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

First separate edition of the VIIA, previously published as supplement to the Fables. First issue of the 24 magnificent woodcuts.

This edition gives the text of Francesco del Tuppo's Naples, 1485 edition of the life of Aesop. Francesco dell Tuppo provided a new Italian translation of the text, basing his life of Aesop on the Latin translation of Rinucius of Arezzo and his fables on an anonymous 12th century verse version.

With the exception of the title woodcut and the border cuts, used by Bonelli for the *Fabulae* printed in 1492, THE WOODCUTS APPEAR HERE FOR THE FIRST TIME; they are the work of the same artist who designed Bonelli's *Fabulae* cuts, and are loosely based on the Neapolitan cuts of del Tuppo's edition.

Essling called the Bonelli cuts "worthy of comparison to the best Venetian engravings of the end of the XVth century" (III, p. 78). Their stylistic similarity to the woodcuts of the Malermi Bible has often been noted; Hind suggested that they may have been designed by the same artist (Introduction to a History of Woodcut, pp. 413-14).

Along with the scattered references in the ancient sources regarding the life and death of Aesop, there is a highly fictional biography now commonly called *The Aesop Romance* (also known as the *Vita* or *The Life of Aesop* or *The Book of Xanthus the Philosopher and Aesop His Slave*), "an anonymous work of Greek popular literature composed around the second century of our era ... Like *The Alexander Romance*, *The Aesop Romance* became a folkbook, a work that belonged to no one, and the occasional writer felt free to modify as it might suit him." Multiple, sometimes contradictory, versions of this work exist. The earliest known version "was probably composed in the 1st century AD", but the story "probably circulated in different versions for centuries before it was committed to writing" certain elements can be shown to originate in the 4th century BC." Scholars long dismissed any historical or biographical validity in *The Aesop Romance*; widespread study

of the work began only toward the end of the 20th century.



FIRST EDITION, RARE.

Joseph Amy (1696-1760), a lawyer and physicist, wrote several treatises on experimental physics relating to drinking water and in particular the processes for purifying it. It was in 1746 that Amy registered a patent for the design of his filter based on wool, sponges and charcoal. Amy describes instruments and machines of his own making for purifying water, machines which were patented and licensed by the Académie des Sciences with Réaumur's approval.



RARE FIRST EDITION OF THE WORKS OF SAINT ANSELM, REVISED BY GABRIEL Bergeron (1628-1711). Magnificent copy bound for Jean-Baptiste Colbert.

Anselm of Canterbury, also known as Anselm of Bec because of his membership as a Benedictine monk of the Abbey of Notre-Dame du Bec in Normandy, is one of the major writers of the medieval West. He is regarded by some as the founder of scholastic theology and the ontological argument, an argument that seeks to prove the existence of God.


"A Benedictine monk of the congregation of Saint Maur.... Bergeron took



care not only to see the old editions published two hundred years ago, but also the manuscripts in the famous libraries of France and England; he saw in that of Sieur Cotton the epistles of St. Anselm, which we did not have, and he formed a fourth book, which he added to the three that P. Picard had already published" (see Moréri).

Important provenance

A very fine copy bearing the arms of Jean-Baptiste Colbert (1619-1683). Colbert began his career with the secretary of state Le Tellier in 1648 and 'was immediately distinguished by Cardinal Mazarin, who employed him from November 1648 and appointed



him successively conseiller d'état (1648), intendant of his household, intendant of the household of the Duc d'Anjou (1652), secretary of the queen's commands (1654); Mazarin also entrusted him with diplomatic missions in Italy in 1659 and finally recommended him to Louis XIV when he died (1661), having showered him with benefits and appointed him as one of his executors...

He was appointed Intendant of Finances in March 1661, then Controller of Finances at the end of the same year and Superintendent of the King's Buildings, Art and Manufactures on 8 January 1664. He joined the Conseil du Commerce in August of the same year, was appointed head and president of the East India Company in March 1665, and was made Commander and Grand Treasurer of the King on 26 August 1665. He was appointed Secretary of State for the Departments of Marine and Commerce in 1668 and for the King's Household in February 1669... An ardent bibliophile, Colbert had built up a library that was famous throughout Europe... The printed books were sold in 1728 by his grand-nephew, Charles-Eléonor Colbert, comte de Seignelay" (see OHR).



"In 1739, on the outbreak of war with Spain, Anson was given command of a Pacific squadron fitted out to raid Spanish possessions along the South American coast. Anson was provided with seven ships. Around Cape Horn the fleet hit bad weather which separated and damaged the vessels. Eventually the Chilean coast was sighted near the Isla de Chiloe from which point the remnants of the fleet made for the Juan Fernandez Islands. Anson and his remaining crew eventually reached Anatacon, the



Tinian, before reaching Macao. Anson eventually left Macao for the homewards voyage, he watered at Prince's Island, crossed the Indian Ocean, and anchored at Table Bay. Sailing again in early April he returned through the Atlantic returned to Spithead Portsmouth. Although Anson lost most of his crew (an estimated 1 000 lost to scurvy, 300 to typhus and dysentery, four in action and the remainder to shipwreck), and all but one of his ships, he did return with a vast bounty, at the time valued 400 000 f!" (Howgego).






FIRST EDITION OF THE AUTHOR'S MAJOR WORK.

"It was not until 1779 that Bezout published his Théorie des équations algébriques, his major work on elimination theory. Its best-known achievement is the statement and proof of Bezout's theorem: 'The degree of the final equation resulting from any number of complete equations in the same number of unknowns, and of any degrees, is equal to the product of the degrees of the equations. Bezout, following Euler, defined a complete polynomial as one that contains each possible combination of the unknowns whose degree is more than the degree of the polynomial.

Bezout also computed that the degree of the resultant equation is less that the product of the degrees for various systems of incomplete equations... The proof makes one marvel at the ingenuity of Bezout, who, like Euler, not only could manipulate formulas but also had the ability to choose those manipulations that would be fruitful" (D.S.B.).


Lazare Carnot (1753-1823), one of the first members of the newly founded Institut de France, occupied several important posts during the French Revolution including Delegate to Legislature in 1791, member of



the Committee of Public Instruction before being elected to the Committee of Public Safety in 1793 as one of the Ministers of War. Considered, alongside Monge, one of the creators of modern geometry, Carnot is one of the founding members of the École Polytechnique.

"This new edition incorporates recent developments in the field. In the preface Carnot makes reference to Lagrange's invention of the calculus of variations and the law of least action" (Roberts & Trent).



Antoine Laurent Castellan (1772-1838) was a French architect, painter and engraver. He studied landscape painting at Valenciennes and travelled to Switzerland, Italy and the Ottoman Empire. He also made a very brief visit to the Ottoman territories, mainly southern Greece and the islands (Zakynthos, Kythera, the Peloponnese and Hydra) as well as Istanbul and the Hellespont. At the end of the 18th century, under the reign of Sultan Selim III, the French state organised an expedition to Istanbul with the aim of improving relations with the Ottoman Empire. Castellan took part in this expedition as a painterdraughtsman. The expedition was a failure, as its members were forced to flee the country in the face of war, epidemics, fires and revolt. Despite



these obstacles, Castellan nevertheless published his impressions of the journey, illustrated with engravings based on his drawings made on the spot.

There are three known issues of this edition: in wrappers, with the plates in black (ordinary edition); boards, with the plates in colour (deluxe edition); and 2 copies on vellum. This copy, complete with 72 plates (including a frontispiece for each volume), corresponds well to the deluxe edition. The beautiful plates show costumes, headdresses, some monuments, the interior of a hammam, etc.



An astonishing handwritten account of a convulsion demonstration.




The document is signed Morand, possibly the surgeon Sauveur François Morand or his son Jean-François, also a doctor and a resident of the Académie des Sciences.

The author, obviously a doctor, had anonymously entered a Paris flat where a meeting of convulsionaries was to be held. He attended the entire ceremony, which he recounts in detail.

Four convulsionaries enter the trance in succession: Sister Rachel, Sister Félicité, Sister Sion and Sister Suzanne. A male figure in a dressing gown, called Papa by the

convulsionaries, is the master of ceremonies.



«Si l'on en juge par les contorsions, par les raidissements des membres, dans lesquels les poignets se ferment et les doigts se serrent fortement, par les postures dans lesquelles on voit le visage rougir, la gorge se resserrer ou se gonfler, dans lesquelles la respiration tremblante, gesnée, retenue ou forcée est entrecoupée de sanglots, de soupirs, de sons plaintifs (...) tout contribue à faire passer (...) l'idée d'une situation violente, d'un état de douleur, et d'une personne menacée de suffocation... Dans quelques accès particuliers où les sœurs saisies d'une espèce de delyre ou d'extase, semblent revenues à un état de simplicité et d'innocence dans un degré approchant l'enfance ces secours qui répugneraient à bien du monde, sont sollicités, sous le titre de NANAN.» Les «secours» sont en fait les souffrances variées infligées par «papa»: deux sœurs sont successivement crucifiées, sans le moindre signe de douleur (l'une d'entre elles déclare subir la crucifixion pour la 21e fois). «Les clous qui sont employés à cette opération, sont de l'espèce dite Demi Picard, très aigus et longs de 5 pouces» (l'auteur parviendra à en subtiliser un). L'une d'entre elles «non contente de cet essay, a tout de suite demandé que sa langue fut fendue ; il lui a été donné satisfaction»; une autre sœur choisit la bûche «un gros tronçon de bois de chesne rond, lisse et poli...» à l'aide duquel «papa» pilonne son dos; une autre demande la sangle.

Morand observed the pulse, breathing and other signs of convulsions

with the practised eye of a doctor. He points out that «malgré l'intrépidité décidée» de l'officiant, «les secours en usage dans l'œuvre des convulsions, ne sont pas précisément ce qu'ils paraissent au premier coup d'œil», l'homme «possède l'art et le talent de [les] rendre supportables».

At the end of the volume is an account of another session attended by a number of prominent figures, during which the police intervened, arresting "le papa et les sœurs qui étaient au nombre de six".

It is followed by the report of the hearing, written by another hand.

The author worked on his text, crossing it out and correcting it several times (for a presentation to the Académie des Sciences? but this memoir does not appear in the table for the years 1760-61). He prefaced his signature with a Latin formula attesting to the veracity of his testimony: "testor de visu".

On the title, in the same hand, the volume bears the words «Remis à la bibliothèque de l'académie des Sciences, par le témoin soussigné à la page 45» (Morand), ainsi que plusieurs cachets de la dite bibliothèque et un cachet «Double échangé».

On verso of title: very interesting contemporary engraved bookplate, armorial but unidentified, repeated in stencil at the head of the text.





Coquillart are rare, especially when preserved in old, or near contemporary bindings; one single copy of the 1540 edition (rebound in the 19th century) is recorded in the Anglo-Saxon auction records since 1959.





This was Cuvier's first published work, in which he set out his classification of the animal kingdom. He demonstrated the superiority of observation and comparative anatomy over theory, and his empirical approach had a major influence on nineteenth-century biologists.

"Cuvier's *Tableau élémentaire* - his first separate work - contains the first general statement of his natural classification of the animal kingdom" (Norman).







FIRST EDITION.

Georges Cuvier (1769-1832) gives here the sequel to his magnum opus Recherches sur les ossement fossiles, published five years earlier in 1812. The Règne Animal provides the first scientific basis for comparative anatomy.







This account of his travels in northern Angola and the Congo Basin was "a great success with a public fond of exoticism and piquant anecdotes but repelled by geography" and provoked a memorable scholarly dispute that has lasted to the present day. How far did Douville go in telling the truth? This former seminarian, born in Hambye (Normandy) in 1797, made his fortune in England as a merchant, then travelled to Asia and South America (notably Brazil) before setting sail for Africa in 1817.

«Malheureusement, dit Numa Broc, Douville n'a rien d'un géographe et il est difficile de suivre ses itinéraires sur une carte moderne... On peut penser que de Benguella, il a gagné Loanda en suivant la côte ; il a ensuite remonté le fleuve Kouanza (...) jusqu'à Kassouga aux confins de l'actuel Zaïre. De là, il a descendu la rivière Kouango jusqu'à son confluent avec le Kasaï. A-t-il poussé vers le nord jusqu'au grand lac Léopold II, qu'il appelle lac Couffoua ou lac des Morts ? Il est de retour à Ambriz, sur

l'Atlantique, au nord de Loanda en mai ou juin 1830... Si Douville dit vrai, il serait le premier Européen (à l'exception des chasseurs d'esclaves) qui ait réussi à pénétrer aussi profondément dans le bassin du Congo».

The veracity of these accounts was challenged as early as 1832 by the English geographer Cooley, who claimed that Douville had never gone beyond the African coast, and that he had borrowed his account from Portuguese merchants and slave traders... Back in Brazil, Douville devoted himself to the local flora and fauna: his collections formed the first nucleus of the Bahia Museum of Natural History. He is thought to have been murdered on the banks of the Rio São Francisco in 1837.

"It is a curious and interesting book; we do not know to what degree it is a product of the author's imagination... After publication of this book, Douville returned to Brazil in 1833... disguised as a physician. He was murdered by a client from whom he had received an advance payment for an ailment he was unable to cure" (Borba de Moraes).

The lithographed illustrations include a large folded map and 20 plates, 13 of which are in colour: African types, funerary festivities, human sacrifice, views, etc. The frontispiece of volume I shows the gold medal awarded to the author by the Geographical Society in 1831. 

Louis David was a regular contributor to the same publications as Gustave Droz, notably *L'Autographe au Salon*.

Monsieur, Madame et bébé was a huge success from the first publication, with no fewer than 20 editions in 1867, the year following the original, and as many as 116 in 1882. These were in fact some of the articles Droz had published in La Vie parisienne.

Barbey d'Aurevilly devoted a long article to the work on 20 June 1866, praising the author and his story, particularly the last part: Bébé. He was quick to point out the sensuality of Droz's

writing in a comparison with La Bruyère: «Malgré ses mérites incontestés, je ne crois pas que La Bruyère ait eu jamais celui de lacer un corset à personne et de remettre une épingle en place, tandis que M. Gustave Droz, lui, au contraire, habille, déshabille, et réhabille [sic], épingle et désépingle et ré-épingle avec une incomparable supériorité! " (Le Nain Jaune, 20 juin 1866, p.2-3).





Extremely rare Lyon edition of Jacques Vincent's translation into French of an anonymous Spanish text. Born in Crest Arnaud in the Dauphiné, Jacques Vincent was secretary to the bishop of Le Puy. Brunet describes a first French translation printed by Michel Fezandat in Paris in 1554, followed by another dated 1561.

The present edition of 1596 remained unknown to him, but he indicates that the following one, printed in 1597, also by Rigaud, served in 1777 as a model for the text which appears in the *Bibliothèque des romans*. The bibliographer adds in his note for the Spanish edition of 1512: « Il est difficile de dire aujourd'hui avec certitude, si cet ouvrage est une

imitation de J. Boccace, ou si, comme l'a cru M. de Tressan, il est tiré d'un poème espagnol plus ancien que Boccace ». Gaëlle Bourg is more precise : « Jacques Vincent traduit un texte espagnol anonyme, imprimé à Alcala de Henares par Arnao Guillem de Brocar en 1512 (et peut-être déjà avant, dès la fin du XVe siècle) qui constitue, selon G. Reynier, « une adaptation très réduite de notre Flores et Blanchefleur ». Il fait donc repasser en France le « vieux roman », réduit par l'adaptation espagnole. Il y ajoute la traduction du roman de Juan de Segura (Queja y aviso contra Amor), lui-même imprimé, dans sa version d'origine, à la suite d'un autre texte (Processo de cartas de amores que entre dos amantes pasaron) et donné comme tiré du grec, mise

en scène éditoriale permettant de recommander l'ouvrage aux lecteurs » (Gaëlle Bourg. Éditions lyonnaises des romans du XVIe siècle).

The translator's name is to be found on the first pages of the introduction : « Ode à Maistre Jacques Vincent, sur l'augmentation de nostre langue françoise. Par Pierre Tredehan d'Angers ». Pages 165 until the end contain under a separate title « La complainte et avis, que fait Luzindaro, prince d'Aethiopie : à l'encontre d'amour, & d'une dame : continuée jusques à leur fin. Mise de grec en castillan. Puis translatee en francoys, par Jacques Vincent du Crest Arnauld en Dauphiné, aumonier de monsieur le comte d'Anguien ».

Of this edition we have been able to locate only two institutional copies, one at the Municipal Library in Besançon, and one at Houghton Library, Harvard.



Published in 50 copies, and not sold, this moving collection consists of letters written by Eugénie de Guérin to her brother Maurice de Guérin during the latter's illness.

The second part of the work is the *Journal* that Eugénie wrote after her brother's death in 1839, and which she dedicated to him.: "Encore à lui, à Maurice mort, à Maurice au ciel. Il était la gloire et la joie de mon cœur. Oh! Que c'est un doux nom et plein de dilection que le nom de frère! Vendredi 19 juillet, à 11 heures 1/2, date éternellé".

The eldest sister of the poet Maurice de Guérin devoted herself to collecting and promoting her brother's work, for which she felt an exceptional love.

Deeply religious, her mysticism mirrored that of Barbey d'Aurevilly, whom she met during his brief stay in Paris. In fact, she only left her

native province to attend her brother's wedding. She stayed in the capital for nearly 6 months, during which time she met many writers.

She is best known for her Diary, which covers the years 1834-1842, and her Letters, published in 1855 by Barbey d'Aurevilly.

Her Letters to Louise de Bayne, whom Maurice was courting, and her Letters to her brother highlight her talent for combining love of the divine with sisterly love.

This edition, published by Barbey d'Aurevilly and G.-S. Trébutien, was printed on 3 different papers: ordinary (laid), heavy laid and vellum.

AUTOGRAPH LETTER

Unique copy, enriched with an autograph letter of 3 pp., signed, by Barbey d'Aurevilly to Sainte-Beuve, sent from La Bastide d'Armagnac (dept. of Landes). Undated, it is known however that it was written on 18 January 1856.

Barbey d'Aurevilly would like the critic to write a few words about the book in the *Athenaeum*, to which he had been a contributor since 28 July 1855: «Si vous n'étiez pas probablement archiblasé sur les succès de toute nature que vous devez à votre charmant et admirable talent, vous ne manqueriez pas d'être sensible à l'épilogue que Mlle de Guérin fait de ce talent qui lui était allé au cœur, en passant par l'esprit... Si favorisé qu'on soit de la renommée, l'opinion d'une telle femme peut encore fleurir un amour-propre délicat et peut-être ne mettrez-vous pas sans émotion à votre boutonnière cette fleur d'héliotrope, cueillie pour vous, sur la terrasse du Cayla?».

Barbey hoped to read the lines that Sainte-Beuve had 'almost assured' him he would give, and he asked that the special issue of the journal 'in which you spoke of our dear dead' be sent to him. The *Correspondance* de Sainte-Beuve (edited by Bonnerot, vol. X, 2396 A) mentions the existence of this letter and adds:»qu'elle n'a pas été retrouvée mais qu'on connaît un fragment cité dans une lettre de Barbey à Trébutien du 19 janvier 1856». SSainte-Beuve was not insensitive to the talent of the Guérins. It was he who was chosen by Trébutien to edit a biographical and literary study of the works of Maurice Guérin, also entitled *Reliquae* and published in 1861.

So it seems that Eugénie paved the way for the publication of her brother's works. While he enjoyed a special relationship with Jules Barbey d'Aurevilly, having attended the Lycée Stanislas in Paris with him, his sister was not to be outdone. She was not only praised in literary circles for her kindness, but also for her elegant and remarkable writing.

Even before her *Journal* was published, it was the subject of readings orchestrated by her brother, Maurice. Audiences, including Barbey d'Aurevilly and his close friends, were won over by Eugénie's prose.

Barbey made it the subject of one of his *Memorandum* in 1838:»Guérin m'a conduit dans sa chambre où il m'a lu divers feuillets du journal de sa sœur.

— quelle diction charmante et pleine de traits tellement rêveurs qu'ils semblent profonds. Quelle distinction d'esprit! Quelle noble fille. Et que cet esprit est bien femme! Et que cette âme est bien sœur! [...] talent qui ne se doute pas de lui-même, naturel, chef-d'œuvre de perfection» (p.280-281)

Eugénie's works were published before those of her brother (apart from the prose poems published posthumously by George Sand in the *Revue des Deux monde* in 1840). She seems to have worked hard during her lifetime to gain recognition for her brother, and in so doing, without having expected it, gained the recognition of the literati of the 19th century, as well as those of the 20th.



Intended as advice for the author's nephew, a college student, this philosophical treatise on the types of love is particularly concerned



with the dangers of erotic passion. Through a dense web of classical allusions, Haedus explores love, passion, and pride as the moderator in his own dialogue—beginning, of course, in the library. The two other interlocutors are priest Antonius Philermus and poet Aemilius Cimeriacus (who contributed an introductory poem). The poet makes the case for the beauties and pleasures of love, and a priest warns against the consequences of indulging in carnality.

The "conversation" encompasses representations in the art of love, sexual attraction and desire, the state of marriage and the relations

between the sexes, and forays into peripheral concerns like fashion and personal grooming. A virtuosic work of Humanist learning and human experience, it is also a remarkably beautiful example of the printer's art. Regarding the types, Schulderer notes "a quite original face, with its wealth of curves and serifs, and its greatly prolonged ascenders and descenders, which gives his volumes a flavor of fine printing, admirably consonant to their small bulk and format."


The author was friends with the printer, Gerardus de Lisa, who had immigrated to Italy from Flanders. Little is known of Haedus (1427-1504), other than that he was born Pietro Cavretto, served as a priest, and wrote an earlier book ("Amores") in reaction to being rejected by his beloved. It is not surprising that one disappointed in romance would compose a work entitled "against the erotic". "The earliest of the series, a brief tract on the upbringing of children, entitled De Liberorum educatione and completed 11 September 1492, has for its author Jacopo, Count of Porcia, or, as he called himself, Jacobus, comes Purliliarum, a castle not far from Pordenone about midway between Udine and Treviso... Only a month after the first edition of De Liberorum educatione - on 13 October 1492 - Gerardus completed the printing of a book by a common friend of his own and the Count's, the Anterotica (or De Amoris generibus) of Petrus Haedus, which is the Latin style of Pietro Cavretto, a priest of Pordenone who has already been mentioned as the translator of the Constitutions


of Friuli executed by Gerardus at Udine in 1484. In the prefatory epistle to the latter, he addresses Gerardus as 'diligentissimus amigo' while the correspondence of the Count, who was his near neighbour, contains half a dozen letters directed to him on various occasions' (Victor Schoelderer, Fifty Essays in Fifteenth- and Sixteenth-Century Bibliography, p. 113-125).

Petrus Haedus (1427-1504), or Capretto, or Del Zochul which in the dialect of Friuli signifies the same thing, was a priest in the town of Pordenone in Friuli. Emiliano Cimbriaco was professor of Greek at Pordenone, and has written a Hendecasyllabicon at the beginning of the text as a tribute to his friend Haedrus, and set his book in this very distinctive and elegant type.



The alucite is a devastating insect that attacks cereal grains (wheat, maize,



barley, rice, etc.). Formerly known in English as the *Angoumois Grain moth* in the pre-revolutionary period, its name refers to the province of Angoumois, now the Charente. It was scientifically described by Guillaume-Antoine Olivier in 1789, and is now found in both the northern and southern hemispheres.

Jean-Charles Herpin (1798-1872) had previously published other articles on insect pests. This new essay presents the results of his experiments to destroy this insect effectively in three chapters: asphyxiation, heat and mechanical shock. For each method, he gives explanations of the means used, sometimes with apparatus invented by him

(for asphyxiation he invented a hermetically sealed box), or by colleagues (mechanical shock apparatus, invented by a certain Amouroux, for which Herpin gives details of operation with an illustration of the machine).







Publication ceased in August 1870 (34th year) with the beginning of the Franco-Prussian war. Le Journal des Chasseurs was founded and managed by Léon Bertrand until 1861 and continued to thrive under Charles Godde. Its main contributors were Joseph Lavallée, Elzéar Blaze, Théophile



Deyeux, the Marquis Foudras, Count Houdetot, etc.

One could compare the journal to the famous British *Sporting Magazine* as all aspects of hunting are discussed, from the most traditional to the most exotic including falconry, big game (lion, bear, ostrich, etc.) and even lice... Illustrations include 368 plates (10 coloured) by celebrated artists such as Grenier, Victor Adam, Alfred de Dreux, Eugène Ciceri, Ichnert, etc. (the set is short of 1 plate: volume 25, *La Somme à mer basse*" but two others are bound in twice).








"In 1825, in Paris, Count Grigori V Orlov published a two-volume collection of the Fables of Ivan Krylov, in Russian, French and Italian. This edition was a first serious attempt to bring to western Europe a work of Russian contemporary literature, of which Krylov was thought to be the most characteristic representative. Count Orlov, a member of a notable family, and in possession of considerable wealth, developed an

active sponsorship policy. He was not satisfied with simply publishing the text: he organised a complete literary programme to bring the fables to public notice. First of all, he made French and Italian prose translations. In Italy, Orlov read them aloud to poets, whom he asked to interpret them in verse. In France he organised a kind of literary tournament by inviting poets and well know figures to produce versions in poetry of his prose translations of Krylov, the Russian 'La Fontaine'. Orlov then had them published by Firmin Didot with a type face developed for the particular occasion. The work was ornamented with five engravings, the work of E. Eszterreich, J.-B. Isabey, C. Beyer and Cain. The publication of Krylov's Fables resulted in the appearance of critical articles in Russia (by Alexander Pushkin) and in France (by Edme Héreau), and of a series of editions of the translations off Krylov's fables into French, and in the development of French research into Russian literature" (Anna Markova, in: Bulletin du Bibliophile, 2009, pp. 287-314).

A humanist open to agricultural and industrial progress, François Alexandre Frédéric, Duc de La Rochefoucauld founded a model farm and schools in Liancourt. A member of the Académie des Sciences and the Société d'Agriculture de Paris, he helped found the Ecole Nationale des Arts et Métiers. He emigrated during the Revolution, first to England and then to the United States for three years. He travelled around the country studying its economic resources, its constitution, the different classes of American society and the customs of its inhabitants.

The account of his journey, written in a precise and simple style, is peppered with observations that are important for our knowledge of the United States at the end of the 18th century. The three engraved maps show the *Provinces septentrionales*, the *Provinces méridionales*, and *L'Amérique septentrionale* divided into its 17 provinces. The 9 folding tables (8 in the last volume) give details of the legislature, senate, and other institutions of American democracy.



Lamouroux (1779-1825) was an algologist and professor of natural history at the University of Caen. In 1809, he was offered a position at the *Faculté des Sciences*, where he succeeded Roussel as professor in 1812.

The scientist divides rockweeds into 4 main categories and describes 36 specimens (all illustrated on the engraved plates) whose habitat is mainly in Europe, but also on the island of Mauritius.



This is not only the first, but also the most important old edition of Leibniz' collected works covering all aspects of his writings: mathematics, physics, logic, metaphysics, chemistry, natural sciences, history, law, theology, philology, sinology, and more. Richly illustrated with a portrait and 42 plates, this edition contains the eulogy on Leibniz by Fontenelle



and the important biography by Jacob Bruckner.

"Leibniz was one of the last universal men of the type which the Italian Renaissance had ideally postulated: philosopher, historian, mathematician, scientist, lawyer, librarian and diplomat. In all these fields either the actual achievements or his seminal suggestions have become part and parcel of European thought" (DSB).



The front cover of the original wrappers has been preserved, it shows two figures pasting up a poster on a yellow background bearing the title of the work and a representation of the lame devil. The latter reappears on the title page with a vignette borrowed from page 18.

The frontispiece is an engraved woodcut by Brévière after Johannot, printed on chine and pasted, and 140 in-text vignettes adorn the text.

As was often the case in the 19th century, this work was first published in installments. A number of novels that were successful in the 18th century were periodised and offered to the public in issues. Once the entire work



had been published, it was possible to have it bound by the publisher.

Le Diable boiteux represents a form of continuity between the 18th and 19th centuries. It is a story of diablerie and enchantment sprinkled with morality. The Wise Man brings in the demonic figure of Asmodeus, who uses a variety of spells. These elements had everything to appeal to the nineteenth century, which was striving to create a French fantastic.

The very first use of the term "genre fantastique" occurred in 1798 in an article in *La Décade philosophique*, *littéraire et politique*, which was based on the work of Le Sage (no. 17, 30 December 1798).

The story and its characters offer Tony Johannot a wide range of possible representations, which he sets out to portray. As always, the airs are marked, his devil is expressive, repulsive with an air that is sometimes malevolent and sometimes mocking. He accentuated the devil's characteristics, and the face was made up entirely of angles: the nose, chin and horns were constructed in a series of sharp shapes that exacerbated the character. Johannot also had fun twisting his Asmodeus in all directions. He often embraces Cleofas, the hero of the novel, suggesting a diabolical hold. The headbands, lettrines, and the cul-de-lampe are just as elaborate as the vignettes, making the work dynamic and rich.

The cover has a small hole on the left-hand character, otherwise a very fine copy.




The author of the *Macer Floridus* remains anonymous, but the text is usually attributed to Odo, Bishop of Meung, who wrote it in the eleventh century. It consists of hexameters describing 77 plants and their medicinal properties.

First published in Naples in 1477, it was immediately so successful that it was reprinted many times until the nineteenth century. This

popularity is undoubtedly due to the poem's ease of memorisation, which can be compared with the other great medieval medical poem, the *Regimen Sanitatis* of the School of Salerno.

The Macer Floridus is "of importance as one of the earliest Western documents showing a revival of interest in botany." (Hunt, I, p. 4).

The first illustrated French Book in French Language, fourth edition. It is illustrated with 257 woodcuts, "identical to Richel's edition (Goff, S-664) but with one addition (fo. 99v) and two substitutions (a new woodcut on fo. 95v and a repeat on 151r)" (Bibl. Philosophica et Hermetica).

This is the second edition printed by Mathias Huss. Mathias's relative, Martin Huss, had established the second press at Lyons with Johannes Siber, and in 1478 issued the first edition of the *Speculum* in French adorned with woodcuts; that edition was the first illustrated French book.

He issued a second edition in 1479.



Martin had procured the woodcuts for both editions from Bernard Richel who had used them in the German edition at Basel two years earlier. They are the same woodcuts used by Mathias in this edition as well. The four or five editions of the *Speculum* printed between 1478 and 1483 made Lyons a center of the French illustrated book. Based as it is on the Richel edition, this French translation of Julien Macho includes the Epistles and Gospels for Sundays and holy days taken from the *Plenarium*.

The joining of these two works highlights the *Plenarium* as a didactic work and the *Speculum* as a liturgical substitute. Not only are these additional Biblical passages, arranged according to the ecclesiastical calendar, a further aid to the lesser clergy looking for inspiration for sermons, but they lend a practical order to the *Speculum*, making it more suited to the regularity in meditation and devotion recommended for a heightened spirituality.

Mathias Huss apparently printed two editions of the *Speculum* in French dated 1483, both of which are usually assigned in the Copinger reference HC 14298. Copinger took his description from the Lyons Public Library copy which matches that in the *Bibliotheca Philosophica Hermetica*. These two copies represent an edition distinct from the only American copies listed in Goff (Rosenwald 383, PML check list, 1569).

Although the page shows a different type-setting, and the colophon of

the Bibliotheca Philosophica Hermetica / Lyons copies give the year only, while that in the Rosenwald / PML copies give the day and the month (3 March as well). (See Bibliotheca Philosophica Hermetica, no. 175, this copy).

Due to the constant use these devotional books are usually quite worn. This copy has the first leaf in facsimile, all outer margins restored, occasionally touching some letters.





SECOND COMPLETE EDITION OF NOSTRADAMUS' *PROPHÉTIES*, OF GREAT RARITY.

Most probably printed ca. 1571, the edition has recently been baptized "Édition A" by Patrice Guinard, who placed it second in his chronology of Nostradamus editions by Benoist Rigaud bearing the date of 1568. The great Peruvian Nostradamus specialist Daniel Ruzo did not own a copy, and Guinard locates only 6 copies : Lyon BM (incomplete) ; Lyon BM (Fonds Chomarat), Châteauroux BM, Heidelberg UB, Wrocław BU Glowna, Firenze BN - to which one should the copy illustrated in

Der Schlüssel zur Welt des Nostradamus by René Troyan (Stammham, Merano, 2003), "acheté chez un libraire selon l'auteur. Estampille de bibliothèque visible au second livre" (Guinard).

Each part is illustrated with a fine woodcut vignette: part one depicts the sky with a sun, moon and five stars as well as sphere held by a hand emerging out of a cloud while another hand is measuring its surface (Chomarat, woodcut no. 2); the vignette of part two depicts Atlas

carrying the celestial globe, with a seascape in the back ground (Chomarat, woodcut no. 4). Engraved initials, borders and a floral woodcut complete the ornamentation (Chomarat, woodcut no. 17).

The editions by Benoist Rigaud are highly important, especially concerning the establishment of the last three 'centuries' of the new preface which some believed to be apocryphal and of which no printed version is known to be published during the author's lifetime. Patrice Guinard insists on the fact the first 942 quatrains are published here for the very first time (see: Revue française d'histoire du livre, n° 129, Nouvelle série, 2008, pp. 9-142).






"In 1767 Pallas was invited to work at the St. Petersburg Academy of Sciences. He was elected ordinary academician and had the rank of acting state councilor. For more than forty years Pallas was associated exclusively with the development of Russian science. During his first years there he studied nature and the peoples of the Russian empire, participating in the 'Academic expeditions' of 1768-1774. His research as leader of the first

Orenburg detachment of the expeditions covered both European Russia and Asia... Pallas' writings and the other materials of the "Academic expeditions" enriched natural history by providing massive amounts of empirical data which made it possible to generalize on the geographical distribution of plants and animals and to gain knowledge about the orography, climate, population, and economy of varied and little-studied regions of Russia" (DSB).



It is illustrated with 120 figures engraved after Marillier by Berthet, Biosse, Choffard, Delvaux, de Ghendt, Langlois, Legrand, de Longueil and others.

This monumental work brings together the works of some forty authors specialising in the fairytale genre, starting with Charles Perrault and Madame d'Aulnoy, whose early editions had already become extremely rare by the end of the 18th century. In the first thirty-six volumes, published in 1785 and 1786, this monumental work brings together tales by Perrault, Fénelon, Madame d'Aulnoy, Jeanne-Marie Leprince de Beaumont (La Belle et la bête), Mademoiselle de la Force, Mademoiselle Lheritier,

Hamilton, Caylus, Jean-Jacques Rousseau, the *Arabian Nights* translated by Galland, and others.

This impressive work of compilation, due to the persistence of Chevalier Charles-Joseph de Mayer (1751-1825), was part of the recent fashion for fairy tales and large collections published by subscription. Beyond the commercial aspect, the compiler had two aims: to safeguard works in danger of being forgotten; and to provide future generations with models and sources of inspiration.

Mayer had initially planned to publish thirty volumes at the rate of two per month; thirty-seven were published between 1785 and 1786, to which were added, three years later, the four volumes devoted to oriental tales.

Important collection of 207 letters of high-ranking personalities (kings, popes or other historic figures) concerning events of that period. They include many details on the reigns of Kings Henri II and Richard I and are an important source for cultural and literary history of England, Sicily and France.

French theologian of the twelfth century, Pierre de Blois, whose political and literary fame had spread throughout Europe, played a leading role in the service of Eleanor of Aquitaine and the English king Henry II, who entrusted him with several important negotiations

with the king of France and the Holy See. His output in the epistolary genre was amazing: he claimed to be able, while dictating three letters to secretaries, to be writing a fourth. Run by the Brethren of the Common life, Brussels proto-typographers, this printshop was active since the early 1475, while continuing the production of manuscripts. The office produced 36 volumes, all of greatest rarity, including 20 undated, about ten indicating Brussels as the place of printing, and only one with a complete bibliographical address.

The ornaments of this copy include a large initial at the beginning of the text, and numerous smaller initials in red. The text is entirely rubricated. ISTC locates only 3 institutional copies in the United States (Boston Public, Bridwell Library, and Yale).





FIRST EDITION, VERY RARE.

This magnificent book of festivities was created in 1638 after the travels of Marie of Medicis in the Spanish Lower Countries, the last stop of the exiled queen-mother before her retreat to England and Germany where she died of gangrene on 3 July 1642.

The remarkable plates include illustrations created in London by Wenzel Hollar (Pragues 1607 - London 1677), one of the most influential draughtsmen and engravers of the 17th century. It was him who introduced the technique of etchings to England. The suite of unsigned engravings include an allegorical frontispiece, a wonderfull folding plate depicting the reception of the Queen by the Prince of Orange in front of the town of Bois-le-Duc, and 14 full page illustrations, occasionally included into the pagination. The full page illustrations show: a meeting of the high ranking officers of the Low-Countries; portraits of the Prince of Orange and Marie of Medicis; the boarding of queen-mother in Gorcum, Dordrecht

and Rotterdam; her entry to Delft, Haarlem, Amsterdam and Leyden; the reception of the high ranking officers before The Hague; a play (comedy) on a canal in Amsterdam; and the boat carrying queen-mother on a very agitated sea. Whilst Landwehr and Hugh W. Davies (cat. Fairfax Murray) attribute all of the engravings to Wenzel Hollar, other bibliographers (Pennington, Parthey et Hind) attribute his work only to the frontispiece, the two portraits and the meeting of the high-ranking officers.







Severino is one of the first to describe correctly the anatomy and reproductive system of vipers. Interesting zoological, historical and symbolic treatise on snakes, the first edition of which appeared in Padua, with the same publisher, in 1643.

The author, Marco Aurelio Severino (1580-1656), a Neapolitan surgeon, naturalist and philosopher influenced by Tommaso Campanella and Bernardino Telesio, is considered one of the precursors of modern medicine and experimental science. Severino taught anatomy and medicine in Naples, where he directed the

hospital for incurables. His Zoologia Democritea (1645) is one of the first treatises on comparative zoology. The very abundant illustration, engraved on copperplate, includes a title with mythological vignettes, a portrait of the author with a quatrain in the caption and 24 beautiful figures in the text, 18 of which are full-page, most of which approach the iconography of snakes from an archaeological and mythological angle. Two figures, very curious, show snakes mating and a singular distillation apparatus. The author of this suite, the engraver Giovanni Giorgio, or Georgi, lived in Padua and worked mainly for booksellers; according to Mariette, he was of German origin (cf. Bénézit).

"Severino's permanent contributions seem to lie in his anatomical works...

Severino recognized a close similarity between the anatomy of man and of animals and considered important the detailed study of nonhuman anatomy. He himself dissected and studied a wide range of specimens, both vertebrate an invertebrate... Particularly important are his relations to Harvey and his place in the discussions arising from the publication in 1628 of Harvey's *De motu cordis*" (DSB).



"During the voyage with Cook, Sparrman had earned a little money translating a Swedish medical work into English, sufficient to finance an expedition of his own into the interior of South Africa. Sparrman set out overland from the Cape on 25.7.75 in the company of a South African named Immelman, paralleling the southern coast and visiting the regions of Swellendam, Mossel Bay and the country to the north of Port Elizabeth... During his travels he made the first study of Bushmen" (Howgego).

Sparmann's travel account was highly succesful and translated

into various European languages. The French edition contains the most important number of engraved plates and is enlarged with the scientific report of Smeatman on termites ("Relation sur les termites, adressée à la Société royale de Londres, par M. Smeatman, en février 1781") which occupies pages 397-463 of the first volume.

The drawings were made by Henry Salt, who accompanied Viscount George Valentia in 1802 as his secretary on the first British mission to Abyssinia, sent to conclude an alliance to obtain a port in the Red Sea in case France, under Napoleon, should seize Egypt.

During the journey that lasted just over four year, the team roamed much of India, Ceylon, the shores of the Red Sea, Abyssinia, and Egypt. As the western coast of the Red Sea, Abyssinia and its neighbouring countries were known very little, Count Valentia proposed to make

a precise report in the hope of establishing trade there. The fine atlas contains 28 plates engraved by Victor Adam after the drawings by Henry Salt.

"This work contains much information of a novel and important kind... It was read through the press by Mr. Salt, who was secretary and draughtsman to Lord Valentia" (Lowndes).



FIRST EDITION OF THE TEXT READ AT THE ROYAL SOCIETY ON 20 JUNE 1776.



Author of several treatises on the properties of chemical substances, the Irish mineralogist and chemist Peter Woulfe (1727-1803) is best known for having lent his name to the Woulfe bottle - a bottle with spouted holes, allowing a gas to circulate in a liquid. He is also credited with the discovery of the first synthetic dye, picric acid, which he described in 1771. Finally, he was the first to suspect the existence of tungsten, a chemical element that was unknown at the time. Admitted to the Royal Society in December 1775, the Experiments... represent his

inaugural lecture, given in honor to the grant received after the death of the British naturalist Henry Baker (1698-1774).

"In this offprint from *Philos. Trans.* Woulfe describes the 25 experiments he made to determine the extent of mineralization by acid of salt (hydrochloric) and acid of vitriol (sulphuric). The conclusion reached was that silver and mercury are the only metals mineralized by acid of salt and that the mineral formed also contain acid of vitriol... Woulfe presented this paper as the first of the *Bakerian Lectures*. Henry Baker (1698-1774) left funds in his will to the Royal Society to endow a lecture series" (Cole).
