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

A scarce, provincially published Regency work bemoaning the lot of farmworkers; particularly the fluctuating corn price and high cost of land rental. The author (a tentative attribution has been made to Sir William B. Cooke by the British Library) laments that 'all classes of the community seem arrayed against the poor miserable Farmer...the great objects that the capitalists and commercial interest appear to have at present, are, to set every Landlord against his Tenant, and every Tenant against his Landlord; and the Clergymen of the parish against both.' Though nominally addressed to agriculturists in the region of Doncaster, our 'Farmer' argues, with great rationale, that 'the great interest of the state, - agriculture, manufactures, and commerce - are so intimately combined, that one cannot suffer without corresponding injury to the other', and implores all those connected to the working of the land to, in a somewhat communitarian appeal, to 'consider ourselves as belonging to one family, the members of which can only thrive by the assistance they derive from each other.'



The undated third edition, following anonymous quarto and broadside appearances in 1648, of an anti-Puritan Latin verse satire in Latin. Composed by Oxford educated clergyman and sometime Master of Magdalen College School John Allibond (1597-1658), it sends-up the initial stages of the Oxford Parliamentary Visitation, which commenced in 1647 but was not published in English until an edition of 1717, with the translation made by Ned Ward.

Outside of several copies in Oxford, ESTC locates only four copies in British libraries (BL, Cambridge, Durham and Glasgow) and just five elsewhere (Folger, Harvard, Huntington, NYPL and Yale).





All editions are rare, despite evidence of frequent reprinting and at least one resetting; COPAC and OCLC together locate copies of editions appearing in 1821 (Fifteenth edition'), 1823 and 1827. Of this 1824 Bath imprint the former locates no copies in British libraries, and only two in the United States (Georgetown and UNC).





The first edition (a pencilled note the front free-endpaper suggest a second appeared in 1881), of a collection of Indian receipts recorded by an anonymous resident of British-controlled Madras; many of which 'learnt from the natives of that part of India'. The 116 dishes presented, aside from South Asian variants of more traditional fare that would have been familiar to members of the Raj (vegetable soup, stewed kidneys etc.), include recipes for Dhal curry, dry 'Kebobs', 'Pillaw' rice, prawn 'Sambal', Tamarind fish, and stewed sheep's tongues.

OCLC records copies at two locations in North America (LoC and New York), and none in the British Isles.

Totalling 576 lots, sold over six days, Genoude's library was primarily devoted to historical and religious works from Elzevir editions of the seventeenth-century, to modern Parisian publications on the Napoleonic Wars.



A handsome presentation copy of a Madras-printed modern history of 'one of the most ancient Zemindaries in India...and consists of the Pergunnahs (Tanas) of Bobbili, Rajam, Kavitey and Sitanagaram...about 920 sq. miles in area', compiled by the then Maharaja Sir Venkata Svetachalapathi Ranga Rao Bahadur (1862-1921). In a short preface the author explains that the compiler of an 1889 history of the same region in the Madras Presidency 'made a gross mistake as to the Founder of the Samasthanam', which this work corrects thanks to the discovery of 'some more records and further accounts...obtained from several sources'.

COPAC locates only two copies in British libraries (BL and Oxford), OCLC adds SOAS, two at the University of California, and one further, at Duke.




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

The first edition of publisher and historian Robert Chambers' (1802-1871) guide to the more obscure structures of Scotland's capital. Reekiana was compiled from material gathered by Chambers during research for his popular Traditions of Edinburgh (1824), and published to serve as both as a third or supplementary volume to that work (indeed the index refers to both first and second volumes), and as an independent guide 'for strangers and natives through the ancient part of our city.' The unusual title was 'once contemplated for a similar work by Sir Walter Scott' which he 'good-humouredly surrendered' to Chambers whose works he published.

This copy was presented as a gift to a Peter Cunningham, perhaps the author and literary critic (1816-1869), son of Allan Cunningham (1784-1842).





Patrick Colquhoun (1745-1820), Scottish merchant, statistician, magistrate, and founder of the first regular preventive police force in England, the Thames River Police. First published in 1797, A Treatise on the Police of the Metropolis examines the nature of criminal activity within London, such as burglary, fraud, gambling, and illegal trading in the dockyards, and discusses issues of punishment and suggests alterations to the policing of the capital that Colquhoun thought necessary. He emphasised the requirement for measures in crime prevention, particularly through the visible presence of officers acting as a deterrent, to be a fundamental part of any police force. His utilitarian approach saw that Colquhoun's methodology would greatly inform techniques in modern policing throughout the world.









The *Paradoxes* defends that earlier work and formed part of his appeal for a return from exile; in which he would be supported by fellow philosophers, including Voltaire. Two further parts, on the freedom of the press and luxury, were subsequently published.




Having previously compiled a collection of Gaelic tales in *Legends of Galloway* (Edinburgh, 1825), Denniston here records a fragment of a poem from the Gallwegian oral tradition that recounts the conflict between Scottish and English forces at the site of Threave Castle in 1378. The poem is preceded by a lengthy introduction and followed by detailed notes providing historical grounding for the text.

Scarce, with COPAC recording only four copies outside of Scotland (BL, London Library, Manchester and Trinity College Dublin).

Written whilst a student at Cambridge, the work has an unconventional style that attempts to mimic the humour of Sterne's *Tristram Shandy*. Such was the work's popularity that subsequent to the first Rochester printing, two London editions of 1785 and 1786 were required, with a Dublin edition appearing in 1787, by which time the author's name had been added.

A rare survival, in the original wrappers, of Scottish physician and writer George Edwards' (1752-1823) plan for European peace. Better known as an early supporter of the income tax (indeed he claims to have fathered the thought of it), Edwards, who also practised as a physician in London and Barnard Castle, was an inveterate proponent of extensive plans for various economic and political ventures. This present plan for a new world order of foreign policy, remarkable in its naivety of realpolitik and any form of self-determination, was designed to maintain Britain's mastery of the seas.

It included the acceptance of 'the present and future elevation of the five grand nations of the world, Great Britain, France, Russia, Austria and the United States', the defeat, at a stroke of a pen, of the Ottoman Empire, and the subsequent gifting of Constantinople to Russia, and the carving up of large parts of the world, including South America, into defined spheres of influence, including those areas 'allotted to us, which should be the Southern half of Asia Minor from the Mediterranean Sea to Persia'.

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

The first edition of writer Pryse **Lockhart Gordon's (1762-1845)** travelogue on Belgium and Holland, including a detailed account of the causes and events of the 1830 Belgium Revolution which led to the secession of the nation from the United Kingdom of the Netherlands.

John Rushout, 2nd Baron Northwick (1770-1859), art collector and connoisseur who developed close relationships with many eminent contemporaries including Sir William Hamilton, Edward Gibbon, and Horatio Nelson. His friendship with Nelson would result in Rushout being the first European to hear of the British victory at the Battle of the Nile - news he received from the admiral personally.



Eight lithographed leaves of verse are accompanied by illustrations of a society dance detailed in pen and ink, the whole inspired by French composer **Gatien Marcailhou's (1807-1855)** popular waltz *Indiana*.

Annotation on this copy corroborates the annotations on a copy in the Bodleian, attributing authorship to Maria Gore, 'Maid of Honour to H.M. the Queen Adelaide...afterwards Hon. Mrs. Powys-Keck', sister to Viscountess Howe and daughter of **Admiral Sir John Gore (1772-1736)** and his wife Georgina, herself the daughter of Admiral Sir George Montagu.

By the very nature of the hand-finished production, this must surely have been a limited edition. Few examples are recorded in institutions worldwide; OCLC locates only two copies in the British Isles (BL, Oxford), and a single copy elsewhere (Herzogin Anna Amalia Bibliothek).







It also contains instructions on the assessment of specific duties (e.g. on windows, male servants, waiters in taverns, carriages, race horses and armorial bearings), with tables facilitating calculations.








John Keble (1792-1866), English poet, Anglican clergyman and leading light of the Oxford movement. His *Christian Year*, a collection of 103 well executed devotional verses, was first published here in an anonymous edition of only 500 copies. It was hugely successful, and proudly claimed by the author from the second edition onwards; hundreds of subsequent editions appeared before the end of the nineteenth-century. Later referred to as the 'Victorian Churching of Romanticism', Keble's heady mix of popular, emotional and approachable verse and high church ideals presaged his later involvement in the Tractarian Oxford Movement.

The autograph letter loosely inserted in this copy was sent to English cleric and antiquary Rev. Francis Kilvert, (1793-1863), from Keble's residence at Hursley Lodge, September 25th 1839, thanking Kilvert for his 'account of the departure of my dear & I may say motherly friend'.


Charles Kingsley (1819-1875), Anglican clergyman and historical novelist, was appointed the Regius professor of modern history at Cambridge on the recommendation of the prince consort - and outlined his theory of history in this inaugural lecture. Despite flourishing largely outside of academic life and generally failing to place history at the centre of University studies, his lectures were popular.







Joseph Lister (1827-1912), English physician and founder of anti-septic surgery. After eight years as the Professor of Surgery at Glasgow University, Lister left in 1869 to take up the professorship of clinical surgery at Edinburgh. His first lecture outlined his germ theory of putrefaction: 'the germ-theory declares that the putrefaction of organic substances under atmospheric influence is not effected, as used to be supposed, by the oxygen of the air, but by living organisms developed from germs floating in the atmosphere as constituents of its dust'. Significant in itself as scientific theory, for Lister it was of particular significance given that his antiseptic system of surgical treatment aimed to avoid putrefaction by guarding against germs.

As this copy is of the same provenance as similar offprints and pamphlets presented to Dr Lonsdale of Cumberland Infirmary, it is likely that he was the recipient of this presentation copy.

Straker, of Bishopgate St., London, of the origins of the farcical Dorset legend of the Shapwick Monster; a crab dropped by a travelling fishmonger from Poole *en route* to Bere Regis mistaken for a 'Monster' by a 'country clown' who stirred up an angry mob of locals to repel the invader. It is the only known work of **Buscall Fox (1818-1887)**, East Anglian painter, who was lodging in Dorset at the time of this work's publication.

Several notable participants of the Napoleonic Wars are represented, including the French Emperor - with much made of the recent addition of the 'Golden Chamber', a room housing artefacts recovered from the field of Waterloo and affects once in Napoleon's possession - including his coronation robe and the blood-stained counterpane used on the camp-bed on which he died.



Monteil based the work on his own extensive collection of manuscripts, which he would sold in 1835, with many passing into the library of English antiquary and book collector Sir Thomas Philipps.



The 'New Turkish' had been introduced in 1928 by the authority of Mustafa Kemal Ataturk in an effort to further the formation of an homogenous nation state from the ruins of the Ottoman Empire by eliminating regional dialects. The publication of this guide by the Government Printing Office was no doubt informed by the need for officials to have a working knowledge of the new tongue in dealings with Turkish Cypriot counterparts.








The first edition, in original cloth, of an account of a journey in the Eastern Sahara during 1851 by naval officer Sir William Peel (1824-1858), third son of Sir Robert Peel (1788-1850). Having foreseen the opportunity afforded by a period on half pay, Peel entered into meticulous preparations for his expedition, including intense study of the Arabic language under the tutelage of Maronite Joseph Churi, with whom he would travel. The pair departed in August, tracing a path north up the Nile, crossing the desert of Khartoum into al-Ubayd. Their progress was fraught with peril and beset by severe fever. Safely returning to England in January 1852, Peel immediately set about composing this memoir. His distinguished career in the Royal Navy would see Peel serve during the Crimean War at Sevastopol and the battle of Inkerman, later participating in the military reaction to the Indian Mutiny. His bravery, being renowned in the services, would see him become one of the first recipients of the Victoria Cross.



A rare miscellany of comic tales and curious anecdotes, compiled under the distinct, and rather 'on the nose' pseudonym of 'Love-laughter'. Many of the some 90 short pieces share the common attribute of concluding with an often highly telegraphed and absurd punch-line, with many directed at the expense of the inhabitants of Ireland: 'An Irish country schoolmaster being asked what was meant by the word, 'fortification,' instantly answered, with the utmost confidence, "two twentyfications make a fortification." Overall the work provides exceptional insight into how humour has altered in the intervening two centuries.

A publication with a similar title was issued by printer Brett Smith of Dublin in 1815, under the pseudonym of 'Johnny O'Daisy'.





A remarkably odd work recounting, complete with 'quaint East Anglian twang', a relation 'in the Methodist Chapel, Dickleborough', of a most congenial meeting between Farmer Smith, who 'lived in the good old days when British wheat was selling from 15s. to 20s a bushel' and had invented 'a plough which was a great improvement on the cumbrous implement then in us', and Prince Albert and Queen Victoria. Such was the depth of feeling ingrained in their meeting, which followed the farmer's night in Windsor Castle, we are told, that 'not long afterwards he received a box from London, and in it he found a most beautiful Family Bible, with a note explaining that it was a present from the Queen and Prince Albert'. Undeterred by formality as the farmer was, he promptly sent it back requesting the Queen's signature in it.

The oddities of this work are not confined, however to it's content; despite publication in Torquay (by M. Haughton, of whom we can find no trace), it bears an imprint of 'R.J. Acford Ltd, Chichester'.

Perhaps unsurprisingly, this is entirely unrecorded by COPAC or OCLC.





The second of two published collections of verse by Thomas Rhodes (fl.1808-1824), both published in Coventry, presented here in an entirely unsophisticated state. Dedicated to 'the Nobility and Gentry' as well as the largely bourgeois, Midland's based 'Subscribers to the following Miscellanies', this collection of conservative and pro-establishment verse is prefaced by Rhodes' condemnation of 'an unceasingly inveterate enemy, whose unprincipled aims at universal aggrandisement are everyday more and more apparent. The longest and most laudatory pieces are dedicated either to mainstream Anglicanism, or the defence of the English constitution and character against enemies both foreign and domestic, including 'Lines in Praise of Britain', 'The English Constitution, an Eulogy' and 'An Eulogium on the British Character'. In a similarly patriotic manner Rhodes, in common with many other contemporary poets, presents his own lament to the death of the hero of the hour, 'Elegaic Verses on the Death of Admiral Lord Nelson'.

An ardent supporter of the enfranchisement of women, (he stood for parliament as a women's suffrage candidate at a by-election for the Wimbledon seat in 1907, but was not elected), Russell here suggests that those men who oppose suffrage do so only due to 'the fear that their liberty to act in ways that are injurious to women will be curtailed'. He continues to summarily dismiss the more extreme anti-feminist criticisms of female intellect present both in Dicey's work and indeed the contemporary political culture in general, views most conspicuously espoused by organisations such as The Women's National Anti-suffrage League and the Men's League for Opposing Woman Suffrage (these two bodies would amalgamate in December 1910, six months after the publication of the present pamphlet). His only concern for the political emancipation of women is that more than just the granting of the right to vote will be required, as enfranchised women will enter a system 'which has been made by men, where the parties are divided according to the divisions of opinion among men, where all the candidates are men'.

Anti-Suffragist Anxieties.

By BERTRAND RUSSELL.

THE arguments against women's suffrage were, until lately, by no means easy to discover. For though much had been written and spoken in its favour, opponents still felt themselves securely entrenched behind the ramparts of prejudice and custom, and did not think it necessary or prudent to venture on the open ground of explicit discussion. Now, however, owing to the activities of the Anti-Suffrage League and the writings of an eminent Professor,* it has become possible to discover what are the reasons for opposition which it is thought wise to avow. It must be confessed that they do not make a very formidable array, and that many of them are old friends which have done duty against every reform since the Ancient Britons first ceased to dye themselves with woad. But such as they are, they deserve examination.

A neatly accomplished copy of a mid-nineteenth century printed ships log-book, complete with printed borders, two days set out per page, and with columns for 'H', 'K', 'F', 'Course', 'Winds', 'LW' and 'Remarks', produced by Charles Oram, Bristol bookseller with premises on Broad-Quay, and completed on board the St. George during a voyage from Bristol to Calcutta, via the Cape, August 11-November 19, 1840. Oram's attractive printed log was marketed as 'an improvement on the plan' of well-known navigational teacher and author John Hamilton Moore (1738-1807).

The St. George, with two decks and three masts, was built in 1828, at Chester, with a gross tonnage of 605 and a length of 139 feet, 9 inches. Owned by the merchants William Acraman, Daniel Wade Acraman and William Edward it was one of the larger Bristol ships to regularly conduct the India trade.

Beneath the imprint to the title the publisher notes that 'Merchants, Captains, Seamen, and others, supplied with every Article in the Stationary Line on the most reasonable terms', and in the imprint Oram proudly boasts that in addition to stationary he is a 'Chart and Navigation Bookseller'; however, we can find no record of any other copies of this log, or indeed any other publications with Charles Oram's imprint in either COPAC or OCLC.





The Kent, a British East Indian Company vessel bound for Bengal and China caught fire in the Bay of Biscay on her maiden voyage. On board were 641 passengers and crew, including 20 officers and 344 soldiers belonging to the 31st Regiment of Foot, 43 women and 66 children, 20 private passengers, and a crew (including officers) of 148 men. The quick-thinking of Captain Cook of the passing Cambria saved the lives of 547 souls.

The manuscript annotations are generally utilitarian, it nevertheless displays evidence of familiarity with Paley (Vol. I, p.107), and occasionally includes some rather poetic parsing of Smith's meanings; such as this comment relating to the impact of poverty on childrearing; 'Poverty nips the infant flower' (Ibid). The approving comment 'Good remarks' appears next to Smith's comments on overwork of labourers on four days causing idleness in the remaining three of each week (Vol I. p111) suggests a background or at least understanding of the impact of manual labour on man's body and soul.







The society was founded in 1804 by William Sawrey Gilpin, Robert Hills, John Claude Nattes, Francis Nicholson, Nicholas Pocock, William Henry Pyne, Samuel Shelley and John and Cornelius Varley who had broken away from the Royal Academy in protest of the Academy's inferior treatment of watercolour.

Each catalogue lists approximately 300 individual artworks, including notable entries by Birket Foster, John Burgess, and Edward Burne Jones. Several female artists are represented - notable given the difficulties faced by women in gaining submission to Royal Academy and associated shows.

Presented here unpriced, a note preceding each of the lists explains that 'The Keeper attends in the Gallery with a Book, containing the Prices (independent of Frames and Glasses) of such Pictures as are for sale'.

The collected correspondence and articles of artist James McNeill Whistler (1834-1903) chronicling his impassioned exchanges with critics and acquaintances such as John Ruskin, Oscar Wilde, and Harry Quilter. In August of 1889 American journalist Sheridan Ford began editing the work at Whistler's behest. Shortly thereafter, releasing the value the book may hold, Whistler withdrew publishing permission and dismissed Ford. In retaliation, in February 1890, Ford published this pirated edition at Antwerp under the unauthorised imprint of Frederick Stokes & Brother. Whistler responded swiftly seeing to it that production was terminated and the majority of copies confiscated. This legal action did not deter Ford would issue a Parisian printing that same year. The pirated edition differs somewhat from the official text published by William Heinemann in June 1890, including as it does additional material relating to Wilde and a record of the collapse of Ford and Whistler's relationship.
