“WE DO NOT ASK HIM WHAT HE THINKS OF HIS CONDITION”

First editions. The conferences aimed to bring together representatives of Northern and Southern states to propose solutions to the social and economic problems faced by Black Americans. However, Black Americans were themselves excluded. The editor of the proceedings was also the stenographer for the conferences; in this capacity, she was the first woman employed by the US Department of State. Two works, octavo. “HOW I WISH THE LADIES COULD VOTE”

A politically engaging letter from Harriet M. Buss to her parents, Silas and Sally Buss. Writing as a student, Buss went on to teach hundreds of formerly enslaved people over the course of her career, including Robert Smalls, a future member of the United States House of Representatives, and help establish Shaw University, a historically Black college. Single bifolium of blue ruled writing paper, written across three sides in black ink, the fourth serving as an integral envelope. Stamped and franked; a well-preserved letter.

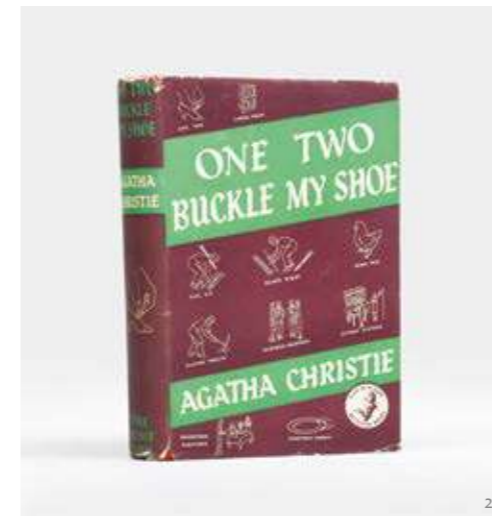
An example of one of the world’s oldest paper currencies, one of a cache obtained by the French sinologist Paul Pelliot in Beijing during the 1900 Boxer Uprising. Today, Pelliot’s name is closely associated with the extraordinary collection of ancient manuscripts unearthed in the early 20th century at Dunhuang. 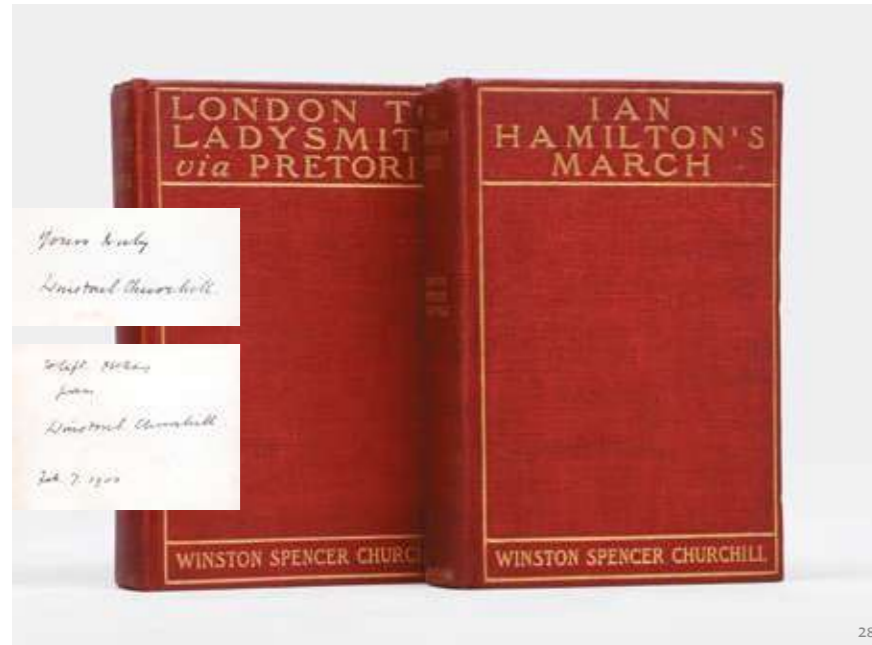

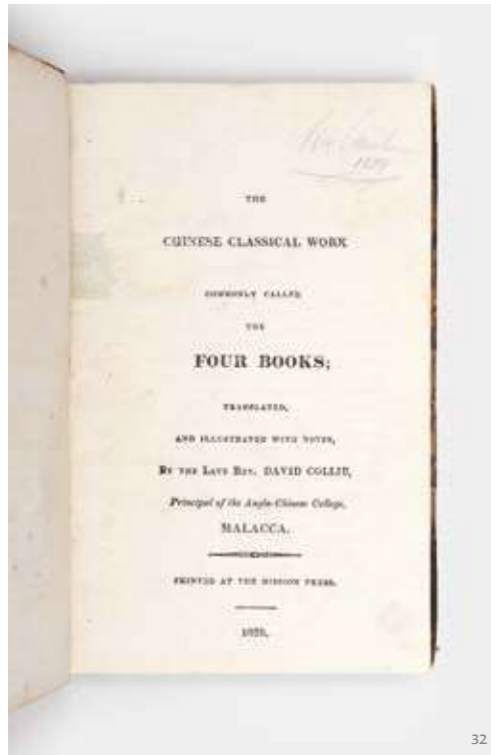
THE SCIENCE OF CLIMATE CHANGE

For much of modern history, climate change was conceived as something remote and geological. From the early 19th century, a series of distinct milestones took place: recognition of the greenhouse effect, laboratory measurements of heat-trapping gases, early

calculations of carbon dioxide's climatic influence, and the advent of continuous atmospheric monitoring and climate modelling. Only in the late 20th century did these strands converge, bringing anthropogenic warming to the centre of climatology and into public consciousness. This collection documents the long accumulation of scientific knowledge concerning climate change. It ranges from early printed weather prognostications and annotated incunabula to handwritten observational data and contemporary reports of the Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change.

Offered as a collection. Together, approximately 750 items, principally printed books and journals, the vast majority in first edition and in excellent condition. An inventory is available on request.

THE BEST EDITION OF THE FIRST SEA ATLAS OF THE WORLD

This sea atlas, “arguably the most sumptuous ever produced” (Burden), was published in 1646 when its author, Robert Dudley, was 73. It was not only the first sea atlas of the world but also the first to use Mercator’s projection, the earliest to show magnetic deviation, the first to show currents and prevailing winds, the first to expound the advantages of “Great Circle Sailing” (the shortest distance between two points on a globe), and the first sea-atlas to be compiled by an Englishman.

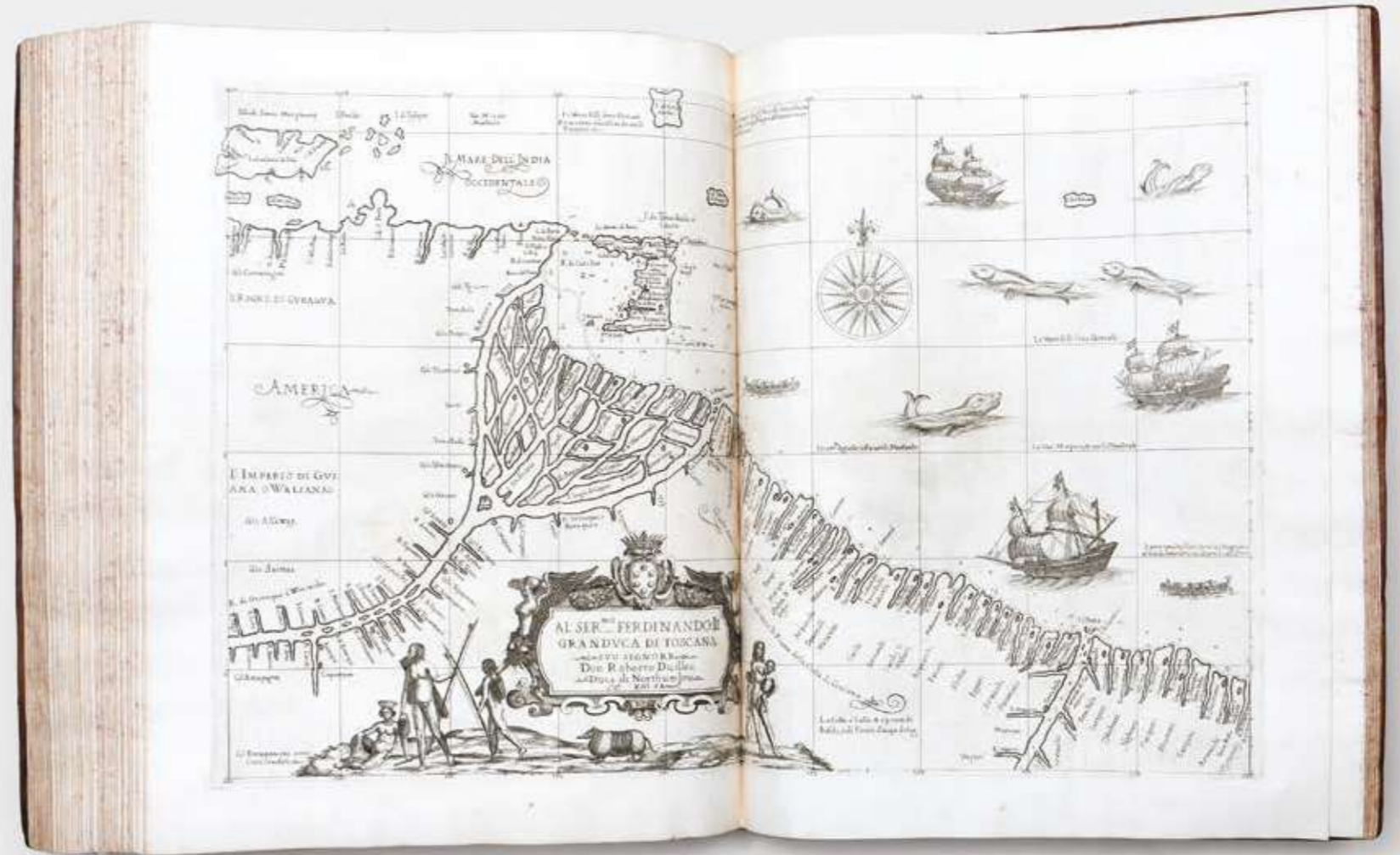
The book is a superb marriage of Dudley’s navigational expertise and cartographic excellence, with beautifully engraved charts by Antonio Francesco Lucini. Six parts in two vols. Folio. Sumptuously engraved. Contemporary sheep, elaborately panelled in bind, vol. II with plate 16 silked at gutter, plate 20 cut out and mounted. An unusually clean and well-preserved set.

PRINTED FROM WOODBLOCKS CARVED IN THE 12TH CENTURY

A survival of early Chinese efforts to propagate a printed Buddhist canon, produced from woodblocks carved in the late 11th or early 12th century in Fuzhou, where two of the city’s leading temples each sponsored a monumental edition of Buddhist learning.
