

Editio secunda. 8vo., pp.(xvi), 151, [i], 182, [xviii]. Greek letter with Latin translation at foot followed by editors' index. Three full-page engravings, of Cicero, Aeschines and Demosthenes. Pencilled annotations.Last few leaves slightly cockled. Contemporary calf, gilt label to spine, Cambridge panelled boards, edges sprinkled red. Endcaps and corners a little worn, ffep removed but a second leaf remaining, lightly rubbed but still very good.

Second edition of the recension of Peter Foulkes and John Freind, scholars of Christ Church, first published in 1696 and particularly popular on account of its index of explanations of difficult terms.

Bound without half-titles, corner roughly cut from title-page probably to remove the name of a former owner. Later mid-brown calf with spine and boards heavily blind tooled, edges sprinkled red, drab endpapers. Spine uniformly worn, a few scuffs and scrapes, good.

'The texts of these plays exhibit the purest readings of the author [...]. These plays are accompanied by Notes, explanatory of the alterations, a Glossary of the remarkable words and expressions, and an Index to the Glossary. The typographical execution by the University press is exceedingly beautiful.' (Dibdin)

The editor Charles James Blomfield (1786-1857) was elected fellow of Trinity College, Cambridge in 1809, these two editions represent his first published works of scholarship. Further editions of Aeschylus followed (Persae, Choephori and Agamemnon), as well as Callimachus and fragments of Sappho, Sophron and Alcaeus. Blomfield became bishop of Chester in 1824, and of London in 1828.



G. L Beeforth was a "Bookseller, Stationer, Print and Music Seller" of 3. St. Nicholas Street, Scarborough, who complemented his stock with pianofortes, desks, blotting paper and leather goods.



Contemporary mottled calf, spine heavily gilt with red title label, gilt borders to boards, marbled endpapers. Joints and endcaps neatly repaired, corner tips worn.

'Brindley's Classics' series, beginning in 1745, eventually ran to 24 pocket-sized volumes containing the work of Classical authors. A 1750 advertisement in the Westminster Evening Post (15th September) described them as 'very proper Presents for young Gentlemen pursuing their Studies, either at the Universities or public Schools of this and other Kingdoms, there will always be Sets kept ready bound in various curious Bindings for that Purpose.'



Attractive small-format edition of the works of Virgil from the press of John Brindley, who produced a long run of Latin authors in the same format. Brindley was bookseller to the Prince of Wales and was authorised to carry his insignia, which appears on the engraved titlepage.

The editor, Usher Ganahan, had a rather less illustrious career, ending badly with his execution in 1749 for tampering with gold coins.







'Probably the second book published by Pickering' (Keynes), this first edition of Horace, exquisitely printed in diamond type by C. Corrall, became a bibliographical landmark as the first issue in the 'Diamond Classics', the series dedicated to George John, 2nd Earl Spencer (1758-1834), renowned bibliophile.

Some pages unopened. Foxed, (heavier to title-page), some toning at fore-edge, rear hinge neatly repaired with minimal interruption to marbled endpapers. Armorial bookplate of J.E.B. Mayor with the motto 'Mea Anchora Christus' to front pastedown.

The text contained in Liber De Metris Poeticis is now considered to be a 16th-century forgery by Jacob Dissorinus, assembled almost entirely from material already available in other grammatical works.

John Eyton Bickersteth Mayor (1825-1910), English classical scholar, was Librarian of the University of Cambridge from 1863 to 1867, and in 1872 became successor to H.A.J. Munro in the professorship of Latin, a post he held for 28 years. Mayor was a teetotaller and early advocate of vegetarianism, writing on the subject in his book, *Plain Living and High Thinking* (1897).

Étienne André Philippe de Prétot (1710-1787) produced between 1747 and 1755 many editions of Latin classics for the Parisian publisher Antoine-Urbain Coustelier. He based this edition of Horace on the 1728 Parisian edition of Sanadon who, according to Dibdin, 'chiefly followed Bentley and Cunningham, especially the latter.' (Dibdin II, 107).



Dibdin lists the editions of 1565, 1571 and 1579 as the only Basel-produced editions of Isocrates worthy of note (see Dibdin 4th ed. II, 125). However, according to Hoffman all of Isingrin's Basel productions after 1555 refer to Wolf's excellent edition, which first appeared in Paris in 1551.



To each volume's front paste-down, the armorial bookplate of John Putland with '1730' added in sepia ink. In addition vol. I has a tiny note, '2 vols. coll. & perf. FCB, Jany. 1848', at the very top of the front paste-down, plus '2 vols. D.J.M.' to ffep. The date of the collational note implies that these volumes were purchased at the five-day sale of John Putland's library held by Charles Sharpe of Dublin in 1847, at which 1650 lots were auctioned on the instruction of Putland's grandson George. John Putland (1709-1773) obtained his bachelor's degree at Trinity College, Dublin in 1731 and became a Master of Divinity there in 1734, though he was never a minister. He was very active in the life of the city as member of the Spiritual Society, a patron of the arts investing particularly in theatres, and a Mason. He served as a magistrate in the 1740's, and later as High Sheriff for the Country of Dublin.

Havercamp's folio edition of Josephus, a monumental summing-up of the then-current state of Josephan scholarship. Dibdin reminds us that although not the most accurate edition, "this work contains the readings of two MSS contained in the Leyden library, and some observations of Vossius and Cocceus found in the margin of a copy of the editio princeps". It also prints treatises on Josephus, including Daubuz on Josephus's passages relating to Christ.



Henri, Count of Chambord (1820-1883) was briefly and disputedly King of France from the 2nd to the 9th of August 1830, and afterwards Legitimist pretender to the throne of France from 1844 until his death.

Vol. I with portrait frontispiece and errata leaf, vol. II with half-title and list of subscribers, as called for. Sporadic toning, vol. II heavily toned from p.609 onwards and with a small worm trail near gutter for approx. first hundred pages. MS to ffep vol. I (a description in heraldic terminology of the arms of Richard Newport depicted on the frontispiece). Contemporary Cambridge panelled calf, raised bands and reddish title labels to spines, edges sprinkled red. A bit worn with some scrapes, but very good.

Each volume with armorial bookplates of John Hoadly, LLD to front paste-down and Henry Carrington Bowles to rear paste-down (the latter being the Bowles arms with those of H.C.B.'s wife Ann Garnault inset).

Historian and notary Richard Newport (d.1716) complied this history of the Diocese of London from sources including the London Registers (begun in 1306), registers kept by individual bishops and a return of 1636 from which he took information about the income of the parishes. His father (also Richard Newcourt, d. 1679) was a cartographer and draughtsman who, in addition to contributing drawings to Dugdale's Monasticon, was also responsible for

the most important map made of London before the Great Fire, his Exact Delineation of the Cities of London and Westminster and the Suburbs Thereof (1658).

John Hoadly (1711-1776) was a poet and dramatist, and a friend and correspondent of David Garrick. The appearance of 'LLD' on his bookplate dates it from sometime after 1747. Henry Carrington Bowles (1763-1830) was a successful publisher and seller of maps, prints and geographical games. His bookplate dates from sometime after his marriage in 1799. The ephemera found between the pages of vol. I appears to relate to his ownership of the book.

Loosely inserted: two letterpress-printed sheets reproducing letters sent in January 1824 and February 1827 to The Gentleman's Magazine, concerning London churches destroyed in the Great Fire of 1666 (both from 'H.C.B.'); small hand-drawn and coloured arms of Sir John Philpot, Lord Mayor of London 1378, on a scrap of paper; a piece of tracing paper with a coat of arms and an inscription referring to Sarah Bolles; 4 scraps of paper with MS notes, one seemingly part of a letter addressed to H.C. Bowles Esq. and dated 1827; a long MS list of churches on a folded piece of paper watermarked 1821.



Contemporary tan calf, spine heavily gilt, de Massol armorial centrepiece in gilt to each board, edges red, marbled endpapers. Upper joint cracked but board firm, corners worn, very good.

In addition to the de Massol coat of arms on the binding, an armorial bookplate of Vouzan with the motto 'Nihil Desperandum' is attached to the front paste-down. There are faint traces opposite the title-page of another bookplate having been removed.

This copy is the same as ESTC T506751 save for a different woodcut ornament on the title-page: in this case the outward-facing flower has five rounded petals (i.e. not the same as the variant ESTC N66122 either). The imprint is believed to be false, with this edition most likely being printed in Amsterdam. An MS note in an old hand on the title-page ascribes the translation to L'Abbe [Jean] Barrin and Th[omas] Corneille.

Woodcut printer's device to title-pages with motto 'Ne extra oleas', woodcut initials, head- and tail-pieces. Marginal notes in several different old hands to the first two volumes. Head margins faintly toned, occasional light spotting and a bit of foxing to vol. III, vol. I with unobtrusive repair to final leaf. Contemporary vellum with titles very nicely inked to spines, fore-edges turned in, edges lightly sprinkled blue. Vellum a bit dusty, a few small marks, very good indeed.

Vol. I has an illegible ownership inscription in an old hand to its ffep, and a second inscription (possibly reading 'W.W. Kosteri') to the title-page.

According to Harwood "the most beautiful and correct edition of Seneca.". Dibdin considers it "one of the rarest and dearest of the octavo Variorum classics: its typographical beauty is equal to its editorial correctness. Scholars who possess it will do well to treasure so valuable and commodious a work." This Elzevier edition is unusual in presenting in its third volume the writings of the younger Seneca, which Dibdin notes are omitted in the Antwerp editions. It contains the best notes available: those of the first great modern Senecan, Justus Lipsius in the late sixteenthcentury, and those of the second great Seneca scholar, J. F. Gronovius.



"[Spelman's] Life of Alfred was originally dedicated to Charles i, but the new dedication points out a quite special resemblance between Alfred's life and that of Charles ii, who had lived so long in exile" (Madan).



Title-page and some fore-edges dusty, sporadic spotting and toning, occasional ink blots (i.e. p.377 and fore-edge margins toward rear)occasionally affecting but not obscuring text, pp.431-2 with paper flaw at fore-edge. Fore-edges trimmed to different lengths. Later half calf, spine label, brown marbled paper boards. A bit rubbed, joints and endcaps neatly repaired.

Second edition of the first translation of Virgil's 'Aeneid' into Scottish. This edition corrected the first printing (1553), and the Edinburgh philologist Thomas Ruddiman added an elaborate glossary which was the basis for the antiquary John Jamieson's 'Etymological Dictionary of the Scottish Language' (1808). The poet Gavin Douglas (?1475-1522), Bishop of Dunkeld and third son of the earl of Angus, "was one of the first to draw the distinction between Scots and 'Inglis'" (OCEL). He was unusual amongst his contemporaries in concentrating solely on studying the vernacular, rather than producing books in Latin. The 'Life' of Gavin Douglas by Bishop Sage, appended here, is one of the main sources for the author's biography.

At the bottom of each page some short critical and historical observations are given; and there are two very useful indexes.' (Dibdin)

Inscribed and dated 1799, this catches Wakefield (1756–1801) red-handed, acquiring books despite finding that, having resigned his position at Hackney College, he could no longer support himself as a private tutor without also publishing extensively to earn his living. Thus the wheels of Scholarship turn.

Contemporary red straightgrain morocco by Kalthoeber, spines with raised bands and a simple gilt flower tool to four of the six compartments (the others containing title and volume number), plain gilt borders with tiny corner tools, a.e.g., Greek key gilt dentelles, marbled endpapers. Spines slightly darkened, endcaps rubbed, joints rubbed with a few very small areas peeling, corners worn. Still a very good, attractive set.

Bookplate of Richard Hungerford Pollen with his family crest. This is likely Richard Pollen (1786–1838), a gentleman of Rodbourne in Wiltshire. He was brother-in-law to Charles Robert Cockerell, the Architect of the Ashmolean Museum, and father to the artist John Hungerford Pollen (1820–1902). To the first blank of each volume a tiny inscription reading 'Pollen e dono T. Graham', with the date 1803 added to the second volume.

To the first volume, ffep verso, a small orange ticket reading 'Bound by C. Kalthoeber, London' is legible but rather ink stained. This is the notable bookbinder Christian Samuel Kalthoeber (1775-1817), a German emigré working in London. He was originally apprenticed to Baumgarten, and took over the latter's business in 1782. He was considered, at the end of the 18th century, to be one of the finest binders in the world.

'This edition, which forms a companion to Wakefield's Horace of 1794 [...] is printed with great elegance: the notes are placed at the end of the text.' (Dibdin). Schweiger writes that the text has been ingeniously improved.

This edition appeared during a time of enormous productivity for Wakefield when, having resigned his position at Hackney College, he found he could no longer support himself as a private tutor and began publishing extensively to earn his living. 'Wakefield was excessively fond of emendation, always worked in great haste, and rarely took time for revision. Thus, although his critical remarks can show considerable brilliance and an unusual awareness of continental advances in scholarship (Wakefield seems to have been among the first Englishmen to promulgate F. A. Wolf's conclusions about Homer), his work is riddled with errors and was largely dismissed by the British Academy within a few years of his death.' (ODNB). Although in contradiction the ODNB also hails Wakefield 'as one of the two leading British scholars of his time, the other being Richard Porson'.


