THE SPEAKERS

Laura Carnelos is Library Curator of Rare Books and Manuscripts at Eton College. Her interests include archival evidence for 'popular' culture and publications, and the transnational circulation of books and ideas. Her publications explore Italian 'popular' books between the 16th and 18th centuries.

Dr Jane Carroll is Ussher Associate Professor in Children's Literature at Trinity College Dublin. She researches real and fictional children's engagement with collecting and collections. Her publications include British Children's Literature and Material Culture (2021).

Dr Ana de Oliveria Dias is a postdoctoral researcher with the Crafting Documents project (University of Oxford), examining labels originally attached to relics of saints and holy places. Ana's research explores what such objects reveal about medieval scribal culture.

Professor Nicholas Pickwoad worked as a book conservator and adviser to the National Trust. After working at Harvard, he led the St Catherine's Monastery Library Conservation Project at the University of the Arts London and was director of the Ligatus Research Centre. He now teaches and publishes on the history of bookbinding.

Adrian Seville is emeritus professor at City, University of London. His research focusses on the history of printed board games. He curated an exhibition of games from his collection at the Grolier Club, published as The Cultural Legacy of the Royal Game of Goose (2019). His latest publication is Cartographic Games (2023).

Grace Touzel is a PhD candidate at the School of Advanced Study, University of London, and a librarian at London's Natural History Museum. Her research examines London blankbook binders of the long 18th century. She has published on pioneering naturalists and the blankbooks of Sir Hans Sloane.

Laurence Worms is an antiquarian bookseller. He researches the history of the London map trade and has contributed to publications of the London Topographical Society. His British Map Engravers (2011) has become the standard work.
