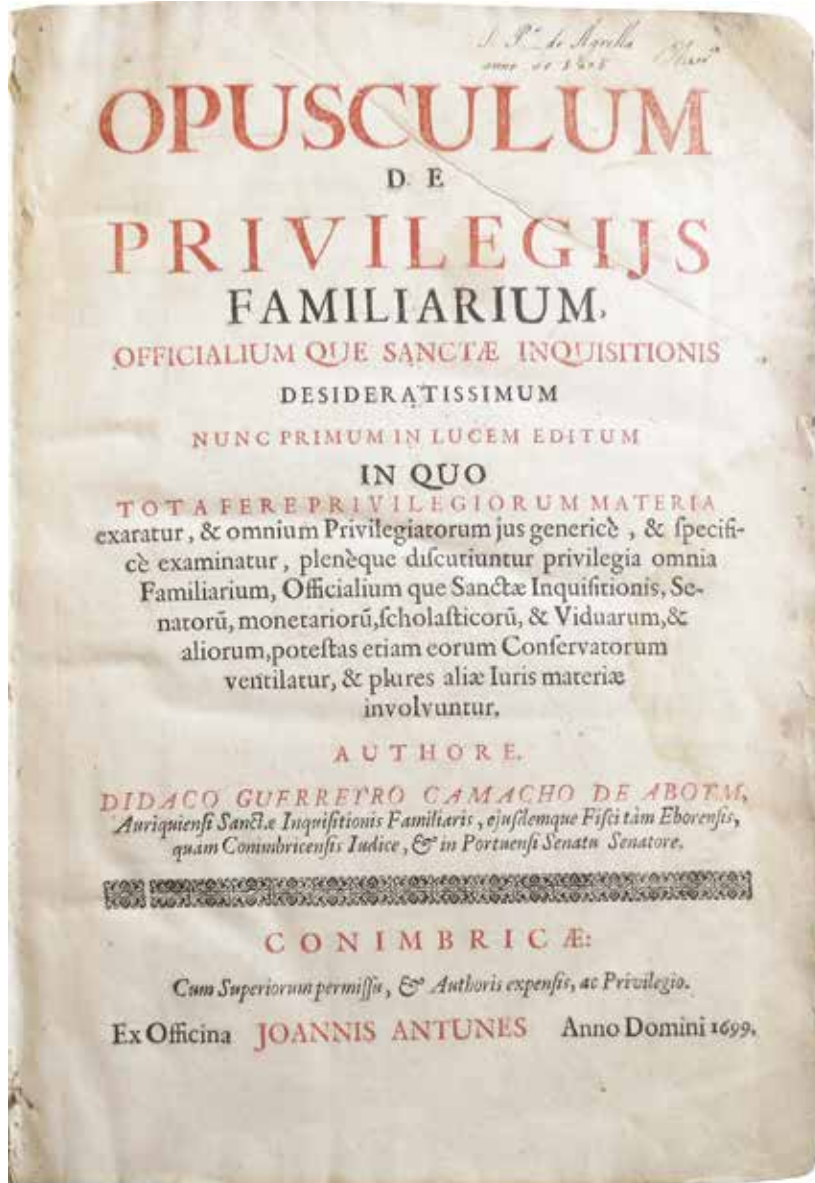

FIRST EDITION. Despite the Latin title, significant portions are in Portuguese and Spanish. This work lists the duties and privileges of familiars of the Inquisition, with rules on how they must dress, when they may bear arms, from what taxes and legal charges they are exempt, as well as the rights of their wives or widows, families and slaves. It was reprinted in Lisbon in 1735, 1747, and 1759.

Included in the preliminary leaves, on ¶¶3 verso, are a Latin epigram and a sonnet in Portuguese by Gaspar Teixeira Pinto.

Reprinting of the third *Regimento*, or handbook for officials of the Inquisition in Portugal, originally issued by Cardinal da Cunha in 1774, with a long introduction hostile to the Inquisition by the editor, original to the present edition. The *Regimento* includes sections on trials, torture, and autos da fé, with chapters on those who commit heresy, blasphemy, bigamy, and sodomy, as well as Jacobins, witches and astrologers. Included are details about a sentence of the Tribunal da Inquisição de Coimbra against one Maria Antónia, condemned for having made a pact with the devil. The *Regimento* was first printed in Lisbon, 1613, and again in Lisbon, 1640. Each version is substantially different from the others. The 1774 version, issued when the Marquês de Pombal was in power, substantially de-fanged the Inquisition. After the 1820 revolution in Portugal, the Inquisition was completely abolished.

It has been said that the text of the 1774 *Regimento* was written by José Basilio da Gama at the behest of the Marquês de Pombal.

José Maria Andrade was a physician educated at Coimbra University, born at Celas, Coimbra.

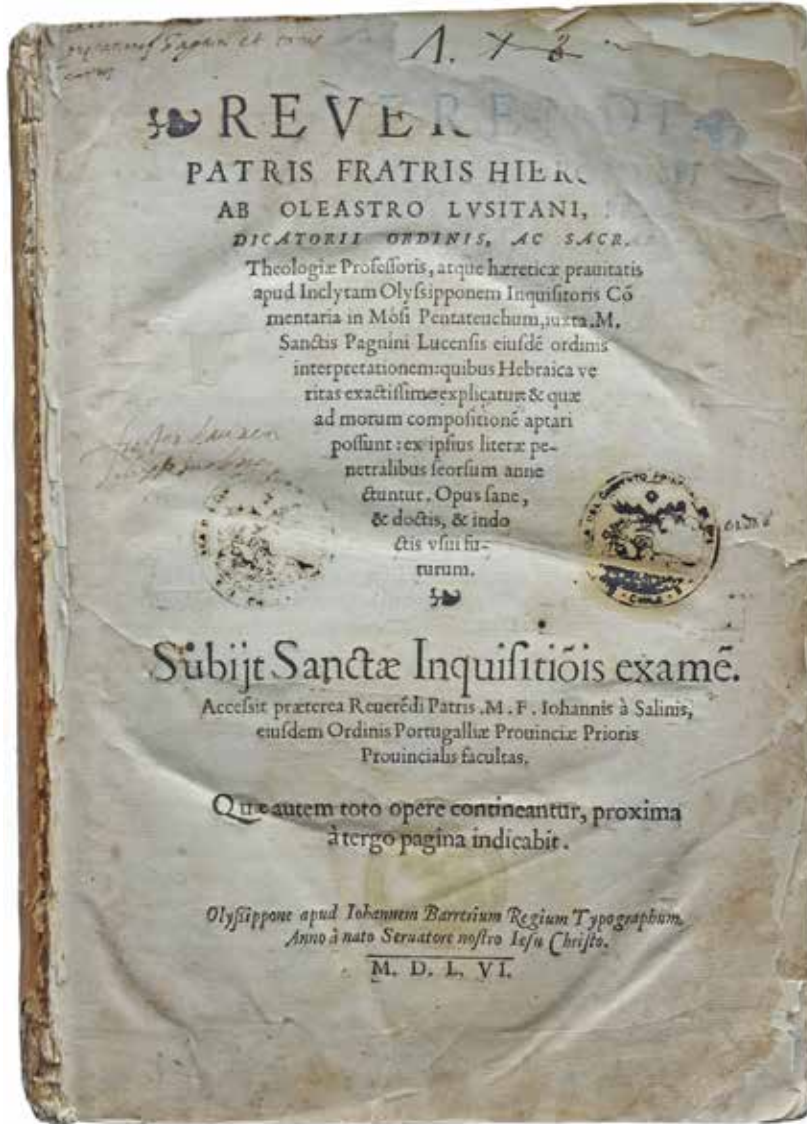

FIRST EDITIONS of these commentaries, including the full text of the first five books of the Bible. The initial volume contains a dedication by the author to the Cardinal D. Henrique and a prologue by the author to the reader. At the beginning of Exodus is a letter in Latin from D. Jerónimo Osório to the author, and another from Jerónimo de Brito to the reader. At the beginning of Leviticus is a letter in Latin from André de Resende to the Cardinal D. Henrique.

A Dominican Friar born in Azambuja (d. 1563), Frey Jerónimo Oleastro was one of the most notable theologians of his time, known for being accomplished in Hebrew and Greek. D. João III sent him to the Council of Trent, where he was most noticed in the session of 7 January 1546, when he energetically opposed any attempt at innovation. It was at the Council of Trent that he became known for his commentaries on the Pentateuch. Having been elected Prior of the Monastery of Batalha in 1552, the Cardinal Infante D. Henrique called on him to take up the post of Inquisitor at Évora. He was then transferred to the Lisbon Inquisition, where he became *inquisidor-mor* in 1555. As head of the Inquisition,



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he was known for practicing the greatest violence and cruelty. In 1560 he was elected Provincial of his order.

Frey Jerónimo Oleastro based his work on the translation of the Bible by Sanctes Pagnino (1470-1541), a native of Lucca (Tuscany) who became a Dominican at age 16 and studied under Savonarola and others. Pagnino, who counted the Medici among his patrons, was summoned by Pope Leo X to teach at the school for Oriental languages in Rome. He was admired by other scholars, including some rabbis, for his literal adherence to the Hebrew in *Veteris et Novi Testamenti nova translatio*, first published in Lyon, 1527.

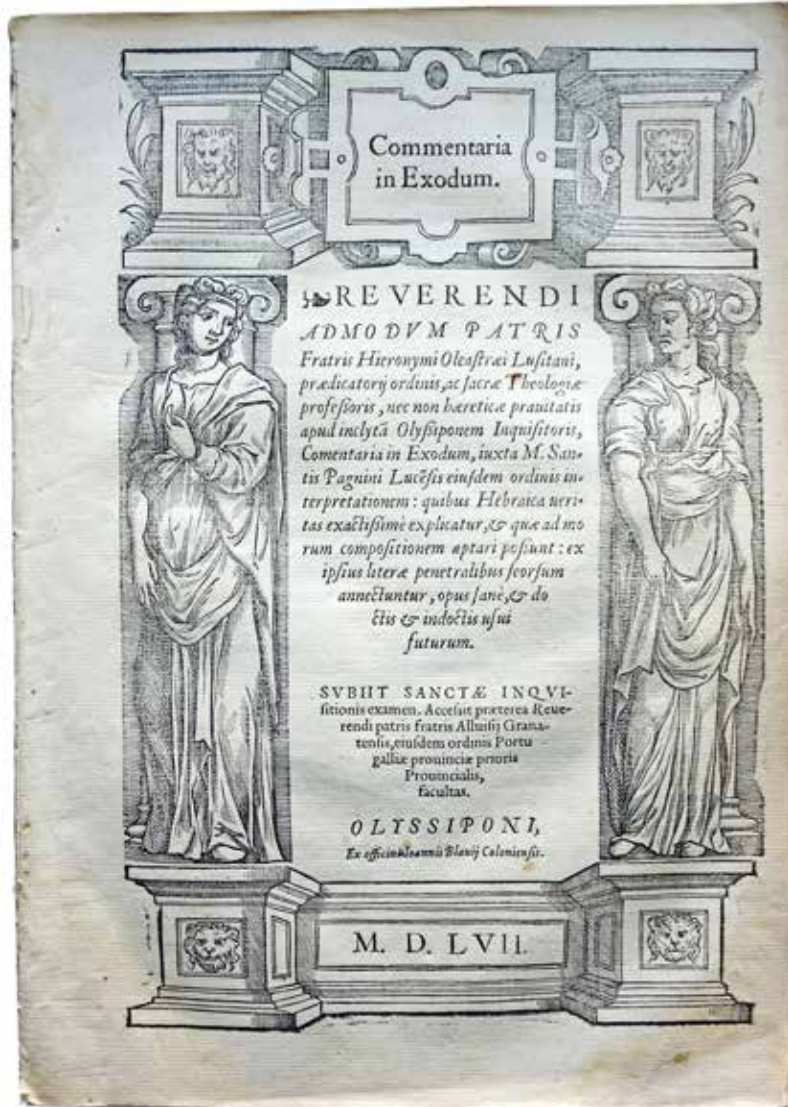

Progressive Political Advice under D. José I

FIRST separate EDITION. The *Testamento* had previously been published in the *Investigador portuguez*. In 1821 it was reprinted by Lourenço Caminha in *Obras ineditas*,

under the title "Carta escripta de Paris, ou Instrucção ao Ser. Príncipe D. José." According to Innocêncio, that edition has numerous textual errors. There is also a Lisbon, 1943 edition.

Cunha (1662-1749), a famous progressive politician, diplomat, and economic thinker, served as Envoy Extraordinary to London (1697-1712; returning briefly as Ambassador in 1715), later as Ambassador to Madrid and Paris, and as Minister Plenipotentiary to the Congress of Utrecht (1712-1715). In this posthumously published *Testamento*, his most famous work, he advises the future D. José I to appoint Sebastião José de Carvalho e Melo (the future Marquês de Pombal) as his prime minister; to reform the army, navy, and magistracy; to encourage industry and open rivers and canals to navigation; and to be tolerant of different religious beliefs. Negative influence of the Inquisition, and the situation of Jews and New Christians, is discussed on pp. 45-57. In the course of developing a mercantilistic argument regarding Portuguese trade, products of Brazil, such as leather, sugar, tobacco, pão do Brazil, cravo do Maranhão, cocoa, and vanilla are repeatedly mentioned in connection with Portuguese trade with other European countries on pp. 58-64, as are wines from continental Portugal and Madeira, salt from Setúbal, and importation of fabrics.

First Edition in Portuguese. Originally published in Madras, 1831 under the title *An Historical Sketch of Goa*, the work contains a history of Goa and its religious establishments, and information on population, government, religion, language, trade and industry of Goa, Salsete, Bardez and the Novas Conquistas. The translator's notes include a list of publications on the 1821 revolution in Goa; excerpts from Dellon on *autos da fé* and other Inquisition activities in Goa; a description of St. Francis Xavier's tomb; and Francisco



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Pirard's 1628 description of Pangim during its golden era, along with a description of the town in more recent times.

First Edition in Portuguese, considerably more difficult to obtain than the second, published the following year. Plates depict victims of the Inquisition before and after sentencing, in the torture chamber and at an auto da fé. There is also a plate showing the Inquisition removing the sentence of excommunication from D. João IV, and another titled "Filippe III Rei d'Hespanha" (i.e. Filipe III of Portugal, who was Filipe IV of Spain at the time Portugal declared independence in 1640?), in which the Spanish King consults with inquisitors in a palace while the fires of the Inquisition can be seen through an open door. This is an unacknowledged translation of Lavallé's *Histoire des Inquisitions religieuses d'Italie, d'Espagne, et du Portugal*, first published in Paris, 1809. An English translation appeared in London, 1816. The work was placed on the *Index* in 1825. Innocência da Rocha Galvão, the translator, a native of Bahia, was elected to the General Assembly for Bahia in 1836 and acclaimed President of State in the 1837 revolution.

Second and most complete edition in Portuguese, with an additional plate that did not appear in the first Portuguese edition, "Representação de um Auto da Fé" in front of the old Paço da Ribeira, destroyed in the 1755 earthquake (facing p. 208). Other plates depict victims of the Inquisition before and after sentencing, in the torture chamber and at an auto da fé. There is also a plate showing the Inquisition removing the sentence of excommunication from D. FIRST and ONLY EDITION of this biography of the New Christian Zacuto Lusitano (1575-1649), whom Ferreira de Mira called "o mais notável médico português do séc. XVII." Born in Lisbon, Zacuto studied medicine at Coimbra and Sigüenza and then practiced in Lisbon until the Inquisition drove him to seek refuge in Amsterdam. There he distinguished himself as a medical historian, publishing *De medicorum principum historia* in 1629.

Oliveira Lemos (1860-1923) was the first professor of legal medicine at the School of Medicine and Surgery in Porto. In 1890 he opened a clinic for mental and nervous diseases, and in 1921 was named vice-rector of the University of Coimbra. He wrote many works on Portuguese medical history and founded the Arquivos de História da Medicina Portuguesa.

FIRST and ONLY EDITION of this exceptional thesis presented for the degree of Mestre em Ciência das Religiões at the Universidade Lusófona de Humanidades e Tecnologias, under the supervision of Prof. José Eduardo Franco. The main objective is to address the issue of the forgiveness to the descendants of converted Jews under Pombal. Jews were present at the formation of Portugal. However, the trajectory of this minority in Portugal was not always peaceful. At the time of D. Manuel I, the Jews who converted to Christianity were called New Christians, a clear demonstration of inequality with other

Christians. With the implantation of the Inquisition in Portugal, the New Christians with Jewish background became the main target of persecution, inquests, indictments and convictions. Father Antonio Vieira that stood in defense of the Jews and the New Christians, in addition to proposing the restructuring of the Portuguese Inquisition. The main part of this work deals with the Pombal era, with emphasis on the several legislative documents enacted by under D. José. These documents which benefited the New Christians brought a new legal framework arising from the promulgation of the Law of Good Reason, an important part of modern Portuguese law.

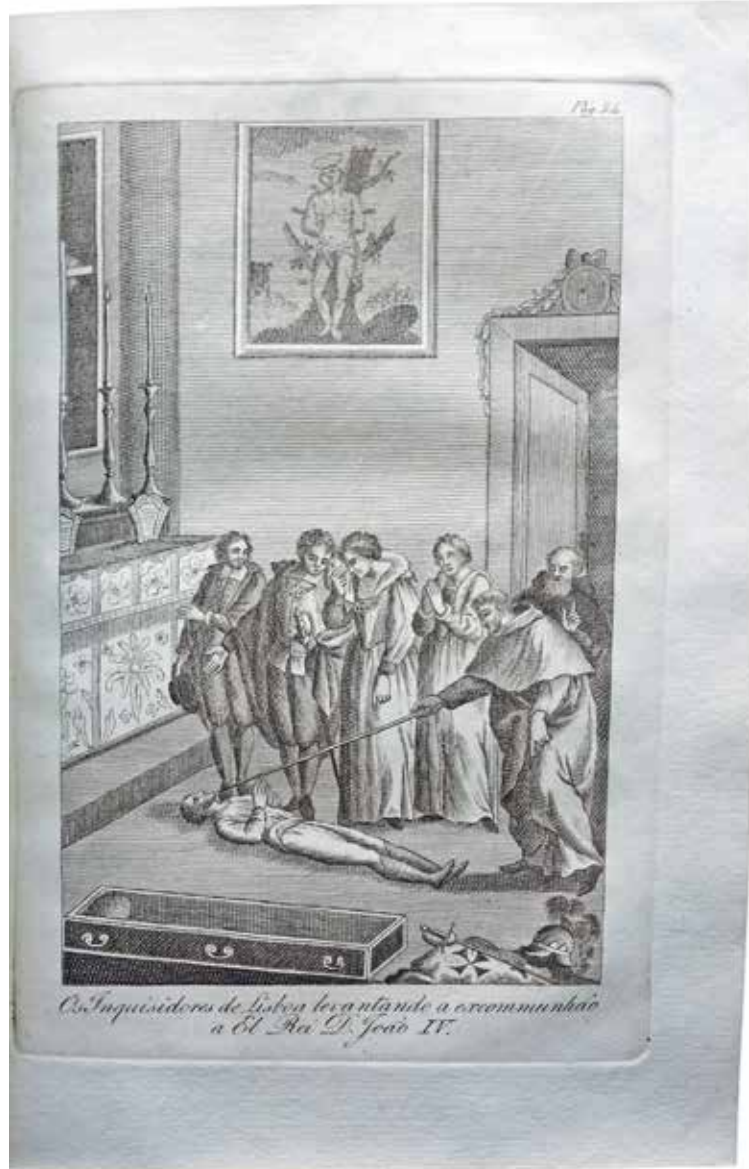

Third edition of the **first book in Portuguese on Freemasonry**; also the **first book on the subject by a Brazilian author**. The *Cartas* first appeared in 1805 with a "Madrid" imprint: the statement on the title page that this is the second edition (repeated on the title pages of later editions) is false, probably made to mislead the censors; also false is the Madrid imprint: the types used are exactly the same as those in the *Cartas* of London, 1809 printed by W. Lewis. That 1809 printing may in fact be a later issue of the 1805 edition with a new title page (the collation is the same, as are the dimensions, according to Borba), rather than a later edition. The work next appeared in Paris, 1821 and then in Rio de Janeiro, 1833.

In these letters the author explains the humanitarian principles of the Freemasons, arguing that those principles do not contravene the monarchy or religion. He also points out that Freemasons are persecuted in Portugal by the Inquisition, citing specific cases, and trying to prove that papal bulls against the Freemasons are invalid in Portugal because they did not receive royal approval.

Furtado de Mendonça (1774-1823), a Brazilian born in Colonia do Sacramento (now in Uruguay) who earned degrees in philosophy and law from Coimbra, came to the United States (1798-1801) to study agriculture and bridge construction for the Portuguese government, then visited England. When he returned to Portugal, full of the liberal ideas he had heard during his travels, he was imprisoned as a Freemason and an opponent of the monarchy. He escaped and fled to England in 1805, where several years later he began publishing the enormously influential *Correio Brasiliense*. After Brazilian independence was declared in 1822, he was appointed Brazilian consul general in England by D. Pedro I but died before he could assume the post.

The final chapter of this new edition (volume III, pp. 214-48), on the reign of Queen Maria I, is by Hipolyto da Costa, who has edited what is otherwise a reprint of the first edition of 1788, with the preface by Moraes e Silva in defence of the Inquisition, and notes. In the last chapter, Hipolyto demonstrates that the reign of D. Maria was liberal and that it tried to improve the economic situation, but he strongly criticizes the minister of police, Pina Manique.

The work covers the years 1087-1800. Aside from the final chapter by Hipolyto da Costa, this is a Portuguese translation made by Moraes e Silva of the section relating to Portugal from the volumes published prior to 1788 of the *Histoire universelle depuis la commencement du monde jusqu'à present, traduite de l'Anglois par un Societé de Gens de Lettre*, Amsterdam, 1742-1792, and Paris, 1802, in 46 volumes. The original English version was first printed in London from 1736 to 1765 in 26 volumes, and was reprinted several times. Moraes Silva writes in the preface that he made the translation with great care and in good style, without the repugnant gallicisms common to so many translations of the period. He added notes, and wrote himself what was necessary to complete the history of the reign of King José I. In addition, he explains that he left in the original text, for sake of authenticity, passages which malign the Inquisition. He then writes a defense of the Inquisition, explaining that under José I, new regulations had blunted its strictness. He states that the strong criticism made by the authors is due to lack of understanding of the situation in Portugal.

Furtado de Mendonça (1774-1823), a Brazilian born in Colonia do Sacramento (now in Uruguay) who earned degrees in philosophy and law from Coimbra, came to the United States (1798-1801) to study agriculture and bridge construction for the Portuguese government, then visited England. The eminent lexicographer António de Moraes e Silva, a native of Rio de Janeiro, took his degree at Coimbra, wrote important works on Portuguese grammar and history

and spent time in England, France and Portugal, serving as secretary in the Portuguese embassies in London and Paris. His *Dicionario da lingua portugueza*, published in 1789, is the standard Portuguese lexicon, based on Bluteau's *Vocabulario portugues e latino* (10 volumes, Lisbon 1721), but with extensive, sweeping revisions. It has been reprinted many times. In 1817 he refused an offer to become a member of the republican provisional government in Pernambuco.

First edition in Spanish of *Riflessioni imparziali sopra l'umanità degli Spagnuoli nell' Indie* (Venice, 1780). It was written to counter the allegations of Spanish mistreatment of the Indians that had been published in Robertson's *History of America*, London 1777, and Raynal's *Histoire philosophique et politique*, Amsterdam 1770.

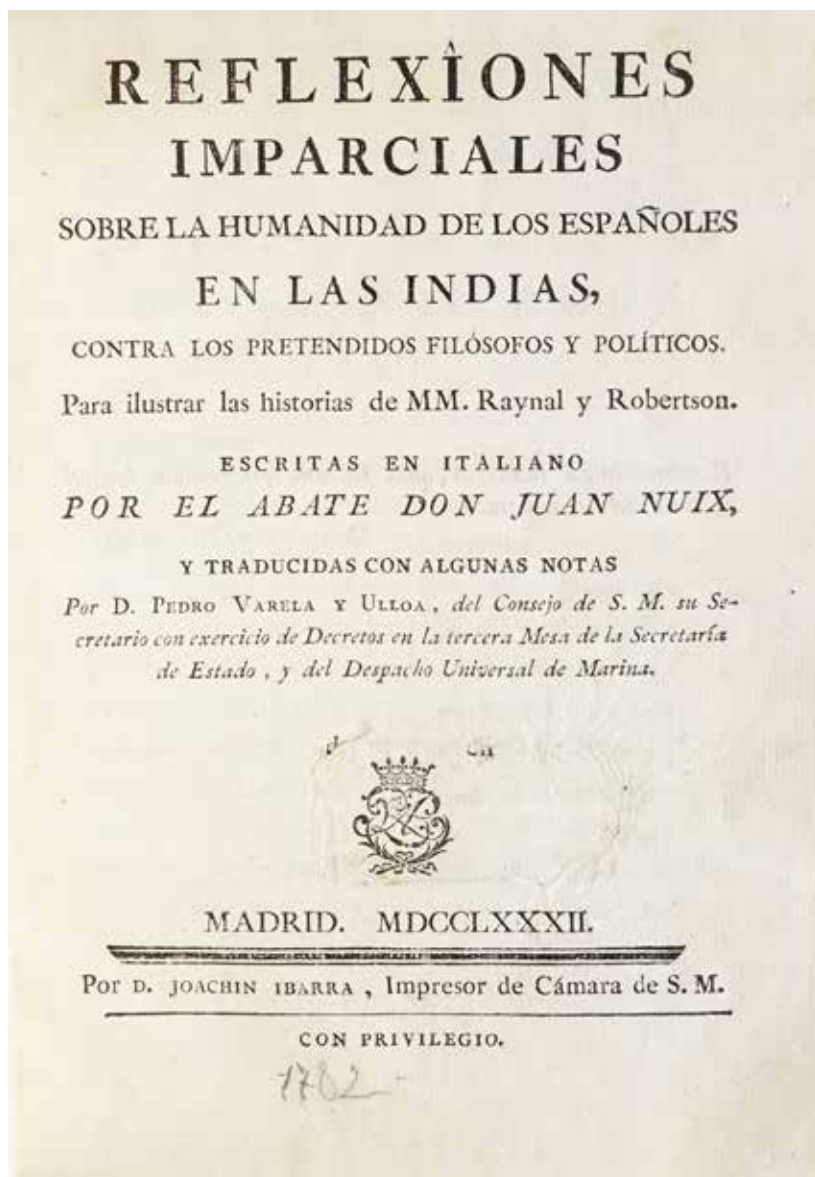
Nuix deals first with the question of whether the Indian population is declining, covering such issues as the reliability of Bartolomé de las Casas' works, the Indians' lack of skill at agriculture, the effects of disease, and "Los extrangeros que impidieron la comunicacion de la Metrópoli con las Colonias." He is particularly vehement about the detrimental effects of mining on the population and the economy (pp. 44-76, with mentions of Peru and Mexico).

Next there is a section on how the Spanish acquired land from the Indians and whether their conquests were morally acceptable. Pages 202-14 deal with the Inquisition. Nuix compares the behavior of the Spanish with that of other European conquerors, insisting that any atrocities in the Spanish colonies were committed by individuals who were later reprimanded by the Spanish government. He concludes by arguing that any harm done to the Indians was more than compensated for by the introduction of Christianity among them.

This first translation from Italian to Spanish was the work of Pedro Varela y Ulloa, a member of the Royal Council. It includes a preface by the translator in which he argues that the Spanish form of colonialism was unique: that the crimes being attributed to those of Spain were in fact the work of private individuals, and were minor compared to those of other European nations. This dovetails nicely with Nuix's contention in the main text.

Nuix y Perpiña (Tora, Old Castile, 1740-Italy, 1783) became a Jesuit in 1754. By 1767 he was teaching rhetoric at Vich. One of the arguments Nuix uses to bolster his credibility in discussing the Spaniards is that he was a Catalan, and the Catalans did not participate in the colonization of the Indies. After the Jesuits were expelled from Spain, Nuix spent the rest of his life in Italy. A second translation of this work, with additions, was made by the author's brother, José de Nuix y Perpiñá, and published in Cervera in 1783.

Type facsimile of the rare London, 1762 edition of a notorious work for which Oliveira was tried, sentenced, and burned in effigy by the Inquisition in 1761. Written in 1756 in response to the devastating Lisbon earthquake of the preceding year, the *Discours* was considered too supportive of Protestant theological positions. Following the facsimile is a 5 page "Nota Bibliographica" by the Portuguese poet, writer, diplomat, and bibliophile Joaquim de Araujo. A contemporary handwritten note inserted in this copy states that it had been presented as a gift by Joaquim de Araújo, who verbally affirmed on 12 September 1893 that this is one of 36 copies on *papel-china*.

First edition in Portuguese of a work originally written in English by a Portuguese exile; it is a fascinating glimpse into the interests of the Portuguese in the early and mid-eighteenth century. Volume I includes essays on papal authority, papal anathemas, the salvation of ignorant men, transubstantiation, physicians, wealthy men, the kissing of the pope's foot, love, poverty, werewolves (*lobisomens*, I, 77-80), modern Greeks, beauty, men possessed by demons (*endemoninhados*), learned women, navigation, superstitions, comedians, gypsies (*boémios* or *egipcianos*, I, 190-5), treatment of criminals, and the constancy and courage of women. Volume II includes essays on the Real Ordem de Cristo, D. Sebastião vs. King Arthur, marriage, the character of Philip II of Spain, pagans vs. Catholics, gambling, spiders and flies, asylum, adultery, reliquaries, pilgrimages, Turks, and the Antichrist. A 26-page analytical index appears at the end of volume II.

Francisco Xavier de Oliveira (1702-83), better known as the Cavaleiro de Oliveira, was secretary to the Portuguese ambassador at Vienna. By 1751 he had left the diplomatic corps and became a Protestant, moving to London where he made a living by publishing *Amusement périodique* monthly, his most important work. After the Lisbon earthquake of 1755, Oliveira wrote a pamphlet exhorting the King of Portugal to banish the Inquisition

and convert to Protestantism, along with all his subjects. Oliveira was burnt in effigy at Lisbon in 1761, but died quietly in England 22 years later.

The translator and editor, Aquilino Ribeiro (1885-1963), is famous in his own right as an author of novels, short stories and children's books.

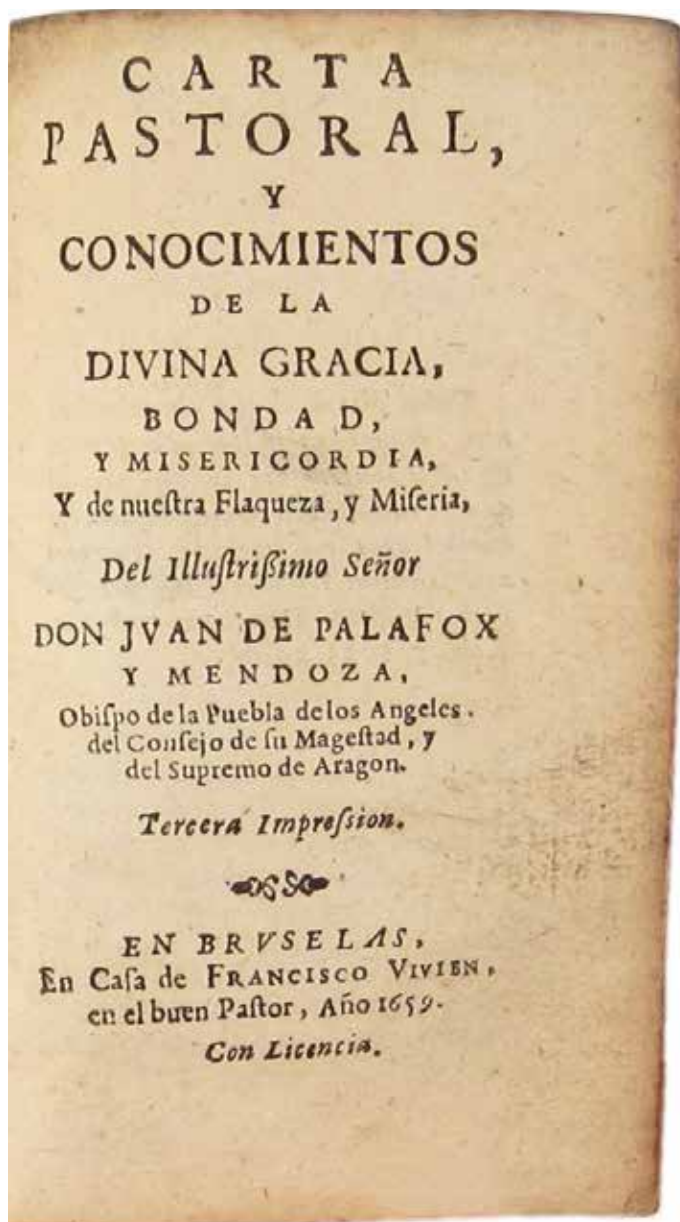

Palafox y Mendoza, energetic and beloved bishop of Puebla, was known as "the second Las Casas" because of his staunch defense of the Indians. As a direct consequence of his battles with the Jesuits, he was eventually transferred to the inconsequential See of Osma in Old Castile, where he died in 1659. His actions were finally vindicated by three papal briefs.

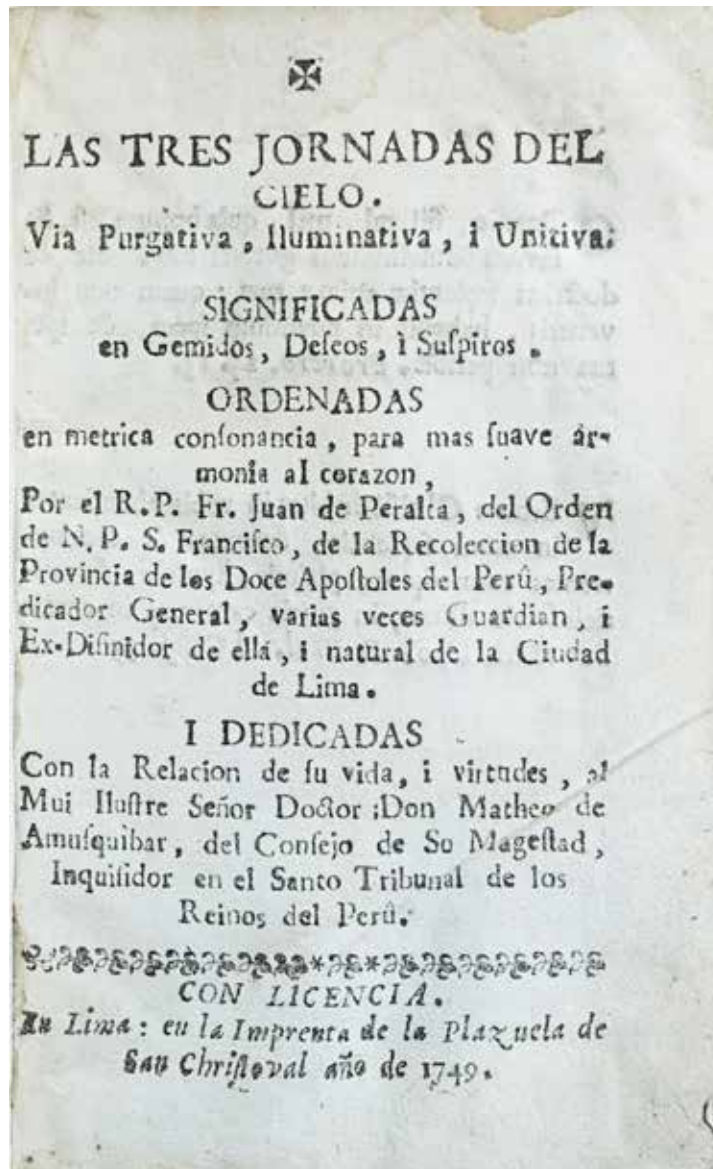

FIRST EDITION of a devotional work that was printed again in Cadiz, 1752, Lima, 1764, and Lima, 1794. These instructions in verse for spiritual enlightenment guide the reader through 15 *gemidos*, 15 *deseos*, and 15 *suspiros*, each based on a biblical verse and preceded by an argument.

The divisional title lacking here before f. I is present in about half of the copies in OCLC. Folios I-XXX are the biography of Juan Jose de Peralta (1663-1747), a Lima native who wrote this work. The biography was composed by someone who worked with him: "Breve noticia de la vida, i virtudes del R.P. Fr. Juan Joseph de Peralta, religioso menor del Orden de San Francisco, que tomò el habito, vivió, i murió en el Convento, i Santa Recoleccion de Nra. Sra. de los Angeles, sita extramuros de la ciudad de Lima, cabeza, i metropoli del Reino del Perú: / Compuesta por el R.P. Fr. Joachim Gomez, lector de prima de sagrada theologia, ex-guardian i actual maestro de novicios en dicho convento."

Previously unpublished manuscript of "Livro nº 397 do cartório da Inquisição de Lisboa" (in the Arquivo Nacional da Torre do Tombo?—we were not able to find any mention of the location of the original manuscript). Said to be one of 500 copies, but there is no printed justification.

FIRST EDITION. An examination of the documents supporting the claim that Gusmão, the famous *Voador*, was actually the first to build a flying machine; includes an illustration of Gusmão's "Passarola" as it was shown in contemporary engravings (a large bird) and as it was shown in a contemporary manuscript (a gondola with a triangular cover). At the end is "a very good bibliography" (Borba de Moraes) listing some 70 books, journal articles and manuscripts discussing either Gusmão or the early history of ballooning and flying machines.

Gusmão (1685-1724), born in Santos, São Paulo, was the brother of P. Alexandre de Gusmão, noted Brazilian writer and educator. Bartholomeu was educated at Santos and at Coimbra, where he took orders. While in Portugal he applied for a royal patent on a flying machine, which he demonstrated on 5 August 1709 before the Court and an amazed multitude. He attracted enthusiastic praise in prose and verse, but also the attention of the Inquisition, which suspected that he was engaged in witchcraft. Gusmão never made another ascension, and some years later, when he had lost the King's favor, was warned that the Inquisition had condemned him to death. That same night he fled Portugal, but died in Toledo soon after of a fever.

Gusmão is featured in José Saramago's important novel, *Memorial do Convento*. Simões was a native of Coimbra.

FIRST and ONLY EDITION of the author's only published work. In it he supports the absolutist cause, favoring the Inquisition and opposing the 1822 Constitution. Pages 135-94 consist of notes, some of them with rather learned references.

Born in Maiorca (Coimbra), Pinto de Sousa studied law at the Universidade de Coimbra and served as a judge in Cabeço de Vide.

FIRST and ONLY EDITION of this oration honoring the Inquisitor General of Portugal and the Inquisition. The new Inquisitor General was none other than Dom José de Bragança (1720-1801), illegitimate son of D. João V, King of Portugal, and the famous nun Madre Paula de Odiveias (Paula Teresa da Silva), favorite mistress of the king. He was thus a half-brother of D. José, King of Portugal, along with two other "Meninos de Palhavã". As a result of a conflict with the Marquês de Pombal, D. José and his brother D. António were exiled to Buçaco in 1760, and only permitted to return after the death of the King D. José in 1777.

The author, holder of a doctorate in canon law, was a deputy of the Inquisition at Évora.

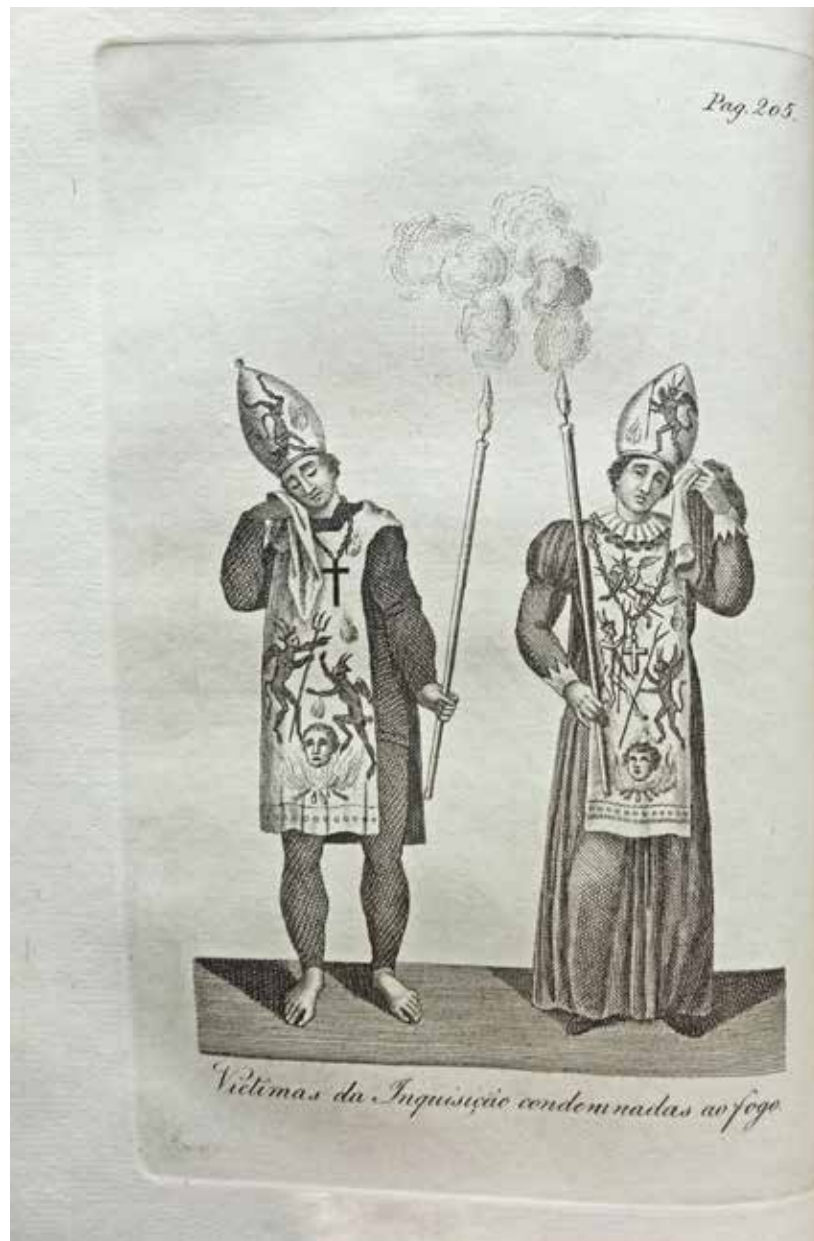
