras, such as the Generosos, Aplicados, etc., and was later nominated to the Real Academia de História by the king himself.

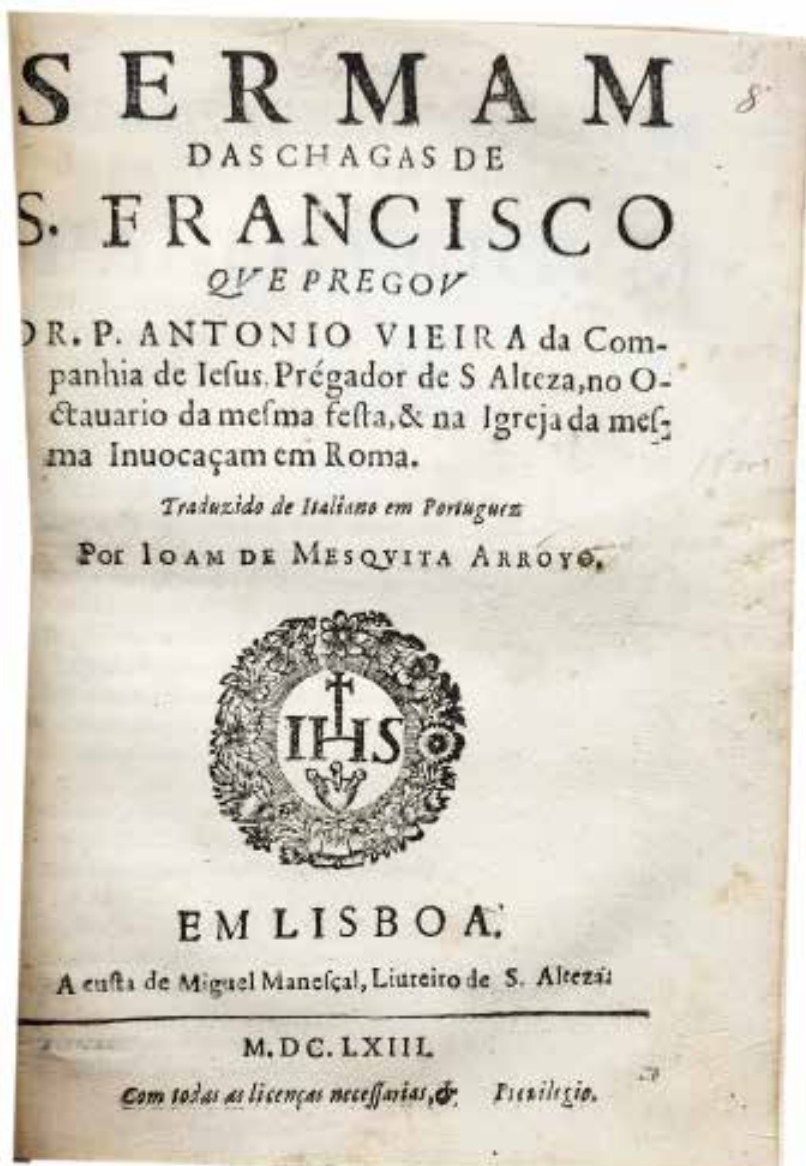

FIRST EDITION in Portuguese. Arouca thinks the printer was João da Costa. Originally preached in Rome, 1672 and published there in Italian the same year; thus the dates of 1663 or 1664 are not possible. There is a supposed 1664 [i.e., 1674?]



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edition. A neo-Latin poem occupies pp. 3-4. This sermon was included in volume XII of the collected *Sermoens*, 1699, pp. 341-361.

Vieira (1608-1697) is described by Boxer as "certainly the most remarkable man in the seventeenth-century Luso-Brazilian world" (*A Great Luso-Brazilian Figure: Padre Antônio Vieira, S.J.*, p. 4). Born in Lisbon, he moved to Bahia as a child and there became a Jesuit novice in 1623. By 1635, when he was ordained, he was already famous as a preacher, and when the Dutch withdrew from Brazil it was he who was chosen to preach the victory sermon. Vieira, a trusted advisor of D. João IV, was sent by him on diplomatic missions to France, Holland and Rome. Beginning in 1652 he spent nine years as a missionary in Maranhão, where he vehemently defended the rights of the Indians against the colonists who wanted to enslave them. As a result, the colonists managed to have him and all the other Jesuits in Pará and Maranhão deported in 1661. Back in Lisbon, his campaign for toleration of the New Christians (crypto-Jews) and his Sebastianist beliefs led to his trial by the Inquisition. He was found guilty, but the ascension of the future D. Pedro II as regent in 1668 led to his release. Vieira's status as a diplomat and missionary would guarantee his letters a place in Portuguese history, but his style and content are also exceptional: his letters and state-papers are invaluable sources for the period, and his sermons are as readable today as they were in the seventeenth century. Pessoa dubbed him "O Imperador da língua portuguesa" (quoted in Boxer, *ibid.*, p. 3).

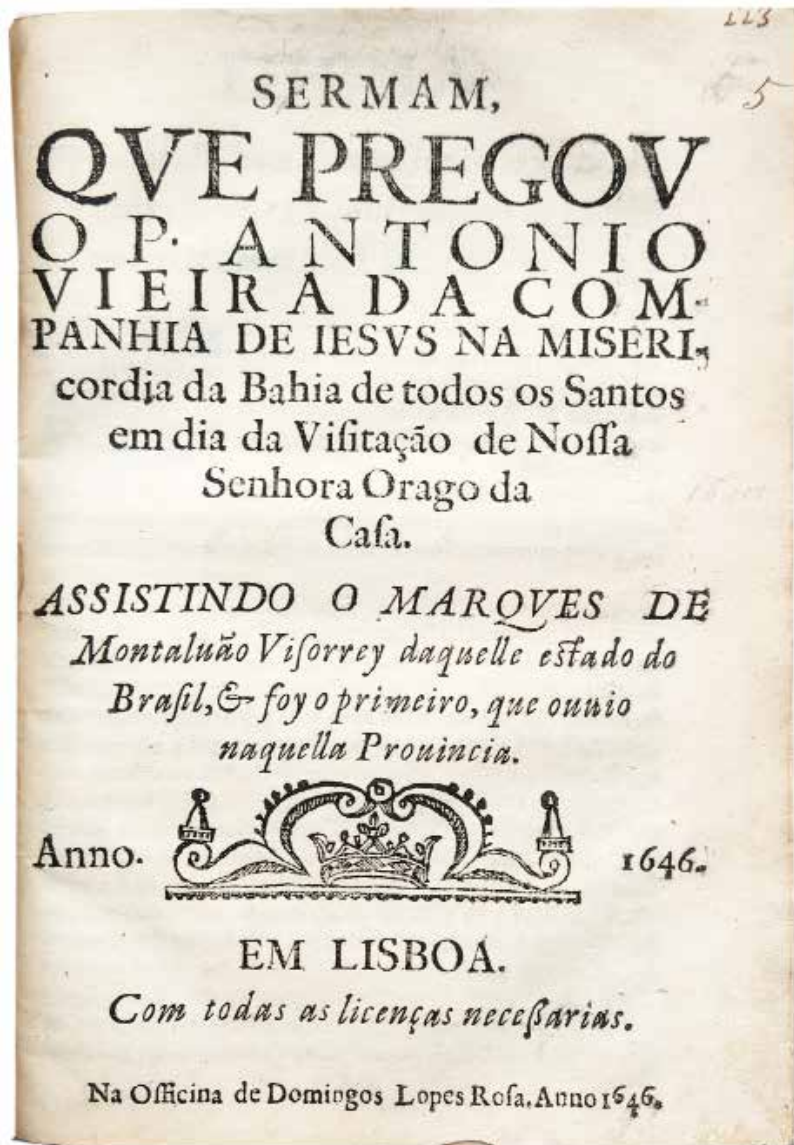

Then there are three editions or issues with the imprint Lisbon: Domingos Lopes Rosa, 1642. There are also editions of Lisbon: Domingos Lopes Rosa, 1654, Coimbra, Thomé de Carvalho, 1658 and Lisbon, Domingos Lopes Rosa, 1659. This sermon appeared in the *Sermoens*, XIV (1710) pp. 49-75, where is it titled "Sermao do glorioso S. Roque".

FIRST EDITION, second issue. The Biblioteca Nacional de Portugal, via Porbase identifies this as variant "B", the other as "A", describing the differences in considerable detail. Comparing the two, a number of minor errors in "A" have been corrected in "B", but the settings of type overall appear to be the same. None of the other sources distinguish between the two issues. A variant "C" has also been identified, which combines features of the other two. At least ten other editions exist, three dated 1652 identified by Paiva, 1658 (three with the same imprint identified by Paiva, and two by Arouca), and 1659, as well as an undated seventeenth-century edition. This text appears in volume V, 1696 of the collected sermons.
