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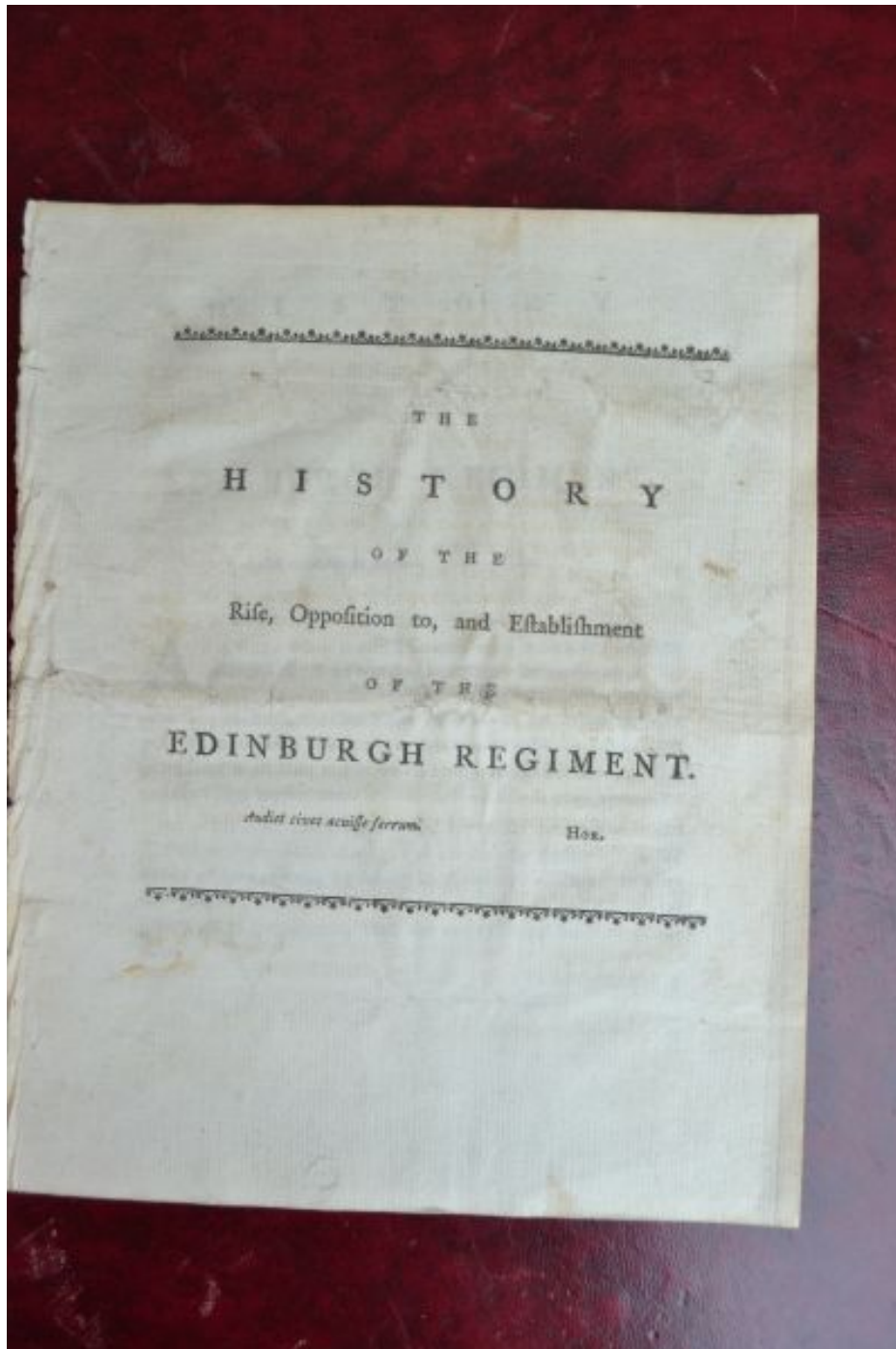

TO THE D. OF B.

WHEN your Grace engaged in the politics of E———, the Sheriff of the county said, with some wit and more truth, " *That you had clapp'd a stibler to your back.*"

The best way to judge of the prudence of your persevering in that measure, is to look back upon the past measures of your life, and who the person is that has led you into most of them.

You began your outset in the world with what some call'd a *matter of the Scots Peers* against the Minister; and what others call'd a *generous assertion of the independence* of your own order; it matters not which. Your zeal continu'd for a few months; you made up the matter in private with the Minister; you shuffled in public with your brethren. Their looks, even their silence at the meeting, were the most bitter reproaches you could receive. You said, That the list propos'd was the very one which you yourself would have chosen; a strange compliment to those noble friends who had embarked in the same bottom with you, who trusted you was to sink or swim with them; and yet whose characters you thus, in their own hearing, surrendered without thanks, in compliment to the characters of others! From that moment, one who lives within a mile of your house mark'd you for his own, as a youth meddling, keen, and unsteady; who could be the tool of faction at one time, and the instrument of power at another.

Your next movement was to put yourself at the head of the Ayr Bank, that, by lending other peoples money to those who would vote for you at elections in Hanks, Burghs, and Counties, you might get the command of all the elections of Scotland into your hands. What was the consequence? You design'd to make others pay for your politics; but, while you had your designs, other people had theirs, and they made you *pay the piper* in the end. When your bubble broke, you hung on for hours in the back parlour of the Bank of England, to try if they would lend money to support the falling credit of your Bank; and you hung on for days and weeks at the levees of Ministers to procure an act of Parliament to prevent the creditors of your Bank from falling upon the private estates of the partners. *By involving your country in your own calamities*, you procur'd that act; but had it not been for the generosity of an English Parliament, the D. of M.'s daughter might,

8. CHART. *Chart of the Atlantic Ocean.*

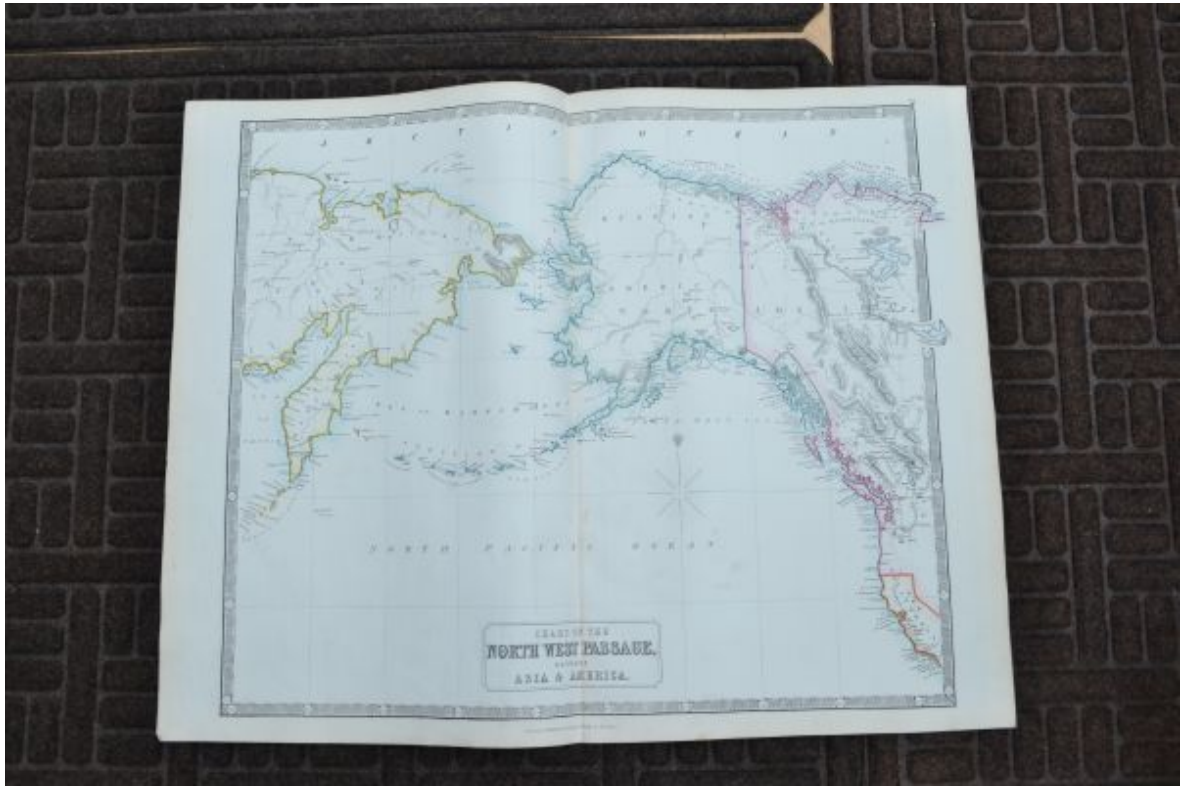

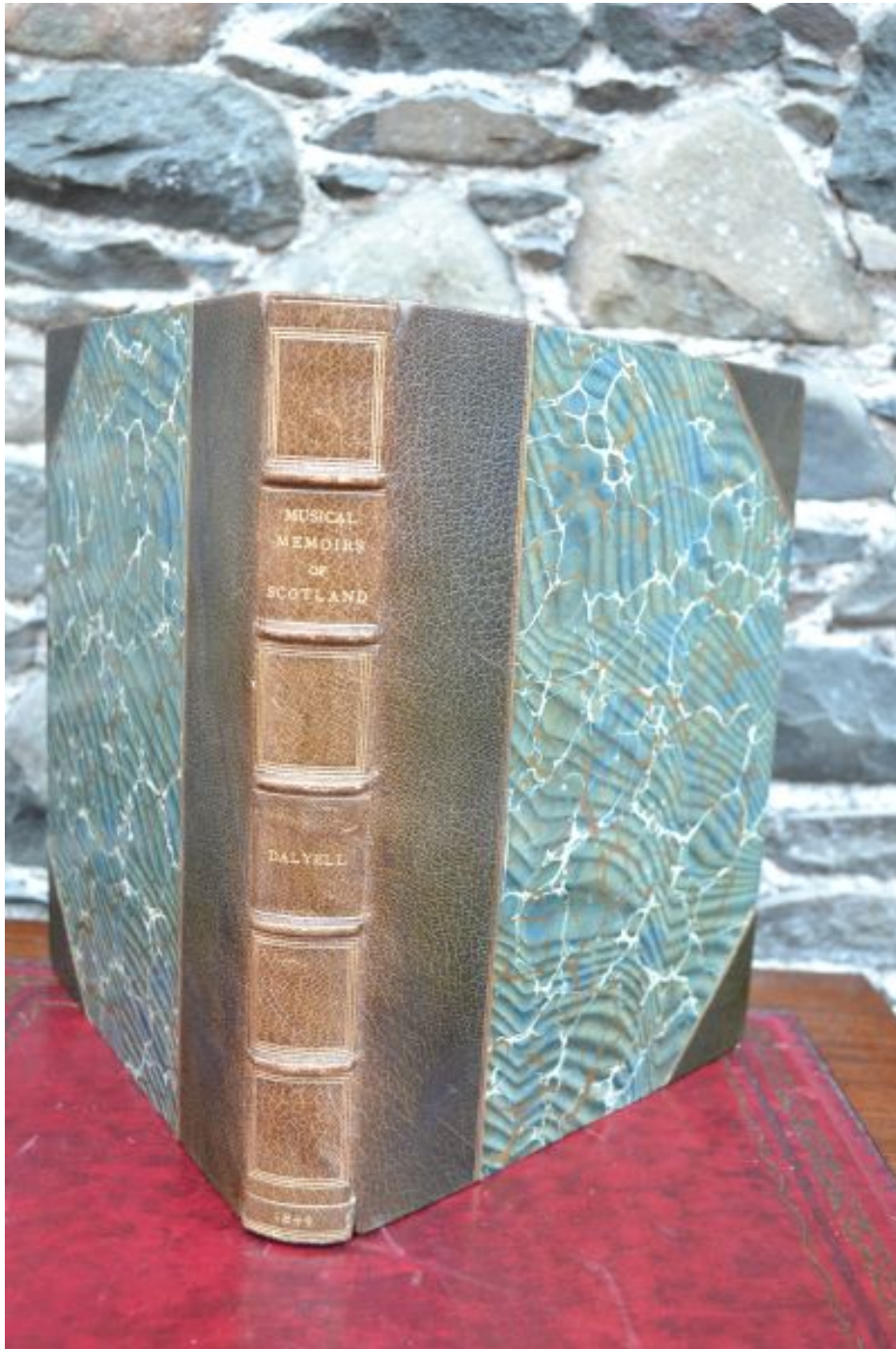
9. CHART. **Chart of the North West Passage between Asia & America.**

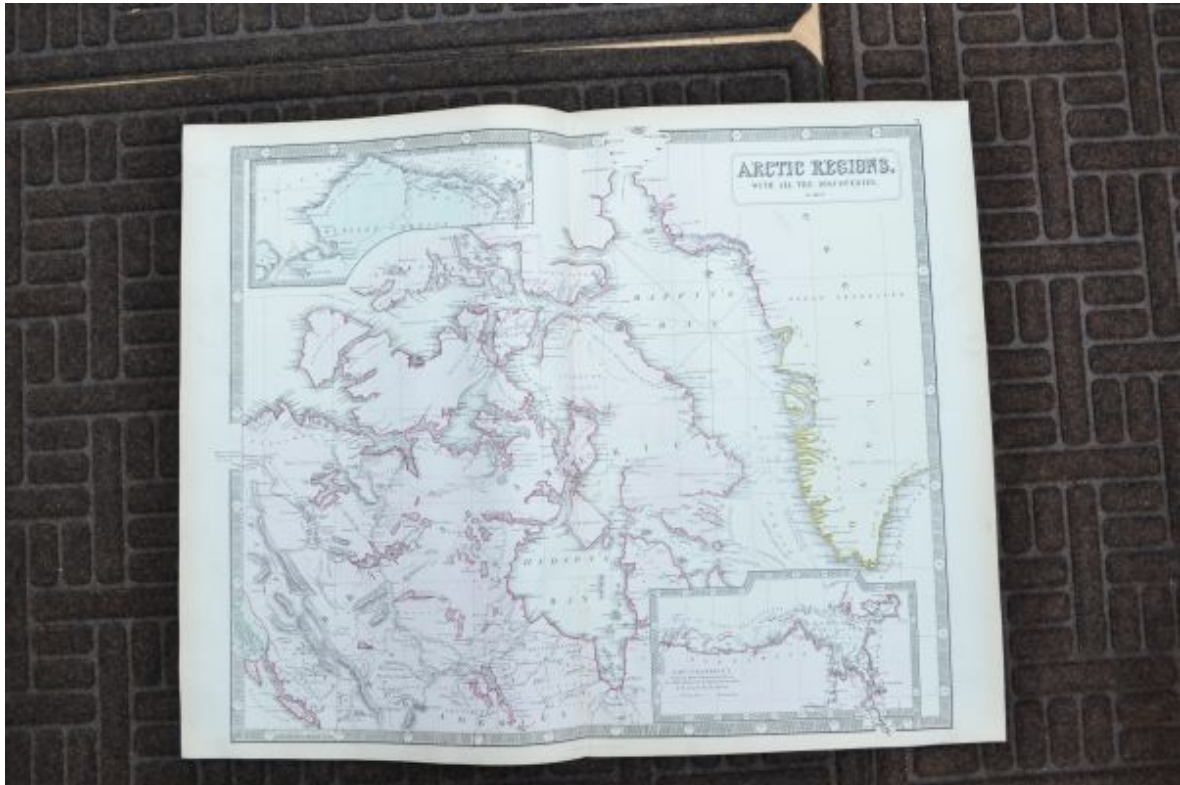

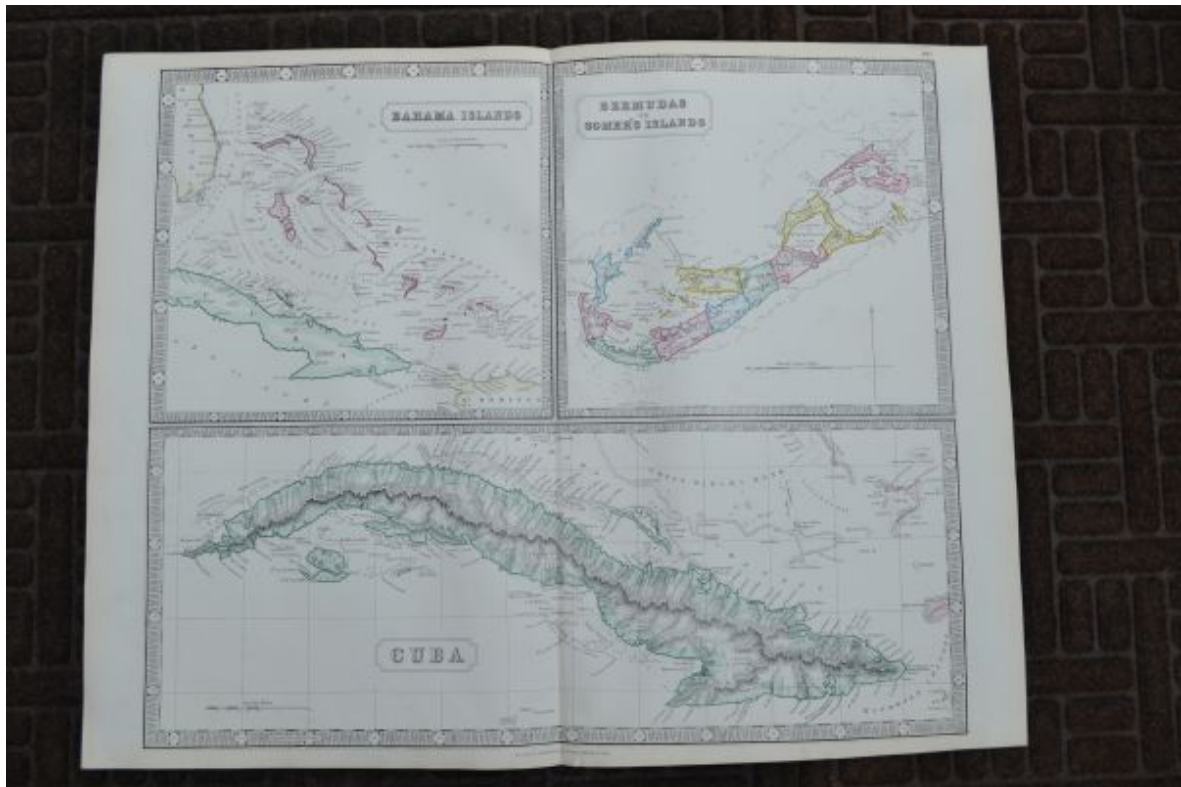

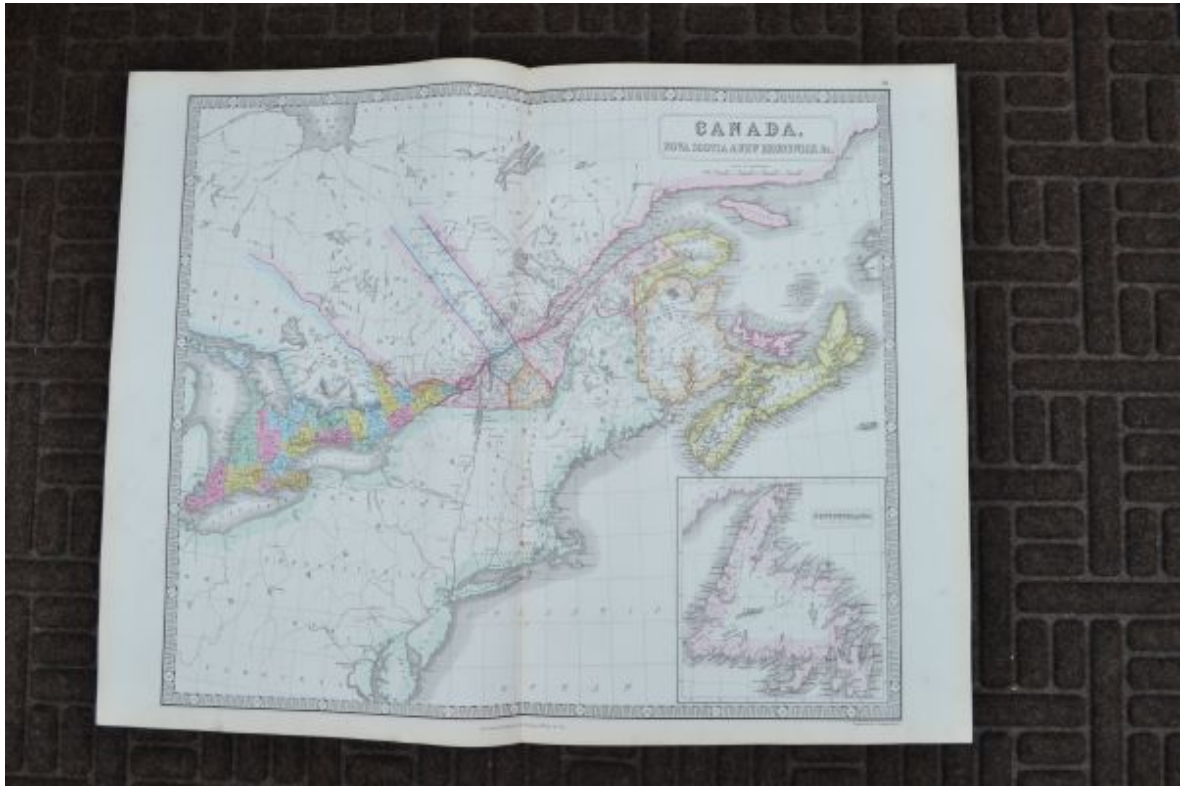

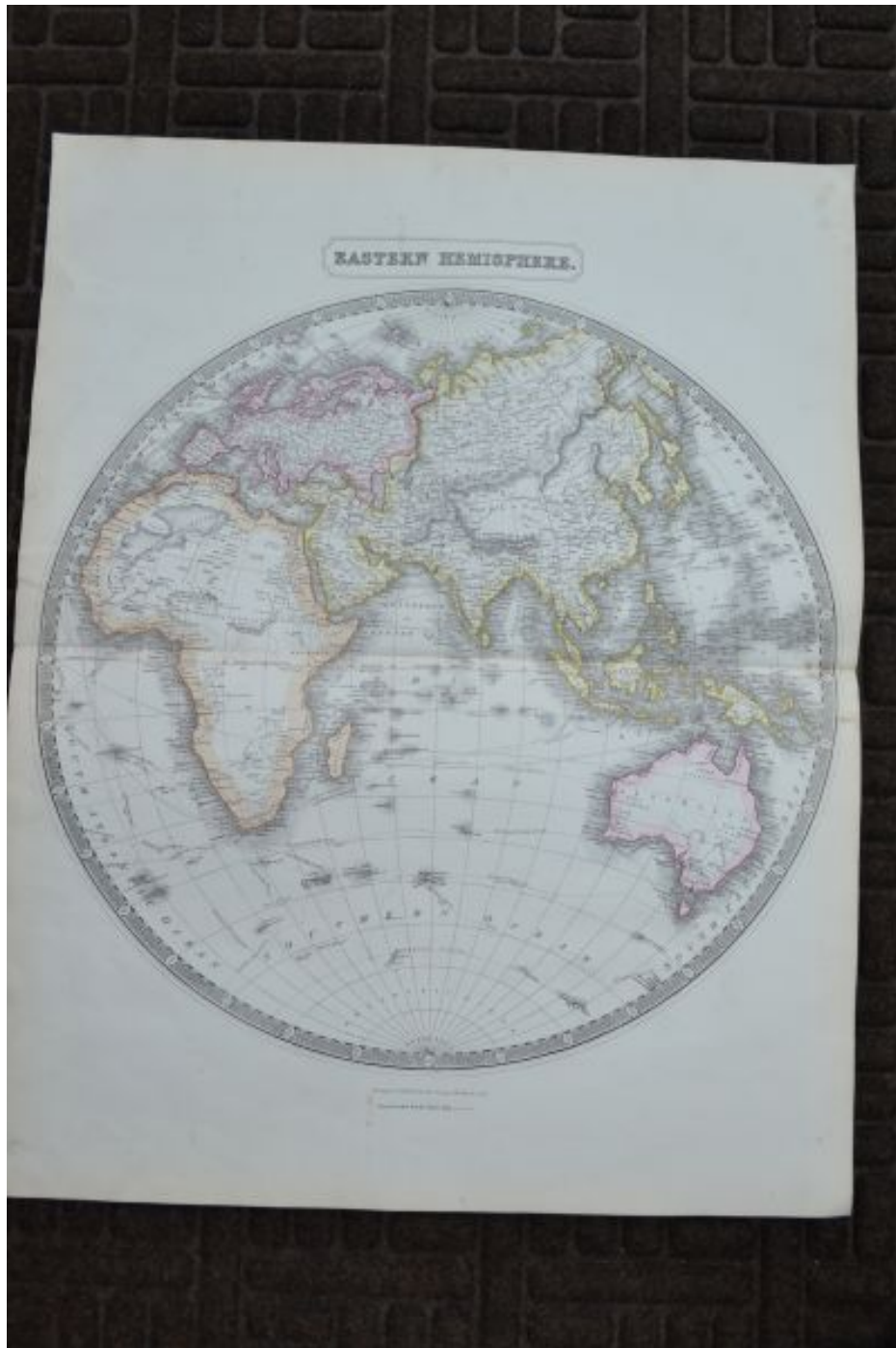

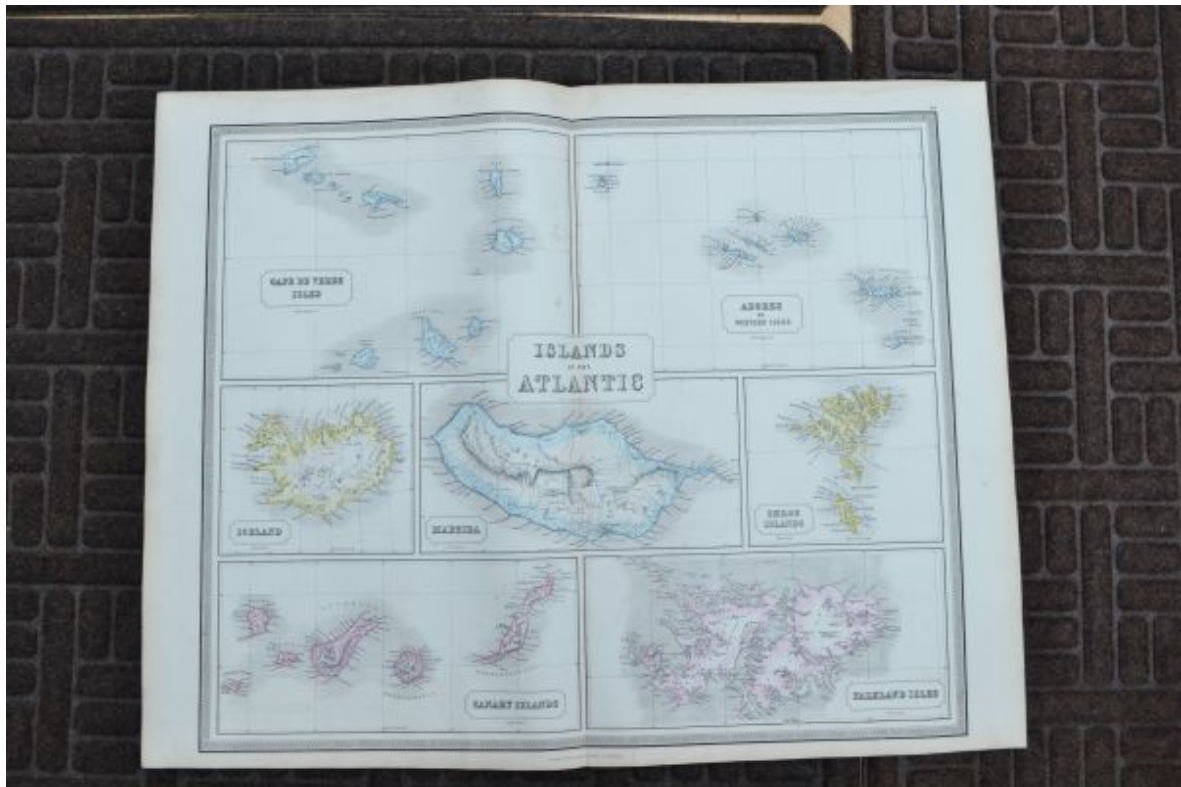

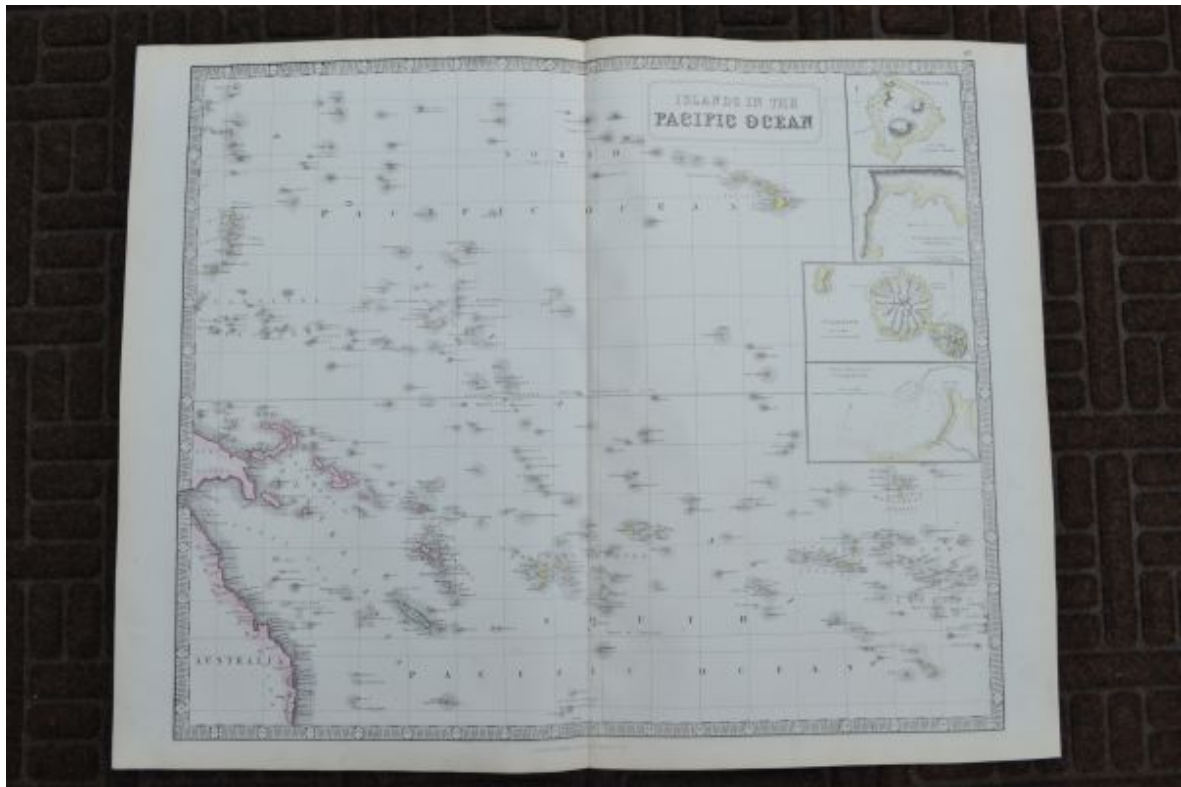

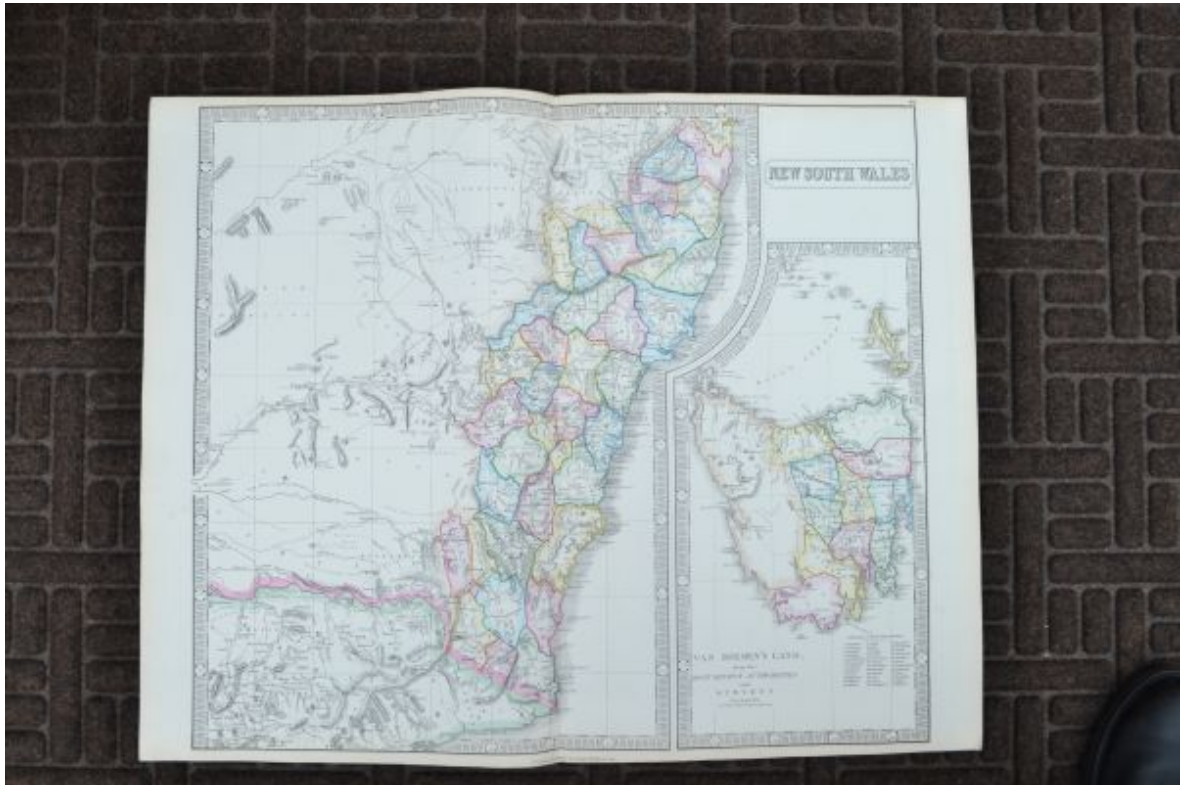

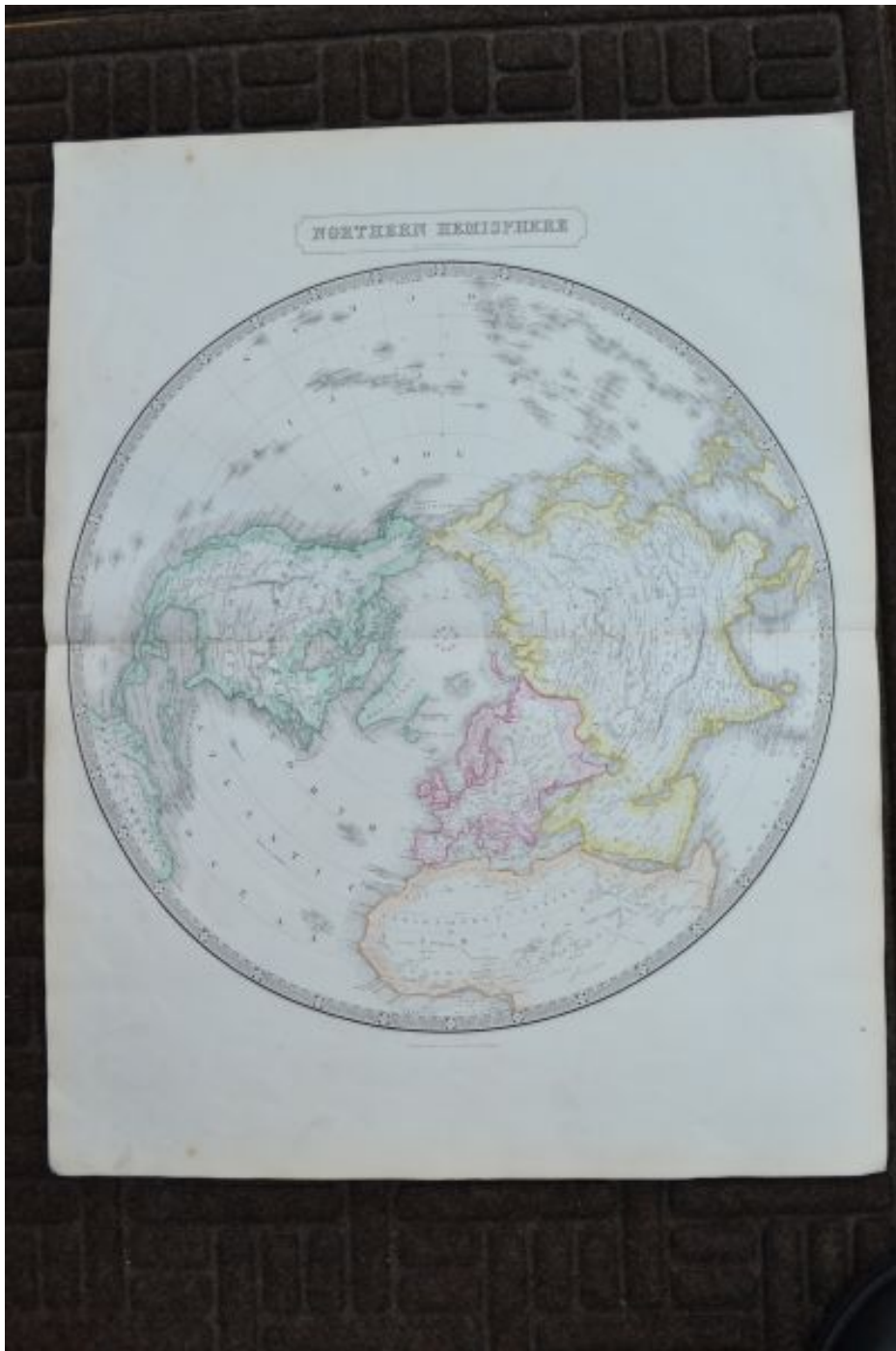

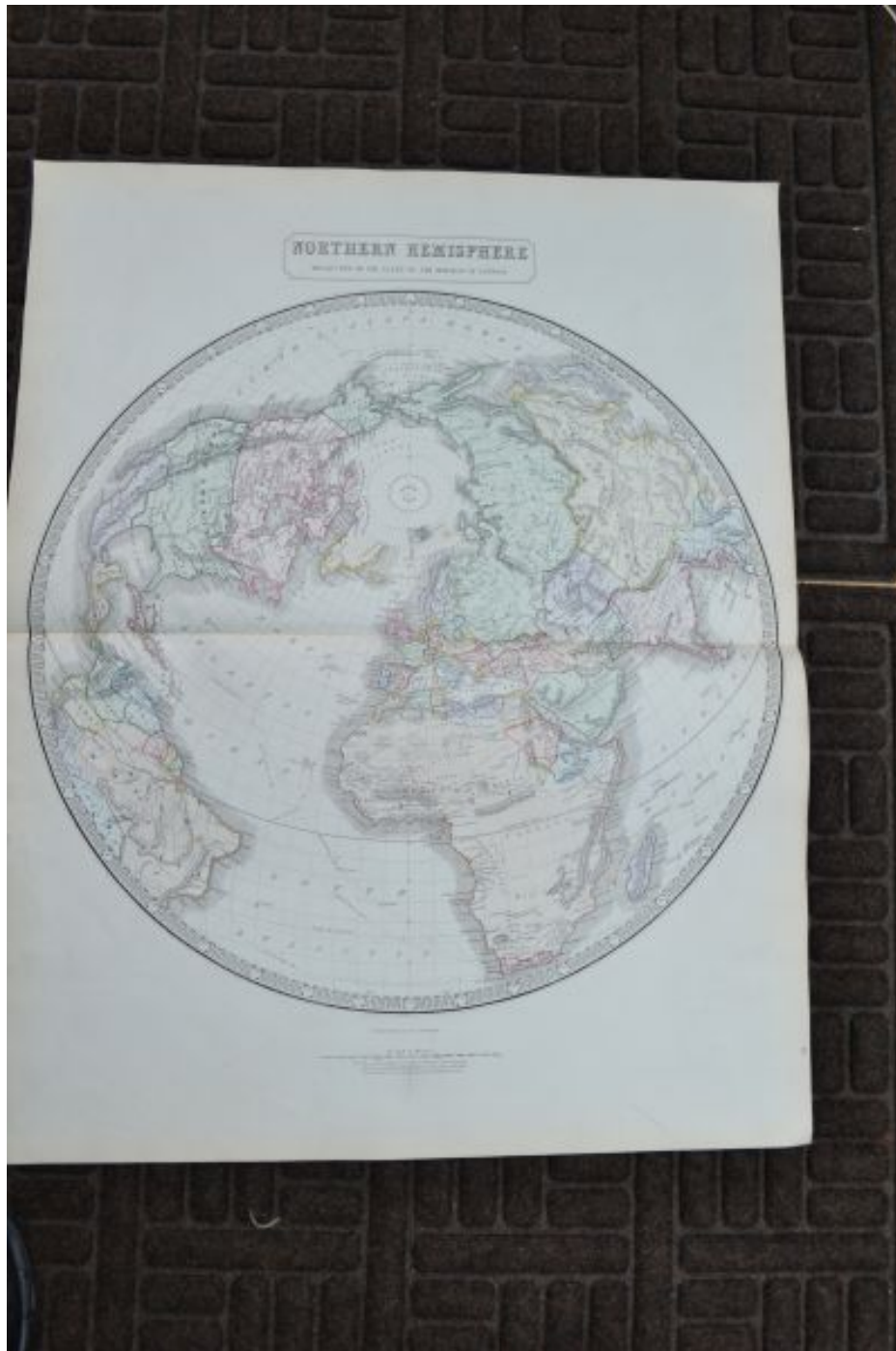

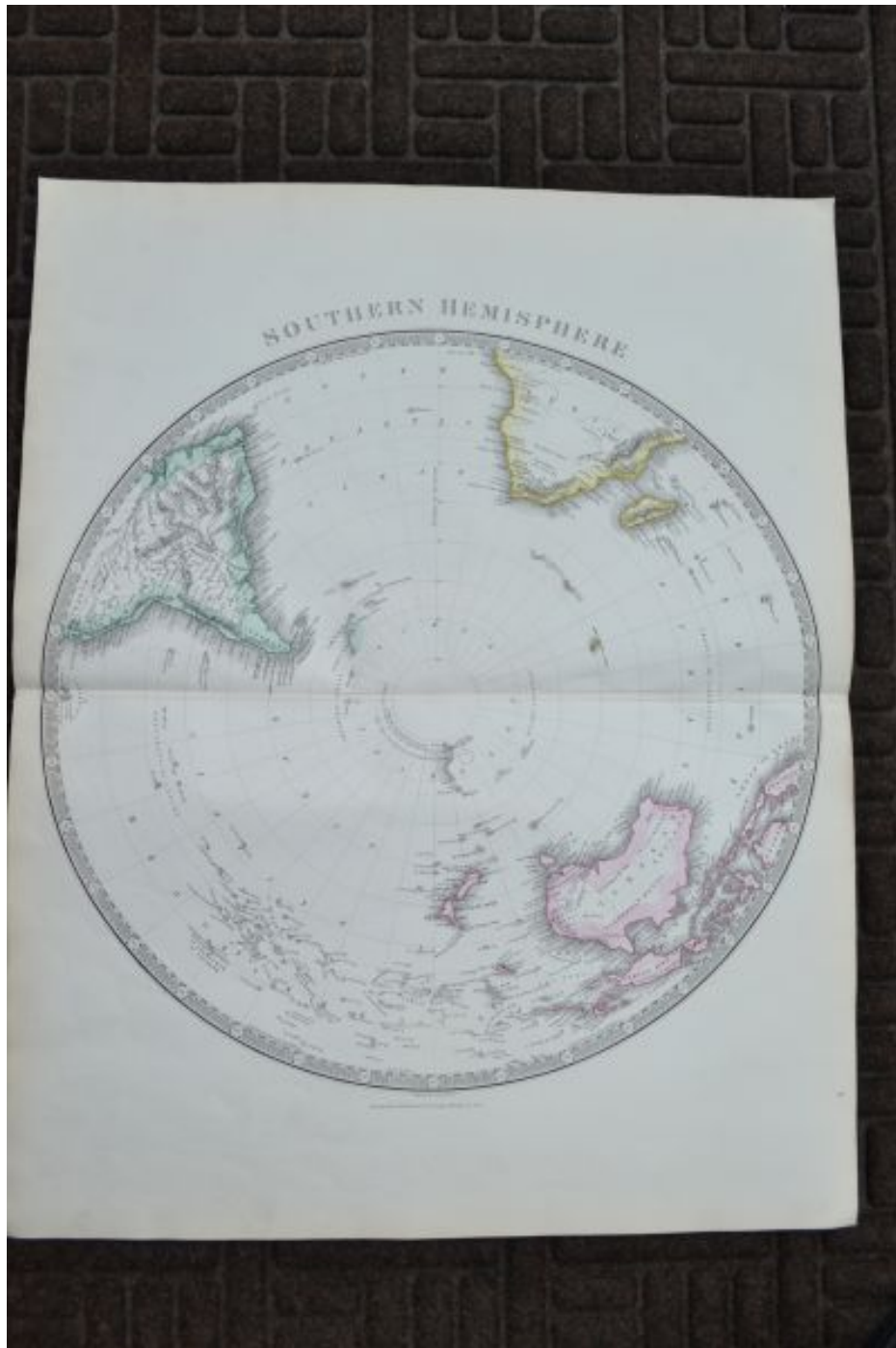

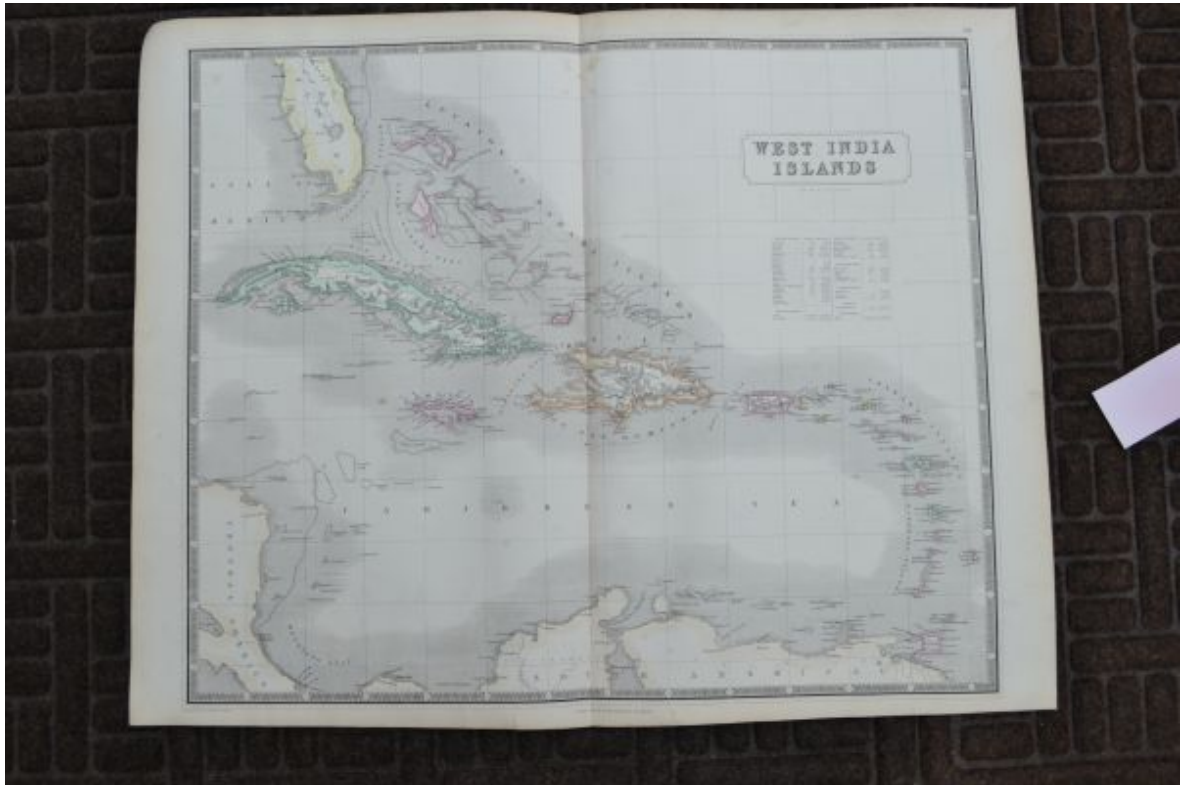

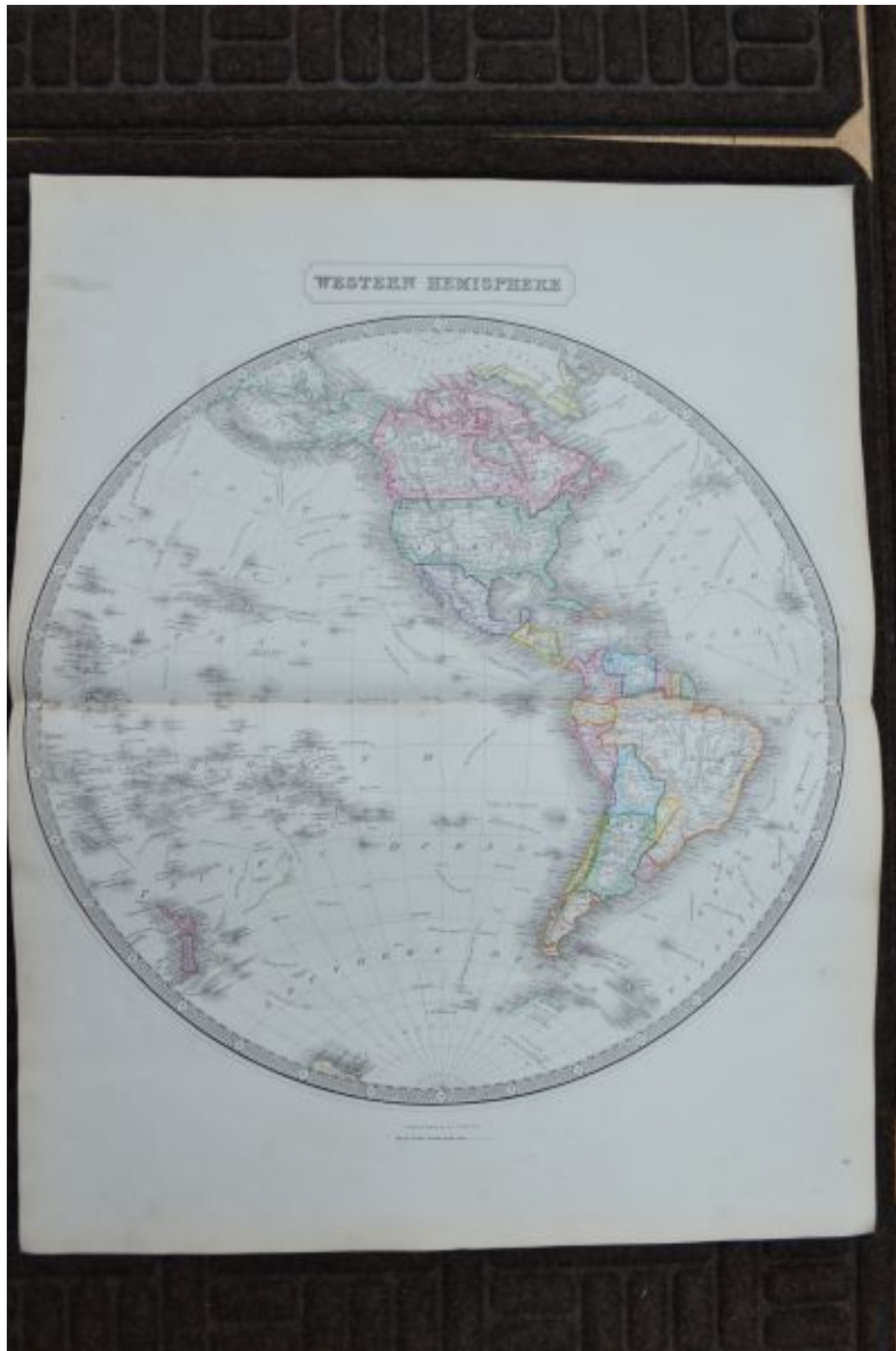

lacking the original clasps, but overall this is an attractive example of early continental printing and binding with attractive roll panels on both boards. We have not been able to identify the binder. [”Philo of Alexandria (c. 25 BCE – c. 50 CE), was a Hellenistic Jewish philosopher who lived in Alexandria, in the Roman province of Egypt. Philo used philosophical allegory to attempt to fuse and harmonize Greek philosophy with Jewish philosophy. His method followed the practices of both Jewish exegesis and Stoic philosophy. His allegorical exegesis was important for several Christian Church Fathers, but he has barely any reception history within Rabbinic Judaism. He believed that literal interpretations of the Hebrew Bible would stifle humanity's view and perception of a God too complex and marvelous to be understood in literal human terms. Some scholars hold that his concept of the Logos as God's creative principle influenced early Christology. Other scholars, however, deny direct influence but say both Philo and Early Christianity borrow from a common source. The few biographical details known about Philo are found in his own works, especially in Legatio ad Gaium (Embassy to Gaius) of which only two of the original five volumes survive, and in Josephus. The only event in his life that can be decisively dated is his participation in the embassy to Rome in 40 CE. He represented the Alexandrian Jews before Roman Emperor Caligula because of civil strife between the Alexandrian Jewish and Greek communities.” Wikipaedia.

TO THE RIGHT HONOURABLE
JAMES STODDART, ESQ.
LORD PROVOST OF EDINBURGH.

My Lord,

I Am sorry that the just defence of my character, against the violent attacks of mistaken or ill-designing men, hath rendered it necessary that I should lay before the public, a plain, and, to my best recollection, a genuine account of my own conduct, respecting those matters of election which at present make so much noise in the city. And as my principal transactions were with your Lordship, I have chosen to publish my vindication to my fellow-citizens in the form of a letter and appeal to you.

It was much against my inclination that I accepted the office of a magistrate at the last general election; but I yielded to your Lordship's pressing request, and acknowledge with pleasure, that your conduct in general, as chief magistrate of the city, hath been very agreeable to me, and in particular your disinterested and public-spirited views in chusing a minister for supplying the vacancy occasioned by the death of Dr. Cummin, made such an addition to the good opinion I had formed of you, that I resolved, so far as duty would permit, to support your interest, and to do you every service in my power.

Your Lordship will recollect, that, about the beginning of June last, you made an appointment to come to my house, that we might converse about the affairs of the community. You then informed me of an instance of bad treatment you had met with from Mr. Laurie, viz. That, in a confidential conversation with that gentleman early in the winter, about the person who should be your successor in office, Mr. Alexander Kincaid and I were both mentioned for that purpose; but that afterwards, without consulting you, he had written to Sir Laurence Dundas in favour of Mr. John Dalrymple: That Sir Laurence shewed you his letter when you was at London, in the month of December, and told you, at the same time, that

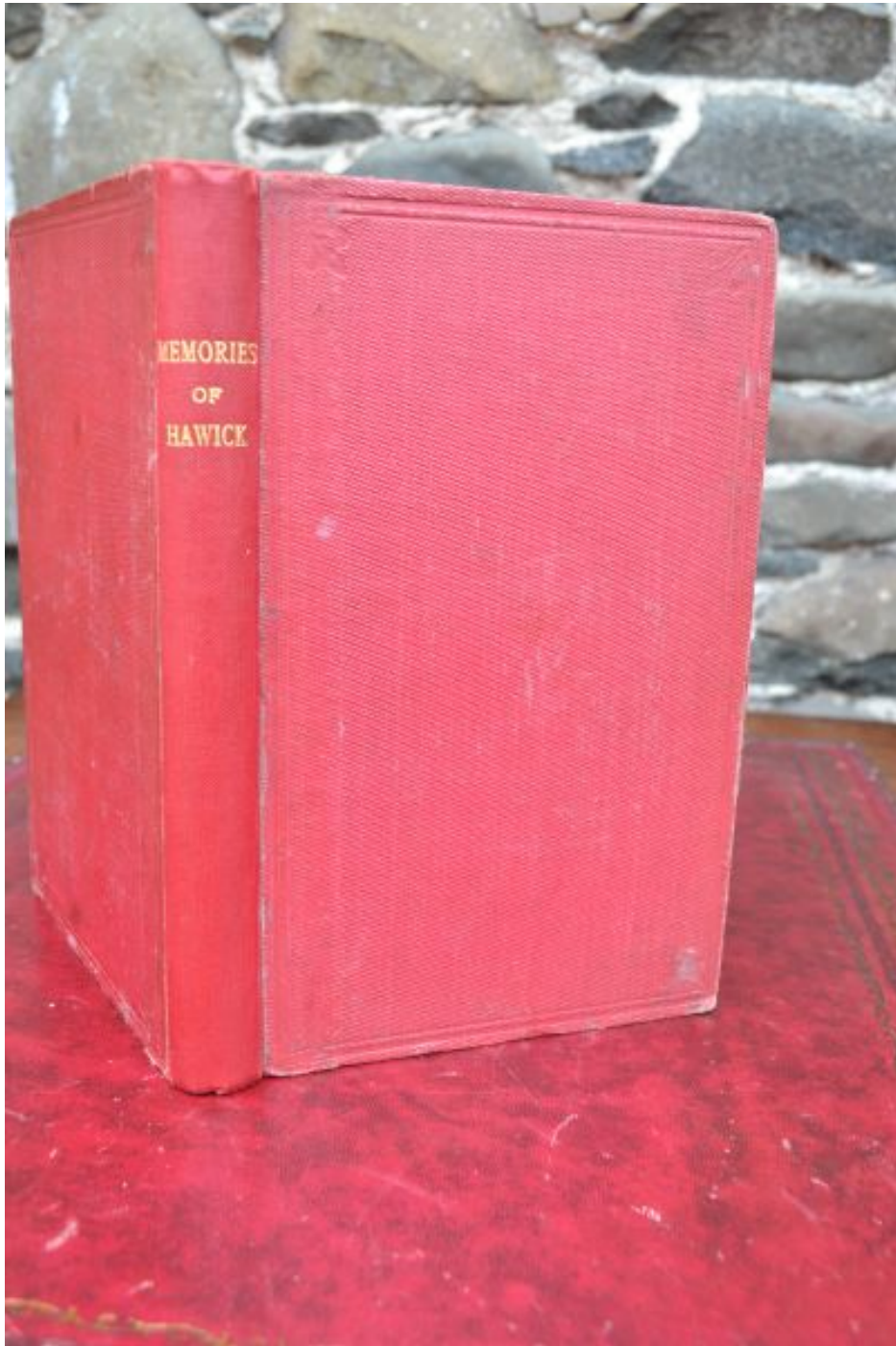

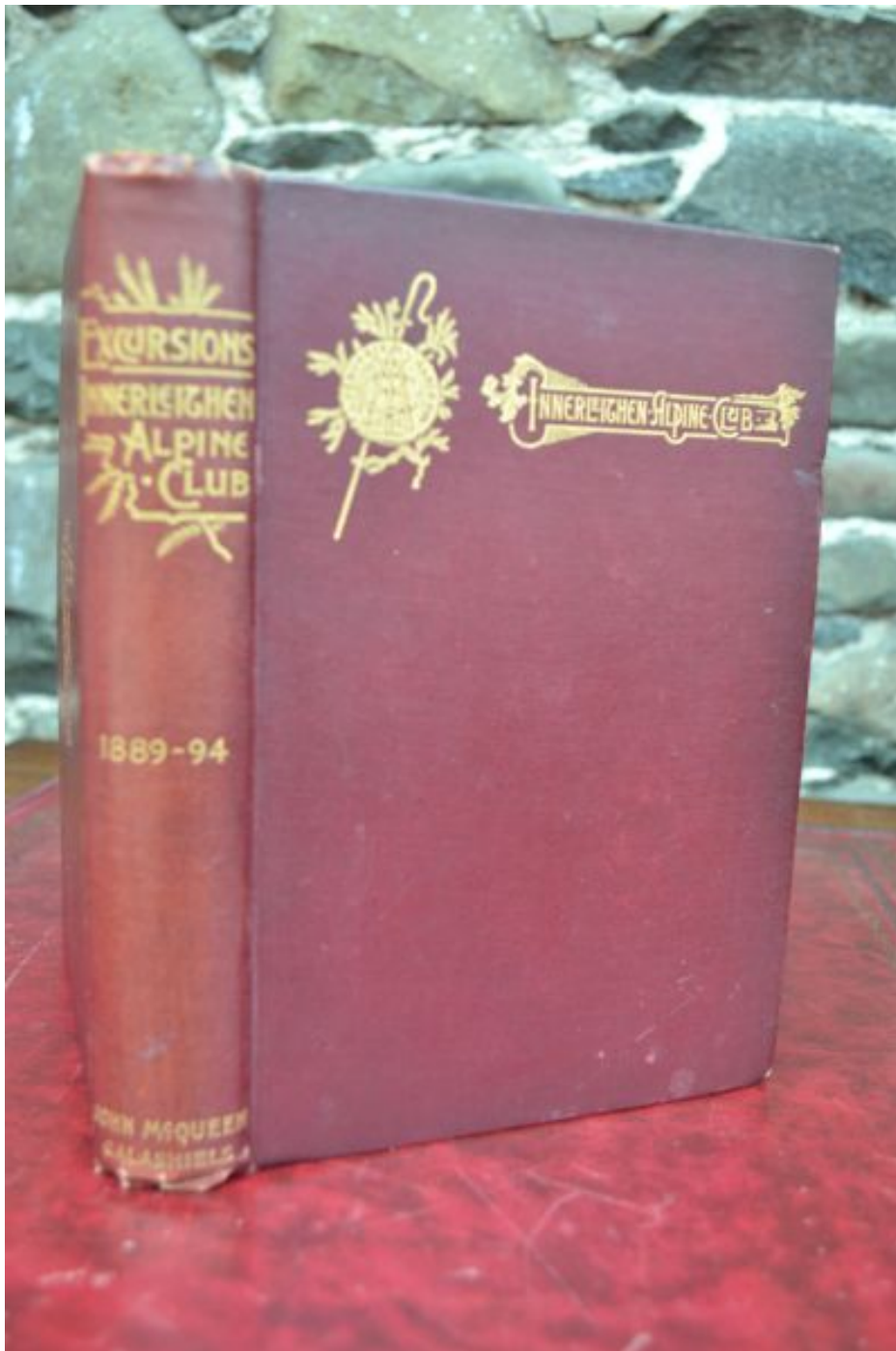

He professes (doubtless with truth) to have consulted ms. authorities, which have now disappeared; and, more especially with regard to ecclesiastical history, the information with which he supplies us is full, and probably trustworthy. It was one of his weaknesses... that he was too much of the cleric, and too little of the man of the world. He is the original source of the three weird sisters who tempt Macbeth..." Millar, Literary History of Scotland, pp. 20/21, noting also that "Macpherson's preface is still the best introduction to the study of Wyntoun." Only 250 copies were printed. (Ref. Maidment Sale Catalogue, 1880, lot 3198.) "It is of great value, not only for the history of Scotland and her notable families but also, since it is written in the vernacular, and not in Latin, for the history of the language." ECSB 83.
